CONTRACTOR JOHN McDON. ALD, OF CHATHAM, IN TOWN OF CONSID ERABLE BEING DONE

John McDonaid, of John McDonald & Co., contractors, of Chatham, and one of the tenderers for the contract for repairs on the railway from Norton to Chipman, arrived in the city last night.




