Storm-Swept Britain! The Gale Renewed With Increased

Violence. Disastrous Results of the Big Blow.

A Coal Steamer Sunk and All Hands Lost.

A Number of Coasting Vessels Known to Have Been Lost.

London, Oct. 15.—The fury of the tempest has not yet exhausted itself. With the rising of the sun to-day the storm resumed its awful violence. London is being deluged with rain, swept with fearful wind blasts, shaken by thunder and startled by flashes of the most vivid lightning. Fearful weather is prevailing in the channel. The Boulogne packet boats are unable to put to sea. All along the coast the beach is STREWN WITH WEECKAGE.

At Dover a large quantity of material evidently belonging to one or more wrecked ships has been washed ashore. The body of a steamship fireman has been washed ashore at Holyhead.

ALL HANDS LOST.

A Cardiff coal-laden steamer sank yesterday near Holyhead, and the entire crew perished. The weather in the Irish Sea is the most severe experienced in many years. In the midland counties especially has great damage been done to the stacked crops.

LONDON, Oct. 16.—Many vessels have been seen driven helplessly past Dungeness Light flying signals of distress. The lifeboats were unable to be of any assistance, owing to the speed at which the vessels were being driven down channel by the storm. Yesterday morning an immense scaffolding erected about a building near Hyde Park gate collapsed under the pressure of the hurricane, burying in its ruins a number of persons who had sought shelter beneath it. One person was fatally injured, and many women received severe

The storm at Leicester wrecked a large menagerie, killing many of the animals, and severely wounding a number of others. Goschen Gives His Views on

He Says "Balfour Has Triumphed Over

the Irish Specter.' Convention of the Irish National Fed

London, Oct. 16.—Hon. Geo. J. Goschen spoke yesterday at Cambridge. He denied that the bye-elections furnished a forecast of a Liberal majority at the general elections. Sir Wm. Vernon Harcourt's predictions about the matter, he said, were "mere chuckle and chaff." The Unionists were not despondent and had no reason for early dissolution. The vast constitutional changes approved by the Liberals would require second appeal to the country if sincerely voted, but their object generally was to catch votes. If the House of Lords rejected home rule the Gladstonians did not intend to dissolve Parliament, but rather to try to tinker and fiddle with the constitution. The people ought to have an opportunity of declaring themselves on the subject of home rule as a straight issue. Responsible Liberal statesmen proposed to deal with the House of Lords without anything to replace them. They surprised him about the "one man one vote" idea. If it happened it must be accompanied by a redistribution of seats. He raised a warning voice against the payment of members; they ought to be absolutely the independent friend and not theservant of the constituencies. With short Parliaments and paid members good legislative work would cease. Regarding the leadership of the House of Commons, he said that Mr. Balfour had triumphed over the Irish specter. Nothing was more natural than that the most successful Irish Secretary should lead the Unionist host in the House of Commons in their coming battles.

Meetings at Kingsville, Cottam and Harrow.

Kingsville, Oct. 15.—The traveling KINGSVILLE, Oct. 15.—The traveling dairy held a meeting here on Saturday at 2 p.m. in the town hall. This meeting was well attended by an appreciative audience. Mr. W. J. Palmer delivered a lecture on dairying, while the butter made by Mr. Brown was of excellent quality. About 50 pounds of new milk were brought to the meeting and the cream separated by the De Laval cream separater, after which the practical value of this machine was duly explained. On Monday the members of the dairy proceeded to Cottam and held a meeting at the residence of Mr. Buckle, a mile from the village. The Harrow fair was next visited on Tuesday and Wednesday, when the large tent was set up and practical butter-making if—atrated every afternoon. Samples of milk were also tested and cream separated from the new milk. Lectures were delivered by Prof. Dean on the subject of butter-making. This portion of Essex is largely dovoted to the growth of corn and fruit, but gradually more attention is being given to dairying. A cheese factory is being erected near Harrow this season which will be put in operation next season.

BREATHES THROUGH A WHISTLE.

BREATHES THROUGH A WHISTLE.

A Boy Thrives Despite a Piece of His Toy Balloon in His Throat.

St. John, N. B., Oct. 15.—A case very similar to that of Dr. Bothwell in Brocklyn is attracting much attention among physicians here. Twenty-four days ago John Taylor, 10 years old, was playing with a toy balloon. The balloon was filled with air through a hollow mouthpiece. Taylor blew too hard and the balloon burst. He was startled by the sound, and his gasp of surprise drew the mouthpiece, together with a piece of rubber, into his windpipe. His desperate efforts to obtain breath forced the obstruction down to the bronchial tubes, at the entrance to which it became lodged.

Mrs. Taylor found the boy semi-unconscious, and the strange sound made by the whistle as he attempted to breathe explained his plight. At the public hospital Doctors Maclaren and White at once decided upon trachectomy as affording the only chance to save Taylor's life. The incision was made, but the whistle could not be reached. The physicians said then that Taylor's death was a question of only a few hours.

Now, more than three weeks since the accident, the "house doctor" announces that Taylor would be sent home in a day or two, as nothing more could be done for him. The whistle has become firmly lodged in the left bronchial tube, and the patient In the left bronchial tube, and the patient breathes through it with comparative ease. It is thought the rubber attachment must have been absorbed, as no whistling has been heard since a day or two after the accident. The boy still breathes partially through the incision in his throat, but it is rapidly healing. His general health has improved, and he gives little indication of the terrible ordeal through which he passed.





3. Newcomers to the city. It must be remembered that for Dominion purposes the city only embraces Wards 1, 2, 3 and 4. Ward 5 (East London) and Ward 6 (South London) are in the county. Citizens who have within a year moved from Wards 5 or 6, or from London West, into either of the other four wards, should examine the lists at once. In all probability their names are omitted. Newcomers from other parts of the country should also take action, or they will lose their votes.

Let every citizen remember that the voter who gives half an hour to aid in purging the lists now contributes far more to victory in the next election than would be effected by days of work in the campaign if he fails to do his duty at present.
