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

To His Excellency The Right Honorable Charles Stanley, Viscount Monck, Governor General of British North America, &c., &c., &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

I have the honor, for the last time as Minister of Agriculture for the Province of Canada, of laying before your Excellency the Report of the operations of this Department for the year 1866; and in so doing I shall confine myself to a full detail of the work carried on during that period, having in previous Reports—and especially in the last Report—fully expressed my opinion on several important subjects connected therewith.

It is with much satisfaction that I am able to repeat my remarks of last year, as to the progress of the Department, under the valuable and efficient superintendence of my Deputy, Mr. Taché.

I.—GENERAL REMARKS.

Respecting the improvements proposed in former Reports, I beg to express the hope that the various suggestions made by myself and my predecessors will be adopted by the future Confederate Government; that thus may be secured to those branches of the Public Service, hitherto included in this Department, a certainty and systematic operation which they have not formerly possessed.

The Monthly Reports of the Agricultural Department at Washington, received by us, furnish abundant evidence of what may be done, even in new countries like ours, in colecting agricultural statistics and rendering them serviceable to the general public.

For the better performance of the duties entrusted to this Department I would again, with the view of bringing the subject before the Executive of the future Confederate Government, suggest the importance of early legislation on the following subjects:

1st. The laws respecting Registration and Statistics.

2nd. A new law of Patents.

3rd. Amendments to the Copyright Act.

II.-AGRICULTURE.

Under the Constitutional Act, calling into existence the new Dominion, the administration of our Agricultural laws will be a subject, to some extent, of both local and general concern. The clause explains itself sufficiently on this head.

" AGRICULTURE AND IMMIGRATION.

"Clause 95.—In each Province the Legislature may make laws in relation to Agriculture in the Province; and, it is hereby declared that the Parliament of Canada may, from
time to time, make laws in relation to Agriculture, in all or any of the Provinces, and to
Immigration into all or any of the Provinces; and any law of the Legislature of a Province relative to Agriculture or to Immigration shall have effect in and for the Province
as long and as far only as it is not repugnant to any Act of the Parliament of Canada."

These concurrent powers, it is to be apprehended, may occasion, at least at first, much practical difficulty to the future administrators of this Department; but the interests are, in the main, so obviously general, that it is to be hoped local impediments will not be found seriously to interfere with the adoption of the most liberal legislation whether as regards Immigration or Agriculture.

THE LATE RECIPROCITY TREATY.

The fears entertained last year with regard to the unfortunate effect of the abrogation of the Reciprocity Treaty between the United States and the British Provinces, have not been realized to the extent anticipated.

The following statement of exports from 1859 to 1866 will shew that the demand for 1865 was quite one of an exceptional character, and that although there is a falling off in the exports of 1866 compared with those of the year immediately preceding, yet in the average of seven years there is no falling off in the aggregate.

The Annual Return of the Board of Agriculture of Upper Canada will be found in the Appendix, which gives an encorraging prospect of the farming interest in the west.*

The Upper Canada Provincial Exhibition for the past year, held at Toronto, was a highly successful display of the Agricultural and Industrial resources of the Province, and especially in the variety and number of valuable stock exhibited, exciting great interest among our own and American Agriculturalists. These Exhibitions in the western section of the Province have steadily advanced in magnitude and importance, and do much credit to the local management. They have fully represented the annual improvement in the breed of stock, in the growth of cereals, in fruits and vegetables, and the products of the workshop and factory.

The following statement shows at a glance the operations of the Boards, up to this date:-

FLAX CULTURE.

In consequence of the repeated representations made to the Government for the importation of Riga Flax seed, for distribution among the farmers of Upper and Lower Canada, an Order in Council was issued on the 6th of January, 1866, authorizing the purchase of 1,000 bushels of the best Riga Flax. The seed, obtained in England, arrived at Portland on the 2nd of April, and was distributed (at cost price) in the following proportions to the respective Boards of Trade at Montreal and Toronto:

The importation has induced many persons to devote part of their land to the cultivation of this valuable crop. Mr. Donaldson, Emigration Agent at Toronto, in his special report on this subject, says:—

"Of the progress of flax culture I have only to say it is steadily increasing, and is now beginning to be spoken of in the commercial world as ranking among the staple crops of the country. Thus, next year, the number of acres will no doubt be double that of any former year in Canada; and well may the farmers adopt it, as it is one of their best paying crops. I am authorized to state by Colonel R.L. Denison, of Dover Court, that he pulled three tons of flax from one acre this year; and, be it observed, this was from the Riga

seed imported by the Government, for which he received the round sum of \$48, or at the rate of \$16 % ton. The linen manufactories, scutching mills and linseed oil mills, are increasing throughout the country; and, as stated in last year's Report, no crop benefits the country more, and none is more in keeping with the progress of immigration, from the immense amount of labor it creates."

In the Report on the Trade and Commerce of Montreal, compiled by W. J. Patterson, Esq., Secretary to the Board of Trade and Corn Exchange Association of that city, the following statistics of the flax trade for the past two years are given:—

1865.—The quantity of seed brought to Montreal this year was fully 100,000 bushels, against 70,000 bushels in 1864, and 50,000 bushels in 1863. The local consumption in 1865 was about 80,000 bushels, 20,000 bushels or more going to Boston and Chicago.

"Scarcely any flax seed was received from Upper Canada this year, although the area under cultivation was greater than ever before, which was accounted for by the fact that several crushing mills had been erected in the West, thus creating a home market. American buyers had also been drawing large supplies from that part of the Province.

"1866.—The production of flax seed is steadily increasing, and farmers find the crop a remunerative one. The yield of this year showed that a larger breadth had been sown in both sections of Canada; the difference—as compared with 1865—showing an increase in the ratio of from 10 to 15 \$\pi\$ cent. The local consumption of Montreal this year was about the same as in the preceding one—say 80,000 to 85,000 bushels; the remainder of what was brought to the city was shipped to the United States, where there was a brisk demand."

The Board of Agriculture of Western Canada, in their Report, states that: "The Riga flax seed imported by the Government last year and very liberally supplied to the farmers, at a reduction upon cost price, has shown the advantage of such occasional importations by the superior length and quality of the fibre produced from it. The number of acres under flax last year in Upper Canada may be computed at 10,000."

"There are about 100 Scutching Mills in operation, three Linen Mills, and many Rope Walks, the products of all which establishments meet with a ready and remunerative sale. The seed is also in demand, at paying prices, either for manufacturing at our own oil mills or for exportation to the United States."

CULTURE OF THE VINE.

Respecting the culture of the vine and the manufacturing of wines therefrom, to which reference was made in our last reports, I am now enabled to confirm the statements then made and the opinions then given, "that Canada was situated in latitudes corresponding with those of the best vine-growing countries," and that the probability of establishing vineyards and manufacturing good ordinary wine seemed to be demonstrated beyond question, by the fact that good wholesome wine has been made at the vineyards of Clare House, County of Peel, of which Mr. DeCourtenay forwarded most excellent samples to the Deputy,—that the same has become a marketable article readily purchased in retail, and there is reason to expect that it will become an important article among the natural products of Canada.

III.—ARTS AND MANUFACTURES.

Both the Boards of Arts and Manufactures are in the same position as last year; and I refrain, on the present occasion, from repeating the suggestions made in former Reports, as the control of these Institutions will now be subject to a new jurisdiction. Their respective Annual Reports, in the Appendix, furnish information as to their proceedings during the year, and the balance sheets show how the grants have been expended.

The "Assessment Act of Upper Canada," passed during the last Session of Parliament authorizes the Council of every County, Township, City, Town and Municipal Village, to pass By-laws for aiding Agricultural and other Societies, among which the Board of Arts and Manufactures for Upper Canada is mentioned. Under this Act, the support of these various Societies will for the future be drawn more immediately from local resources, instead of being, as hitherto, almost entirely dependent on Legislative grants.

IV.—COLONIZATION ROADS IN LOWER CANADA.

This branch of the Department being placed by Order in Council, under the control of the Hon. the Commissioner of the Board of Works, I refer to his Report (included in this volume) for all information respecting the undertakings and expenditure of the year.

V.—IMMIGRATION.

In connection with Immigration I have the honor to report that, at the commencement of the year I engaged Mr. William Dixon, at Liverpool, as the Canadian Agent for the season of 1866, the appointment being expressly understood to be temporary.

Respecting Mr. Dixon's operations and the results, I cannot do better than quote the words of Mr. Buchanan, the Chief Emigrant Agent, who states:—

"I beg to draw your special attention to the Report of the proceedings of the Liver-pool Agent, Mr. Dixon, which appears in Paper No. 11.

"This Report embraces a view of the operations of the Agency during the season, and contains many valuable suggestions well deserving of consideration. I most fully concur in many of Mr. Dixon's views and opinions, and regard with a considerable degree of satisfaction the results of his labor. Since the establishment of the Liverpool Agency, in March last, every effort appears to have been made to gain for the resources of this country a wider publicity amongst the labouring population of the United Kingdom than they have obtained before. The official letters which I have been in the habit of receiving from Mr. Dixon from time to time abound with common sense and practical hints on the subject.

Mr. Dixon expresses, you will observe, a firm conviction, founded on experience, that the proper place for an Agency of this kind is London and not Liverpool. The reasons he gives for preferring the Metropolis are I think sufficiently cogent and they coincide entirely with those I advanced in a former Report when discussing the same question."

It will be further seen by the Report of Mr. Buchanan that although the number of Immigrants has greatly increased during the past year, yet it is not of so satisfactory a character as we could desire, inasmuch as a very large proportion are Norwegians and Swedes on route for the Western States. Of the 28,648 Immigrants, 14,968 were Norwegians

and Swedes, and of these a great proportion were induced to take passage to Quebec without the means of proceeding further, under the assurance that they would be sent on free of charge by our Government. I had the honor to call your Excellency's attention to this abuse in my last Report, and it is a grave subject for consideration whether some legislative remedy should not be adopted against a system which annually involves the Province in a leavy charge for the transportation of such persons beyond our own limits.

Mr. Buchanan gives his opinion on this point as follows:-

"This opinion, on further consideration, I have seen reason to change, as any such legislation would, I fear, drive the stream of Foreign Immigrants from our Ports to that of the United States, a consummation most devoutly to be wished on their part, and would most injuriously affect our railway and forwarding interests; as, although this large outlay may have been incurred, the Province is—if not directly, at least indirectly—benefitted.

"The entire expenditure incurred in their direct relief may be stated at \$13,000; but the amount of Emigrant Tax, which they have contributed was \$17,996, leaving a surplus of \$5,000, available for other purposes.

"The Foreign Immigrants of the past season paid to our Railway and Forwarding Companies over \$100,000 for their inland transport alone, independent of other outlays which they must have incurred for provisions, &c., &c., on their route. Of course it would be desirable, as I mentioned previously, that these poor people should not be sent to the United States by this route, under the belief that this Department would assist in forwarding them to their destinations. But as we cannot reach effectually the source of this abuse we are compelled to deal with it as it exists; and as no positive loss is incurred, but a large indirect benefit secured to the country, prudence would suggest that, for the present, matters should remain as they are, with the hope that we may shortly be in the position to offer such facilities and inducements as will secure a portion of this valuable immigration to settle in our country."

The mortality among those bound to our ports, from Great Britain, both on board and in Quarantine, has been comparatively small, numbering 8 deaths among 11,687 passengers; while among those from Germany and Sweden the deaths have numbered 176, out of 16,961 Emigrants, namely, 157 on board and 19 at Quarantine; again shewing that the expenses of Quarantine are chiefly incurred on account of foreign ships, and that a thorough revision of the system is required, in order that foreign ship-owners may be made to bear their share of the outlay.

The following conclusions from the Inland Agent's latest reports are reproduced here, with a view to attracting greater attention.

Mr. Daley, Agent at Montreal:—"On the important subject of Emigration the first question is, what class of mechanic or laborer is required for the Province generally? and secondly, the class wanted in this immediate vicinity, Montreal and its surroundings, coming specially under my direct supervision.

"The first and most important on the Island may be termed agricultural labor, not only because it affects Montreal, but the openings in every direction are such that there need be no hesitation in those skilled in agricultural pursuits making this neighborhood their home.

"Nearly all the branches of the manufacturing interest offer very lucrative employment for the skilled laborer, and even hard working uneducated men can earn good wages. There are two dangers attending all working men: the first is, that at certain periods of the year the demand for labor is far in excess of the supply; and secondly, money earned comparatively easily is spent quickly, in a manner that generates bad habits.

"Before closing my general remarks I may state that, what we term educated labor, is very much at a discount here; such is the excellent education given to our young men, that the surplus of those who do not care about farming pursuits study either for the Bar, Medicine or Commerce; and, having local connections, generally supplant any foreign competitor.

"I would therefore strongly advise the educated class of the middle ranks in England to think well before emigrating to this country, unless they have some certain prospect of a good start,"

Mr. Wills, Agent at Ottawa:—"From accounts generally received from the United States the labor market in that country seems quite overstocked; and on this account it may be that, hereafter, intending settlers may look to Canada for a new residence. If they do—as I have often predicted in the past—in the Ottawa Valley they are certain of being successful; and if this fact could only be made apparent in the proper quarter it should have the desired effect; and it remains with you to endeavor to have the information circulated among those who are likely to profit by it in the future. In this city, owing to the increase of population incident upon the removal of the Seat of Government, an activity has prevailed among all classes of the community hitherto quite unprecedented, which necessitated the employment of a larger number of all classes of persons.

"The greatest difficulty has been experienced in obtaining female servants, and, as a consequence, the rates of wages for this class of service has also been considerably increased. A suitable class of females, accustomed to the general duties of house service, would meet with ready employment here during the present year. If you can aid in obtaining a supply it would confer a favor on the inhabitants of this city. The surrounding country also requires a number of females, with a knowledge of farm service; if such could be sent hither their services would command immediate and remunerative employment."

Mr. McPherson, Agent at Kingston:—"The demand for farm laborers during the past season has been very great, I having received applications for upwards of one thousand laborers, and the wages offered were from \$1 to \$1.50 a day, and board, for these who knew anything about farming, the crops being unusually heavy and laborers very scarce; and I have no doubt but the demand will be fully as great, if not greater, the next season. The prices of all kinds of grain being so high, farmers will endeavor to put in as much as possible; therefore I am of opinion that ploughmen will be much needed in the spring of the year, and in harvest laborers of all kinds will be much required. The discovery of gold in the County of Hastings and in the rear of Addington will, no doubt, draw a great many of those who usually work at farm work to seek for the precious metal. I have not had an opportunity of visiting the locality where the gold has been discovered, but from the general reports that reach me, I have no doubt but that gold will be found in paying quantities in many of the townships in the Counties of Hastings, Lennox and Addington, and search can be made after the snow goes off in the spring. The last reports, however,

from what is called the "Richardson Mine," in the township of Madoc (which was purchased from the proprietor of the farm when the discovery was first made, at a cost of \$50,000 [fifty thousand dollars], states that the prospects are much greater than was first expected, and that very rich specimens of quartz have been discovered, which it is stated will yield several thousand dollars to the ton. If this should prove to be true it will make a great opening for immigrants."

Mr. Donaldson, Agent at Toronto:—"Were the Government to cause to be cleared on a few lots in one of the most eligible townships now surveyed and ready for the settler, say ten acres on each hundred, to erect a suitable log house or shanty of—say 20×30 feet, the cost of this improvement would only be some \$200, and would be readily paid back by the party entering on the land. There are hundreds of cases where families come out to this country with a few hundred pounds—or even dollars—in their pockets, who would readily avail themselves of such an offer, and would willingly pay back the cost of this clearing or improvement to the Government on entering on the premises. What a difference it would make to a party between going into the bush under such circumstances, having a house to take their family into, ten acres cleared—ready to their hand, and entering on the dense woods without such an advantage. The proposition has already been made in many instances to such parties, who readily admitted that they would be most willing to do so. Some twenty lots might be made ready in this way, which would involve an outlay on the part of the Government of only some \$8,000, all of which would be paid back, as already stated, by the party settling on the land."

Mr. Rea, Agent at Hamilton:—"Agricultural laborers, thoroughly conversant with the business, have been in much request, but the supply was not sufficient to meet the demand throughout this and the western section of the country. I have had numerous calls and many letters on the subject, but it was not in my power to afford them such assistance. It is a matter of surprise to me that more of this class do not come to this country, where they would obtain high wages, with board, and, by strict frugality, in a few years be in a position to purchase either wild or partially cleared lands, to commence for themselves. I may reiterate the same as regards servant girls well versed in household matters; they can at any time find plenty of respectable employment at remunerative wages. Needlewomen, tailors, shoemakers and the like, will always find abundance of work; the business of mechanics, such as boiler-makers, fitters, &c., is at present stagnant, but will, I have no doubt, revive before spring.

"Judging from the great prosperity which prevails throughout the country, and the frequent demand for all kinds of labor last summer, I feel confident that the inducements for those arriving in the spring are most encouraging. May my expectations be fully realized."

VI.—PATENTS, TRADE MARKS, AND DESIGNS.

During the past year the business of this branch of the Department has nearly doubled that of the year preceding.

Notwithstanding this increase, no accumulation of business in arrear has at any time occurred; and it is satisfastory to state that no complaint of delay has been made during the past twelve months.

During the last Session of Parliament an amendment to section 15 of the Patent law, to which I referred in my last Report as absolutely necessary, was passed, giving power to swear Arbitrators under the Act, as to the faithful fulfilment of their trust, and the power of administering oaths to witnesses, and, if required, to enforce the production of all papers and documents that may be considered necessary to the elucidation of the contested claims. Under the Act, as amended, several conflicting claims have been referred to arbitration, and have been settled.

It is, however, an important question, whether the principle of arbitration is the best for the settlement of such contested claims, or whether the validity of such claims could not be best decided in the ordinary Courts of Law.

An alteration of the Patent Laws so as to admit Non-residents of the Province to take out Patents has been brought under Your Excellency's notice in previous Reports, and I trust that under the future Confederate Government the subject will meet with the early attention which its importance requires.

Several applications have been made for the Registration of Trade Marks which were either similar to or closely resembled others already registered. My Deputy, Dr. Taché, acting under the authority of Section 4, of the Trade Marks Act, decided in these important cases in accordance with his view of equity and justice.

I would especially call your Excellency's attention to the following extract from the 3rd Section of the Trades Mark Act:—

"And the said Secretary, on receipt of the fee hereinafter provided, shall examine the said Trade Mark, to ascertain whether it resembles any other Trade Mark already regis-

tered. And if he find that such Trade Mark is not identical with, or does not so closely resemble as to be confounded with, any other Trade Mark already registered, he shall register the same, and shall return to the proprietor thereof one copy of the drawing and description, with his certificate thereto—that the said Trade Mark has been duly registered in accordance with the provisions of the Act."

It appears to me that the onus of searching the Trade Mark Register should rest with the applicant and not with the Secretary; and that the applicant—having full liberty to search the official record—should be at liberty to register any Trade Mark he chose; and if his claim was afterwards found conflicting with others the case should be settled in the Courts of Law.

The principle laid down above appears to me to be erroneous; and, under such impression, I beg respectfully to submit the question for future consideration.

*Several applications under the special Acts of last Session have been made, and Patents granted in accordance therewith.

I regret that I have again to report to Your Excellency the unfinished state of the Patent Office at Ottawa. In consequence of the special appropriation by the Legislature for its construction the necessary cases and shelving were commenced; but, judging from the slow progress of the work, it will not be completed for some months. There are now upwards of 2,000 models of inventions on our hands, and a daily accumulation of additions to the collection waiting to be placed.

The idea has been suggested to me that, in many instances, Models might be altogether dispensed with, and the usual deposit of Drawing—in which the leading features of the invention are clearly shown—might be accepted as sufficient. Such a course would occasion a great saving to applicants, as proper Models are often very expensive, and iff many cases very difficult of construction on the reduced scale fitted for our collection. This suggestion, with those preceding, I put on record for the benefit of those who, under the reorganization of the Departments, may be charged with the superintendence of Patents, Copyrights and Trade Marks.

No Designs have been registered in the office during the last twelve months.

VII.—STATISTICS.

The work of collecting and arranging the Statistics of the Province, undertaken two years ago, is still progressing and would have been in a much more forward state had the information required from local sources been more freely given. Of the returns called for from persons holding appointments from the Crown one only is complete,—the Registration of Marriages for 1866. Among the clergy of Upper Canada very many have given a willing and immediate response, some have treated the application with silent indifference, and one gentleman has given a direct refusal. The irretrievable loss of the Registers of Baptisms, Marriages and Burials by fire has been experienced in three instances; in a few the records of early years cannot be found and the result hitherto shews that some plan should be adopted to secure the preservation of those now extant, and the future duplicate registration of all such documents.

In the case of Marriage Registers, although the Clergy are required by law to deposit a copy annually with the Registrar, it is evident from the number of marriages recorded that this enactment is generally neglected; and if all attempts to secure such statistics are

not to be abandoned as hopeless, the penalties of the law must be enforced, or some other agenc for procuring returns must be devised.

The Judicial Statistics of Lower Canada, compiled with great care, are, from the neglect of one or two officers, annually incomplete. In the researches made through numerous Returns now required by law the statement is fully corroborated that there are some persons who systematically neglect to supply the Returns required, and I respectfully recommend that these cases should be especially called to the notice of the Crown Law Officer.

I beg to ask your Excellency's attention to the Report of a Select Committee of the Legislative Assembly, in September, 1865, (Appendix, page 105), on the Registration of Births, Deaths and Marriages, and to urge the early consideration of so important a measure. I would also repeat what I stated in last year's Report, that powers should be conferred of obtaining regular annual statistics of all the sources of employment, the capital invested in new and old enterprises and the value of the fabrics produced; also that the Minister charged with this service should have the official power of sending for persons and papers necessary to the compilation of such Statistics.

VIII.—THE BLUE BOOK.

The Blue Book for 1864, appended to my last Report, has been revised and adapted to the years 1865 and 1866, where much additional will be found.

I would recommend that future editions embrace a much wider field of information, so as to make this publication a complete repertory of the official statistics of the Dominion of Canada.

IX.—PARIS EXHIBITION.

Your Excellency having received an invitation from the Imperial authorities to take measures to ensure a due representation of the industry and products of the Province at the Exhibition to be held in Paris in 1867, and a grant of \$50,000 having been voted by the Legislature for that purpose, Your Excellency was pleased to commit the entire management of, and expenditure for, this service to this Department, which proceeded to carry out the intentions of Your Excellency and the Legislature, through the Boards of Arts and Agriculture, east and west.

The Board of Arts and Manufactures of Upper Canada, in their Report, state that the larger portion of the goods selected by them have been taken from stocks on hand, or are of a description made to meet the ordinary demands of this country. This feature of the Collection, although not securing the advantages of unusual display, produced by articles prepared specially for exhibition, will yet give a fairer representation of the resources and progress of the Province in the industrial arts than if so prepared, with regard mainly to effect.

The native stuffed birds sent from Toronto, comprising some 421 specimens, and classified for the Board by the Rev. Professor Hinks, of University College, is probably the argest and finest collection ever got together in Western Canada.

As the Exhibition, when closed, will be the subject of a special Report from the Chief Commissioner and the Executive Commissioner, in which the contributions of Canada and the degree of success which attended them will be fully accounted for, it would be premature to refer farther to the subject under date of this Report.

X.—MEDICAL CONFERENCE ON CHOLERA—CENTRAL BOARD OF HEALTH.

In consequence of the anticipated visitation to our shores, early last year, the following medical gentlemen, appointed by Your Excellency's Order in Council of 20th February, 1866, were summoned to meet at this Department, on Saturday, the 17th of March, to take steps to enforce provisions of Chap. 38 of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, known as the Public Health Act:—Drs. R. L. Macdonnell, Montreal; J. T. Landry, Quebec; E. Van Cortlandt, Ottawa; H. Hill, Ottawa; J. C. Taché, Ottawa; J. A. Grant, Ottawa; J. C. Beaubien, Ottawa; J. R. Dickson, Kingston; W. T. Aikins, Toronto.

At the first meeting of the conference Dr. R. L. Macdonnell was elected President of the Board, and Dr. J. C. Taché, Secretary. The Conference remained in Session for seven days, and after a full discussion of the subject before them, they determined upon a Report under the title of "Memorandum on Cholera," which was presented to Your Excellency, and was afterwards circulated throughout the Province; a Copy thereof is appended to this Report.

THE CENTRAL BOARD OF HEALTH.

