NEW GAIN FOR BRITISH TO SOUTHWEST OF LENS

Further Resistance of Germans Reduced by Storming of Defence-Last Night -Petain's Poilus Again Outfighting the Enemy.

Paris, Aug. 23. - The number of prisoners taken by the French in their offensive operation on the Verdun front has been increased to 7,639, the war office reports. The French last night captured a fortified German position north of Mortmont farm. The announcement follows:

"The German artillery was very active north of the Aisne, especially in the sector between Braye-en-Laonnois and Hurtebise. Several enemy attacks in the regions of Laffaux Mill, Ailles and Cerny were repulsed.
"On the left bank of the Meuse 'On the left bank of the Meuse (Verdun front) our artillery, which had the upper hand, was very active during the night. On the right bank of the river a detail operation enabled us to reduce a small point of resistance of the enemy north of Mortmont farm. We took seventeen prisoners.







HOUSEWIVES MUST USE LESS WHEAT, **BEEF AND BACON**

Conserve Food and Help Allies Win the War.

CRITICAL STAGE IS NOW

Economy Is Vital if Famine at Home Is To Be

Mrs. David Williams, "Bishopstowe," who was appointed chairman of the committee of the Women's Auxiliary of the Organization of Repurces Committee, at the organization neeting held some days ago, makes the following appeal to the housewives of London in connection with the food onservation movement:

The Housewife and the War. We are now in the most critical stage of the war, and the most vital question at this critical stage is how to feed our allies in Europe and our soldiers at the front. The great needs are wheat, beef and bacon. To secure enough of these, the housewives of Canada must use one-sixth less wheat and nearly the housewives of Canada must use one-sixth less wheat and nearly one-third less beef and bacon than they have been using. The Government has enforced this by law in hotels and restaurants, where neither beef nor bacon may be served on Tuesdays and Fridays, and other than white bread must be served at every meal.

In the Homes, Too.

Now we appeal to the housewives of this district to carry out the same regulations in their homes. Success in conserving food will depend much more upon us, the thousands of housewives, than upon the comparatively few hotels and restaurants.

staurants. Remember, the danger is not alone that our soldiers and allies will suffer, but that we at home will face scarcity if not cat home will

will suffer, but that we at home will face scarcity, if not famine, conditions. For the fact is that next year there will not be enough of these three great commodities to go around unless we economize and use substitutes this year. It is unthinkable that our soldiers, who are fighting our battles and risking their lives for us should have their food cut down. Any shortage will, therefore, fall upon us; and, therefore, to save ourselves from scarcity. herefore, fall upon us; and, therefore, to save ourselves from scarcity or famine conditions next year, we must now conserve our food, especially wheat, beef and bacon. ve must now conserve our food, specially wheat, beef and bacon.

Must Eat Less.

How is this to be done? We

How is this to be done? We answer:

1. We must all use one-sixth less wheat (whether in the form of flour or in any other form), and in making bread use oatmeal, cornment, buckwheat or rye flour mixed with white flour, to the extent of at least one-sixth.
