old English Terms For Groups of

Persons and Animals.

In a book on British sports, written in the eighteenth century, Joseph Strutt gives the old English terms for groups of various beasts as follows: "When beasts went together in companies there was said to be a pride or flons, a lepe of leopards, a herd of harts, of bucks and of all sorts of deer; a bevy of roes, a sloth of boars, a sownder of wild swine, a drift of tame swine, a route of wolves, a harras of horses, a rag of colts, a stud of mares, a pace of asses, a baren of mules, a team of oxen, a drove of kine, a flock of sheep, a tribe of goats, a skulk of foxes, a cete of badgers, a richness of martins, a fesynes of ferrets, a huske or a down of hares, a nest of rabbits, a clowder of cats and a kyndall of young cats, a shrewdness of apes and a labor of moles."

Similar terms were applied to gatherings of human beings. Strutt gives them as follows: "A state of princes, a skulk of thieves, an observance of hermits, a lying of pardoners, a subtitite of sergeants, an untruth of somp-ners, a multiplying of husbands, a safeguard of porters, a stalk of forest-ers, a blast of hunters, a draft of but-lers, a temperance of cooks, a melody of harpers, a poverty of pipers, a drunkenship of cobblers, a disguising of taylors, a wandering of tinkers, a malpertness of pedlars, a fighting of beggars, a rayful—that is, a netful—of knaves, a blush of boys, a bevy of la-dies, a nenpatience of wives, a gagle

of women, a gagle of geese."

Banana Crop Every Fifte in Days. "There is evidently an erroneous idea abroad concerning the harvesting of the banana crop," said a man who has been for seven years on a plantation in Honduras.

"The statement that four or five crops of bananas are harvested a year is entirely incorrect. A crop is har-vested on an average of every fifteen days throughout the year. Each thrifty banana plant has many suckers or stalks growing from a single root at the same time. One or more bunches
of the ripening fruit are cut from a single stalk, while the other stalks growing from the same root are left untouched, and in fifteen days another of the stalks is shorn of its fruit. This process continues incessantly during the year. In July and August it is necessary to cut off the ripening bunches every ten days, while in December and January about once a month is sufficient, the average throughout the year being practically fifteen days."-Mexican Herald.





Jean Jacques Rousseau in his "Con-fessions" says he foresaw in a reverie while taking a solitary walk all the incidents of the happiest day of his life

as they occurred eight years later:
"I saw myself, as in an ecstasy, transported into that happy time and occasion, where my heart, possessing all the happiness possible, enjoyed it with inexpressible raptures, without thinking of anything sensual. I do not remember being ever thrown into the future with more force or an illusion so complete as that which I then experienced. What struck me most in the recollection of that reverie, now that it has been realized, is to have found objects so exactly as I had pictured them. If ever the dream of a man awake had the air of a prophetic

vision that was assuredly such."

It is, I think, noteworthy that in all clairveyant cases of this kind the body is through overwork or ill health or fasting or congenitally in the subdued state to which the Indian mystic and miracle monger reduces his own by maceration. It was so with Scott and Rousseau, and with William Hone when he had the following experience recorded in his memoir. When worn out with overwork he was shown into certain room in a certain part of London where he had never been be-

"On looking around everything appeared perfectly familiar to me. seemed to recognize every object. I said to myself: 'What is this? I was never here before, and yet I have seen all this, and if so there is a very pe-culiar knot in the shutter.' I opened the shutter and found the knot. Now, then, I thought, here is something I cannot explain on my principles; there must be some power beyond matter." And from being a pronounced materialist he became a believer in spirits,

and, indeed, eventually a profoundly religious soul.-T. P.'s London Weekly.

At a dinner given in London in 1861 by Baron Brunnow to the Grand Duke of Saxe-Weimar Herr von Bismarck, who was one of the guests, had a long conversation with Mr. Disraeli, then leader of the opposition.