The Central Board of Health established by Your Excellency's Order in Council of April 14, 1866, composed of the following members:—Drs. R. L. Macdonnell, of Montreal; G. S. Badeau, Three Rivers; E. Van Cortlandt, Ottawa; H. Hill, Ottawa: J. C. Taché, Ottawa; J. A. Grant, Ottawa; J. L. Beaubien, Ottawa; J. R. Dickson, Kingston; W. T. Aikins, Toronto; J. D. McDonald, Hamilton; C. G. Moore, London,—was convened on the 28th April, at which time ten of the above gentlemen met. Dr. R. L. Macdonnell elected President, and Dr. Grant, Secretary.

A Code of Sanitary Regulations was drawn up and submitted for Your Excellency's approval on the 3rd of May, these Regulations, as published in the Canada Gazette, were forwarded immediately to the Mayors and Reeves of Upper and Lower Canada, respectively. (Appendix, page 77).

Local Boards of Health were formed in several places, (Appendix, page 98) in accordance with the provisions of the Statute, and every precaution and preparation was made to carry out the requirements of the Statute, in the event of the appearance of the Cholera in any part of the Province.

To secure a sufficient quantity of disinfectant medicine, an Order in Council authorized the Board to purchase and import a quantity of chloride of lime, not exceeding 1,000 dollars in value, which was placed for distribution in charge of the Officer of the Marine Hospital at Quebec.

I am thankful that I am able to report to Your Excellency that the Province was preserved from this fearful visitation, and that I was enabled at the expiration of six months, the time appointed for its duration in the Statute, to dispense with the further attendance of the eminent gentlemen composing the Board. Their report, submitted to Your Excellency, is herewith appended. (Appendix, page 96).

REPORT OF MR. BUCHANAN, CHIEF IMMIGRATION AGENT.

GOVERNMENT IMMIGRATION OFFICE, Quebec, 25th February, 1867.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit to you, for the information of His Excellency the Governor General, my Annual Report of the Emigration to Canada during the season of 1866, to which the usual Statistical Tables, containing the fullest information under distinct heads, are attached.

Table No. 1, in the Appendix, presents a review of the arrivals by sea from each Country, showing the number embarked, the births and deaths on the passage and in Quarantine, and the males, females and children.

From this Table it will appear that the total number of souls landed at Quebec, from the opening to the close of navigation, was 28,648 viz: 1,564 cabin and 27,084 steerage passengers, an increase of 7,293 over the emigration of last year. Their sexes may be thus given:—

Showing a decrease of 4,892 in the emigration from the United Kingdom and an increase of 12,185 in that from Foreign Ports.

The number of vessels engaged in the transport of these people was 158, measuring

128,459 tons, and consisting of 54 steamers and 99 sailing ships.

The steamers made average passages of 12 days from Liverpool, 11½ from London-derry, 21 days from London, and 15½ from Glasgow; and the sailing ships averaged 33½ days from the United Kingdom and 50½ days from Foreign Ports.

Separating the Cabin from the Steerage Passengers, the following results appear:—

Which tend to show that of the whole emigration from the United Kingdom, 11,539 came out by steamers, and but 148 by sailing vessels.

The number of sailing ships from Great Britain that came under the provisions of the "Imperial Passenger Act" was but two, the remaining 22, carrying 39 passengers, not having been subject to its regulations.

The first passenger ship of the season, the steamship *Hibernian*, arrived in port on the 1st May, and the last passenger ship, the *Nova Scotian*, on the 14th November.

I am glad to be able to report so favorably of the healthy state of the immigration of 1866. Amongst the emigrants from the United Kingdom but eight deaths occurred at sea, while the mortality on board the ships from Foreign Ports bears a smaller per-centage than ordinary, amongst the Norwegians there were 73 deaths on the passage, and nine in quarantine, together 82 or equal to 0.60 per cent, and amongst the Germans 83 deaths occurred at sea, and ten at Grosse Isle, being 93 or equal to 2.72 per cent.

occurred at sea, and ten at Grosse Isle, being 93 or equal to 2.72 per cent.

The prevalence of cholera on the Western Continent of Europe in the spring of the year caused much alarm, and fears were entertained that this dread scourge then raging in some of the Danubian Principalities might be conveyed to us through our foreign emigration. A more elaborate system of medical discipline was at once inaugurated at Grosse Isle, fresh additions were made to the staff of employees and extreme vigilance was used in enforcing a rigorous quarantine on all ships sailing up the St. Lawrence to this Port. These measures (which involved a considerable increase of expenditure) had the effect of calming the public mind and providentially we escaped the visitation of any grave epidemic disease.

Table No. 2 presents a comparison between the number of passengers from each port in 1865 and 1866. By this it will be seen that more than 9-10ths of the emigration from England proceeded from Liverpool; from Ireland it came almost entirely from Londonderry, and from Scotland from Glasgow.

Of the numbers from Continental and other ports, the Geman ships came as usual from Bremen and Hamburgh, and the Norwegians from fourteen different places.

Two vessels brought passengers from Antwerp, one from Alexandria, two from Spain, and one from France.

Table No. 3 contains the trades and callings of the steerage male adults, which may be thus generalised:—

and Table No. 4 presents a comparative statement of the number of emigrants landed at the port of Quebec, from 1829 to 1866 inclusive, a period of 88 years; showing an aggregate of 1,063,413, and a yearly average of 27,984.

Next in order, to proceed to furnish a "resume" of the Reports (originals in Appendix) of the following inland Agents:—

Mr. Daley, at Montreal; Mr. Wilis, at Ottawa; Mr. Macpherson, at Kingston; Mr.

Donaldson, at Toronto, and Mr. Rae, at Hamilton.

The Annual Report of Mr. Daley, the Montreal Agent, contains the following

particulars :-

Number of pauper emigrants who received assistance in the shape of passages and temporary relief, 526 souls, equal to 317½ adults, being a decrease of 122 souls, equal to 98 adults for a corresponding period in 1865. Of this number 131 were male adults, 155 female adults, 177 children and 63 infants, who were natives: 69 of Ireland, 27 of Scotland, 42 of Eugland, and 388 of Norway, Germany and

Denmark, they were forwarded to the following destinations:

To Canada, west of Toronto, 251; Central Canada and Toronto, 237; Ottawa district, 22; Eastern Townships and Quebec, 16. Mr. Daley still continues to complain of the scarcity of the labor supply. The common laborer, he states could easily have obtained \$1 per diem throughout the season, and the farm laborer could have commanded almost any wages he chose. A larger demand existed for both these classes than has ever been known in Canada before; and the agent was able to supply but a very small proportion of the applications he received. Female domestic servants and skilled mechanics of various descriptions were also in great request. Some of the latter could have commanded as high as \$3.50 to \$4 per diem, and Mr. Daley thinks that this fact should be publicly made known in the populous laboring districts of the mother country. The Agent's Report furnishes a short synopsis of the present condition of the different branches of industry and manufacture in the City of Montreal. An estimate is given of the number of hands each trade can employ, and the average wages paid to its workmen.

Allusion is also made to the sanitary state of the city, and to the precautionary measures adopted in the spring to ensure an effective observance of the Quarantine Regulations, and Mr. Daley concludes his Report by thanking the managers of the several lines of transport for their co-operation in helping him in the discharge of the duties of his office, and to several gentlemen and ladies connected with the National Societies and

Relief Committees, for their kind and valuable assistance.

Mr. Wills (the Ottawa Agent's Report,) supplies the following information:-

Number of European emigrants arrived at his Agency, via the St. Lawrence, 296; ditto from United States, 218—together, 514. They were composed of 75 English, 182 Irish, 50 Scotch, 194 Germans, 7 Norwegians and 8 Americans, and they were disposed of in the following order: 85 remained in the City of Ottawa, 65 proceeded to the County of Carleton, 51 County of Russell, 35 County of Pontiac, 79 County of Ottawa, 112 County of Renfrew, 43 Canada West, and 44 went to the United States.

Assistance was rendered to 160 emigrants, equal to 127 adults, at a cost of \$1.61 per

adult; they consisted of 50 men, 45 women and 65 children.

The Agent states that the demand for labor, both male and female, and for various branches of mechanics, was both large and uninterrupted during the whole season, and that the wages offered were, as a rule, much in advance of those paid in previous years. Notwithstanding which he was able to supply but a very few of the applications he received.

Mr. Wills alludes to a number of families in his district who proceeded to the States with a view of bettering their condition, and returned to Canada, after a short absence, thoroughly dissatisfied with the prospects they encountered, he also refers to the overstocked state of the American labor-market, and thinks this will turn to our advantage.

Many of the emigrants who reached the Ottawa Agency last season, were induced to take passage it seems to New York, and the Agent, while describing the inconvenience and expense these poor people are thus put to in reaching their destination, suggests that some plan ought to be devised to put a check to what is now becoming a systematic evil.

Mr. Wills, in bringing his Report to a close, offers a few remarks upon the necessity of adopting some practicable scheme to settle waste lands appertaining to the Crown.

The results of the transactions at the Kingston Agency may be thus given:—
Total number of arrivals, including those from the States, 1,575 souls. The Agent,

however, is of opinion that a much larger number must have come into Kingston Agency. his district through channels he is unable to obtain any correct account of. The number of European emigrants that reached his Agency was very small, not exceeding 139, and shows a considerable falling off when compared with that of former years.

The number of settlers coming into Canada from the United States, as gathered from the Returns of the various Custom Houses, extending from Morrisburgh to Port Hope (both places inclusive), was 1436, being 10 less than the number reported last year, and the value of their effects is estimated at \$65,190. The Agent afforded relief, in providing

passages to places where labor was abundant, to 46 souls, at a very small outlay.

Mr. Macpherson states that the emigrants landing and passing through his Agency were generally healthy, and that the demand for farm laborers was very great. He received applications for upward of 1000 laborers, and the wages offered ranged from \$1 to \$1.50 a day, with board, for good hands—the crops having been unusually heavy and labour very scarce. He is moreover confident, he asserts, that he could always, during the agricultural season, find employment for 1000 laborers and about 300 servant girls, another class of emigrants in much request.

The Agent expresses his belief that the demand for laborers will be fully as great, if not greater, throughout the approaching season, because the prices of all sorts of grain are ruling extremely high, and it is the farmer's interest to extend the cultivation of his land

as much as possible.

The recent Gold discoveries in Madoc, also, he thinks, will lead to important results, and if present indications are to be relied on, there can be no doubt but that soon a fresh and attractive field of labor for the emigrant will be opened out.

Mr. Donaldson, the Toronto Agent, in his Annual Report, makes the following

statements:--

Number of emigrants arrived at Toronto last season, 16,287, 16,097 having come by
the St. Lawrence, and 190 via the States. Of this number only 329

Toronto Agency: applied for aid and received assistance in the shape of provisions, transport, &c. They were composed of 125 men, 91 women and 113 children. Although the arrivals are largely in excess of last years, the Agent regrets that there has been a considerable decline in the number of those who remained in the Province, and he attributes this falling off partly to the activity displayed by American Agents in England, who are interested in directing the emigration from Canada to the States, and partly to the alarm caused by the Fenian excitement, which occurred amongst us during the summer months.

Mr. Donaldson reports that the demand for labor of every description in his district has never, within his recollection, been so great as it was last season, and he states that fewer domestic servants reached him than on any former occasion, and yet there is no class of emigrant so universally needed.

Since the abrogation of the Reciprocity Treaty manufactories upon a large scale have sprung up it appears in all directions, and the rapid and important progress of flax culture

has created an immense amount of additional labor.

The Agent mentions the benefit he conceives the country has derived from the publication of the "Cunadian Emigration Gazette," and expresses his satisfaction also at the manner in which the emigrants have been treated by the different Forwarding Companies.

He alludes to the importance of the Madoc gold discoveries, and to other evidences of riches now seeking development, and speaks in glowing terms of Canada's prospects of

prosperity and greatness in the future.

Mr. Rae, (the Hamilton Agent,) states the number of emigrants arrived at his Agency (who remained in the Province) at 2,708, viz: 1204 English, 530 Irish, 442 Scotch, 514 Germans, 18 other foreigners; in addition to this there were 3,409 American citizens, giving a total of 6,117 souls; of this number, 867 arrived by the route of the St. Lawrence, and 5250 by the Suspension Bridge.

They were all exceedingly healthy, and generally in comfortable circumstances, but 77 required assistance, which was afforded at an outlay of \$54.45—\$24 for transport and

\$30.45 for bread.

The demand for labor through the season was largely in excess of the supply, and

Mr. Rae expresses his surprise that more of the laboring classes do not come to this country, where fair wages and abundance of work may always be procured. 73 persons, chiefly Germans, were provided with employment. He considers the prospect for all those

seeking employment during the ensuing season as most encouraging.

The amount of capital brought into the country by 262 individuals, he states as \$187,600, which is rather under than over the mark. In addition to this, by the return of entries from the Hamilton Custom House, of settlers from the United States, it appears that 60 families (232 souls) came in during the past season, and brought property valued

Mr. Rae's report is accompanied by some carefully compiled tables, which are drawn up with his usual care, and must have involved a considerable amount of labor—showing the comparative statement of the various localities the emigrants of 1865 and 1866 have located within the Province, as well as those passing through to the Western States.

I beg leave to draw your special attention to the report of the proceedings of the

Liverpool Agency. Liverpool agent, Mr. Dixon, which appears in paper No. 11.

This Report embraces a review of the operations of the Agency during the season and contains many valuable suggestions well deserving of consideration. I most fully concur in many of Mr. Dixon's views and opinions, and regard with a considerable degree of satisfaction, the results of his labor. Since the establishment of the Liverpool agency in March last, every effort appears to have been made to gain for the resources of this country a wider publicity amongst the labouring population of the United Kingdom than they have obtained before. The official letters which I have been in the habit of receiving from Mr. Dixon from time to time abound with common sense and practical hints on the subject.

Mr. Dixon expresses, you will observe, a firm conviction, founded on experience, that the proper locale for an agency of this kind is London and not Liverpool. The reasons he gives for preferring the metropolis are I think sufficiently cogent, and they coincide entirely with those I advanced in a former Report when discussing the same question. It is unnecessary that I should dwell at any length upon the importance I attach to the continuance of this Agency upon a permanent and somewhat more satisfactory basis. My ideas on the subject are thoroughly familiar to you, and the information you will elicit from a perusal of Mr. Dixon's proceedings will, I feel sure, convince you of the necessity of keeping the Liverpool Agency open until the larger and more comprehensive scheme for the furtherance of emigration likely to occur under confederation, can be carried into effect. I must not omit to mention the auxiliary benefit this Department has derived from the "Canadian Emigration Gazette," (the publication of which you were pleased to sanction last spring), a paper describing the resources of the country, compiled for circulation amongst intending emigrants, and designed to supersede the information hitherto annually issued by Government in pamphlet form.

This paper has been very extensively and very judiciously circulated by the Agent through the penny post, in the chief agricultural and mining districts of Great Britain, and has given rise to a large and varied correspondence as showing the interest its circulation has created among the working classes. Many of the influential newspapers in England have noticed the Gazette in both flattering and encouraging terms, and extracts from it are continually being reproduced in the columns of the rural press. Altogether, I know of nothing that has ever emanated from this Department which has exercised so wholesome an effect upon emigration as this little sheet, and the economy with which it is

sustained is a very strong feature of recommendation.

The total number of copies of the Gazette issued in 1866 was 36,500, 26,440 of which were sent to Mr. Dixon and circulated by him throughout the United Kingdom, the remainder were distributed by the department in various parts of the United Kingdom and within the several Provinces. The whole cost to Government, of this large issue, was but **\$875**.82.

More and practical results will follow, as the Gazette is more extensively read. The public mind is slow to accept the facts and figures, and conviction mostly comes when personal interest is first excited. It will require time to familiarize the popular mind of the United Kingdom with our resources, and convince the people of Great Britain and Ireland that their surplus population can be located here with the conditions of success as readily

attainable as in the United States. Besides its publication will serve as an effective antidote to the misrepresentations of American Agencies. At so early a period it would not be reasonable to expect much of direct and practical advantages, but if I may augur of its ultimate beneficial results, from the active interest it has already excited in the public mind, I am sanguine it will become an efficient Agent; enabling us to compete more successfully with our neighbors for that share of immigration, which our resources, now happily on the threshold of more profitable and general development than heretofore, give us a right to expect and claim.

I am unable to speak upon this branch of my Report, except in very general terms, Foreign Emigra owing to the death of my Foreign Interpreter, Mr. Jorgensen, which took tion of 1866. place on the 6th of October last, after an illness of many months' duration, during which I was entirely deprived of his services.

The German emigration, although larger than that of last year, does not call for any

particular remark, not having been distinguished by unusual or peculiar features.

The very large emigration observable from Norway may be entirely attributed to the growing preference manifested by the Norwegians for the St. Lawrence route, as a highway to their settlements in the Western States. I am sorry to say that through the false representations of shipping agents and other persons in Norway, interested in passenger traffic, a considerable number of these poor people were induced to take passage to Quebec without having the means of proceeding farther on their journey under the assurance that they would be sent to their destination, by this Department, free of charge.

A heavy expense has in consequence been entailed on Government in assisting the

indigent poor of almost every Norwegian ship to reach the American Frontier.

I have already made the matter subject of a special Report to yourself, and endeavored, through the Norwegian and Swedish Consul at this port to prevent in Norway the practice of fraud and imposition by Shipping Agents in future, as well as suggested

measures likely to check an evil, fast growing into a system.

I again tried the experiment of detaining the baggage of emigrants as security for their passage money, and this time with better success than formerly. The number of boxes detained was 145 for 240 passages valued at \$1,440, and up to the present date 43 boxes, representing \$584, have been reclaimed, and 102 boxes covering \$856 remain await-

ing redemption.

The following is an estimate, such as I am usually in the habit of furnishing, of the arrivals and distribution of the year's emigrants compiled from Railway Returns and other available sources at my command. It is of course extremely difficult to arrive at any very positive result, but I have carefully endeavored to make this return as reliable as possible, and I think it may be accepted as moderately accurate :-

From a Return with which I have been kindly favored by the Commissioner of Customs, it appears that, during the year 1866, 7,279 persons entered Canada as settlers, by route of the United States. The value of the effects brought with them amounted to \$257,997.51. They were classed as follows:

These, nearly all, may be considered in addition to the numbers reported as having arrived at the inland agencies, as the great majority were entered at Posts, with which the Agents have no communication, so that I estimate that the increase to our population from Immigration, during the past season, cannot be less than 20,000 souls.

Emigrant Tax. The amount of Immigrant Tax collected during the year was \$26,857; \$26,853 in Quebec, and \$4 in Montreal; being an increase of 6,790 over 1865.

Expenditure. The expenditure under the immediate superintendence of this Department

during the year ending 31st December, 1866, amounted to \$58,603.68, viz.:-

The following is a comparative statement of expenditure at the several agencies in 1865 and 1866, which shows a small increase in the expenditure of last year of \$1,959 34 equal to about 7 per cent, while the increase in the number of our arrivals was equal to 34 per cent, so that on a comparison with that of 1865 the expenditure shows a decrease of equal to over 26 per cent.

On comparing the entire expenditure of last year with that of 1865, there will appear an increase of \$17,915.16, of this sum \$12,802.34 was incurred for Quarantine and \$5,112.72 for general emigration expenditure.

As in former years, it will be seen that the chief expenditure has been caused on account of the Foreign emigrants, the great majority of whom merely pass through the Province, and as I had occasion to remark in my Report of last year, that, independent of the expense of the Quarantine Establishment almost exclusively on their account, fully five-sixths of the expenditure in direct relief has been incurred on them.

As a protection against this unsatisfactory state of affairs, it was suggested that the law might be amended, making the ships responsible for the expense incurred on behalf

of their poor.

I his opinion, on further consideration, I have seen reason to change, as any such legislation would, I fear, drive the stream of Foreign Immigrants from our Port to that of the United States—a consummation most devoutly to be wished on their part—and most injuriously effect our Railway and forwarding interests, as although this large outlay may have been incurred, the Province is, if not directly, at least indirectly benefitted.

The entire expenditure incurred in their direct relief may be stated at \$13,000 but the amount of Emigrant Tax they have contributed was \$17,996, leaving a surplus of

\$5,000 available for other purposes.

and become permanent settlers amongst us.

The Foreign Immigrants of the past season paid to our Railway and Forwarding Companies over \$100,000 for their inland transport alone, independent of other outlay which they must have incurred for provisions, &c., on their route. Of course it would be desirable, as I mentioned previously, that these poor people should not be sent to the United States by this route, under the belief that this Department would assist in forwarding them to their destinations. But as we cannot reach effectually the source of this abuse, we are compelled to deal with it as it exists, and as no positive loss is incurred, but a large indirect benefit secured to the country, prudence would suggest that for the present matters should remain as they are, with the hope that we may shortly be in the position to offer such facilities and inducements as will secure a portion of this valuable immigration to settle in our country.

The immigration of the past season may be characterized as of a highly satisfactory nature, although fully two-thirds of the whole British emigration to this port proceeded direct to the United States, drawn thither by the glowing but deceptial accounts so ingeniously circulated by American agents in England of the immense demand for labor of every description and the high wages paid to all classes of artisans (statement, as I have before attempted to prove, thoroughly false and delusive, and only calculated to deceive the ignorant,) and although the Fenian troubles along our border in the early part of the season caused some alarm and detracted from our efforts to secure a fair share of the emigration; still we may congratulate ourselves on having received a valuable accession to our population in a considerable number of persons of wealth and intelligence, who driven out of the United States by the enormous taxes and increased cost of living, have sought investment for their capital in Canada,

Among the arrivals last year from the United Kingdom, were a number of families of the better class, who besides their intelligence and industry, brought with them a considerable amount of capital, which in some cases they invested in the purchase of improved properties in Western Canada. I also received visits from several parties who had been deputed to visit this country and to collect information concerning it by a number of friends in England, who, if the report of their Agents proves favorable, intend to emigrate during the ensuing season. Some of these persons have already returned to England highly pleased with their visit, while others are still in the Province prosecuting their

enquiries.

The laboring classes, so far as I have been able to ascertain, seem all to have done well, and to be at present satisfactorily provided for; no complaint of any kind having reached me. The demand for agricultural laborers and female domestic servants continued throughout the whole season very great, and far in excess of the supply. Mechanics of all kinds, but more especially workers in iron were in particular request, and much inconvenience arose from the difficulty of procuring skilled labor.

The necessaries of life were cheap and abundant, and those content with a fair day's work for a fair day's pay, found not the least difficulty in obtaining ready employment.

Judging from present appearances, I am decidedly of opinion, that Canada will offer prespects for 1867. better prospects, and a far more extensive and attractive field of employment to the intending emigrant, during the approaching season, than she has done for many years.

The Reports of the Inland Agents all show that in nearly every district throughout the country there exists a large and continued demand for farm laborers, female domestic servants, and almost every description of mechanics, and that not only can good wages be guaranteed to them, but that steady work can always be found for many thousands of

people.

The abundant harvest of 1866, which exceeded every expectation—has placed our farmers in a position of comparative comfort and released them from many of the embarrassing effects, the bad crops of former years had subjected them; indeed I doubt whether the farming interest has ever enjoyed a more solid prosperity than it does at the present moment.

The abrogation of the Reciprocity Treaty too, which at one time it was feared would embarrass our resources, and place an embargo upon the trade of the country, from well understood causes, had quite an opposite effect, and has been the means of conferring additional benefit on the mercantile community, so that without exaggeration I can say, that we have now a more plentiful supply of money amongst us than we have ever had before.

The new and important branch of industry, flax-culture, which has lately engrossed the attention of many of our leading agriculturists, has led to the erection of flax-mills and linen manufactories on an extensive scale, in different parts of the Province, and promises to yield a large measure of employment to flax-scutchers, spinners, weavers and

persons generally acquainted with the process of linen-manufacture.

Another and most important element of our prosperity is the extensive erection of woollen-factories. There is little doubt that the impulse to these is mainly owing to the high protective duty imposed by the American Legislature on Canadian wool in its raw state. The home market for this article is large, and will remain so for many years, and cannot fail to furnish a large increase of employment, both on the farm and in the factory,

thus producing labor for the operative and the agricultural workmen.

The manufacture of cheese has recently sprung up, and is becoming an important element in our prosperity. By letters received from Western Canada and other reliable information, I am led to conclude that cheese-factories will exercise a beneficial influence on our agricultural interests, not alone in Western Canada are they introduced, but they are being established in the Eastern Townships, a district peculiarly adapted to dairy pursuits, and such is the excellency of the produce of these factories that the article is now regularly advertised in the English market.

