HUNTINGTON, W. Va., July 22.—A remarkable case of long slumber is reported by Ed. Church, the boy prisoner in jail here. On Jan. 7 the entire family of Farmer Church, living near Guayanotte, were poisoned with the exception of Ed., the 17-year-old son. The mother and two children died. Ed. was arrested on suspicion and confessed that he had put arsenic in the coffee. He was put in jail here, and since about Feb. 1 has slept from 20 to 23 hours every day. He has to be awakened and forced to eat, and often it is impossible to break his sleep. His case is a puzzle to physicians.



Measures intended to give effect to this demand were several times introduced in the Imperial Parliament, but were always defeated through the influence of Bismarck. Dr. Lowe, the Jewish Liberal, speaking on the subject in 1878, stated that as a physician he had visited more than 9,000 workmen who worked on Sundays in their shops of at their houses, and he found proof that Sunday labor had the most disastrous effect. "In their homes," he said, ess and discord reign; the life of the wine-shop has supplanted the family life."
