GERMANY IN DRIVE TO REVIVE PRE-WAR TRADE

Washington, March 18 .- Germany is making good progress in a drive to revive her pre-war trade in lowpriced articles with South America, according to a report to the United States department of commerce today from a trade agent at Santiago, Chile.

Germany's appeal, the report said, is made for the most part on a price basis, though not as low as before the war. The report declares British, French and Belgian goods are as much favored by the present premium on dollars as are

Accounts of the credit terms being granted by the German shippers vary greatly, the report concludes. There are reports of terms varying all the way from fifteen days to two years.

FOUR CHILDREN PERISH IN FIRE; London Needs a Good Hockey WERE LOCKED IN HOME WHILE PARENTS WERE OUT VISITING

President Anderson of the Alert Cline Sault Ste. Marie Couple Are Bereaved in Tragic Manner—addressed the Kiwanians at the: Blaze Was Discovered by Neighbors, Who Were Unaware That the Children Were in the House-Coroner Will Conduct an Investigation.

> Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., March 18.—In the absence of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Andrews, four children, the oldest 8 years of age, and the youngest aged 16 months, were smothered to death last evening when the house in which they had been left alone took fire. The father and mother had gone out for the evening, taking with

them the baby, only 2 months old, and had left the other children at home, with the door locked, to prevent marauders entering. Shortly after 8 o'clock the neighbors noticed signs of fire and sent in an alarm, but were unaware that the children were in the house. The blaze, which gutted the interior of the dwelling, had apparently gained good headway before it was noticed, and by the time the brigade arrived had gone so far that the firemen, after breaking in the door, were funable to enter. When the flames had been brought under control they forced their way in, and a search of the house revealed three children lying smothered upstairs and one downstairs. Several doctors were on the scene at once, but it was too late to do anything for them.

One fire truck broke through a bridge on the way to the fire, but this did not hold up the fire fighters any, as the brigade from another hall arrived at the same time. The children were: Alice, aged 8; Alfred, aged 6; Rose, aged 4, and Mabel, 16 months. The origin of the fire has not been determined. Coroner McLurg will conduct an

Bandit Shot to INFANT DEATH RATE Death in Fight | IN LONDON REDUCED TO 103.9 PER 1,000

Work of Child Welfare Association Begins To Have Effect.

MAKE 3,490 VISITS

Pre-Natal Causes Responsible for Three-Fifths of Deaths.

The safeguarding of infant life will one of the principal subjects brought don Child Welfare Association, which is to be held in the Chamber of Comis to be held in the Chamber of Commerce rooms on Tuesday next.

In the year 1919, the infant mortality rate in London, excluding stillbirths, was 116.7 per 1,000 live births. In 1920 the figures had fallen to 103.9 per 1,000, indicating that the work of the association was taking effect, and in 1920 the rate, including stillbirths, was 137.0 per 1,000.

No fewer than thre-fifths of these

No fewer than thre-fifths of these infants died from prenatal causes, and the association has issued an appeal to the medical profession in London and the medical profession in London and vicinity asking their co-operation in the proposed prenatal work in this city, the general plan of which has already received the approval of the Western Academy of Medicine.

The number of children born in London in 1920 was 1,518, and 208 of these succumbed to various causes, many of which were susceptible of prevention.

During the past year the three nurses of the association made no fewer than 3.490 visits.

GRADE SURCHARGE ON TICKETS TO U.S.

Passenger Agents Receive Information On Subject.

Starting March 21, a graded surcharge to cover the rate of exchange will be made on all railroad tickets sold in Canada for points in the United States, according to information received to day by the local passenger agents. In the same message it was announced that the rate of exchange will be fixed twice monthly by the Canadian Railway Association; the rate prevailing on the first day of each month governing until the fourteenth day, when the rate will be fixed for the remainder of the month. From March 21 to March 31, inclusive, the rate will be 15 per cent.

So that the surcharge could be applied justly to all parts of Canada, it will be graded into three classes according to the distance of the point from the border. At points on the border the full rate will be charged from the border at 75 per cent stations comparatively near the frontier a 75 per cent stations comparatively near the frontier a 75 per cent surcharge will be made, while those at greater distances it, will be placed in 50 per cent or 25 per cent.