The gold discoveries in Western Canada appear to be fast realizing a practical form and they are at present causing much excitement and not a little speculation throughout the County of Hastings. Recent indications all tend to encourage the opinion that gold in promising quantities exists throughout that district. Preparations are being made, and no doubt but a thorough exploration of the whole region will take place during the ensuing spring, when the result, if favorable, cannot fail to exercise a very important feature on

the settlement of the country.

Some may question,—and with some plausibility, whether the mere discovery of gold is ultimately a benefit or a calamity. At first, speculation is wild, and enterprise more of a gambling than of a prudent, systematic form. If gold discoveries tend to settle the country the benefit is large and permanent; but even if settlement does not follow to much extent, the money spent in exploring and other labor is a direct advantage. With respect to Lower Canada, the gold region along the valley of the Chaudiere has lost much of its speculative character, and some of the principal Mining Companies are erecting crushing mills, which will give employment to a number of workmen, both at the mills and in the quarries.

Copper Mining in the Eastern Townships district offers, at no remote period, to provide extended employment. The mania of speculation has subsided which, though it introduced much American capital into the country, could only be regarded as the pioneer

of more steady employment and more permanent industry.

These evidences of mineral wealth are daily seeking development, and must conduce to our future greatness and prosperity; and with fresh elements of material strength and a more extensive range of enterprise springing into existence, and an increasing demand for labor of every kind, the intelligent emigrant can, I imagine, scarcely fail to perceive that the inducements Canada holds out to him as a country for adoption are equal—if not superior—

to those offered by any other Colony.

It still remains cause of great regret that so large a proportion of immigrants who land in Canada should proceed to the United States. Of course the primary cause is that their destination is fixed by themselves before leaving home, or they are induced by the agents of other associations to make their selection. 'Their partial ignorance of Canada and its resources for labor or the investment of capital is such that they rely on interested parties for advice. Still this does not meet the entire question, or satisfactorily explain the reason why such a predominant preference exists for the United States instead of Canada. I believe a cause—and that a most influential one—exists in the facility with which settlers in

the Union acquire lands, and the protection which is offered by a homestead law to the

occupier.

I am induced to believe that the question of free grants to settlers in Canada, connected with a homestead law, must be soon entertained. The importance of such a scheme has been already officially recognized in the Report of the Select Committee on Emigration in 1860, on which you presided as Chairman. That Report contains this most important remark, as it reaches as far as the internal machinery of Emigration here is involved—the very marrow of the reasons why so many of those who come here cannot be induced to remain.

The truth which is enunciated in that Report is: "The strongest attraction which Canada can offer to the European emigrant is cheap or free cultivatable land"; and I apprehend that this must be a condition sine qua non of our internal emigration policy, if we are to compete on terms approaching to equality with our rivals, the United States. It is true that free grants have been provided for settlers, whether foreign or domestic; but it is equally true, in the language of the Report referred to, that "though nothing can be more just and equitable than the intention of the Legislature in these clauses (cited in the Report), yet, practically, by the sons of farmers and others seizing and squatting on such lands as soon as surveyed or opened up by a colonization road, the emigrant is virtually excluded from all share in the benefits intended to be conferred on him by the Province." Hence it would follow that free grants are little more than a theory in our Legislation; while the disappointment of an emigrant applicant for a free grant, in finding he is virtually excluded from all share in the benefits intended to be conferred on him by the Province, will culminate in bitterness. He will regard himself as many have done, and with too much cause, as the dupe of specious promises, and move off to the United States.

I know that these facts are already on official record; and that they exist now as obstructive of settlement of the country, and as an impediment to immigration, just as

they did when the Committee made this Report.

I am the more earnest on this measure of "Free Grants" to emigrants, as it is one I have long entertained; and the experience of many years, fortified by the intelligence of others, convinces me that this system, in its entire integrity, is absolutely essential to the increase of emigration,

In addition with Free Grants a homestead law might be combined. How far this may operate against the credit system, or to what extent it may be practicable, owing to the extensive tracts of land already in the possession of private parties, I cannot deter-

mine.

of emigration.

There is undeniably a growing conviction in the public mind strongly in favor of Free Grants to the actual settler—but that something more than annually putting on record truths, which are self-evident, is necessary, the returns of the past season give ample evidence, and I have the satisfaction of finding my views supported by yourself in your Report for 1865, in which you justly and forcibly observe, "Americans have unquestionably great advantages over us in their larger market and more diversified means of employment, &c.," I therefore feel that I cannot too strenuously urge that an extension of our system of Free Grants is an absolute necessity, if we would secure a legitimate proportion

The imminency of "Confederation" has been accepted, as you will observe "as a sufficient reason for not urging the adoption of improvements, which could not go into operation before a new power would be charged with the general subject." But this very "imminence of confederation" now happily all but an accomplished fact, gives immigration entirely a more comprehensive character in that new political organization, embracing and extending our resources; and in which, it is evident our institutions, particularly that of agriculture and immigration must largely participate. I am convinced that the present and to some extent the old system and laws, which hitherto have regulated immigration, must be altered, or at least so so far extended as to embrace vast improvements, if we are to enter into a more successful competition with the United States. I have referred to these improvements as constituting a present necessity, and I am the more fixed in this opinion from the fact that all the exterior information I can collect goes to strengthen my convictions on this subject.

Public opinion is fast reaching this point; the fact that the United States offer better

inducements to the immigrant, and that the Government disposes of its domain on terms barely enough to cover the expense of survey, &c., without desiring any revenue from its sale stands prominently before the people of the United Kingdom. We, to be successful must either offer similar inducements or be satisfied with a share of the immigrants wholly out of proportion to our resources and wants.

It is not alone here that the absence of Free Grants operates against us. In the United Kingdom almost the first enquiry is in relation to them. Mr. Dixon, the Agent in England, writes, many of the applicants for information ask if they can obtain Free Grants in Canada the same as in Australia, and a large number, I believe, would go to Canada if a comprehensive system was adopted, and of a more desirable class than many who are now going. In a more recent letter he states that the objection made by the foreign emigrants he was brought in contact with that the Government of the United States acted with more liberality towards them than we did.

It should not be forgotten that in the United Kingdom the Agents of the American Emigration Society proclaim, and with some truth, the superior advantages to settlers which the United States possess over Canada in a homestead law and Free Grants of land. Nothing is more attractive to the intending emigrant than these inducements.

Their ambition, a natural and indeed a laudable one, is to become proprietors of the

soil, and the more easy the terms the more readily will they make their choice.

It will thus be seen that not only here but in the United Kingdom we relinquish those strong incentives to settlement in Canada, and permit the Americans to out-bid us in the home market.

That such a state of things cannot long continue without entailing permanent loss to this country is evident. Our main strength must be in our population, and till the waste lands of Canada are settled, or practically so, we must remain in a state wholly inconsistent with that independent position we are about to assume. Lands unoccupied (if suitable for cultivation), are absolutely barren of any profit to the country, and must so remain while untenanted, a profitless possession. In the hands of settlers, no matter how poor—and their poverty would soon disappear if they were industrious,—the returns in the shape of customs, &c., would soon be more than an equivalent to the public exchaquer for the nominal ownership of millions of barren acres.

Being aware of the deep interest you take in everything connected with immigration, I have availed myself of this opportunity to urge some points connected with the settlement of our wild lands, with the hope that they may meet with that consideration which their importance demands, under the new system shortly to be inaugurated. That the entire question of Immigration and Colonisation must soon occupy the attention of our Legislature there cannot be a doubt; and I trust that under your able and enlightened statesmanship a policy may be introduced which will prove not only beneficial to the best interest of the country, but add to the happiness and comfort of thousands of the industrial classes of the mother country, who may be induced to seek a home upon our shores.

ANNUAL REPORT OF MR. J. H. DALEY, THE MONTREAL AGENT, FOR 1866.

MONTREAL, December 31st, 1866.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit for your information my Eighth Annual Report, together with such matter as has come under my immediate observation at this Agency during the past year.

Indigent Emigrants.

The assistance rendered to this class of emigrants in the shape of passages and temporary relief during the past year numbers 526 souls, equal to 347½ adults—being a decrease of 122 souls—equal to 98 adults for corresponding period of 1865.

Of the 526 indigent Emigrants assisted, you will notice the large proportion of Foreigners; such as Norwegians, Swedes, Germans and Danes, numbering 388, being nearly three-fourths of the whole number assisted.

I find that this class of Foreign Emigration is in excess of 1865, 317 souls; this is a large increase. I regret I cannot report as favorably on that from the British Isles, it is to be hoped that when we have these noble provinces confederated that emigration will improve, as there is no doubt that much greater inducements will be held out to encourage emigrants to settle in this country.

Demand for Labor.

Never has labor been so scarce in this City and District as during the past season, every description was sought after, the common daily laborer commanded readily one dollar per diem.

Two of our largest contractors offered to take from me if I could supply them no less than 500 common laborers to work on drains, &c., steady work at one dollar per diem, from 1st June to 31st December. I am sorry to report that I was hardly able to procure them one hundred.

As to the farm laborer he could command almost any wages. Female domestic servants were also in great demand. This class also fell short of the large number of applicants. Skilled mechanics were also scarce, finishers, cabinet makers, boiler makers, hreat

founders, &c., were much sought after and very remunerative wages would have been paid them; such as the first named could command as high as \$3.50 to \$4 per diem.

The causes of labor of every description being so scarce during the past season, must

be accounted for by the following facts which I have taken some trouble to procure.

First.—The European Emigration was less than the preceding year.

Second.—The greater number of those who did emigrate appeared to be and really were of a better class than many who had preceded them in former years, and most of them either had sufficient means to enable them to refuse employment at the current rates of wages, or had friends in various parts of the country, and with whom as natural they would prefer settling.

Industry of Montreal.

On the important subject of Emigration, the first question is what class of mechanic or laborer is required for the Province generally; and secondly, the class wanted in this immediate vicinity, Montreal and its surroundings, coming specially under my direct

supervision.

The first and most important on the island, may be termed Agricultural labor, not only because it affects Montreal, but the openings in every direction are such that there need be no hesitation in those skilled in agricultural pursuits making this neighborhood their home. Nearly all the branches of the manufacturing interest offer very lucrative employment for the skilled laborer, and even hard-working uneducated men can earn good wages. There are two dangers attending all working men, the first is that at certain periods of the year the demand for labor is far in excess of the supply, and secondly that money earned comparatively easily is spent quickly in a manner that generates bad habits.

Before closing my general remarks I may state that what we term educated labor is very much at a discount here; such is the excellent education given to our young men that the surplus of those who do not care about farming pursuits study either for the Bar, Medicine or Commerce, and having local connection generally supplant any foreign com-

petitor.

I would therefore strongly advise the educated class of the middle rank in England. to think well before emigrating to this country unless they have some certain prospect of a good start.

Agricultural Interest.

There has been a larger demand for farm laborers this year than ever known in Canada. This arises from the excellent regulations made by the United States Government for passing emigrants not only over their own railroads but also by the Grand Trunk Railroad to the west via Sarnia.

On the Island of Montreal, and all up the valley of the Ottawa, never was labor so dear. Indeed at times it could not be had at any price. This is a fact to which special notice ought to be called as there is a large opening for working farm laborers, and in connection with this I may mention that all conversant with gardening can readily secure work at fair wages.

The rate of pay of course entirely depends on the skill of the workman; but taken altogether, we can show a brighter prospect to the hard-working, sober man than Great

Britain.

Domestic Servants.

These are steadily in request, and the rate of wages comparatively high. A good cook or housemaid need never be out of employment, and judging from my experience, I would state that there is an excellent opening for some few hundreds.

Boot and Shoe Trade.

This branch of business has been steadily on the increase, and now forms one of the

most important in the Province.

The number actually engaged in the manufacture ranges from 3,000 to 4,000 men and women; but taking their families into account, between 6,000 and 7,000 souls rely on it for their bread.

During the past year the demand for labor in the different factories has been unusually

great, and very high wages have been paid to all skilled hands.

This is not a branch of industry to attract British or European emigrants, as the manufacture by machinery of boots and shoes is comparatively new, but our American friends would find plenty of excellent openings for skilled workmen. The value of boots and shoes manufactured in Montreal, is rather over \$2,500,000 per annum. As regards the wages earned, my remarks of December 1865 apply fully to the year 1866.

Tanning Trade.

The bulk of this business is carried on in the Eastern Townships, and a large portion of our supplies come from the west.

There are no openings in this neighbourhood.

Sugar Refining.

Under the new Tariff this has grown to be an important branch of manufacture and

bids fair to rapidly increase,

We have two large Refineries in this City, which give employment to over 400 persons, and there is nearly always an opening for clever, steady young men, acquainted with the business.

Flour Mills.

This has been a dull season for this branch of business, and I cannot hold out any encouragement to working millers to emigrate to Montreal. Western Canada is decidedly preferable.

Coopers.

The remarks in my last report apply equally to this year; but for skilful men there is generally an opening, as our Breweries and Distilleries always give considerable employment.

Soap and Candle Factories.

I have to call attention to a steady increase in the amount manufactured in Montreal,

and the excellent quality of both.

Although the amount of labor employed is not large, still I consider that there is a fair opening for skilled labor in this branch of trade, at present some 50 hands being employed at about \$1 per day.

Furriers.

I have nothing to add to my remarks in the last report. The business is so entirely restricted to the local demand, that it does not now stand out as one of the leading trades of Montreal; at the same time some thousand people are employed in making up Furs for the local markets, some 100 first-class hands who earn \$8 to \$9 per week, second-class \$5 to \$7, women skilled \$3 to \$5, and so downwards. For skilled workmen there is an opening.

Breweries and Distilleries.

The brewing trade of Montreal has rapidly developed itself during the past few years and all our local establishments are in full work. They employ over 500 men, at wages ranging from \$1.25 to \$2.50 per diem. There is a steady demand for skilled labor.

Oil and Paint Works.

Messrs. Lymans, Clare and Company, have a large factory on the Canal for grinding paints, plasters, and for manufacturing linseed oil. They employ 35 men at a rate of \$1.50 to \$2 per day for skilful men and \$5.50 to \$7 per week for unskilled.

To show the growth of Montreal manufactures, I need simply state that these mills produced in 1865, about 50,000 gallons of oil, in 1866, about 90,000 gallons, and from

900 to 1,000 tons lineed cake, and the extension of this branch of our commerce would be greatly increased if the production of Flax Seed were extended in the province. In fact, we now successfully compete with the Hull manufacturers of raw and boiled lineed oils.

Printing.

This branch of business is steadily on the increase and there are always openings for good hands. As a rule the printing establishments in the United States pay better wages than we in Canada, but generally speaking, good compositors can always find plenty of employment at remunerative wages. A good compositor can easily earn \$10 per week, and the average range of wages is from \$5 to \$8 per week. Taking into consideration the comparative cheapness of living here, these wages are relatively higher than those paid in the United States.

Tobacco Manufactories.

This branch of business has not increased, nor can I recommend the encouragement of any further bringing in of either skilled or unskilled labor. Our present factories employ some seventy-five skilled hands and about 250 women and children. Since the close of the American War, this branch of business has decreased. The wages paid, however, are fair, and like in other trades, there are always openings for steady hands.

Iron and Nail Works.

This branch of our business is about the most important of all our manufacturing interests and employs the largest amount of men's labor. I regret to have to report a very large falling off in the number of hands employed, and I fear that there will be a still further reduction, so that I cannot hold out any encouragement for either skilled or unskilled workmen at present, especially in the face of the high rates of wages now prevailing in England.

There are three Rolling Mills and Nail works, which at present give employment to skilled workmen—say 420—at wages from \$2 to \$5 \$\pm\$ day; and apprentices and laborers

164, from 80 cents to \$1.20 \$\pm\$ day.

Notwithstanding my previous remarks, I do not discourage the emigration of skilled mechanics in this branch of trade. The fact is, that the manufacture of not only nails, but also of tools of all descriptions for agricultural purposes, must every year increase largely. At present, our manufactures of axes, scythes, and other necessary agricultural implements, surpass the English; and, with a fair amount of capital placed in our trade, three times the amount of labor might be fully employed.

There are several manufactories of saws and edge tools, such as axes, chisels, augers, &c., &c. These give employment to rather over 200 men; but the greatest proportion of the skilled labor comes from the United States, the workmen there being more accustomed to the peculiar tempering of the steel required for our cold climate; I cannot, therefore, advise any foreign emigration. Wages for skilled men rule high, and there are frequent

opportunities for obtaining employment.

There are several other trades which I do not enumerate, owing to the demand for labor in each department being very limited; but, generally speaking, as mentioned before, the skilled mechanic can always procure employment, and at remunerative wages; and any possessing talent, combined with energy and sobriety, cannot fail to realize a fair independence in Canada.

Sanitary Condition.

Although at the beginning of this season the cholera threatened to devastate British

North America, by the help of Providence this calamity has been averted.

The precautionary measures adopted by the Medical Board, presided over by our respected fellow citizen, Dr. R. L. MacDonnell, have no doubt contributed, to a great extent, to the exclusion of the epidemic. The learned Secretary of the Board, Dr. Taché, also exerted himself with indomitable energy to provide guarantees against the cholera, and to ameliorate the condition of Quarantine.

The result of the experiment has been, that a Quarantine, organized on modern scientific principles, will probably—if not certainly—prevent the introduction of the disease.

The perfecting of such an organization must evidently—even under the pressure of an increased emigration—tend towards keeping epidemics at a distance from our shores.

During the Fenian raid last June, no less than seven Norwegian and Swedish vessels,

with upwards of two thousand emigrants, were in the Port of Montreal.

As all means of transport to the West were temporarily suspended, owing to the absorption of trains and steamers for Military and Naval purposes, and although eight days were consumed in that arduous and anxious work, during which time these vessels remained in port, I am happy to be able to report that no cases of an epidemic nature occurred during that period.

The number admitted to the Montreal General Hospital, through this Department, during the year 1866, was but 17, as you will notice by Appendix B. There were no cases

of epidemic or contagious disease among them whatever.

The amount of head money collected at this port by the Customs' Department was

but four dollars, this tax is always collected at the Port of Quebec.

I may here be permitted to refer to the results of the recommendations and remonstrances made by me in former reports, and which have been so strongly brought before the notice of the authorities both by the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture, and yourself, with respect to the system of forwarding to this country female emigrants from the Poor Law Unions of Ireland.

It has been clearly established by experience that such consignments are by no means advantageous, and it is a matter of congratulation that our remonstrances have produced the desirable effect of diminishing, I might almost say preventing, a continuance of that

system.

There is in this Province, at the present time, a very large field for that class of domestic laborers to which I have alluded in previous reports. The emigrants of that class however, must expect to be called upon to perform those domestic duties which are of the highest importance in agricultural as well as in city establishments. Washing, ironing, milking, &c., are acquirements without which the otherwise unskilled laborer cannot succeed. An influx of the class above alluded to would be of very great advantage to the country, and the emigrants themselves could not fail to better their condition.

Concluding Remarks.

I cannot conclude this Report without expressing the great obligations the Department is under to the Richelieu Steamboat, the Canadian Inland Navigation and the Grand Trunk Railroad Companies, through their respective Managers, for their kindness and liberality in forwarding sick and poor emigrants at reduced rates, and for their general cooperation with me—also to the Ladies of the Grey Nunnery and the Hotel Dieu, the Governors of the Montreal General Hospital, the Reverend Fathers O'Brien, Villeneuve and Rev. Dr. Irvine, also the various charitable Institutions and the several Relief Committees of the National Societies in the City for their valuable assistance. I have also to thank the Ladies Managers of the Church Home, who have so kindly assisted me in procuring employment for many deserving domestic servants.

SIR,—I have the honor of presenting my Annual Report, accompanied by the usual statistical statements, viz:—

Assistance in the shape of passage orders, temporary relief, medical attendance, &c., was granted to the undermentioned indigent immigrants, equal to 127 adults, at a cost of \$1.61 per adult.

The business of the past year is very little in excess of the preceding one. As you were advised in my monthly reports, the demand for labor continued uninterruptedly during the entire season, and a much larger number of emigrants might have been placed by me had they but reached this locality. Rates of wages never ruled higher, both in the city and surrounding country, mechanics and laborers were handsomely rewarded in being paid a rate of wages largely in advance of previous years; it is to be lamented so few new comers availed themselves of such a desirable advantage.

Very little sickness prevailed among the few who did reach this Agency. The dreadful scourge, the cholera, so generally expected, did not make its appearance in our midst, and it is to be hoped, with the sanitary provisions generally undertaken by the constituted authorities through Canada, that it may be averted in the future. Very little of moment has transpired during the past year, requiring comment at my hands, in this Annual Report. You were advised regularly as to the applicants for labor, and no doubt, had it been in your power to have supplied it, you would cheerfully have done so. I may add though, that the country generally have yearly anticipated greater results in the way of obtaining imported labor through the instrumentality of the Department than has been realized, and in the future it is to be feared that they may not manifest the interest in the matter that they have in the past; however, I feel confident they will yet do their utmost in the promotion of the well-being of the emigrant, when he comes within their reach.

From accounts generally received from the United States, the labor market in that country seems quite overstocked; and on this account it may be, that hereafter, intending

settlers may look to Canada for a new residence. If they do as I have often predicted in the past, in the Ottawa Valley they are certain of being successful, and if this fact could only be made apparent in the proper quarters, it should have the desired effect, and it remains with you to endeavor to have the information circulated among those who are likely to profit by it in the future. In this city, owing to the increase of population incident upon the removal of the Seat of Government, an activity has prevailed among all classes of the community hitherto quite unprecedented, which necessitated the employment of a larger number of all classes of persons.

The greatest difficulty has been experienced in obtaining female servants, and, as a consequence, the rates of wages for this class of service has also been considerably increased. A suitable class of females, accustomed to the general duties of house service, would meet with ready employment here during the present year; if you can aid in obtaining a supply it would confer a favor on the inhabitants of this city. The surrounding country also requires a number of females with a knowledge of farm service. If such persons could be sent hither their services would command immediate and remunerative employment.

I have so frequently adverted to the question of inducing settlers who desire to locate lands on their own account, to this section of the Province, that at the present it is merely necessary to reiterate that, at all times, suitable locations of land can be secured, either partially or entirely uncultivated. The incidental protection afforded to the agriculturist, rendered necessary by the abrogation of the Reciprocity Treaty, will incite them to increase the productions of the land, and which, doubtless, will add to the advantages previously possessed by the Canadian farmer. Already arrangements have been made whereby this change in our system will prove advantageous to the agriculturist of Canada, and at the same time necessitate the employment of additional labor, as compared with past years, thus affording additional inducements to the emigrant to settle in the country in the future.

It may be as well to remark that at least twenty families who had proceeded to the United States from this district in the early part of the season, have returned therefrom, as prospects of employment were not as flattering in that country as they had anticipated. This may be the forerunner of a change in the tide of emigration to Canada, and it may be in the interest of the future intending emigrants that they should ascertain—before making choice of a special locality—to satisfy themselves that they are likely to be succesful in obtaining thereat what they desire.

It is also worthy of note that many of the last year's emigrants who reached this Agency had been induced to take passage to New York, thereby causing both unnecessary delay and large increased expenditure before reaching this place. Some system ought to be devised whereby such an evil should be prevented hereafter. Many a family had suffered considerably by being induced to take passage other than direct to Quebec, and steps

should be taken to prevent a repetition of the like for the time to come.

The settlement of the waste lands of the Crown should be undertaken with a view to attract the attention of intending settlers, and it is to be hoped that in the future this subject may receive the attention its merits so well deserve. Under a systematic and judicious management large reserves of lands at present unproductive might be made a source of profit to the Emigrant, as well as profitable in increasing the revenue and developing the resources of the country in many ways. It has frequently occurred to me, during my experience in office, that but little has been done practically to realize a suitable return from this source of the country's wealth. That much can be obtained in the future, if undertaken in the proper spirit, I feel well assured, and it only requires to be fully understood and administered by capable hands to prove the accuracy of my present prediction. In the first place the exact localities where land suitable for settlement purposes exist should be accurately ascertained, and then a liberal inducement for their judicious settlement should be offered, by which means, in a short time, land at present unoccupied would be made available for permanent settlers.

ANNUAL REPORT OF MR. MACPHERSON, THE KINGSTON AGENT.

GOVERNMENT IMMIGRATION OFFICE,

Kingston, 31st December, 1866.

Sir,—I have now to hand you herewith, the usual Annual Statements and Returns of this office for the year 1866, showing the number of immigrants that arrived in my agency during the season, from what countries they came, and by what routes; also, statement of expenditure with reports in detail, showing the number of destitute immigrants that were assisted by me, from what country they came, &c., &c. All of which you will find in the Appendix.

