A Striking Comparison.

To Sir James P. Whitney:

The attention of the Prime Minister of Ontario is respectfully directed to the action of the Toronto police commissioners, which shows that Toronto, along with other great cities, is desirous of giving reasonable remuneration to those who are engaged by them to do work which is not always of an agreeable nature.

Police constables, after a few years, may earn \$1,000 a year, the attendant with 17 years' experience was only receiving \$120 a year more than this?