The system as it stands now will leave many openings for those in London who wish to evade paying the full amount of the surcharge. SURVIVORS LEFT IN PARLIAMENT

Only Three Who Sat Behind John A.-No Pre-1896 Liberals.

Ottawa, March 17.—General Sir Sam Hughes' address last week brought forcibly home to parliament how few veterans remain in federal political life. mons ever sat behind the founder of the Liberal-Conservative party, Sir John A. Macdonald. Sir George E. Foster entered the Commons in 1882, and for nine years following the great leader. William Smith, South Ontario, has been in political life since 1882, but in that year, his first contest, he failed to win, arriving in the Commons in 1887 and remaining there until 1896, when he was defeated by Sir Charles Tupper on the Manitoba school issue. He did not come back until 1911, and so has the unique record of having been in public life for nearly forty years, twenty of them in the House of Commons, but never sitting in opposition. Hon. Dr. Reid entered parliament in 1890, and was present when the Conservative leader passed away. Only these three remain of the Macdonald era. Two others of the present members were in parliament before 1896—Sir Sam Hughes and W. F. Maclean. They entered the Commons in by-elections early in 1892, and have had unbroken political records William Smith, South Ontario, has commons in by-electrons carry in 1825, and have had unbroken political records ever since. Thus only five men have stood the test of time or public opinion out of the group in the Commons before 1896. On the Liberal side there is not a member who was in parliament before Sir Wilfrid Laurier succeeded to the premiership, and only two or three who were elected in the contest that brought the great Liberal chief to power. For length of parliamentary service, Sir George E. Foster is easily first, and for continuous service Hon. Dr. Reid leads, with Sir Sam Hughes and W. F. Maclean only a year behind. When Sir George Foster entered the Commons, the present prime minister was a lad of 8 years of age on a fatm in Perth County.

Can Germany Pay?

Germany must pay, say the Allied bayonets in Dusseldorf, Duisburg and Ruhrort; Germany must pay, said Premier Lloyd George, speaking for the Allies at the London reparations conference; Germany must pay, agree the newspaper editors in this country as well as in France and England. But can Germany pay? Is Germany ready to make an honest effort to pay? Most editorial observers comment on the lack of accurate post-war statistics on German trade and finance. Every careful newspaper reader has been puzzled by the contradictory stories coming from Germany. One investigator reports marvelous industrial recovery, and another, apparently equally reliable, describes Germany as a land of hunger and poverty and complete industrial collapse. The view of the Kansas City Times is that "Germany is a dishonest bankrupt hiding her assets and dodging her obligations while pretending to hand over her all." Germany, says the London Economist, "has been letting her state finances fall into disorder with a view to showing an economic weakness. Her state services have been run at a loss, and she has used the printing press with a freedom that has aroused the admiring envy of British inflationists. But her industry is in much better shape than her state finances, and on her industry her power to pay is ultimately based."

A wonderful book has come from the pen of Arthur Mee, famous already for his Children's Encyclopaedia, My Magazine, and the Chilnew book is entitled "Little Treasare Island," and is a paean of praise to England, "her story and her

DIVORCE IN INDIA IS NOT VALID IN ENGLAND

NOT VALID IN ENGLAND

LONDON, March 18—A far-reaching divorce judgment was delivered by Sir Henry Duke when he decided that a decree by a court in India dissolving a marriage contracted in India, but one of the parties to which was domiciled in England, has no validity.

Capt. Reginald Keyes asked for dissolution on the grounds of improper conduct of his wife with a brother officer. A divorce had been granted to him in India, but he was doubtful as to the legality of the decree and so brought action here. Despite arguments from the India office holding that the Indian court had the same competence as the English court, and saying that otherwise such decision would make illegitimate thousands of children born of second marriages of persons divorced in India since the passage of the Indian divorce law of 1869, Sir Henry gave judgment in favor of Keyes. He held that Keyes was domiciled in England, that the said marriage still prevailed and that he was entitled to a decree which, Sir Henry said, would be granted with costs against the co-respondent again.

The sorrowing mother saw hope receding, but it never vanished from her heart while she lived.

To a thousand dollars for a Lincoln G. Hutton scholarship at Victoria she added another thousand in her will, besides giving \$500 to the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, and \$2,000 to establish a soldiers' home.

Today Mr. Rodd made it quite clear that the body could not be brought to Canada, as the French Government would not consent.