The total number of arrivals, including those from the States, would appear to be 1,575 souls, but I consider, that a much larger number reached my agency, as you are aware, they land at all the way stations on the line of the Grand Trunk Railway, as well as from the steamers at all towns and villages on the route; but the number that land at these way-stations and towns and villages, I have no way of ascertaining, I can only give the number of Europeans that actually landed at this port.

The statements show a great falling off in the number of immigrants from Europe as compared with former years, being only 139 against 216 in 1865, and 441 in 1864, and 1040 in 1863.

The number of settlers who came into my agency from the United States during the past season, as reported at the various Custom Houses from Morrisburgh to Port Hope, inclusive, was 1,436 souls, being just 10 less than was reported in the year 1865.

The arrivals being so few I have little of interest to report in reference to the immigration of the past year; fortunately we were spared from that dreadful scourge, cholera, that was so much dreaded in the spring, and the immigrants that landed and those that passed through here were generally healthy, only two deaths having occurred at this port, and they were Norwegian children who were on their way to the Western States, the parents were reported to be in poor circumstances and I defrayed the expenses of their burial.

One German family on their way to the Ottawa Country, reported having lost from cholera two or three of their number on their voyage out and at New York, but those of them that reached this appeared in good health.

The demand for farm laborers during the past season has been very great, I having received applications for upwards of one thousand laborers, and the wages offered were from one dollar to one dollar and fifty cents a day and board, for those who knew anything about farming, the crops being unusually heavy and laborers very scarce; and I have no doubt but the demand will be fully as great, if not greater, next season, the prices of all kinds of grain being so high, farmers will endeavor to put in as much grain as possible, therefore I am of opinion that ploughmen will be much needed in the spring of the year, and in harvest, laborers of all kinds will be much required. The discovery of gold in the County of Hastings and in the rear of Addington, will no doubt, draw a great many of those who usually work at farm work to seek for the precious metal. I have not had an opportunity of visiting the locality where the gold has been discovered, but from the general reports that reach me I have no doubt but that gold will be found, in paying quantities, in many of the townships in the Counties of Hastings, Lennox and Addington, and probably in the County of Frontenac, but much more will be known when a thorough search can be made after the snow goes off in the spring; the last reports, however, from what is called the Richardson Mine, in the Township of Madoc (which was purchased from the proprietor of the farm, when the discovery was first made, by a Company formed for the purpose of mining at a cost of (50,000) fifty thousand dollars), states that the prospects are much greater than was first expected, and that very rich specimens of quartz have been discovered which it is stated will yield several thousand dollars to the ton. If this should prove to be true it will make a great opening for immigrants.

It is to be hoped that every exertion will be made to induce immigrants of the labor-

ing classes to come to Canada next season, as well as those who may have capital to invest either in lands or mining operations.

Healthy. Forty-two applied to me during the year for relief, and were assisted by my giving them free passage tickets to their destination or the nearest place where their services were required.

Farm laborers and servant girls. I would undertake to find employment for one thousand laborers, if accustomed to farm work, and two or three hundred servant girls during the year. The harvest the past season being an abundant one, the want of laborers was much felt in this section of the country, and I have no doubt the want of laborers will be much felt next season, unless there is an increase of immigration, as the farmers are preparing to put in a large quantity of grain.

Only about eight thousand dollars was reported to me as cash capital brought in by Immigrants during the season of 1866. The value of settlers' effects brought in from the

States is reported as being \$65,190.

I am not aware for a certainty of any of this year's Immigrants having purchased lands, but those who brought or reported capital informed me that it was their intention, when they could get a place to suit them, to purchase farms.

ANNUAL REPORT OF Mr. J. A. DONALDSON, THE TORONTO AGENT, FOR THE YEAR 1866.

GOVERNMENT IMMIGRATION OFFICE, Toronto, February, 1867.

Sin,—I have now the honor to submit, for your information, my Annual Report for the year ending 1866, with statements, as they come in order, according to your directions.

No. 1, already in your hands, will shew that 16,287 Immigrants arrived at Toronto last season; 16,097 came by the St. Lawrence, and 190 via the United States. Of this number only 329 applied for sid, and received temporary shelter, provisions, and Government transport aid, to the nearest point of their destination—viz: 125 men, 91 women and 113 children. No deaths occurred during the season, and only three cases sent to hospital. In no case have I heard of any complaints since they settled in the country. The boys who were sent from England from the Industrial Schools (except two) have done well. Fewer domestic servants have reached us this year than on any former occasion, and no class of Immigrants so much wanted.

The number of arrivals at this place was much in excess of last year; but I regret to have to state that, of those, a less number remained in the country than the year previous. This decline, I believe, is mainly owing to the great exertions put forth by the Emigration Department in the United States, in keeping, as they do, a strong staff of agents actively employed in Europe, setting forth the advantages of their country, and throwing Canada

in the shade whenever the opportunity occurs.

The large amount expended by them in advertising in the public papers, and by placards at almost every station, steamboat offices, &c., &c., setting forth the many inducements they have to offer, not only in Europe but in Canada, gives them advantages over other countries who make less energetic efforts to secure their share of intending emigrants.

Another—and perhaps the most ostensible cause of all for the few emigrants that have remained in Canada this year, was, in a great measure, owing to the Fenian excitement which prevailed through the summer season, not only in Ireland but upon this Continent. Capitalists were especially deterred from coming here, and those who did, and remained, were uncertain whether they would make Canada their home or not. Happily, this state of things has now passed away, and, with the general prosperity existing throughout the Provinces, we may safely look forward to a different state of things during the ensuing spring.

The high rate of wages that has been paid in the States, in consequence of the war, has of late become materially changed, and it is thought large numbers returned disap-

pointed to Europe last fall for want of employment,

The demand for labor in Canada has not been so great in many years as it is at present. Since the abrogation of the Reciprocity Treaty manufactories are springing up in almost every part of the country. This, with the increased demand amongst the agricultural

classes, opens a wide field and bright prospects for the intending immigrant.

The marked success of the Provincial Exhibition, held in this city last summer, the great improvement visible in stock, farming implements, machinery of almost every description, and not the least observable the happy, contented appearance of the people themselves; not a single complaint to be heard, each one vieing with his neighbor who should carry off the best prize, and all rejoicing under the same form of Government they had lived under at home, was one of the most convincing proofs of the genuine prosperity of the country.

Of the progress of flax culture I have only to say it is steadily increasing, and is now beginning to be spoken of in the commercial world as ranking among the staple crops of the country. Thus, next year, the number of acres will no doubt be double that of any former year in Canada, and well may the farmers adopt it, as it is one of their best paying crops. I am authorised to state, by Col. R. L. Denison, of Dover Court, that he pulled three tons of flax from one acre this year, and, be it observed, this was from the Riga seed imported by the Government, for which he received the round sum of \$48, or at the rate

of \$16 per ton. The Linen Manufactories, Scutching Mills, and Linseed Oil Mills, are increasing throughout the country, and, as stated in last year's Report, no crop benefits the country more, and none is more in keeping with the progress of immigration, from the immense amount of labor it creates.

Were Linen Manufactories established in several of our large towns and cities, a door for employment would immediately be thrown open for the numerous idlers and those

destitute who cannot find occupation.

Before closing this Report, I desire to state the great benefit derived from the circulation of the "Emigration Gazette," printed at Quebec, parties have frankly acknowledged, on their arrival here from the old country, that it was owing to the valuable information received through its columns, they were induced to come to this country.

I have also to express my satisfaction at the manner in which Emigrants have always been treated by the different Railway Companies, every attention has been paid them, and in no single instance has any complaint reached this office, with the exception of one or

two parties who had left their luggage behind them.

Fuller particulars are much required for the information of emigrants of the lands which the Government has to dispose of, and I again have the honor to submit a plan for settlement of free grants in case the Government still continues to offer those to the actual settler, I submitted this plan to a large number of enquiring settlers and in no single instance did they not, at once, consept to comply with the terms proposed in the following letter, and in many instances I have taken their written certificates to the effect that they would gladly comply with the conditions therein described, and would pay down the first cost of making the desired improvement most willingly.

WILD LANDS OR FREE GRANTS IN CANADA.

(To the Editor of the Trade Review.)

TORONTO, May 20, 1866.

It is admitted of late years that the tide of emigration from Europe has tended more towards the United States than Canada; and while the Canadian Government are anxious to offer every inducement the country can afford to draw the emigrant to our shores, a simple and inexpensive plan might be found practicable, if only the trial were made. The difficulties are well known that follow the emigrant who comes without means to encounter the wilderness or forest, so called, and without experience in knowing how to make a beginning or chop the first tree. He feels discouraged, and often leaves in disgust. But were the Government to cause to be cleared on a few lots in one of the most eligible townships now surveyed and ready for the settler, say ten acres on each hundred; to erect a suitable log-house or shanty of say 20 by 30 feet, the cost of this improvement would only be some \$200, and would be readily paid back by the party entering on the land. There are hundreds of cases where families come out to this country with a few hundred pounds, or even dollars, in their pockets, who would readily avail themselves of such an offer, and would willingly pay back the cost of this clearing or improvement to the Government on entering on the premises. What a difference it would make to a party between going into the bush under such circumstances, having a house to take their family into, ten acres cleared ready to their hand, and entering on the dense woods without such an advantage. The proposition has already been made in many instances to such parties, who readily admitted they would be the most willing to do so. Some twenty lots might be made ready in this way, which would involve an outlay on the part of the Government of only some eight thousand dollars, all of which would be paid back as already stated by the party settling on the land. This system, if found to answer, could be successfuly carried on until the whole township were settled. In doing the work, it would be desirable to make the clearing along the road side, a narrow slip to allow the rays of the sun to penetrate, which would serve in a great measure to dry up the roads. In all cases, the settler should be allowed to have his first choice of the lot, and on making the clearing, it might be advantageous to clear A and leave B, and so on, until the 20 lots were cleared; then if any defalcation arose in the payments to the Government, those remaining would sell readily at a profit. Then the first settler going in could be employed to clear the ten acres for the others who might follow, and by this means a source of employment be at once opened

up, by which the party could earn the money he has had already to pay the Government, and still be improving his own lot at the same time. No doubt many of the young Canadian farmers would also avail themselves of this liberal offer, and, in this respect, a great advantage would be gained by those of less experience, who would see and take example from the operations of those old experienced hands in chopping, building, &c., &c.

Parties have already expressed themselves willing to carry out this plan, if only the Government will give them a township in which to make the trial, and if successful in one instance, why not in many? when we would soon find the country peopled, instead of keeping those wild lands in a useless and unproductive state. The Government would be relieved of any responsibility by letting this work by contract; and this could be attended to by the nearest land agent until the settlers themselves should commence operations.

A personal inspection of a few of the townships that the Government are offering to the intending settler would be of immense value to the agent acting at this point, and this could readily be done, at a season of the year when the duties of the office were not very onerous.

You have seen by my former reports, as well as by this, that the demand for labor is unabated, and if it would not be transpressing the bounds of official strictness I would observe that on the threshold of events replete with importance as we are, efforts of no ordinary nature should now be made to direct hither the stream of European Emigration.

The Gold Mines of Madoc bid fair to attract from the field many of our young men, and it behoves us to be ready to supply their place. Of the existence of gold in Madoc, there is no longer any room for doubt, nor for speculation, except as to its value and limits. These, it is more than probable, are very extensive, for within the last day or so it has been asserted, by one of our leading journals, that gold has been discovered in the township of Dysart, on the lands of the Canadian Land and Emigration Company. The distance between the Madoc Mines, and the place where gold has been found in Dysart, is some eighty or ninety miles. It is thought that a vein of the precious metal will be found in varying richness through the whole section of country from Madoc to Dysart. There is every prospect that work will begin in the course of next summer, on the Georgian Bay Canal. Then there comes the International Railroad, of the construction of which, and at once, there can be little doubt. These are works of such gigantic dimensions that unless a grand effort is made at once in the great European centres to guide hither the stream of Emigration, the rapid strides now being made by our country must become checked. These stapendous works, great national undertakings, augur a bright future for this favored land.

Since commencing this report, that wonder of the world, the Atlantic Cable, has brought us intelligence that we may consider Confederation a fixed fact, having passed the third reading in the House of Lords, and that in future we are to be no more a colony, but the Kingdom of Canada. Certainly this ought to add additional inducements to the capitalist to visit this country. In the Gold Region of Madoc, another valuable discovery, we are told, has lately been made by the Honorable Lewis Wallbridge, Speaker of the House of Assembly, of a rich bed of iron ore; this forms an additional inducement for miners and others intending to settle in this country.

With all these inducements I hope we will see a large addition to our population this coming spring.

With the exception of three Norwegians that were sent to Hospital a short time, all were healthy and good condition, and composed of the following classes, viz:-125 men, 91 women, and 113 children-329 in all. Those were sent to the nearest point of their destination, either by rail or steamboat, and no complaints have been heard from them since.

3. What description of labor is most required in your District? And how many per-

sons of either sex could you probably find employment for?

Farm laborers, domestic servants and mechanics, tailors, shoemakers and carpenters, are much sought after. Flax scutchers and a few spinners and weavers would find immediate employment at good wages.

The prospects for the coming spring are good, and all of the above classes will find

work on their arrival in the country.

It is always difficult to ascertain the exact amount of capital brought into the country, parties are so tenacious about letting it be known, but from what we have been able to ascertain within the limits of this Agency, there may have been some thirty to forty thousand dollars; some of this has been expended in the erection of new manufactories, but the bulk of it has been laid out in lands, principally west of Toronto, and in the adjoining counties to York; some went to the Canada Land Company near Goderich, and a portion in the lands of the Canadian Land and Emigration Company in the Township of Dysart, County of Peterboro'.

ANNUAL REPORT OF MR. R. H. RAE, THE HAMILTON AGENT, FOR 1866.

GOVERNMENT IMMIGRATION OFFICE, Hamilton, 13th February, 1867.

SIR,-I have now the honor to present my Annual Report for the past year, comprising the necessary statements, defining, as succinctly as practicable, all the varied transactions which have occurred at this Agency during that period, together with a comparative statement, condensed and in detail, for 1865 and 1866. On examination they will, I hope, prove correct and satisfactory.

During the year the number of Immigrants who arrived at this Agency, intending to settle in the Province, viâ Saint Lawrence and Suspension Bridge, were as follows: 1,204 English; 530 Irish; 442 Scotch; 514 Germans; 6 French; 5 Swedes; and 7 Hungarians; in all 2,708. Those denominated "American citizens" were 3,409—a decrease, when compared with the previous years. The majority were looking out for employment, and, as they are of a roving disposition, it is difficult to point out their particular locations.

The amount expended in transport is \$24, and in provisions \$30.45, in all for the past year \$54.45, disbursed for 77 souls, equivalent to 58 adults, making a trifle under 71 cents per capita, or nearly 94 cents for each adult; taking into account the 11 Norwegian families (numbering 57) going to Chicago, who were supplied with 41½ loaves bread (\$6.23), and one German family of 6, with provisions (90 cents). Although those amounts are included in my statement of expenditure, the parties are not enumerated therein; they were, nevertheless, the recipients of Government aid, and would, if added, considerably tend to diminish the scale prorata.

On my applying to Mr. Swinyard, General Manager of the Great Western Railway Company, he liberally granted to the 11 Norwegian families a free pass over that road to Detroit, and at the same time recommended the Superintendent of the Michigan Central Railway to forward them to their destination. They were in very destitute circumstances. It is to be hoped the Government will enact some law to remedy this cvil, and make captains of vessels from Foreign Ports hereafter bringing paupers to this country, who pass direct through to the United States, responsible for their expenses to the place of destination. Eighteen applied for assistance and were refused, as they had no right to receive Government aid.

During the year I have been enabled to find employment for about 73 Immigrants in this city and neighborhood, the greater proportion of them Germans. There were several

who preferred idleness to work.

It is a pleasing duty for me to inform you that the health of the emigrants arriving here for the past season has been exceedingly good, although, as usual, of a mixed character-their general appearance was fair. There was not a single case of serious sickness, nor any symptoms of the dreaded disease so much apprehended, which was then reported at a distance. The germ—if I may so term it—is now nearer, and conspicuous in various parts of the United States; and it will be greatly aggravated when the sultry weather commences. May equally abundant health be extended to the fresh arrivals this coming summer.

Agricultural laborers, thoroughly conversant with the business, have been in much request, but the supply was not sufficient to meet the demand throughout this and the western section of the country. I have had numerous calls and many letters on the subject, but it was not in my power to afford them much assistance. It is a matter of surprise to me that more of this class do not come to this country, where they would obtain high wages, with board, and, by strict frugality, in a few years be in a position to purchase either wild lands or partially cleared, to commence for themselves. I may reiterate the same as regards servant girls well versed in household matters; they can at any time find plenty of respectable employment at remunerative wages. Needlewomen, tailors, shoemakers, and the like will always find abundance of work. The business of mechanics, such as boiler-makers, fitters, &c., is at present stagnant, but will, I have no doubt, revive before the spring.

Judging from the great prosperity which prevails throughout the country, and the

frequent demands for all kinds of labor last summer, I feel confident the inducements for those arriving in the spring are most encouraging. May my expectations be fully realized.

The amount of money brought into the country, as the printed form for the year will fully explain, may be divided among the following nationalities: (From Old Country,) 61 English families, \$41,300; 13 Irish, 8,000; 92 Scotch, \$64,400; 73 German, \$31,600; making \$145,300. (From United States) 2 English, \$20,500; 20 German, \$20,800, and 1 Bohemian, \$1,000, equal to \$42,300, making in all \$187,600, excess over the previous year of \$33,800. The utmost care has been observed in collecting the statistics; the amounts appended to the several nationalities, are underrated instead of being exaggerated, it is a difficult matter to estimate, with any degree of accuracy, as the time allowed to glean the required information is not only very limited, but many are reticent on being interrogated respecting their means, while others may expand too much. I am, however, convinced that the amount is much more than the statement indicates.

The Returbs received from the Custom House here of the effects brought in by emigrants from the United States are as follows: 60 free entries; Nationalities: 75 English, 50 Irish, 76 Scotch, 22 Americans, 9 Foreigners; composed of 72 men, 78 women, and

82 children—in all, 232; with property valued at \$11,454.

The number who passed this agency from various parts of the Province was 3,741—principally to find employment. The majority went to Buffalo, Rochester, a few to St. Paul's, and other places in the United States. I may, however, mention that many of those invariably return in the autumn.

General health very good; not a case of serious sickness to mention during the year; 18 applied—refused, as not entitled to Government aid; 77 were assisted: in transport 25, distributed as follows: 1 to Windsor, 6 London, 2 Galt, 1 Clinton, 1 Guelph, 4 Preston, 1 Newburg, 7 Toronto, and 2 Ancaster: in provisions 52-42 to Hamilton, 2 Chatham, and 8 to Barton Township; composed of the following nationalities: 15 English, 18 Irish, 10 Scotch, and 34 Germans; total number relieved, 77 souls, or equal to 58 adults.

3. What description of labor is most required in your District, and how many persons

of either sex could you probably find employment for?

Good farm servants, who thoroughly understand agricultural work, and even common laborers were much inquired for, especially during the harvest season; the demand was far in excess of the supply. The same may be applied to servant girls versed in household affairs; they are constantly asked after. Needlewomen, shoemakers, and tailors will generally find plenty of employment. Business in foundry and machine shops very stagnant at present, may probably resuscitate to usual activity before the coming summer.

REPORT OF MR. DIXON, THE LIVERPOOL AGENT, FOR THE YEAR 1866.

CANADIAN GOVERNMENT IMMIGRATION OFFICE, Liverpool, December 31st, 1866.

Sir,—The Emigration season of 1866 having now drawn to a close, I now beg to

forward you a statement of my proceedings to December 31st.

In obedience to instructions I left Quebec for Liverpool on the 2nd February, and secured very eligible offices in Water Street, at a rental of £30 per annum, taking possession on March 1st, I at once placed myself in communication with Passenger Agents and other gentlemen interested in the Emigration business, and caused advertisements making known my office to the public to be inserted in 114 newspapers, copies of the advertisements and the names of the newspapers in which they appeared I forwarded to you at the time, I also issued 10,000 posting bills and had them circulated in the rural districts throughout the Kingdom.

These advertisements led to a large correspondence, for in the month of March I received 82 letters requesting information concerning Canada, in April 504, May 613, June 522, July 635, August 616, September 170, October 108, November 62, and in December 83, making a total number of letters received during the season 3,395, involving in reply a very laborious and varied correspondence, all letters being invariably answered the day they were received. In addition I received over 850 personal applications, many

from persons possessed of a large amount of capital.

I received from you during the season printed matter for distribution concerning Canada and her resources, as follows:—

1,800 copies of pamphlets on Canada, published in 1864.

3,125 " Illustrated Supplement to Canada Farmer.

50 "Naturalization Laws of the Province.

100 " Canada Geographical and Agricultural.

25 " Canadian Guide.

3,250 "Steamship passage regulations.

10,000 " Posting bills (double demi size).

65 "Tables of distances, routes and passages from Quebec.

86 "The Hon. T. D. McGee's pamphlet on the Irish position.

26,440 "Canadian Emigration Gazette, with other papers of various descriptions.

I forwarded copies of the Gazette and other papers to all the Agents and Sub-Agents 714 in number, of the Montreal Ocean Steamship Company, and various other lines throughout the United Kingdom, also to 164 Mechanic's Institutes and Reading Clubs, a large number of the clergy, and other gentlemen and noblemen whom I thought would feel interested in Canada, and despatched a copy to all my correspondents and applicants, and circulated them among the emigrants on the steamships sailing hence to Canada. As the new editions of the Gazette were issued I forwarded from time to time to the editors of 1,240 newspapers, many of whom in their columns reprinted extracts and published very favorable articles concerning Canada.

Copies of Canadian papers with which you constantly supplied me I invariably posted to editors of newspapers throughout the country, who frequently published favor-

able extracts from them.

During the months of July and August, in consequence of space being required by the Imperial Government for the conveyance of troops, passengers holding tickets were not able to embark in the steamships, except in very limited numbers; consequently many families were detained two, and even three, weeks in Liverpool for want of accommodation. By the Imperial Act, shipowners contracting to forward passengers to distant ports are

required to allow persons holding tickets 1s. 6d. per day towards defraying their expenses during detention beyond the advertised day of sailing, but in all cases of delay the Montreal Steamship Company generously increased the allowance to 2s. per day. In all their arrangements for the convenience and comfort of their passengers, the ships of this Company are not surpassed by those of any other line leaving this port for America.

A very large number of intending emigrants applied to me for free passages to Quebec, in consequence of the Government of Nova Scotia having authorized their shipping agents in England to grant passages to Halifax on the payment of twenty shillings for each person

before sailing,—Nova Scotia being confounded with Canada.

The Australian Government also granted both assisted and free passages to farm and domestic servants, and to some classes of artizans. Free grants of land were also offered,

to encourage the better class of emigrants.

The agents of those Colonies were extremely energetic in their operations, lectures being delivered frequently in the agricultural districts throughout England, Wales and Scotland, though principally in the latter country, and their advertisements were continuously before the public in almost every respectable publication in Great Britain.

The Fenian raids in the early part of the season, with subsequent threats of violence by citizens of the United States, proved most injurious to our interests, and was the means of directing the attention of some well-to-do Scottish farmers to Australia, who would other-

wise have proved most valuable settlers to Canada.

In consequence of having no assistant in the business of this Agency, and being so constantly engaged in replying to applicants, it was quite out of my power to visit any of the rural districts, though it would have been very desirable that I should have done so.

I have been extremely careful in advising those only to emigrate to Canada whom I

believed would prove an acquisition to the country.

Constant applications have been made to me for free grants of land, and I would respectfully suggest that it is of paramount importance to Canada that free grants of land should be offered to intending emigrants, and that this Agency should be authorized to give Warrants to the applicants, on receiving a certificate from their clergyman or local magistrate, vouching for their respectability, with such other safeguard as may be approved,

thus offering a tangible inducement to the emigrant.

After diligent and careful enquiries, I firmly believe that if our Government would afford the like facilities to the Danish, Swedish and Norwegian emigrants, that a large and most valuable addition to the farming population of our country could be secured; the previous habits of these people rendering them singularly well adapted for settling in Canada. It would be most desirable, however, should our Government accede to this proposition, that the lands granted should be of good quality and well selected, so as to satisfy them, and induce others of their countrymen to follow. I do not think it will be possible to secure a permanent settlement without offering them inducements somewhat similar to the above, as the general impression among them—as far as I can learn—is, that the Government of the United States deals more liberally with them than that of Canada.

