Cholera Claims Many Victims.

Tunis, Sept. 13.—Of the 9,000 pilgrims that left here and other ports in May last that left here and other ports in May last for Mecca only half have returned, the others having fallen victims to the cholera. The survivors tell terrible tales of suffering. On June 24, 100,000 pilgrims were gathered on the secred mount to hear a selemn address prior to their proceeding to Mecca. Many of the multitude were starving. The mountresembled abattlefield, being strewn with the corpses of victims of the pestilence, among whom were lying hundreds of the poor wretches dying from the dread disease. So frightful was the condition of affairs that no one dared to capproach the place. Finally a force of 700 Turkish soldiers was sent to bury the dead and rescue the living. Of the whole battalion only 200 men escaped the pestilence.

The certificate holders present owned 38 per cent. of the trust, 62 per cent. having been retired. The trustees advised the cancellation of the certificates and the issue instead of securities against the companies forming the old trust. The report was adopted.

A FATAL FIRE.

A Canadian Steamer Destroyed With Loss of Life.

The Eyron Trerice Reduced to Ashes at Leamington-Two Men Burned to Death and a Girl Drewned -Big Loss.

Leamington, Ont., Sept. 13.—The steamer Byron Trerice, which plies between Rondeau harbor and Cleveland, was burned at the Leamington dock this morning at 2 o'clock. The origin of the fire is unknown, but is supposed to have been caused by the explosion of the lamp which burns on the forward part of the vessel at night. The fire had gained such headway before it was discovered, and was burning so rapidly, that those of the crew who escaped did so only with their lives. She had been thoroughly overhauled and refitted to the extent of \$12,000 last winter, so that she was as elegant a boat as any of her class. The result of all this medley and clamor of clashing interests still asking the Government to help them, and trying to fasten the worst abuses of protection upon the new system of a tariif for revenue only, must be to show to the country and the Ways and Means Committee the impossibility and inequity of a jumbling scale of duties, and the necessity and justice of imposing a uniform ad yalorem duty.

The gentlemen who are having a hearing before the Ways and Means Committee seem to think that the tariff is to be made for their benefit. Yet the object of a tariff for revenue only is only revenue. It is for the benefit of the whole country, and the nursing of special interests can find no part in it. It must be just and uniform, following one and the same plan, and muss not be cobblestoned with favoritism.



Sir John Thompson made his first public address at Montreal Tuesday. In his speech he touched on the future policy of his Government, affirming his adherence to a tariff levied so as to benefit a few at the proposed by the Liberals. They are hopeful that the United States Congress will carry out a similar programme in spite of the manufac tured scares of the favored few, but in any case such is the system that the majority of the people of Canada can be relied on to establish and maintain.

Why, it has been asked, are the Canadian high tax organs so ready to believe and to reproduce the fearful forebodings of the United States newspaper defenders of class legislation? Probably on the ground assumed by the criminals who resolved to hang together in their effort to avoid punishment lest they might hang separately.

It is natural that the Canadian "pro tectionist" apologists should go to the United States for arguments in support of the robber tariff. When it was inaugurated by Sir Leonard Tilley, he borrowed a man to show him the most approved way to systematically plunder the people by the aid of a "protective" tariff. Ringing Declaration of the English Liberal Federation.

The Lords Must Not Stand in the Way of the People-A Crisis in History.

London, Sept. 13 .- The circular issued LONDON, Sept. 13.—The circular issued to day by the National Liberal Federation is virtually an important Ministerial manifesto. The federation has sent to every federated association in the United Kingdom a copy of the manifesto, the substance of which is here given:

For several years the Irish home rule question had been subject to discussion in the constituencies more full, thorough and sustained than had ever before been given to any political proposal. In July, 1892, Mr. Gladstone came in power with a clear mandate to deal with the subject."

The circular here briefly summarizes the course of the bill in the House of Commons and the House of Lords, and then continues:

"The seven years' discussion by the country, the 82 days' consideration by the House of Commons and the definitely ascertained wishes of over 2,000,000 electors, are all to count as nothing when opposed to the views of some 400 Conservative peers, representing themselves alone, and for the most assembled merely by virtue of being the sons of their fathers. 
