The report on statistics was presented by the clerk, showing that there are now eighteen self-sustaining congregations, four augmented congregations, five mission fields.

There are at present five vacant congregations—Blackville, Black River, Milford, Bathurst and Campbellton. Two augmented churches became self-sustaining during the year—Tabularia and Milford.

ALL EYES NOW ON GASPE HARBOR AS THE WINTER PORT

Upper Canadian Capitalists Are Taking Up Matter
of Railway Extension to
Gaspé Basin.

THE SHORT ROUTE AGAIN

At frequent intervals the encouraging announcement is made that capitalists have at last recognized the advantages of Gaspé as the winter port of Canada, and that the railway extension to Gaspé Basin will be pushed to completion so that this famous port can be used as the winter port of Canada.

Last week it was announced here that a company composed of capitalists of which it is believed the Canadian Northern are not the least prominent, may be formed to continue the railway line to Gaspé, Quebec, with the idea of making that port the winter port of Canada.

It is claimed the harbor at Gaspé is expected to be completed, about seventy four miles of rails are yet to be laid in that section. The road formerly constructed by the Atlantic and Lake Superior Railway from Paspébec to Matapédia, about ninety-seven miles, will, if possible be purchased and on completion of the International Railway this summer, between St. Leonard and Campbellton, it is intended to join by a new bridge across the Restigouche River at Campbellton the railway line to Montreal.

This would give the new road connection with the G. T. P. C. P. R. and T. C. R. and make it a link in at least two transcontinental systems. It is claimed that in this way the winter railway haul to Montreal would be shortened by 300 miles, and that considerable reduction could be made in the steamship routes between Canada and Great Britain.

One of the incidental features is to make Campbellton a distributing point for mails east and west.

The St. John Times, commenting on the conference of business men and newspaper men in St. John, makes the following timely comment:—We are all, in a sense, groping toward the light. A new spirit has possessed the people of New Brunswick, but they are not quite sure whether it will lead them. Their faces are turned toward the morning, and not toward the sunset—to the east and not toward the west. Wherever men get together, whether in farmers' conventions, conferences of municipal representatives or boards of trade, the question uppermost is this: What can we say or do to develop greater confidence in the resources and advantages of New Brunswick, and more effective means of turning all of them to profit? Nor is the change of sentiment confined to material things. In many affecting moral and social conditions a new spirit has arisen. The whole outlook of the citizen of New Brunswick whether he is as yet fully conscious of it or not, has vastly improved. This conference will do great good. It is the beginning of a movement the significance of which is perhaps not realized at the moment. We in St. John are at present putting emphasis upon the growth that has taken place here in ten years. Campbellton is growing at a faster rate than any other town in New Brunswick, but it could grow faster. Why not help it along.

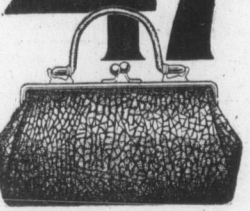