It would be very advantageous to our best interests that I should be supplied with copies of blue books and other publications issued by our Government, to forward to editors of newspapers, so that a satisfactory connexion might be maintained with them. It would also prove, I think, beneficial to the best interests of the Province if the Boards of Arts and Manufactures were placed in communication with this office, for the purpose of obtaining information, or the transaction of any business that might require attention in this country. I would also suggest that some others of the Departments might have Agency

business in England which might be conducted through this office.

Should the Agency be continued in England, I am of opinion, from the experience I have acquired, that the office should be established in London in preference to any other place. London would, in all respects, possess advantages over other towns. Country gentlemen and farmers nearly all visit London some time during the season, and I would have more opportunities of seeing them; none of them ever come to this port. Emigrants only arrive the day before sailing, to pay the balance of passage money. Nearly all the passage tickets are secured in the country towns, and a deposit paid. Messrs. Searle & Co. have over 300 agents for booking emigrants; the other Brokers have an equal number, and, in

one or two instances, even more. I do not know any advantage possessed by Liverpool that is not equally shared by London, while London has many over all other places.

During the time of my tenure of office I have invariably received the utmost kindness and courtesy from Messrs. Wm. Searle & Co., the passenger agents of the Montreal Occan Steamship Company, who have ever evinced an unwearied disposition to assist me in advancing the comforts of emigrants about proceeding to Canada; also from the Messrs. Allan, and all the other gentlemen connected with the Company.

I would desire to thank you for your thoughtful care and consideration, and for supplying me with all the useful information that I could require for the use of this Agency.

REPORT OF W. DIXON, ESQ., CANADIAN EMIGRATION AGENT, LIVERPOOL, ENGLAND.

CANADIAN GOVERNMENT EMIGRATION OFFICES, 15, Water Street, Liverpool, Sept. 1st, 1866.

J. C. TACHE, Esq.,

SIR,—As the emigration season is drawing to a close, I think it would be satisfactory to forward you a statement of my operations during the half year ending August 31st.

In obedience to your instructions I secured an office in Liverpool, at the above

address, at a rental rate of £30 per annum, receiving possession on March 1st.

I caused advertisements, making known my business and office to the public, to be inserted in 114 newspapers (chiefly Provincial), a copy of advertisement, together with the names of the papers I now enclose you. I also published posting bills, double demi size, one of which I now forward you, with the name of the districts in which they were posted.

The publication of the advertisements immediately led to a large correspondence, and I received during the month of March, 82 letters, requesting information concerning Canada, and its resources; in April, 504; May, 613; June, 522; July, 635, and in August, 616. Total number of letters received during the half year, 2,972, involving in reply a very laborious and varied correspondence.

I received also upwards of 500 personal applications. Many of the applicants were

persons possessing a large amount of capital.

The printed matter I received for the purpose of stimulating emigration, and for distribution among intending emigrants, was as follows:—

I despatched copies of the Gazette and other papers, generally in packets of either six or thirteen, to the Agents and sub-Agents, 328 in number, residing in various towns and villages throughout the United Kingdom, acting for the Montreal Ocean Company's ships sailing from this port, and to 386 shipping agents engaged for various other lines.

I also forwarded copies to 134 Mechanics' Institutes and Reading Rooms, to a large number of the Clergy, members of Grand Juries, and to other gentlemen and noblemen, whom I thought might feel interested in Canada, and supplied them to all my correspondents and personal applicants, and distributed them to the emigrants on each steamship sailing hence to Canada.

I sent copies of the first edition of the Gazette to 1,240 newspapers in the United Kingdom, and of the 2nd and 3rd editions, each to 220, many of whom published very favourable notices of Canada, as a field for emigration, also long extracts from the Gazette. These newspapers I frequently sent to Mr. Buchanan, the Hon. Mr. McGee, and to the

Bureau of Agriculture.

Copies of Canadian newspapers, which I constantly received from the chief office in Quebec, and from other sources, I invariably posted (when there was nothing objectionable in them), to the editors of newspapers throughout the country, who frequently pub-

lished favorable extracts from them.

I think we labour under a serious disadvantage from the rate of passage money to Quebec being frequently higher than that to the United States, it would of course be arbitrary to require steamship companies to carry passengers at a uniform rate through the entire season; but I think it would be desirable, in any future arrangement, for a subsidy with the Montreal Steamship Company, that an understanding should be arrived at to carry emigrants at, at least as low rates as other companies, with equally good ships, and without a Government subsidy, carry them to ports in the United States, between 400 and 500 miles more distant.

During the months of July and August, in consequence of the vast quantity of freight offering for Canada, and space being required for the conveyance of troops, by the Imperial Government, passengers holding tickets were not permitted to embark in the steamships except in very limited numbers, consequently many families were detained two, and even three weeks in Liverpool for want of accommodation, a large number of others preferring to proceed to Canada via New York, to waiting indefinitely for direct conveyance to Quebec.

By the Imperial Passenger Act, ship owners contracting to forward passengers to distant ports are required to allow persons holding tickets 1s. 6d. per day towards defraying their expenses during detention beyond the advertised day of sailing; but in all cases of delay the Montreal Steam Company have voluntarily increased the allowance to 2s. per day, in all their arrangements for the comfort of the passengers, the ships of this Company bear a very favorable comparison with those of any other line leaving this port for America.

All the Passenger Agents of the Montreal Steamship Company, with a large number of others, are authorized to book passengers to almost any Railway Station in Canada, or the United States, even as far south as New Orleans, receiving a commission for their trouble on the gross amount of the passage money. This system makes it to the interest of the agents to book emigrants as far as possible into the United States for the sake of the extra profit. I think it would be well to request the Grand Trunk Company to withhold all commissions from the agents on the amounts received for transit beyond the boundary of Canada.

In consequence of the Government of Nova Scotia having authorized their shipping agents to grant passages to Halifax, on payment of twenty shillings each before sailing, a great many of the intending emigrants applied to me for free passages to Quebec, Nova Scotia being confounded with Canada.

Constant applications have also been made for Free Grants of land.

Free and assisted passages are given to the Colonies of New Zealand and Australia, to farm and domestic servants, and some classes of artizans, larger wages are also named by the agents of those Colonies, as the prevailing prices mechanics and servants earn, than could be obtained in Canada. Free grants of land are also offered to encourage the better class of emigrants.

The Fenian raids in the early part of the season, with subsequent threat of violence by citizens of the United States, proved most injurious to our prospects and was the means of directing the attention of some well-to-do Scottish farmers to Australia, who would

have been most valuable settlers to Canada.

I have been extremely cautious in advising those only to emigrate whom I believe would prove an acquisition to Canada.

All letters from applicants were invariably answered on the day they were received. In consequence of my not having assistance in the business of this agency, and being so constantly engaged in replying to applicants, it was quite out of my power to visit any of the rural districts, though it would have been very desirable that I should have

My expenses for the half year ending August 31st amounted to £340 1s. 4d.

Should our Government decide on continuing this agency, for the purpose of directing the attention of emigrants to Canada, I would respectfully suggest that it is of paramount importance that free grants of land should be offered to intending settlers, and that I should be authorized to issue Warrants for the quantity of land granted to the applicants, on receiving a certificate from their clergyman, or local magistrate, vouching for their respectability, with such other safeguards as may be approved of, thus offering a tangible inducement to the emigrant.

Upon enquiry, I believe that if our Government would afford the like facilities to Danes, Swedes and Norwegians, that we could secure a large and most valuable addition to the farming population of our country, the previous habits of these people rendering

them singularly well adapted for settlers in Canada.

It would be desirable, should the Government accede to this proposition, that the land set apart for a Swedish, Danish and Norwegian settlement should be in a position, and of sufficient goodness, to satisfy them as to their future prospects, and be the means of indu-

cing others of their countrymen to follow them.

I do not think it will be possible to secure the permanent settlement of those northcountrymen in Canada without making them an offer somewhat similar to the above. The general impression among them—as far as I can learn—is, that the Government of the United States is inclined to act with more liberality towards them than the Government

As preparations are now being made among the better class of those people for the spring emigration of next year, it would be desirable if free land should be set apart for their use, that it should be made known to them with as little delay as possible, to prevent

them from maturing their arrangements for proceeding to the United States.

It would be advisable that I should be authorized to issue Notices, that ship owners carrying passengers from the Continent of Europe to Quebec should be held accountable for the amount of the passage money from Quebec to the western limits of the Provinces, of those unable or unwilling to pay their fare. An order of this description would have a salutary effect; otherwise our Provinces will have a heavy expense entailed upon them, in forwarding people to settle and enrich a foreign country.

Should a Canadian agency be continued in England, I am of opinion, from the experience I have acquired, that a permanent office should decidedly be established in London

in preference to any other place, for reasons which I can easily explain.

Preparations for advertising should be matured in December for the next season's

It would be advantageous that I should be supplied with copics of Blue Books and other publications issued by our Government, to forward to editors and proprietors of newspapers, so that a satisfactory connection might be maintained with them.

Specimens of grains, minerals, and other products, on exhibition at this office for the inspection of intending emigrants, would be appreciated by them, and tend to impress

them favorably with the great richness of our natural resources.

It would meet a want long and severely felt by Canadians without friends residing in England, if our Government would permit them to make use of the office to receive letters. and to obtain any information or trifling assistance that they might require freely; in fact to grant them the privileges enjoyed and so much appreciated by Americans and other foreigners at their Consulates; it would also prevent Canadians frequenting United States Consulates and passing as American citizens, for the purpose of obtaining information, which has been very freely accorded, in many instances to my own knowledge.

It would prove beneficial, I think, to the general interests of the Provinces if the

Boards of Agriculture and Arts were placed in communication with me, for the purpose of obtaining information, or the transaction of any business that might require attention in this country.

I would also respectfully suggest that some others of the Departments might have

agency business in England, which could be profitably attended to in this office.

REPORT.

In presenting this the Tenth Annual Report, the retiring Committee beg to submit

as brief a sketch as possible of their proceedings for the past year.

The several Institutions represented at the Board were as follows:—Ayr Mechanics' Institute, by two delegates; Cobourg, by two delegates; Dundas, by its President; St. Catharines, by four delegates; Toronto, by its President and eight delegates; Whitby, by two delegates; the Toronto Board of Trade, by one delegate; the Toronto University College, by the Rev. W. Hincks, F.L.S., Professor of Natural History, and Geo. Buckland, Esq., Professor of Agriculture.

During the year your Committee were deprived, by death, of one of their most esteemed colleagues, in the person of Mr. Thos. Sheldrick, President of the Dundas Mechanics' Institute. He was regular in his attendance, and respected by all who had a seat with him in the Committee, of which he had been—with one year's exception—a

member from the first organization of the Board.

Your Committee have to report, generally, that the various operations of the Board, to as full an extent as its income would permit, have been successfully carried out, with the exception of the programme for the Annual Examinations, which will be hereafter referred to.

LIBRARY.

The excellent Free Library of Reference, containing so many valuable works on almost every branch of practical, and several branches of general knowledge, continues to be visited by a very encouraging number of artizans, and others; not only during the ordinary office hours of the day, but on every Tuesday and Friday evening of each week, when it is always open from 7 till 10 o'clock, for the benefit of those who are otherwise

occupied during the day.

In addition to the new and standard works on the shelves, the table is regularly supplied with the London Artizan, Builder, Gas-Light Journal, British Patent Journal, Bookseller, Engineer, Engineer and Mechanic, Grocer, Morgan's Trade Journal, Mechanics' Magazine, Practical Mechanics' Journal, Popular Science Review, Photographic Notes, Photographic Journal, Technologist, the Working-Man, and Willis' Price Current; the American Artizan, Scientific American, Publishers' Circular, Gas-Light Journal, Coachmakers' Magazine, the American Farmer, American Agriculturist, and the Gardeners' Monthly; the Canadian Farmer, Canada Gazette, Canadian Journal, Journal of Education, U.C., and the French and English copies of the Journal of Education for L.C. The most of these when taken off the table are fyled, and subsequently bound up for reference.

During the year there have been added to the Library 45 volumes of books, and 26 volumes of the class of works above referred to have been bound up and placed on the shelves. Your Committee would also acknowledge donations from the Literary and Philosophical Society of Manchester, of one volume of its Memoirs and two of its Proceedings; from the Institute of Mechanical Engineers, Birmingham, the regular receipt of copies of its proceedings; from Dr. W. Canniff, formerly of this city, a copy of his valuable work on anatomy; and from the publishers, several valuable exchanges named in the above list.

From personal communications with both the Minister and Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Your Committee learn that the valuable set of British Patent Publications will soon be removed from the charge of this Board, to the Patent Department at Ottawa. No doubt another complete set could be obtained on application to the British Commissioner of Patents, at the cost to the Board of the binding only; but as that item alone would amount to from \$1,200 to \$1,600, Your Committee fear that the Board will have to sustain the loss the removal of these valuable works will involve, unless the Government tender the pecuniary assistance necessary to obtain another set. It will be a matter for the serious consideration of their successors in office.

Section 246, sub-section 4, of the Consolidated New Municipal Act for Upper Canada, provides that the Council of any Municipality may pass a By-law granting money or land in aid of the Board of Arts and Manufactures for Upper Canada. The citizens of Toronto, and members of previous councils of this city, have at various times advocated a grant of money for the purpose of establishing a public free library. Your Committee respectfully represent, that, so far as valuable works of a really useful character are concerned, this Board has established just such a library as is required; and that it is therefore worthy the support of, and entitled to a grant of money by the Municipal Council of this City, in which, although a Provincial Library, it is localised.

THE JOURNAL.

The Sixth Annual Volume of the *Journal* has now been completed, and it is gratifying to know that it is appreciated by a large number of subscribers. That the issue has not been more extended, is owing to the absence of any effort to increase its circulation above the usual 1,000 copies; as, at the price charged, the Board cannot afford to publish a larger number.

Although the Journal contains a large amount of valuable practical information, it might be much more useful were it made the medium of interchange of thoughts and ideas

between the numerous Mechanics and Manufacturers of the Province; and the vehicle for communicating to the public new discoveries and inventions, and the establishment of new branches of manufacture or other industries throughout the Province.

ANNUAL EXAMINATIONS.

No candidates presented themselves for examination during the past year. The volunteer movement, no doubt, interfered much with the opportunities for study of many young men; still, there is reason to believe that some other inducements are necessary to hold out, other than the mere acquirement of knowledge. In the Society of Arts, London, where such examinations are carried on so successfully, and the Society's diplomas are accepted as evidences of proficiency by employers in every department of business, large rewards are given in money and medals, in addition to the diplomas, to successful candidates. A small annual subscription on the part of a number of those interested in the educational progress of the industrial classes, would secure the carrying out of the suggestions here made.

The programme of examination for the ensuing season, and also statistics of previous examinations, were published in the last number of the Journal.

PATENT LAWS.

The unwise restrictions in the Patent Laws continue to be a subject of complaint.

The Minister of Agriculture, in his last Annual Report, says :-

"Amendments to the Patent Laws, which have been frequently urged upon the attention of the Department, and favourably reported upon by my predecessors in office and myself, are not again put forward this year, in view of the Union of the Provinces. Should that union take place within a reasonable time, it would be obviously premature for Canada to lay down a basis of legislation in respect to Patents and Copyrights, which might be essentially changed by the Legislature of British North America. I have, therefore, although most anxious to introduce several changes in our Patent Laws, postponed the sub-

ject until Confederation goes into operation."

Your Committee draw attention to the desirability of having copies of all drawings and specifications of Canadian Patents made, and published, within a short specified time after the issue of each and every patent; and that copies thereof should be on fyle for public reference at the free libraries of this and the Lower Canada Board, as it is now the case with Trade Marks and Designs. A small advance in the fee charged patentees would be sufficient to meet the outlay, and be cheerfully submitted to by them. The publicity thus given their inventions, especially of copies, should also be on sale, as at the British Patent Office, more than compensating them for the additional cost of Letters Patent. other practical suggestions may be made whenever the Legislature is prepared to introduce such a measure as is referred to by the Honorable Minister of Agriculture.

PARIS EXHIBITION.

In the early part of the year your Committee had a conference with the Minister of Agriculture, in respect to the best mode to adopt to secure a good representation of the Province at the Paris Exhibition. Nothing definite, however, was decided upon until the month of August, when a communication was received from the Deputy Minister of Agriculture, informing your Committee of an appropriation having been made of \$4,000 for the purchase of articles of the manufactures of Upper Canada. Special appropriations were subsequently made to your Committee for the purchase and preparation of a collection of the stuffed birds of Upper Canada; a collection of books, pamphlets, and newspapers published in Upper Canada; and a representation of the apparatus and other appliances of our public schools, as manufactured here for the Department of Education. The combined appropriations, including a sum for incidental expenses, packing, &c., amounting in all to \$5,050; all of which, with the exception of from \$50 to \$75, is or will be expended in the purchase and transmission from here of the collections, of which a list is hereto appended.

Owing to the prosperous state of the manufactures of the country, generally, and the

press of orders waiting for fulfilment, great difficulty was experienced in securing the attention and contributions necessary for the purpose. The larger portion of the goods sent have been selected from stock on hand, or are of a description made to meet the ordinary demands of the country. This feature of the collection, although not securing the advantages of rich display, produced by articles prepared specially for exhibition, will yet give a fairer representation of the resources and progress of the Province in the Industrial Arts.

One important department of our manufactures will be entirely unrepresented in this collection at Paris, viz:—Steam and other heavy machinery. This is much to be regretted, as no branch of our industries would afford more satisfactory evidence of progress, had time and means permitted of a suitable selection being made; but with an appropriation of but \$4,000 for manufactures, and with but little over three months' time allowed wherein to complete the collection and have it ready for transmission, your Committee did not deem it prudent to make any attempt to secure what would, under more favorable circumstances, have been so highly desirable.

The native stuffed birds sent by your Committee, comprising some 421 specimens, and classified for the Board by the Rev. Professor Hincks, of University College, is probably

the largest and finest collection ever got together in Western Canada.

The accounts connected with this fund are not yet closed, as some other incidental expenses may yet have to be met; but the balance unexpended will be within the sums above mentioned.

THE FUTURE OF THE BOARD.

Present indications are, that, ere another year elapses, the Confederation of these Provinces will have been completed. If established in accordance with the terms of the arrangement made by the Quebec Delegates, the duty of encouraging Arts, Manufactures and Agriculture, will devolve upon the Local Government. In view of the probability of such a change taking place during the ensuing year, your Committee refrains from suggesting any new operations to the consideration of their successors in office, or urging upon the Government to provide means for the prosecution of those so strongly recommended by their predecessors for the two past years, such as a school of Art and Design, an Industrial Museum, &c. The in-coming Committee will, no doubt, watch the course of events, and take such steps as may be necessary in the interests of the Board, so as to secure the early establishment of the important objects referred to. The rapid advance made, and still making, in the various branches of our infant manufactures, will justify all the nurture and encouragement that can be given on the part of the Government of the Province; and means furnished to enable the manufacturer to make himself acquainted with the philosophy of the art he practises, and beauty of design in construction, are amongst the readiest modes of accomplishing the desired object.

FINANCES.

The Secretary-Treasurer's detailed statement herewith submitted, shows total receipts for the year, including a balance of \$1,072.89 from previous year, of \$3,386.33; expenditure, \$2,165.00; leaving a balance in hand of \$1,221.33, to meet current expenses of the Board to the 30th of June next.

Your Committee have great pleasure in bearing testimony to the labours of your Secretary in connection with the *Journal*, and also to the large amount of extra time and trouble required of him in procuring and preparing material for transportation to the Paris Exhibition; and have made an appropriation of \$200* to Mr. Edwards, as a substantial approval of the manner in which he has performed these duties.

REPORT OF THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE.

The Honorable the Minister of Agriculture in his Report to His Excellency the Governor General, dated January, 1866, says:—

"It is thought that the organization provided by the Statute 20 Vic., cap. 32, is

defective, and calls for amendments; but the Boards themselves and the public seem to be of opinion that the main impediment to their usefulness lies not so much in the legal organization as in the insufficiency of the annual grants voted by Parliament for these purposes. The course marked out for the Boards by the Statute was certainly a most extensive one—including Industrial Museums, Schools of Design, Evening Schools for Apprentices and Adults, Free Libraries of Mechanical Works, &c., &c. It is now apparent that with \$4,000 per year not one of these objects, not to speak of all, could be fairly carried out; and it is therefore not surprising to find that the burden of the Annual Reports of these Boards to the Department has been, and is, 'give us more funds and we will give you returns, such as were contemplated by the Legislature when we were first instituted.'

"While concurring in this view, I yet feel it my duty to observe that it seems most undesirable to have institutions of this description dependent on the Government alone, or even principally, for their pecuniary means. In England, to whose example we are frequently referred by complainants on this subject, all such institutions depend mainly on local subscriptions and only partially on Parliamentary grants. Such is the fact in relation to Mechanics' Institutes, Science Schools, Evening Schools and Schools of Design. The English Government, indeed, does much; its Committee of Council on Education, and its Science and Art Department, have effected great things for Arts and Manufactures since the attention of the state was fairly challenged to those important subjects in 1851. The Government of Canada ought unquestionably to do much more than it has done to promote similar objects and interests, but without liberal and continuous local co-operation, the desirable results never can be reached.

"An additional reason for calling especial attention to the condition of both Boards, is to be found in the extraordinary development of all our artificial and manufacturing interests, within the last few years. If complete statistics of the capital engaged and labour employed in such pursuits could be obtained (as under an improved method of collecting such statistics, it is to be hoped they may and will be), there could not exist a second opinion on the importance of the interests at stake, or the necessity for enlarging the powers and resources of the Boards.

"In evidence of the good use made of the inconsiderable annual grants now voted to the Board in Upper and Lower Canada respectively, the 'Balance Sheet' of each for the year 1865 is given under a separate head in the Appendix."

Your Committee would merely remark on the above, that the funds at the disposal of the Board have not been sufficient to allow the commencement of any of the more important operations anticipated by the Statute, in which the parties participating in the benefits could be called upon to contribute a portion of the expense—as would be the case in the operation of a School of Design, and a School of Arts for mechanics and practical men, such as was submitted to the Government by this Board, in the year 1865.

Your Committee will conclude by giving one other extract from the Minister's Report, relating to the representation of this Province at the Dublin Exhibition, in which this Board took an active part. 'The Report says:—

"It is certain that relatively and proportionately, the contributions from Canada were, as a collection, amongst the best Colonial Collections shewn at Dublin, as the decision of the Juries in favour of our Exhibition, sufficiently proves."

"The grant of the Legislature was made available for its object only on the 17th of March, rather less than six weeks before the time at which the Canadian Court was required to be open to the public in Dublin, and the total sum voted was five thousand dollars; out of which all the expenses of purchasing, packing, and transporting goods to Portland, and from Portland to Dublin, the installation and Agency expenses and all contingent outlay were to be taken. Notwithstanding these difficulties, the products of Canada arrived in time at Dublin and received a comparatively large share of the prizes awarded by the Judges of the Exhibition. It is satisfactory to be able to add that the display of Canadian Minerals was the immediate cause of the sale of some of our Crown Lands to an amount much exceeding the entire grant placed at our disposal.

"All articles for the Dublin Exhibition were procured departmentally, some (comprising general collection) directly by the Department, and the remainder through the

active co-operation of the Geological Survey, the Boards of Agriculture and Boards of Arts and Manufactures of Upper and Lower Canada.

"Before referring more particularly to the prize list, it will not be without interest to quote a few sentences in relation to the Canadian Court, from the semi-official volume in-

tituled, The Visitors' Guide to the International Exhibition of 1865.

"At page 135, after a short description of the most important collections constituting the Canada Exhibition, occur the following remarks:— We have, however, named only so many of the the various products as will enable visitors to recognize the Canadian Department, and which, we trust, will lead visitors to look for some of the more characteristic exhibits of the Department. The arrangement of what is shown, the selection of things exhibited, and the general aspect of affairs about the Canadian section, do credit, in a very high degree, to the industry, judgment, skill, and good sense of those who have been entrusted with the representation of this important part of Britain's possessions. There are few parts of the building, where visitors, who like to see the result of self-reliant industry, and the marks of indomitable courage in mining and agricultural operations, will spend their time more agreeably than at the Canadian Stand."

REPORT OF THE SUB-COMMITTEE OF THE BOARD OF ARTS AND MANUFACTURES FOR LOWER CANADA.

