Musical instruments became fixtures in the home until today one is not regarded "in the swim" unless one has a piano, a phonograph or other instrument. The home is regarded as incomplete, in fact, the dwelling is not regarded as a home unless music is housed beneath its roof.





It is noticeable that he is not giving much attention to this matter in the East, although his backers boast that he has one policy only for all Canada. Why, Mr. Somerville asks, should he stop in the West? Why not pool the crops of Ontario and Quebec, the dairy produce as well, the fish and coal trade of the Maritimes? One is as reasonable as the other.




