





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SHORT TERM CREDITS How the Government co-operates With Local Associations.

Individual Farmers, the Township Council and the Government Pool Subscriptions — Managed by a Board - Ten Associations Local Already Doing Business.

(Contributed by Ontwrio Department of Agriculture, Toronto.) There is one distinctive difference between the system of long-term loans and the system of short-term loans recently inaugurated in this Province. Those who have followed the preceding articles will have observed that long-term loans are made direct by the Agricultural Develop-ment Board, 5 Queen's Park, To-ronto. In contrast to this, no shortterm loans are made by the Board, but are made solely through local associations organized for this purpose.

Short Time Credits Described.

Short Time Credits Described. The reason for this difference in method of operation lies in the differ-ence in the nature of the security and the nature of the loan. In the matter of long-term loans, the secur-ity is a first mortgage on land, and the personality of the borrower, while important, is secondary. In the short-term loans, the security is a note or lien on chattels, and the personality of the borrower, and his reputation in the community, is one of the big determining factors. Then, too, the loan is usually a small one. too, the loan is usually a small one. With \$2,000 as the maximum, the average loan will no doubt be a good deal under \$1,000. It would, there-fore, be physically impossible for any central office to grant and supervise loans in all the different sections of the Province for small amounts. No other system of granting short-term loans on personal or chattel security by a central office for a whole Pro-vince is in existence. 