That upon their assumption of office they felt, as their predecessors had, the pressing necessity of adopting immediate action to secure the reduction and discharge of the liabilities incurred in the erection of the Exhibition Building, which has been an incubus for several years past, paralysing the efforts of the Board and circumscribing its opera-tions, as without the necessary funds it was impossible to carry out the important work expected of it. Your Sub-Committee proceeded at once to lay before Government a statement of the position and liabilities of the Board, together with the claim for five years occupation of the Exhibition Building by the Government, for Militia purposes. Your Sub-Committee was led to believe that the amount of the contractor's mortgage would be paid and charged to the rent account of the Building; but notwithstanding the assurances thus given, no action was taken by the Government until the sixth day of November last, when the sum of four thousand seven hundred and twenty-four dollars and ninety-six cents was appropriated by the Governor in Council, in settlement of the claim for rent of the Exhibition Building, during the last five years; and in order to extinguish the mort-gage due to Government on the property, the Hon. Mr. Ferrier was authorized, under the direction of Government to dispose of the vacant lots adjoining the property, to the extent required to meet the balance of amount due.

The amount thus allowed for rent, your Sub-Committee paid over to the holder of the contractor's mortgage, in reduction of the amount due by the Board, and your

President signed and received the necessary discharge.

As it appeared, however, from the terms of the minutes of the meeting of the Gover-

nor in Council, that a misapprehension still exists respecting the funds out of which the building was erected, and the adjoining lots, your Sub-Committee felt bound to remonstrate against the repeated misapprehensions made on this subject and repeatedly corrected by your Sub-Committee; and duplicate letters were consequently addressed to the Hon. the President of the Council, and the Hon. the Minister of Agriculture. A reply from the latter has been received, containing assurances that, notwithstanding what has been done, he is still fully alive to the difficulties under which the Board labours, and that he will seize the first favourable opportunity to renew his efforts in its behalf. The correspondence and a copy of the minute are herewith submitted.

Your Sub-Committee would recommend to their successors renewed application to the Government, for the relief of the Board from the liabilities still remaining due on the Exhibition Building, as soon as the members of the Government now in England return to this country, inasmuch as the operations of the Board cannot be carried out on a proper

scale until these barriers are removed.

The valuable free Library of reference held in trust by this Board was, in the early part of the year, transferred to the Reading Room of the Mechanics' Institute of Montreal, under an arrangement by which the Reading Room was enlarged and a portion set apart for this Library, with a separate entrance for the public at all hours, whereby not only enlarged accommodation for the Board was secured, and a considerable saving in its expenses effected, but additional facilities were afforded to the public for reference to it.

The specifications and drawings of the English Patent Office have been regularly received and bound: but with the exception of these, your Sub-Committee have been unable to place any additional works on their shelves, for the reasons already set forth as

circumscribing the efforts of the Board.

Your Sub-Committee, desirous of having a worthy representation of the manufactures of Lower Canada at the Paris Exhibition of 1867, opened up a correspondence with the Bureau of Agriculture on the subject immediately after entering upon their duties, but was unable to take any action until the latter part of August, owing to a want of information respecting the amount to be placed at the disposal of the Board for that purpose. Notwithstanding these difficulties, your Sub-Committee have no reason to be ashamed of the collection they have made, and believe that the representation of this section of the country will not be injured by the collection now made, and awaiting transportation to Paris.

As soon as your Sub-Committee was informed that the sum of \$4,000 was all that was appropriated for the purchase of manufactures, the Secretary was instructed to write to the Minister of Agriculture, and remonstrate against its insufficiency for the purpose

intended.

It is to be regretted that the recommendation of your Sub-Committee's predecessors, that a joint exhibition of the products of the two sections of the country, should be held previous to the transportation of the articles to Paris, has not been acted upon; as an excellent opportunity would have been afforded the residents of both sections to see what

progress had been made by each other in the Arts and Manufactures.

Your Sub-Committee petitioned Parliament last session for the amendments to the Patent Law, which have been repeatedly recommended by the Board; but no beneficial result has attended their labor, although special legislation was evoked in individual cases, and one of the principles asked for by the petition—the patenting foreign inventions—was admitted in these particular cases; a result which your Sub-Committee remonstrated strongly against, inasmuch as the man of means was favored, while the equally worthy but poor man was ignored; whereas, in the opinion of your Sub-Committee, no distinction between the two should be recognized.

Your Sub-Committee, while regretting that these remonstrances were insufficient to overcome the influence exerted in this matter, was nevertheless gratified that they were not fruitless, but led to the insertion into each act granting such privileges, of restricting clauses which had been recommended as desirable and applicable to a general measure.

The petition and correspondence are herewith submitted.

Your Sub-Committee recommend to their successors the desirability of continued action in endeavoring to obtain the adoption of such a law on this important subject se will be a happy substitute for the unjust and illiberal measure which now exists in our statute book.

Your Sub-Committee has much pleasure in drawing your attention to the fact, that the Act 24th Vic., chap. 21, respecting Trade Marks, which was prepared and submitted to the Legislature by a previous Sub-Committee, has been largely taken advantage of during the past year, and is one of the fruits of the efforts for the public good put forth by this Board.

It is a cause of regret that the clauses respecting the registration of designs have not also been taken advantage of; but your Sub-Committee is of opinion that this result is attributable rather to a want of information than to a want of appreciation on the part of the public, of the provisions of the Act. It is therefore suggested to your Sub-Committee's successors that the question, whether more publicity should be given this matter, and what action should be taken by the Board for that purpose? is not worthy of consideration.

Your Sub-Committee have had under consideration the feasibility of founding a School of Design in this city, and plans have been prepared by which the required accommodation can be provided at the Exhibition Building, at a comparatively small outlay. At the same time, the Art Association of Montreal having under consideration the desirability of establishing a Gallery of Art, a Committee was appointed to confer with a Committee of the latter Association, for the purpose of securing a School of Design and a Gallery of Art combined; but nothing definite has yet been decided upon.

Your Sub-Committee recommend to the consideration of their successors, this scheme

for supplying a want, the necessity and importance of which is daily increasing.

In the early part of the year your Sub-Committee made application to the Minister of Agriculture for duplicate models and copies of specifications of Canadian Patents, but in consequence of his having no funds for that purpose, he was unable to comply with that request.

As it is highly desirable that these models and specifications, or copies of them, should be placed in some central position where access to them could easily be had by the public; and as Montreal is the centre and seat of the Mechanical class, your Sub-Committee suggest to their successors the consideration of what measures are necessary to procure and place on exhibition such a valuable collection as this would undoubtedly be.

Your Sub-Committee appointed a delegation to visit the Provincial Exhibition held in the city of Toronto, in the month of September last; the result of which visit appears from the report of Messrs. G. Weaver and David Brown, which is herewith submitted.

The Classes of the Mechanics' Institute for the winters of 1865-6 were visited and examined by a Committee consisting of Dr. Dawson and Mr. McMurray, and in consequence of their favorable report, a sum of \$80 was appropriated to their aid by the Sub-Committee.

These Classes have again resumed their operations; and, considering the benefits they confer, and for the purpose of enlarging their usefulness, your Sub-Committee, at the beginning of the present session, expended a sum of \$100 in the purchase of such models and blocks as were required to fully carry cut the objects of the classes, and these are now among the assets of the Board.

The long expected Dublin Exhibition Medals were received during the past summer, and those awarded to Montreal exhibitors were distributed by the Hon. the Minister of

Agriculture, at a meeting of the Board, held on the 18th September.

During the year now closed a new element—delegates from the Art Association of Montreal—was introduced into the composition of the Board, under the provisions of the amendments of 1864 to the Act incorporating this Board, thereby proving that the operations of this Board have not been wholly deprived of public interest; and your Sub-Committee sincerely trusts that every succeeding year will exhibit not only an increasing interest, but largely increasing means of carrying out the great and noble objects for which this Board was organized.

The Treasurer's statement for the year is herewith submitted, from which it will be seen that the funds of the Board have been carefully husbanded, awaiting the fulfilment of the many promises on the part of the members of the Government for the amelioration

of the condition of the Board.

The whole, nevertheless, respectfully submitted.

> BOARD OF AGRICULTURE OF UPPER CANADA, Toronto, May 15th, 1867.

To the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture, Ottawa.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit the following brief Report of the proceedings of the Board of Agriculture of Upper Canada, for the year 1866.

The Board in 1866 consisted of the following members, viz.:-

Elected Members.—Hon. D. Christie (President), Hon. Asa A. Burnham (Vice-President), Hon. Geo. Alexander, Mr. Wm. Ferguson, M.P.P., Mr. R. L. Denison, Dr. Richmond, Mr. F. W. Stone, and Mr. J. C. Rykert.

Ex-officio Members.—The Hon. the Minister of Agriculture, Mr. A. J. McGillivray, President of the Agricultural Association, Professor Buckland, Rev. Dr. Ryerson, Chief Superintendent of Education, and Dr. Beatty, President of the Board of Arts and Manufactures.

The Board held five meetings during the year for the transaction of business, viz.: on April 17th, August 15th, September 5th, September 24th to 28th (during the Exhibition), and lastly on November 8th, each time at Toronto. Various matters of importance to the agriculture of the country were considered at these several meetings, besides the business connected with the management of the Annual Provincial Exhibition, and questions from time to time arising in the relations of the County and Township Agricultural Societies with each other and with the Board.

THE PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION.

The Annual Provincial Exhibition was held at Toronto on the 25th to 28th September, and was, in every respect, a highly successful display of the Agricultural and Indus-

trial resources of the Province. These exhibitions have advanced progressively in magnitude and importance, in the number, variety, and excellence of the animals and articles exhibited, and in the concourse of visitors attending them, from their first institution up to the present time. They have kept pace with, at the same time that they have aided in contributing to, the development of the resources of the country. They have represented annually the improvement going on in the breeds of cattle, in the varieties of grains and seeds, in fruits and vegetables, and the products of the workshop and factory; and by the knowledge thus afforded of the value of such superior animals or products, their introduction into new districts and new localities has been rapidly promoted, to the great advantage of the general agricultural interests of the Province. The Exhibition of 1866 gave evidence of no falling off from its predecessors. In some of the classes, the number of articles might be less than on former occasions, but the quality was, on the whole, superior. The show of live stock, is believed to have been better than on any former occa-In any of the classes there was scarcely an inferior animal or article to be seen. The Exhibition, on the whole, afforded abundant and most satisfactory evidence of the advantages of Upper Canada as an agricultural country, and of the progress our farmers and mechanics are making in all the varied branches of industry represented under the classification of the Prize List. The weather in the beginning of the week was unfortunately unusally unpropitious, but this did not prevent the grounds, on the last three days of the show, from being as numerously attended by interested visitors as on almost any previous occasion. I submit the following statement showing the number of articles exhibited and the amount awarded in each class:-

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES.

There were in Upper Canada, in 1866, sixty-three County or Electoral Divisions and two hundred and sixty-four Township or Branch Agricultural Societies in existence. These Societies collectively received, in subscriptions from their members, up to the time of applying for the Public Grant, the sum of \$39,254.30, and from the Public Funds the net sum of \$44,630.76, all to be applied to the purposes for which they are established by Statute. THE CROPS OF 1866.

The past year was one of great productiveness in the farming districts of Upper ida. Owing to the copious rains of summer, the crops attained great luxuriance of growth and gave promise of a more abundant yield at harvest than for several years past. This prospect was verified by the result, for although the continued rains retarded harvesting operations, and affected the quality of the sample in some degree, and although, from the same cause, the potatoe crop was affected more or less by rot in some portions of the country, yet on the whole the year was one of more than average fruitfulness, and the market prices for almost all descriptions of produce have been highly remunerative. The farmers of Upper Canada may therefore without doubt be considered as at present in the enjoyment of a high state of prosperity, and all other classes of the community doubtless derive more or less benefit from this fortunate condition of things.

AGRICULTURAL INSTRUCTION.

Professor Buckland has, during the past year, in a number of successive towns, visited and lectured at public meetings in the following counties, viz : Essex, Kent, Lambton, Perth, Huron, Middlesex, Oxford, Brant, Halton, Peel, Simcoe, York, Ontario, Durham, Northumberland, Renfrew, Carleton, Russell, Lennox and Addington. In this useful labor he has occupied twenty-three weeks' time, and has held eighty-three meetings, at which the attendance has been from forty or fifty to one hundred and fifty or two hundred persons each meeting. He has, besides, had much personal intercourse with farmers in the above counties, and a few others where meetings were not convened. He has found, and has endeavored to encourage, an active desire to acquire a knowledge of the most improved systems for developing the resources of the land, and has also endeavored to promote a spirit of intercourse and mutual co-operation and inquiry amongst the farmers in the more remote districts. Amongst other subjects he has specially brought to the attention of his auditors the importance of the improvement of stock by using pure-bred male animals; the better and more thorough cultivation of land, by applying the labor to a less surface, and leaving a larger amount in pasturage; the advantages and means of pursuing dairy husbandry, flax cultivation, &c., &c. His lectures have been looked forward to by the members of Agricultural Societies and others with much interest, as a means of acquiring valuable information, and have been, as a general rule, well attended.

The Veterinary School continues in successful operation, in connection with the course of agricultural lectures given by Professor Buckland, assisted by other Professors of the University, to occasional students, each winter. At the recent session there were in attendance seventeen students, of whom thirteen were studying veterinary science with the view

of practising it as a profession.

The following is a programme of the lectures for the session, with the names of the Lecturers: Andrew Smith, V.S., Edinburgh—Anatomy and Diseases of Farm Animals. J. J. MEYRICK, M.R.C.V.S., Royal Artillery—Veterinary Materia-Medica. James Bovetl, M.D.—Animal Physiology. GEO. Buckland, Professor of Agriculture, University College-The History, Breeding and Management of the Domesticated Animals.

On the conclusion of the session four young men presented themselves for the final

examination for the diploma, viz. :-

JOHN COATES, Milton, Co. of Halton; ARCHIBALD MCNEE, Perth, Co. of Lanark; EDWARD HABRISON, Milton, Co. of Halton; LAVIN CATHER, City of Toronto.

The Examiners were:—Mr. Varley, V.S., 13th Hussars; Mr. Walters, V.S., Royal Artillery; Mr. Hagyard, V.S., Brampton; J. L. Lizars, M.D., Toronto.

The young men passed their examination in a highly satisfactory manner, and severally received their diplomas. The Examiners had no hesitation in stating that at least some of them would have passed with credit to themselves at either the Royal Veterinary College in England, or the Edinburgh in Scotland. These young men have all entered upon the practice of their profession in different localities, with good prospects of success to themselves, and of advantage to the interests of the breeders and owners of domestic animals in their several neighborho od.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The cultivation of Fall wheat, formerly the grand staple crop of Upper Canada, continues to be a precarious industry in the front townships, owing to the depredations of the

wheat midge, and the danger of being winter killed from the want of a sufficient covering of snow. Our farmers, therefore, besides the cultivation of Spring wheat, which has largely taken the place of the fall sorts, are learning more and more to turn their attention to the production of other articles of a marketable character. Amongst the new branches of agricultural industry which have thus arisen, "dairy farming" deserves particular mention. The system of cheese factories has been extensively adopted in many counties, and continues to receive increased attention. There are probably now not less than one hundred of these establishments in successful operation, using daily the milk of from one hundred to five hundred cows each. The cheese produced is, generally speaking, of good quality, and commands a ready sale at remunerative prices. Formerly there were very large quantities of this article imported for domestic use. Now, this home demand is to a great extent supplied from our own factories, and considerable quantities are exported to England and the United States as well, where it has met with a very favorable reception. This is a most important and salutary change in our agricultural practice. By devoting an increased breadth of land to pasturage, under the dairy system, instead of keeping the larger proportion under the plough, our soil will gradually recover its former fertility and when the wheat-fly finally disappears it will be possible to return to wheat cultivation again. should it be found desirable so to do, with renewed success. Butter making, another branch of dairy farming, has not heretofore received that attention from our farmers which its importance demands; considerable quantities have of late years been bought for exportation to England and other countries, but for want of attention to the quality these ventures have not always met with that success which should be desired. Many shipments, however, selected with care, have proved of excellent quality, and given full satisfaction to the purchasers. Our farmers are gradually learning to manufacture a better article, and butter will probably become, at no distant day, one of our most important export staples.

The cultivation of flax continues to receive attention. The Riga flax seed, imported by the Government last year and very liberally supplied to the farmers at a reduction upon cost price, has shown the advantage of such occasional importation by the superior length and quality of the fibre produced from it. The number of acres under flax last year, in Upper Canada, may be computed at about 10,000. There are about one hundred scutching mills in operation, three linen mills, and many rope-walks, the products of all which establishments meet with a ready and remunerative sale. The seed also is in demand at paying prices, either for manufacturing at our own oil mills or for exportation to the United States.

The Government having wisely, in view of the destructive cattle plague lately raging in England, and the great danger of infection from it, prohibited the importation of cattle from that country last year, no importations of live stock consequently have take place since 1865, except of a few horses and sheep under special circumstances. This under the ordinary condition of things would be a cause of regret, as, although our herds of thorough-bred cattle have arrived at a high degree of excellence, there is still an important advantage to be derived from the frequent introduction of fresh blood by means of new importations. But the exemption from the cattle plague, which may perhaps be attributed entirely to the measures taken by the Government, or which, at all events, might have been lost if those measures had not been taken, is a fact for which the farmers of Upper Canada, and indeed the whole community, have great cause for thankfulness. Now, however, that the plague has nearly disappeared in England, it may reasonably be hoped that it will be found safe at an early period to remove existing restrictions, and permit the free importation of superior animals for the improvement of our flocks and herds, as formerly.

The Government having placed a certain sum of money at the disposal of the Board for the purpose of making a suitable collection of the agricultural products and agricultural implements of Upper Canada, for the Universal Exhibition at Paris this year, the Board endeavored to discharge the duty intrusted to them, and made such a collection of articles as the time and other circumstances would permit. These articles were duly forwarded to Paris, at an early date in the year, the whole being contained in thirty-nine cases, a complete inventory of which was forwarded at the time to the Department at Ottawa.

MEMORANDUM ON CHOLERA.

Adopted at a Medical Conference convened at Ottawa, the seat of the Government of Canada, by the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture, pursuant to an Order of His Excellency the Governor General in Council—March, 1866.

PRELIMINARY REMARKS.

Since the recent outbreak of Asiatic Cholera in the Levantine regions, and its spread into countries more directly connected with the localities of its origin, all the vexed and complicated questions arising out of the consideration of this terrible scourge, have been re-agitated throughout the world.

It is not the intention, in this Memorandum, to examine any of the many hypothetical opinions and systems arising from such a fertile subject of discussion, but to collect in a somewhat condensed compass, for the guidance of individvals, associations, corporations and civil authorities, such practical information as is undisputed amongst unbiassed and well-informed minds, about the character of the disease and its ordinary way of propagation, about the duties of every one towards himself and his fellow-creatures in time of pestilence, about the best means of preventing or delaying its appearance and mitigating its effects. These were the objects of the calling together of this Conference by the Government, and are consequently the subjects dwelt upon in this document.

In answer to the questions naturally arising in everyone's mind, as to whether it is probable that this continent will be visited by cholera this year, and whether the disease is likely to be more or less disastrous than formerly, many very contradictory, though very decided, opinions have already been given through the public press and medical periodicals. However, as there is some danger in the promulgation of opinions which cannot be founded on any tangible or well-defined reasons, it seems better to candidly acknowledge that such eventualities are not within the reach of human science to unravel, but that they must be accepted as they are to happen with a submissive and courageous spirit; and it is wise to be prepared for the worst.

Another question, upon which volumes of contradictory arguments have been written, scores of laws enacted, amended, repealed and re-enacted, whether strict quarantine can secure immunity to a country against the importation or spread of pestilential diseases, appears to have been answered by experience in this sense: that although the strictest quarantines (as a general fact) have certainly failed in securing, in toto, the advantages promised by the extreme partisans of such measures, these measures, nevertheless, have always proved themselves to be highly beneficial in delaying the time of the invasion of the malady, in mitigating its effects and preventing that extension which is known to take place where no such precautions are observed.

No one denies that every reasonable separation of infected persons or things from the healthy and clean, generally speaking, is beneficial; and every one admits that hygienic measures are extremely advantageous at all times. It is, therefore, with such views and with the determination of carefully avoiding the counsels of carelessness, on the one side, and pusillanimity on the other, that the investigations connected with the adoption of this

Memorandum have been prosecuted.

It is earnestly hoped that the following short chapters and paragraphs (though containing nothing assumed to be new for persons acquainted with moral, medical and social

sciences), will not be without good results, intended specially as they are:

1st. To confirm the public mind against useless and dangerous fears, by showing that the first duty, as well as the better understood interest of every one, is to meet manfully, with a truly devout spirit, the threatening scourge; 2nd. To diffuse amongst the people a sufficient knowledge of what ought to be done to alleviate the calamity and to guard against errors which are so apt to pervade a community in times of such visitations.

Should everything be followed out that is recommented in this Memorandum, and be executed, and should the threatened pestilence not invade Canada, it could never become the subject of the slightest regret, as being so much time and expense uselessly thrown away; because all the measures are calculated, in every respect, to improve generally the moral, the domestic, and the social habits of our population.

CHAPTER 1.

PESTILENTIAL DISEASES.

To make use of the happy expression of M. Tardieu, "It is well to bear in mind that pestilential diseases are not of that class of which it has been given to man to penetrate the origin and to understand the principle."

From time immemorial the world has been periodically subjected to the ravages of epidemic or pestilential diseases, varying in their intensity and peregrinations, mysterious in their origin, and from whose occasional recurrences mankind, in all probability, will never be free.

SECTION 1.—EXTERNAL CHARACTERS OF CHOLERA.

Any discourse of a purely scientific nature would be out of place in such a document as this, but it is of all importance to insert in this memorandum such information as would render the disease, in its ascertained character and effects, generally understood by members of the community at large: because no one knows to what an extent even a small amount of knowledge may become useful in removing painful and dangerous fears, or equally perilous feelings of blind security, also in avoiding fatal errors, and thus making in many instances and many ways its possessor serviceable to himself, relatives and fellow-creatures generally.

Cholera is apt to appear in every climate (very few countries, indeed, having escaped its visitation); it attacks both sexes, every age, and all conditions of life, the poorest and

the wealthiest, the weak and the strong.

Generally, but not always, it appears more fatal where misery, filth and crowding are to be met with, and intemperance and other vices are sure to render its blow more disastrous.

The approach of Cholera is often preceded by contagious, endemic or epidemic diseases, and a more than usual prevalence of affections of the stomach and bowels, and oftentimes also by diseases of a disastrous nature (epizooties), attacking domestic animals.

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Occasionally, the appearance of Cholera seems to have a marked effect either in increasing or diminishing the intensity of other concomitant diseases; at other times it appears to fail to exercise the slightest effect on them. The experience of Canadian medical practitioners has gone, however, so far to establish that Cholera has generally superseded in a great measure all other diseases.

There are only two circumstances connected with this scourge which seem to observe a determined character of constancy, these are the ratio of mortality to the number of persons attacked, and the influence of continual cold on the duration of the pestilence.

The ratio of mortality almost at all times and in all countries is never below one-third, and sometimes averages from forty to fifty deaths for every one hundred cases of confirmed Cholera. The appearance of the cold season invariably checks the intensity of the malady in moderate climates, and generally stops it entirely in severe climates. Whether these well-asserted facts are of the negative, the dubial or the positive category, it is well that they should be made known to the public, to prepare the minds of all to see things as they are, in time of trial, and to guard against too illusory and hopeful expectations, as well as against foolish fears; for a great many have fallen, and a great many are apt to fall easy victims of Cholera through imprudence and carelessness caused by an optimist view of the state of the matter, as well as through terror and despondency brought on by an exaggerated idea of the existing danger.

It is well that a general elementary knowledge of the real symptoms of Cholcra should be possessed by every member of the community. Generally speaking, then, an attack of Cholcra is preceded by a kind of malady called *Cholcrine*, which may end, however, without a full development of the disease, but which seems to act ordinarily as its precursor.

The symptoms of *Cholerine*, also called *premonitory symptoms*, are the following, not always, however, to be met with in the same order, nor all at one time, nor the same in every person affected:—Noisy motions in the bowels, pains in the belly, loose evacuations, generally bilious, sense of general uneasiness and weakness, loss of appetite, whiteness of the tongue, sometimes there is headache and very frequently inclination to vomit.

In connection with these symptoms it should be remembered that, in time of Cholera, there is a great disposition to looseness of the bowels, which, if not attended to carefully, is apt to terminate in Cholerine, as well as Cholerine in confirmed Cholera.

When the premonitory symptoms are followed by a real attack of Cholera, and when Cholera comes on without it, the progress of the disease is characterized by successive stages, which are respectively designated by some authors by the name of—lst, period of invasion; 2nd, period of state or collapse; 3rd, period of reaction; 4th, period of termination; or simply first, second, third and fourth stages.

The period of invasion is characterized by several or all the following symptoms: diarrhoa, vomiting, pains in the regions of the stomach, cramps, general diminution of animal heat, coolness of extremities, increasing constricting sensation in the regions of the stomach, anxious expression of countenance, with alteration of the voice very peculiar to the malady, pulse quick and growing weaker and weaker, eyes depressed and sunk in their orbits, livid and contracted appearance of the face, irresistible thirst and desire for cold water and suppression of urine.

The period of state (or collapse) is characterized by an increase in the severity of the former symptoms, the skin in general becomes livid and bluish in color and bedewed with cold perspiration, the skin of the fingers assumes the same appearance as those of a drowned person, the pains and cramps increase to agony, the evacuations become of a whitish fluid, like thin gruel or rice water, they are often passed without the knowledge of the patient, the skin emits a fetid smell, a squalid appearance pervades the whole surface of the body, the breath is colder and colder, the respiration is much labored, a profound prostration of every vital action follows, and death quickly closes the scene; but the intellect remains almost as perfect as in state of health nearly to the last.

The period of reaction, when it fortunately occurs, shows the following symptoms: the pulse rises gradually, the blue coloration of the skin disappears with the returning warmth of surface, the respiratory movements become more regular, the voice is by degrees restored to its normal tone, a warm moderate perspiration shows itself on the skin, the countenance is more natural and the face becomes more or less turgid and the eyes somewhat injected. Sometimes the reaction is too violent, and then there is danger of congestion of internal organs, specially of the brain.

The period of termination is characterized by a gradual return towards the normal state, and by the re-establishment of the urinary and bilious secretions, coupled with the disappearance of the flushed and violent symptoms of reaction. But here again, there is danger of this short convalescence merging into a secondary affection somewhat resembling typhoid fever.

All these symptoms may vary a little in form, they vary a great deal in intensity, and somewhat also in order of succession: they may be all present and well-marked in many cases, whilst in others some few symptoms may be absent, or nearly so; but taken several

at one time, they are characteristic of Asiatic Cholera.

Death may happen at any one of these four periods, but most generally takes place in

the $second\ stage$.

The fatal termination of the disease, as well as recovery from it, may be determined in a few hours, and may be delayed for a few days. Deaths have been recorded to have happened after four hours of confirmed Cholera, and cases of seventy hours of sickness have also been reported; however, such short and long duration are both extremely rare exceptions.

SECTION 2.—PROPAGATION OF THE DISEASE.

This is not the place to discuss whether Cholera is a contagious, epidemic or infectious disease; from all we know about this mysterious malady, it may possibly partake of

the three characters intended to be defined by these words.

It is certain that, first noticed in India, the scourge is exotic for all other countries than south-castern Asia, from which continent it takes its much-dreaded name, known throughout the world as Asiatic Cholera. From the place of its birth, the scourge, at unfixed and varied periods, starts on its tour around the globe, following the grand routes of travel and commerce, sometimes accompanying an army on its march, sometimes following in the wake of pilgrims going to the rendezvous of their devotions, or a caravan of merchants: ascending or descending large rivers and crossing the wide ocean, stopping at all the centres of population, and spreading terror and death along its passage.

When Cholera began its migrations, it went first from India to Persia, then easterly to the end of the continent of Asia and to the islands of the Indian Archipelago, and westerly to Russia, Poland and Germany, and from central Europe to its northern portions and the British Isles. It then moved south-easterly, ravaging France, Spain, Italy and the neighboring countries, and traversing the Mediterranean it went to North Africa; at the same time, having crossed the Atlanta Ocean, it found its way to America, and thence

returned to Asia through Egypt.

The above-described peregrination of Cholera was the first one undertaken by this terrible traveller. He walked sometimes slowly, at other times advanced either by steady or rapid strides, resting occasionally, however, until he had accomplished his voyage, which began in the Delta of the Ganges in the year 1817 and terminated in the vicinity of the Red Sea in 1834.

Since its first appearance as a cosmopolitan travelling scourge, Cholera, varying in some instances the course of its progress, has no less than five times visited the European and American continents, in spite of all measures adopted by different countries to exclude its presence, and at all times preserving its *incognito* about everything appertaining to its nature and personality.

Many discussions are still maintained as to the manner in which Cholera is carried in its voyages through land and over water. There being no doubt that it is portable, it is wiser to act under the admission that it is carried by persons, effects and merchandize, and

even by the winds of the air and currents and streams.

At the present time Cholera is on its sixth general tour. It appears to have left Asia for the West with the Mahometan pilgrims of Mecca last year; then, after ravaging Egypt, it visited Turkey, Italy and much of the Mediterranean coasts; it has since entered France by Toulon and Marseilles, has gone as far north as Paris, and crossed the Atlantic Ocean to extend its calamities to some of the islands of the Caribbean Sea. The probability of its coming as usual to Canada has called for new preparations on the part of our Government and our municipal authorities. The only countries which have enjoyed a kind of immunity from the visitation of Cholera are the extreme regions of the North and South,

the remote interiors of continents, and the elevated regions of mountainous countries. The lines of its predilections are the navigable rivers; and many authors are of opinion that, generally speaking, the sea and lake sides, and the vicinity of water courses, are localities of choice for Cholera.

Notwithstanding some exceptional facts to the contrary, the disease makes more ravages wherever intemperance and other vices are to be met with, and wherever want, misery, crowding and filth are dominant. Cholera is apt to return to localities shortly after its disappearance thence, although ordinarily it travels on regularly; and although it commonly goes steadily from place to place in the line of its general course, it does, however, occasionally make a jump over distances of several hundred miles.

The direction of the winds seems to have very little influence, if any, on the propagation of Cholera, nor is it at all proved that the geological formation of a country, nor its meteorological phenomena have any marked influence on its prevalence or intensity.

SECTION 3.—FORMER VISITATIONS OF ASIATIC CHOLERA IN CANADA.

The first epidemic of Cholera visited Canada in 1832.

Its existence and its ravaging influences in many parts of Europe had at last excited fears to be entertained about the probability of its coming to our own shores; and in October, 1831, a communication from the Imperial authorities was made public by the Executive of Lower Canada, whereupon a meeting of the medical profession took place at Quebec, immediately after which Dr. Tessier, of Quebec, was dispatched to New York, to study the sanitary measures adopted in that large community against the threatened

scourge.

The first commission of a sanitary nature against the introduction and spread of Cholera was established at Quebec in February, 1832, and was composed of Drs. Morrin, Parent and Perrault. Subsequently, a rather numerous Board of Health was organized, and regulations passed for the inspection and sequestration of ships coming from infected ports. The Cholera—having previously appeared in New York, Boston and other places in the United States, notwithstanding that it has been reported to the contrary by some writers—made its first appearance in Canada at Quebec, where it was introduced by the shipping on the 8th of June, and spread at once its destructive influence in the neighboring parishes.

It was in Montreal on the 10th of June. Thence it extended its ravages to mostly all the localities of Upper and Lower Canada, and disappeared entirely at the end of the

month of October, having lasted in all about four months.

The second Cholcra followed the first within a very short time, and took place in 1834. At its first appearance, in the latter part of May, in the Quarantine Station at Grosse Isle, it affected so mild a character that it was not considered to be confirmed Asiatic Cholcra, and it preserved its mild form for a short period. It assumed, however, a more violent character through Canada at the end of July and during the month of August, but finally disappeared with the month of September, the Sanitary Commissioners having had a High Mass of thanksgiving chanted in the Cathedral of Quebec on the 2nd of October. The above fact is most important, as furnishing conclusive evidence of the cessation of the malady at a fixed date. This second sojourn of the pestilence in Canada having also lasted about four months.

The third Cholera—which is for us the Cholera of 1849, while for some countries it is the scourge of 1847 and of others of 1848—seems to have entered Canada by Kingston, where it made its appearance at the end of May, 1849. The pestilence had previously to that date appeared in several parts of the United States, and was at that time rapidly

ascending the Mississippi and the Missouri Rivers.

Some slight cases occurred in Quebec on the 11th of July, and a few more on the 12th; then it spread through almost the whole of Canada, its ravages being in some places greater, but in many places less, and also generally less destructive than in 1832. It seems to have disappeared entirely about the middle of October, after a few days of recurrence at Montreal, having lasted in all this time about four months and a half.

The fourth epidemic of Cholera in Canada took place in 1851.

It was introduced through the States, and Quebec was the last of our cities to receive it. The appearance of the plague took place under a rather mild form in August, and

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the last cases were observed no later than the first days of October. It lasted only about two months, taking Canada as a whole, and only five weeks at Quebec, from the 25th of

August to the 2nd October, having caused 206 deaths in that city.

On one of the last days it existed in Quebec, a ship, the Perthshire, sailed for England: almost immediately after her departure from Quebec the pilot was seized with Cholera and died. The captain and one sailor having also been attacked, the mate anchored the ship at l'Isle Verte; but in a few days both patients got well and the vessel started again without any further case and completed her voyage.

The fifth epidemic took place in 1854. It first entered Canada at Quebec on the 20th of June, and for this attack we have the whole history of the importation of the malady, in a Report of Drs. Landry and Jackson and Mr. Gauthier, Commissioners appointed to investigate the facts connected with the introduction of Cholera of 1854 into Canada.

Two emigrant ships, both from Liverpool—the Gienmanna and the John Howell having each a medical attendant, arrived at Grosse Isle before the middle of June. The Glenmanna had Cholera on board and had lost a number of passengers at sea; the John Howell had no Cholera, but had lost five passengers at sea from measles. They both disembarked their sick at the Quarantine, and two or three days after proceeded to Quebec with the rest of their passengers. The two ships were inspected on the same day, the 17th June, in the port of Quebec, and found free from all sickness; two infants, however, having died of debility on board the John Howell between the Quarantine and Quebec. The two ships apparently remained exempt from all sickness for two days, and were admitted to pratique on the 19th. The immigrants went ashore, some of them returning to the ships for meals and to sleep, when, on the 20th, the Cholera broke out almost simultaneously in 1 oth ships, whence several cases were immediately sent to the Marine Hospital. Then it appeared on board some other ships, and subsequently spread.

From Quebec, and apparently following the course of the immigrants in their journey west, the Cholera seems to have appeared in the under-mentioned cities at these respec-

tive dates:-

At Montreal, on the 22nd of June, among immigrants first;

At Kingston, on the 25th, on the person of a resident, having had no other communication with the immigrants than looking at them on the wharf, but being a man of intemperate habits and in miserable circumstances;

At Toronto, on the 25th, on two residents, who were not known to have had com-

munication with the immigrants;

In Hamilton, on the 23rd and 24th June, on immigrants.

The Cholera of 1854 ended in the latter part of the month of September, having lasted about three months. The Central Board of Health closed its labors on the 22nd of

September by formal resolution.

The Report from which these informations are gathered speaks of the immunity from Cholera enjoyed by the town of Brockville, on the St. Lawrence, although situated on the same grand route as the ravaged cities, towns and villages bordering the river side, and although immigrants had been allowed to go ashore in passing by.

A fact of some importance is also recorded in the same report, which it is well to

insert:

The Cholera appeared in the Provincial Penitentiary at Kingston on the 21st of July—that is nearly a month after it had commenced its ravages among the inhabitants of

the surrounding neighborhood.

The number of deaths from Cholera throughout the whole of Canada during this last epidemic, as recorded in the minute-book of the Central Board of Health of 1854, is put down at 3,486; a figure which, from the enormous difficulties to be met with in collecting correct statistical informations, must of necessity fall a good deal short of the reality.

The difficulties-insurmountable when the small localities have to be accounted forhave rendered impossible any attempt at gathering in this Memorandum figurative statis-

tics of the former obolera epidemics, besides the figures above given.

These figures may convey a deductive idea of the losses inflicted by Cholera on our country, when it is known that the number recorded is necessarily below the mark, and that the epidemic of 1854 was about one of the mildest of the five.

CHAPTER II.

PUBLIC AND PRIVATE DUTIES AS CONNECTED WITH CHOLERA.

The impending danger of a public calamity, and still more, its appearance in the midst of a community, in adding to the ordinary wants adds necessarily to the duties of all.

The State, the municipal corporations, the different associations, some professional corps and private individuals, have each special duties, more or less onerous, more or less

dangerous oftentimes to perform.

Cholera being, as it is, one of the most awful of all scourges, cannot appear, not even be simply threatenings without a general call for the performance of such duties, in the accomplishment of which it is within the province of every one to render eminent services to his fellow-citizens. Besides, it needs the concurrence of every one; for, in vain the State would try to do its part, if the municipal and other public bodies were refusing their concurrence, or, which amounts to the same thing, were derelictant in doing their share of the work; in vain would the municipalities and public bodies, in harmony with the State, attempt to accomplish their part, if institutions, families and private individuals, were careless of their own.

There is a community of interest to be subserved in averting the common danger; there must also be a community of action in preparation and defence for such an object.

On the Government devolves the duty of the general organization, of the gathering of the forces, of the promulgation of general information, of the external surveillance. It is its duty to keep the grand watch, and to defend the approaches, if they can be defended. The law embodied in chapter 38 of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada and the laws relating to Quarantine, have defined what part the State is to take in such measures, besides what appertains to the nature of State administration.

To bring to bear on the subject wise views and judicious counsels for all, to remind the minor bodies and the public at large of what is required from them by the law of the land, are also a part of the duties of the State: it is also its duty to institute a Central Board of Health, with whom all other Boards, and even individuals, can correspond, in order to impart to the composing portion of the whole body unity of purpose and uniformity

of action.

Such observations are made not to teach the State, but rather to warn people against the too common error of expecting more from the Government than the Government can possibly perform, and thus individuals or corporations might neglect what is most needed in such circumstances.

More special duties devolve upon municipal bodies; but they are restricted within narrower limits as to space. Each corporation is to see that every possible thing for the salubrity of their locality is done, that the poor are furnished with the necessaries of life, and, in case of sickness, with the necessaries called for by their painful situation; they have to invite to their assistance the counsels of men who, by their position and their avocations, can advise them in devising local measures and calling for general action from the higher authorities, if wanted.

Public institutions, families and individuals have to show themselves willing and obedient in accomplishing what is required from them, in avoiding what is forbidden and

in extending to others such help as is within their reach to dispense.

It is a constant duty for every citizen of a community to guard against everything which could be offensive or detrimental to his neighbors or to society in general; but that duty becomes a great deal more stringent in case of calamity, when the difficulties and the burdens of human life have become much heavier.

There is in such time more responsibility in every act of private and civil life, when the neglect of wanted precautions, when the indulging in something dangerous, when the diffusion of a simple foolish joke, or an ill-timed rumour can bring into the bosom of your own family or to the fireside of your neighbour, sorrow, terror and even death.

A time of pestilence, when the hand of the Almighty is laid upon us, ought to be a time of more than ordinary composure, sobriety of mind and body, of simplicity and dig-

nity of manners, of watchfulness over ourselves and of charity to fellow creatures.

The remainder of this Memorandum is devoted to outline the general principles by which the conduct of public bodies and private individuals should be directed during an

epidemic. Intended for all and being of necessity restricted to generalities, this paper is not supposed to impart a profound knowledge of things which are not, and which cannot be, otherwise than the exclusive privilege of men devoted to the special study of medicine.

Moreover, it would be dangerous to say more than what can be sufficiently well understood by the people at large, because otherwise a misinterpretation of an unavoidably

half-acquired notion might lead to very fatal mistakes.

If fully impressed of its tenor and honestly actuated by a high sense of duty, they will always know when (either in a public or in a private capacity) they can take upon themselves to act, and when they should call to their aid the counsels or administration of men whose specific mission is to acquire for all, what all cannot, by any possibility, be made to acquire for themselves.

CHAPTER III.

MEASURES AGAINST CHOLERA,

It is useless and also highly detrimental (this cannot be too often repeated) to flatter ourselves with the idea that, if such a particular thing were done in such a particular manner, complete immunity from this disease would be attained; it is equally dangerous to despond under the depressing belief that nothing can be done to mitigate the evil.

Cholera has visited almost the world entire (continents and islands) at least five times, in spite of all measures adopted by the most enlightened and civilized countries to prohibit its introduction. It must be accepted, then, as a truth, that Cholera must and will prevail whenever the higher counsels of the Almighty decree that it shall be so.

prevail whenever the higher counsels of the Almighty decree that it shall be so.

But God has given to man a certain power over things natural, in accordance with the general laws established by Him; and the legitimate use of such power, if not always attended with complete success, never fails, however, to be followed by some good results.

It has been even so with Cholera. A happy disposition of soul and mind, good salubrious conditions of life, caution and hopeful faith, moderate and temperate habits, have saved, and will always save, thousands from the effects of this and other scourges. Notwithstanding that the same views have already been enunciated, it is thought important to bring them again and again before the notice of the public, even at the risk of being considered tedious.

The measures to be adopted against Cholera, and in fact against any contagious epidemic or endemic disease, may be classed under the following headings:—1st, Sequestration or Separation; 2nd, Hygienic precautions; 3rd, Diffusion of sound ideas and judicious advice, and inculcation of obedience thereto; 4th, Prophylactic timely interference; 5th Intelligent counting tractions to the contage of

5th, Intelligent curative treatment.

The measures of the first class are evidently appertaining to the functions of the Government and municipal bodies, as defined by law; the measures of the second, third and fourth classes necessitate the co-operation of the community generally, and of all its members individually; the measures of the fifth and last relate to duties which devolve on members of the medical profession, and, under their guidance, on health officers, Sisters of Charity and other attendants on the sick, and on them alone.

If every one could pause to reflect on the importance of the performance of his own duties, do them well and not embarrass others in the accomplishment of theirs, and if all were to work in harmony, good will, devotion and forbearance, without assuming other than their own task, at the same time fulfilling it unflinchingly, it would be no great

stretch of prophecy to predict grand results for present and future good.

SECTION 1.—SEQUESTRATION.

The means of sequestration or separation, as a preventive measure, are of two kinds: firstly, those employed against the introduction of pestilence from infected countries; and, secondly, those which are adopted in centres of population, within a country already invaded by an infectious or epidemic disease. The first are effected by the establishment of Quarantine or Lazarettos; the second, by the establishment of temporary special hospitals or refuges in isolated situations, if possible.

Such measures, it has been already said, are useful and extremely advantageous; but it would be a dangerous fallacy to calculate upon their absolute success, and to neglect the

far better measures of a moral, sanitary and hygienic character.

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A few remarks and observations would be sufficient to convince every unsophisticated mind of this truth. To be satisfied of the infallible result of a Quarantine would require that the certainty of the disease being contagious be thoroughly established, or, if simply infectious, it would require a certain positive knowledge of the nature of its mode of transmission, of the time it can lay latent on persons or things, and a close insight into the nature of chemical or other agents capable of destroying the virus. It would again require the certitude of its being incapable of travelling on the winds and with the currents of running waters, or, if otherwise, to be fully aware of the exact distance at which the virus cannot be any more hurtful by having lost its propagating influence.

It would also necessitate an absolute prohibition of every intercourse, mediate or immediate, between all persons or things appertaining to the country to be protected, and also of every thing or person started from all suspected or infected regions, and even from all persons and things connected with the Quarantine station itself, such station becoming

ipso facto an infected spot.

Even if we were entirely conversant with the mysterious propagation of those maladies, such total prohibition of intercourse between countries in constant intercourse with

one another would be, in itself, a great calamity.

The recent successful instance of sequestration at New York, on board the English ship Atalanta, connected as it is perhaps with political, social and commercial tendencies of the day (not altogether medical), has received amongst our republican neighbors an advocacy of absolute prohibition by means of extremely rigid quarantine and non-intercourse. To adopt extreme measures on the isolated experience of the case of the Atalanta would be indulging in the very fatal philosophical error of arguing of the general by the particular; and possibly the non-spreading of the disease in the case of the Atalanta may, after all, be attributed to the presence of the cold season.

All this reasoning, nevertheless, is not a plea for the abandonment of the principle of sequestration and of measures of quarantine, as already and repeatedly enunciated. Happily, however, there is a middle course that can be observed, equally distant from extreme

determination called for by most opposite opinions.

It would be impossible, even if it were of absolute necessity, to guard the country against the importation of Cholera on the line of our inland frontier, extending over hundreds of miles. But here it may be said that our neighbours, in defending themselves from such an importation into their own territory, are virtually making us participants of the same advantages. That argument, however, cannot apply to our numerous ports situated along the coast of the Gulf and the lower St. Lawrence, such as are the free port of Gaspé, the ports of Paspébiac, Percé, Rimouski, Escoumins, and the ports of the Counties of Saguenay and Chicoutimi. A medical health officer chosen on the spot might perhaps be appointed at each of these ports, with instructions to inspect every ship, and in case of sickness to stop each ship from pratique, and by instituting the ship herself as quarantine ground for the master and crew, whilst those on board may be submitted to special treatment, till the sickness has disappeared, providing for any case in which, by death, the crew is reduced to an insufficient number of hands.

The point, however, at which a quarantine is of all importance, as proved by the constant experience of former epidemics, is on the St. Lawrence, at the entrance of the port of Quebec. The Government possesses already, and very fortunately, at that very point an admirable establishment, which only requires to be made at times of more than ordinary dangers adequate to the circumstances. A better selection for a Quarantine than the Grosse Isle Station cannot be made, situated as it is at some thirty odd miles from Quebec, on an island of about 600 acres superficies, with deep water and good anchorage, at least three miles distant from any parish or village, and yet sufficiently near to prompt and commodious public means of communication.

There can be practiced a reasonable sequestration, embracing, on one side, the relative security from infection which quarantine measures can afford, and, on the other side, neither vexatious nor ruinous to commerce and international intercourse. The rules to be adopted to carry on such a reasonable quarantine need not be laid down in this memorandum; they constitute no new science to propound, being well considered and set down in the works of many authors and in the codes of most nations. This document, being intended for all, cannot enter into lengthy details, and, moreover, as this part of the preven-

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tive measure devolves upon the State, the Executive has already, and can always have, at

its command the means of information sought for to determine its action.

There is, as connected with the Quarantine, a question on which it is important that the public should possess some practical information, in order to prevent one-sided notions taking possession of the public mind, and thus become a subject of very serious embarrass-This question may be thus written: What rules shall apply to steamers of passenger lines frequenting the ports of Quebec and Montreal, one of which—the Canadian Ocean Steamship Company's Line—is subsidized by our Government and carries our European

It seems impossible to exempt them entirely from quarantine when coming from a country laboring under the scourge; but a strict quarantine for such ships may prove very disastrous, even absolutely ruinous for the company and calamitous for commerce in general.

This simple expose of the question at once suggests that it is one of no small import-

ance, and one which is fraught with serious difficulties.

Without any attempt to solve the question in this memorandum, it will not prove useless, it is hoped, to suggest a measure, the adoption of which may result (if not always, at least in several instances) in the avoidance of the greatest danger, on one side, and of

immense losses to the company, passengers and merchants, on the other.

This measure is suggested by the practice for a long time adopted by the Austrian Government towards their company of steamers trading between Smyrna and Trieste. This practice would secure an increased efficiency in the case of our steamers, from some modifications of a more stringent nature and from the fact of the greater length of the passage between Liverpool and Quebec than between Smyrna and Trieste. To follow this practice would require that a special medical health officer is placed on board each steamer, which will then be, whether there is disease or not on board, assimilated to a quarantine station. This officer to be appointed by Government, at the first warning of Cholera, for a limited required time, besides the ordinary physician of the ship.

During the storage of the cargo sanitary precautions would have to be enforced, and preventive disinfection practiced in a way not to damage the goods, by the use, for instance, of dry hypochloride of lime or some equally efficacious disinfectants, and whitewashing of ship and boxes with lime water. These recommendations are not made in ignorance of what can be said against the real efficacy of such measures, but it is assumed that the

wiser course is to incline towards the safer side.

Every day of the passage sanitary measures would have to be resorted to, according to regulations made to that effect, and amongst others the goods and effects of the passengers

in daily use would have to be ventilated on deck.

In the case of five days having elapsed since the last attack of Cholera on board, at the moment of arrival at Grosse Isle, all those yet on sick and convalescent lists being landed, the ship, without further detention, would be permitted to proceed to Quebec, and if free from Cholera on her arrival at Quebec, then allowed to pratique; if not free from Cholera, ordered to remain at anchor at the mouth of the St. Charles, to be dealt with according to the orders of the inspecting physician at the port, after consultation with the Quebec Board of Health.

In the case of detention at Grosse Isle, for a shorter period, less stringent measures of purification to be adopted for these ships than with ordinary vessels. Even partial admis-

sion to pratique might be allowed them.

Now comes the consideration of the second sort of sequestration which has been indi-

cated at the beginning of this section, that is, isolated Cholera Hospitals in cities.

Very little requires to be said on the subject in this memorandum, further than that the adoption of such hospitals, and several of them in large cities, is a measure of paramount importance. These hospitals, of course, are destined to receive the poor, to avoid the formation of focuses of Cholera in the small, filthy and crowded lodgings. Refuges for convalescents of the same class ought also to be procured, for a convalescent is a vehicle to carry and impart the pestilence.

It devolves upon the municipalities of towns and cities to create such temporary establishments, and it is for the Local Boards of Health to see that they are well venti-

lated, properly kept and attended to, according to peculiar local circumstances.

SECTION 2.—HYGIENIC PRECAUTIONS.

The Sanitary measures to be adopted can be conveniently classified under two heads, viz.: Public and Private measures, and these can again be conveniently subdivided into

two other classes: measures relating to persons, and measures relating to things.

Necessarily the information or advice imparted in the following lines are restricted to general principles, intended to serve as a compendium on subjects upon which the reflections of all, and the serious studies of some, are to be directed. Sanitary measures concern every locality and every place, they apply even to isolated country-dwellings of farmers and others, but they particularly apply to villages, towns and cities, because the larger the agglomeration of population in a given place the more those measures become necessary, from the fact that the actual number of lives exposed is greater, and also that the agglomeration increases the danger in a far greater ratio than that of numbers alone. Every thing being equal, a population of so many thousands gathered into a smaller space, will, in time of pestilence, suffer a greater loss than an equal number of persons spread over a larger superficies.

It is a matter of public security to have every thing of a dangerous nature removed from the centres of population and vicinity of human abodes; such as are contents of cesspools, composts, offals, heaps of manure, carcasses of animals, soakage, in one word, every

sort of vegetable or animal matter in actual or impending decomposition.

In reference to the disturbing of such matters, when occurring in masses, a very important remark is to be made. Such masses should be carted away to farms in cold seasons. But if in time of actual pestilence it is better not to disturb them at all, but to resort to the means of disinfecting the surface, and covering them with a sufficient layer of dry earth.

Pools of stagnant water, open sewers, discharged ditches of establishments of industry are also vicinities of dangerous character, therefore to drain or to cover, or to disinfect

them, are salubrious measures of great importance.

There is a numerous class of trades and manufactures which, being in their very nature offensive, ought not to be allowed to be carried on in the midst of towns and cities, such are the slaughtering of animals, collecting and storing of old rags and debris, manufacturing lime, vegetable charcoal and animal charcoal, acids, coal oil refineries, tanneries, making of artificial manures, soda and candle factories, and many other branches of industry, especially those connected with the transformation of parts of animals, which debris are not to be collected in quantities without being submitted to inspection and sanitary precautions.

Large stables, collections of cattle intended for slaughter, and especially piggeries are very objectionable in cities: as the establishment of the first-mentioned class cannot be prohibited, it is necessary that stringent regulations for the very frequent carting out

of town of litters and manure be enforced.

The question of carrying off the surface water, always more or less impregnated with putrescent matters in towns and cities, and the daily mechanical removal of the night soil, in other words the question of drainage and sewerage generally is as important in a sanitary point of view, as it is difficult of a satisfactory solution in a scientific and financial light. Evidently such complicated problems are not to be treated of in a paper like this; wherever a village, town or city can undertake such comparatively vast works its municipal authorities must have recourse to professional men to deal with the question on the spot.

In the absence of under drainage, open drains ought to be established to dry the soil, and in the absence of perfect sewerage (an extremely rare advantage), disinfectants and interment, when practicable, are to be applied, if in conjunction one with the other so

much the better.

After having thus enumerated the principal objectionable materials, trades and manufactures which ought to be prohibited, let every one be reminded of things which are to be provided, and especially of the very great importance of obtaining an abundant supply of water which should be of the best quality.

Every possible means to furnish plenty of good wholesome water to the population of villages, towns and cities ought to be put in requisition by the municipal authorities, in

order to provide for an abundant supply of this commodity wanted at all times, but singu-

larly indispensable in time of pestilence.*

Such an enunciation bearing on measures of so self-evident a necessity, may appear to many, nothing else than the useless uttering of truisms and common place remarks, but the daily neglect of these measures, the apathy entertained about them, the constant evils resulting from such apathy and neglect are a sufficient proof of the necessity of their being repeatedly brought before the public. Let these suggestions be continually dwelt upon lest, after having been carelessly heard, they should be entirely forgotten.

The cleaning of streets, yards, public buildings and private houses ought to be thorough before the hot season sets in and before the malady has made its appearance. There is in most of our villages, towns and cities quantities of old wooden pavements, planks and other decaying timber, lying in the streets and in and about the back grounds in a state of partial decomposition and absolutely saturated with filth and moisture of all sorts, which should be burned, or carted out in open country early in the spring, should

it be considered available for anything useful.

The sanitary or precautionary measures may be mostly all expressed by two collective words—cleanliness and ventilation. Cleanliness of the streets, passages, yards, dwellings public and private, infers the removal of all matters which are factors of decomposition, either as ferments or as fermentable bodies. Every remain either vegetable or animal is susceptible of decomposition, and consequently, when out of place, becomes a fertile cause of insalubrity and disease. Out of place is intended to mean where they are not wanted for actual and immediate use; for example, collections of hides and bones are out of place everywhere else than in the establishments where they are to be converted into leather, glue, animal charcoal or any other industrial product; and the establishments themselves are out of place in the midst of centres of population; again manure and composts are out of place anywhere else than on the farms they are destined to fertilize.

Cleanliness is obtained by scratching away, washing off and carting to the fields all offensive matters. In the cleaning of polluted places the use of a little chloride of lime in the water may be of great benefit. The same remark, however, which has been made about disturbing masses of matters during hot weather and in time of pestilence, also applies to filth collected on walls and other surfaces of dwellings and premises when under the immediate influence of extreme heat and moisture, putrefaction and diffusion of miasm acquires an immense impetus under such circumstances, consequently it might not be unattended with danger to undertake any extensive hot water washings of these dwellings during sultry weather; and it might be better to cover the surfaces of such dwellings or

their appurtenances with a thick coat of paint or lime.

As several allusions have already been made to disinfectants it is just as well to remark, so that it be well understood: firstly, that substances called disinfectants in common language, are not all possessed of such properties; secondly, that even real disinfectants, (like all other precautionary measures), although of beneficial use, are not in themselves infallible resources—they are simply good adjuvants. Thus the acquiring of the best conditions of salubrity is not a simple but a complex problem, the result can only be ob-

* Dr. Dundas Thomson says, in reference to the subject of the influence of water on the appearance of Cholera in London:--

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[&]quot;But, perhaps, the most terrible example on record of the fatal effects of impure water occurred in 1854. I found that the Southwark Company's water was of a different composition from the water of the Lambeth Company. When I applied a piece of muslin over the supply pipe of the Southwark Company to the cistern in my laboratory at St. Thomas's Hospital, a large quantity of human excrement was detained, and the impurity in solution was much greater in the Southwark Company than in the Lambeth water, which contained little or no matter in mechanical suspension. The Lambeth water was obtained from Hampton, while that of the Southwark Company was pumped up from the river near Vauxhall-bridge. These two companies possessed mains in the same streets, and supplied the houses indiscriminately. Analysis alone enabled me to detect the two waters, as the inhabitants, without consulting their water receipts, were unable to state the source of supply. And although the population supplied by the two companies. was precisely in the same condition, except as to water, the cholera deaths in the bouses supplied by the Lambeth Company were 37 to every 10,000, and in those by the Southwark Company 130 to 10,000, or as one to every three and a half. I conclude from the data supplied that 2,500 persons were destroyed by the Southwark water, who would have been saved if they could have obtained the Lambeth water. It is a remarkable fact that the Lambeth water, in the epidemic of 1848-49, was more fatal in its effects than the Southwark, the Lambeth Company taking their water lower down the river at that time. The mortality in houses supplied by the Lambeth water was 125 in 10,000, while the deaths in houses supplied by the Southwark water were 118 in 10,000.

tained by the operations of various forces converging towards the same point of action.

But few of the best disinfectants will be mentioned here, in order not to create confusion in the mind of persons not deeply versed in these matters, and also in order that special attention being concentrated on a few, more certainty of an ample supply of them is obtained, and the prevention of possible speculation imposing on the credulity of the people.

Quick Lime is recommended for its cheapness, for its being so readily obtainable everywhere, for its easy application and for its being so familiarly known to every one. It

is well also to mention the purifying qualities of powdered charcoal.

Chloride of lime, sulphates of iron and copper, and permanganate of potash, or Condy's fluids, are the other disinfectants recommended; and it is hoped that they will be imported (not being yet manufactured in the country) by druggists and merchants, in ample quantities and sold at a reasonable trade price.

These substances are not to be employed indiscriminately in places actually occupied by people; they are specially intended for sewers, heaps of dirt or manure, outside privies, night pails, &c. If otherwise employed they ought to be so under the direction of medi-

cal men or apothecaries.

Chloride of lime may be used in the proportion of one pound of Chloride to a gallon of water, and it is assumed that a pound of Chloride of lime so diluted is sufficient to partially disinfect one thousand gallons of running sewerage; when used for washing a much weaker mixture is to be made, say an ounce to a gallon of water, and the articles are to be well rinced and cleaned in pure water, and well exposed afterwards. In every case the Chloride must be well mixed with water.

Sulphates of Iron and Copper may be used in the proportion of a pound to a gallon of water for disinfecting filth and sewerage. Condy's strong or red fluid may be diluted in the proportion of one gallon to fifty gallons of water, and the weak or green fluid in the proportion of one to thirty gallons. However strong may be the faith in disinfectants, in spite of what is alleged against them, they can never supersede or cause to be overlooked the more reliable measures, as are cleanliness and ventilation for instance.

Good ventilation infers firstly perfect cleanliness of dwellings; secondly, the avoid-

ance of crowding, coupled with a free circulation of wholesome air.

The enunciation of this broad principle is suggestive of advice in a general form: that crowded and long standing gatherings of people are to be (as much as religious, educational, military and civic duties can permit), avoided during the reign of pestilence, especially at night, and that this precaution or rule applies not only to the interior of buildings, but even to meetings in the open air. Of course in the application of such a principle no one ought to indulge in pusillanimity and the drawing of extreme consequences.

Times of epidemic are not times to fly from the service of God in his own house; and they are no excuse for dereliction of other public duties, but they are times for prudence on the part of legitimate rulers, and of obedience on the part of other members of the community. It would be a desirable measure that, during the prevalence of Cholera,

colleges and schools should be closed and vacated.

It is a rule to be always observed during mild seasons, that churches, public halls, and rooms in ordinary dwellings, when not actually occupied, should be open by means of their windows to the access of currents of fresh air, as sweeping as the state of the atmosphere and artificial means when at command can allow. This suggestion is not to be understood as recommending the introduction of cold draughts or direct strong currents of air where persons are standing, sitting or reposing; but under these circumstances ventilation should be effected quietly as well as steadily. Fresh air is a commodity which men can use and abuse.

In the present state of science no fixed formula can be given for the space of room allowance requisite for each person, nor is there any one admitted method of ventilating buildings, for the simple reason that ventilation depends on a multitude of circumstances, varying with the external ambient air, the habits, temperaments, healthy or unhealthy condition of persons, the dispositions and situations of tenements, and so forth.

A man can be ventilated to death by fresh air in a box and can be suffocated by foul air in an immense hall. It devolves upon every one—in his public or private capacity—to adopt measures of this kind, and upon the local Boards of Health, during the prevalence

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of epidemics, to see that no uncommon evils, resulting from deficiencies of space and ven-

tilation, are allowed to endanger the public health.

A special mention is to be made here of the annoyance and discomfort very often met with by our travelling community, which may be, in time of pestilence, the source of great danger,—that is the overcrowding of cars on Railways, and sometimes of Steamers with passengers. In such times there should be no more than one person for each bed of a sleeping car, and no more passengers in any other vehicle than there are seats to accommodate. While speaking of Railways, it is deemed of the utmost importance to revert to the necessity of remedying the abominable nuisance of privies at all our Railway Stations, and to the detestable habit of soiling the approaches of every stopping place on our Railroad tracks.

The privies of Cars and Steamers should also be the object of very special attention

and supervision.

Without a great display of dogmatical science, it is easy to pronounce whether the atmosphere of an apartment is close, overloaded with noxious gases or odors, either too hot or too cold, too dry or too moist, for ordinary purposes. Besides, it would be impossible to alter at once, or for many years to come—even if it were a necessity—the permanent circumstances of dwellings, public or private. So it is better to leave aside those questions of discussion, and to resort—in addition to the simple and common means of keeping everything clean—to making use of the doors, windows, wickets, and also of large fans, to agitate the air of the inside, where the surrounding external atmosphere is still and heavy. It is a great criterion to judge of the sanitary condition of any lodging, that its inhabitants who have dwelt in it for a reasonable time (all other things being equal) have a comparatively-looking clean, strong and healthy appearance. Under these circumstances there is every reason to believe that the perils of residing in such a dwelling are not great, even if there were something evidently susceptible of being ameliorated. This, of course, would be no reason to abandon any idea of progressive improvement, but it would be a sufficient cause not to adopt vexatious measures against the proprietor or inmates of such tenements.

It is a precaution of the utmost importance (the abandonment of which might be felt fatal to many lives) that the stoves or heating apparatus of dwellings should be kept, during all seasons, in good working order, so that they can be used moderately in case of sudden lowering of the temperature, and also in cases of extreme dampness; for, although ordinary and gradual diminution of temperature and continuous action of cold season, such as heralds the approach of winter, has a marked effect on the stopping of the disease, the same effect is by no means produced by an abrupt change from a hot day to a few hours of summer cold: such change, besides its depressing effects on the animal functions—especially those of the stomach and bowels—seems to act (by the way of reaction) as an intensifying agent on the decomposition of organic matters, which cannot be entirely removed from the immediate vicinity of human abodes. It is not needless to remark that a heating

apparatus is also a most useful means of effecting ventilation.

It is an important duty devolving on the municipal authorities of towns and cities to see that all adulterations and alterations of articles of food and common beverage are prevented. A large town or city ought to have a medical inspector, who, being a practical chemist and a microscopist, should watch over the buying and selling of all alimentary

substances in common use.

As to preservations of a purely hygienic character applying particularly to ordinary daily régime, they do not differ from those which apply at other times, with the exception that some innocent indulgences, such as friendly gatherings, might, perhaps, better be avoided, as well as anything indifferent in itself, which is known by every one to have a depressive effect on the natural functions of the organism, and particularly any overexertion of the mind and body.

Again and again let it be repeated that drunkenness, immoderate use of food and drink, excesses, and vice in general, are, per se, predisposing causes of sickness, Cholera

being a special and fatal complication of the malady.

There is no necessity in time of epidemic for a change of customary habits and diet, provided they are good; far from it there may be danger in making any important change.

But if the habits or diet are bad, it is of much moment that they should be modified,

and that such modification should take place before the appearance of the scourge, in order that all the functions of the body may harmonize with such changed state of things before the time of trial has arrived.

Every article of food and every beverage or preparation known by a person as having on his bowels a loosening effect or producing costiveness are to be avoided; the first on account of their actual action, the second as necessitating afterwards the use of aperient medicines, or being apt to bring a reaction to the same effect. Care should also be taken not to fast when attending the sick, nor to remain too long without food at any time during pestilence.

Occasional use of bathing and the constant habit of daily cleanliness of person are evidently needed, but caution should be observed against too prolonged and frequent bathing.

It is well to wear warmer than ordinary summer clothing, especially flannel next the skin, because there is in times of Cholera a predisposition to sudden chilliness, against which it is wise to be constantly guarded, the use of flannel belts on the belly is often recommended, and great care should be taken not to allow the feet to become cold and damp, especially when not in actual bodily activity.

As seen in the preceding lines, the principles of hygiene are in the main very simple, still, their being enforced with strict observance on the public requires not a small share of industry and understanding on the part of those who are entrusted with that duty. The execution however of some of the measures (as applied to local circumstances) required in case of epidemic are exclusively within the province of the medical profession, and it stands to reason that there should be a comparatively large proportion of its members in the composition of the local Boards of Health. This is not to grant a favor, but rather is it an onerous and responsible duty imposed on a class of the community more strictly obliged by the nature of their avocation to undertake it.

Section 3.—Instructions and Advice.

One of the evils connected with the appearance of public pestilence is the indulgence in spreading reports, rumors and opinions of all sorts. Thence timid people are frightened, and excitable people lose their self-possession.

Men of systematic ideas propound wild theories, and credulous persons adopt them as absolute truths. Speculators are also apt to take their chance of such times, and long before the appearance of Cholera, advertisements are seen offering for sale all sorts of remedies and specifics for that scourge. Patent medicines, previously announced as curative compounds against almost every known ailment, are presented with a new placard, in which the word Cholera is added to the already long catalogue of fever, debility, inflammation, gangrene, diabetes, suppression of urine, constipation, diarrhoa, &c., &c., all of which are to be cured under all circumstances, real, possible or imaginary. Thus and in many other ways charlatanism is opening its meshes to credulity and fears.

To lend a too credulous ear to all these reports, rumors, predictions and promises, becomes the source of much danger. The press should be guarded from giving countenance to such parties, for the injurious effects therefrom resulting—could they be realized, would be found to be of alarming magnitude.

The duty of every one is very simple, and to accomplish it is the only means of expecting immunity for ourselves and of being useful to others. The laws of the country have provided that public bodies should be selected in each locality to collect information, to watch over the progress of the malady, and to give orders for the execution of all necessary measures; the wisest course, surely is to look to these persons for information, if needed, and to accomplish cheerfully and faithfully what is recommended or ordered by

If sickness should come, there is a class of men whose minds have been directed to the study of the functions of the human frame and the cure of disease; their duty as well as their interest is to effect all that human skill can do to restore health, and on their success rest their honor, peace and comfort; it is true they may be unsuccessful in their efforts, but far less risk will be incurred than at the hands of irresponsible persons.

Some advice is much needed in relation to the attendance on the sick during Cholera, because cowardly fear may lead people even to forget what they owe to their fellow-crea-

tures and even to their near relatives; and on the other side ill-advised devotedness may expose people to unnecessary danger. A very simple rule previously offered to the reflections of a sound intellect and to the feelings of an honest heart may do a great deal of good. Whoever is the sick and wherever he lays the prey to the malady, whatever your station in life you owe to him help and comfort; if he is in need of medical assistance seek it; if he requires anything in your power to give, give it to him; if he has no attendance attend to him or procure them for him. But if the sick person happens to be well provided and attended to, then there is no occasion to go near him unless he is a bosom friend or a relative.

This place is just as good as any other to insert a remark which is to be taken as one of paramount importance. The articles of clothing and bedding which have been soiled by the dejections of the sick are to be first disinfected, and then washed carefully; if of small comparative value they had better be burned or buried. The dejections of the patients are to be received in pails containing some disinfectants, and are not to be then

thrown into sewers, privies or cess-pools, but are to be interred at some depth.

The crowding of people around a sick bed is especially bad in regard to Cholera. In duty and honor you are bound to face every danger when called upon for a good purpose; in duty you are bound to avoid the smallest risk when there is no useful object to be attained. If we except unwholesome crowding, there is not, generally speaking, so great danger as people may fancy in the attendance on the sick; and provided that the precautions indicated in this memorandum are observed, there is hardly any more peril than in the mere walking the streets of a locality under the scourge. Most of the medical men, sisters of charity, and attendants of hospitals in the country, have weathered several epidemics without having been seriously ill, although living in close communication with the sick day and night for months; their secret has been to avoid fear, to be calm, cleanly and prudent.

In time of Cholera Cemeteries must be the subject of very strict attention, and are not to be allowed as places of public resort; it is better not to attend funerals in large numbers. Once on this subject, it is well to guard against precipitate as well as too long delayed burials. The medical members of local Boards can frame instructions to persons connected with such a service; the inspection of a medical man is sometimes absolutely necessary. With proper precautions, there would be no danger in allowing families who have the means of going into the expenses necessitated to carry on such precautions, to have the consolation of having their dead buried in the usual way adopted by them,

and be allowed the usual church service.

SECTION 4.—PROPHYLACTIC TIMELY TREATMENT.

In time of Cholera epidemics the stomach and bowels are apt to be easily deranged, and great care should be taken to remedy, at once, such derangements, without fancying any danger when there is actually none. Sometimes Cholera is preceded by *Cholerine*, or premonitory symptoms, and sometimes it comes on without warning, even sometimes without many of its most striking characteristic symptoms.

In every case of a sudden ailment, whenever medical aid can be obtained it should be procured. But, in the absence of such assistance, there are measures and simple treatment, some of which may be administered by the patient himself, and others by any assistant; it is necessary, therefore, that such measures should be known by everybody.

Any one attacked by pains in the stomach or bowels, cholics, or diarhoea, however slight in appearance, should moderate his diet, and even abstain from strong (or any) food; he should avoid fatigue, cold and dampness, clothe himself warmly, and make a moderate use of some warm aromatic drink, like infusion of tea, chamomile, ginger, mint, coffee, or similar substances.

If the symptoms increase, or that—even at the outset of the complaint—there is a sensation of chill and inclination to vomit, then the patient must be put in a warm bed, between woollen blankets or sheets. The use of aromatic drinks is to be continued, and frictions under the bed-clothes, not uncovering any part of the body, and every other external means of warming the skin are to be applied.

It has been deemed wiser to abstain from offering any suggestion concerning treatment by medicines or drugs, on account of the danger accompanying the use of such agents

by other than medical practitioners.

Once on the subject of duties connected with attendance on the sick, it is proper to remark that, whilst it is at all times the duty of the physician and others to maintain a cheerful and encouraging demeanor towards a patient, yet it would be exceedingly culpable—especially with such a prompt malady as Cholera—to conceal from the patient his true condition.

Certain precautionary public measures, of a prophylactic or preventive character, which may be adopted with immense advantage everywhere, and which are of absolute necessity

in large towns and cities, have to be indicated in general terms:-

Amongst such measures, the appointment of a medical health inspector stands first. The duties of such officer would be to examine, beforehand and during the prevalence of epidemic, the streets, yards, edifices, dwellings, wells and other water supplies, to see whether such hygienic conditions as are of a feasible nature, under the circumstances, have been adopted, and to report thereon to the local Board of Health and to the Municipal Corporation.

This officer would also be entrusted with the duty of imparting generally to the people such information as is likely to be of use in warning some against incurring unforeseen dangers, in alleviating the terrors caused by the apprehension of exaggerated or totally imaginary perils, and in detecting incipient sickness and enforcing treatment. Such service has been already established, with good results, in several European countries, under the

title of preventive domiciliary visits.

The establishment of temporary public dispensaries in different parts of large cities, under the immediate control of the local Board of Health, is also a measure of the utmost importance, where every one could be furnished with such remedies as are recommended for the treatment of premonitory symptoms, or with those prescribed by a medical attendant at a cheap price for all, and gratuitously for the poor. The same establishment could also be made a deposit of disinfectants, and of flannels and other articles for the destitute, to be delivered on the production of a ticket from the local authorities at the cost of the municipality. In large communities it would be also advisable to have always in requisition proper vehicles or ambulances for the removal of the sick, such conveyances could be in connection with the service of both Cholera hospitals and dispensaries.

SECTION 5.—CURATIVE TREATMENT.

The treatment of Cholera is one of the most difficult of all therapeutic efforts which can be required from even the most experienced medical man. To enunciate such a proposition is to say that none but a professional practitioner should undertake such a task. To meet the symptoms of the malady, as they appear in their protean form, in accordance with the general laws which govern the human body and the pre-acquired knowledge of the many agents employed as medicines, is the problem, to solve which is not a little perplexing for the most accomplished physician.

Thence, the wisest counsel which can be given to the family, friends or charitable attendants, of any person apparently laboring under an attack of Cholera is:—Send for

the physician!

But there are many people in the new settlements and in the backward parts of the country (and the case may also happen in older and nearer parishes and townships) who cannot obtain the advice or ministration of a physician, and there are a great many more who, by no possibility, can procure such help in time; for these parties some advice may become of great value, if not in teaching what is to be done, at least in warning them of what they ought not to do.

In the preceding section the prophylactic and primary treatment of premonitory symptoms, or incipient Cholera, has been described; and such treatment, in the total absence of a physician—or while waiting his arrival—can be undertaken by any intelligent person, and is to be resorted to without fail. But now we have to deal with the confirmed malady, when the symptoms have changed, and when the disease is undergoing a rapid succession of phases, calling, consequently, for a succession of modes of treatment different from one another.

In the absence of a physician, then, the four stages of Cholera may be treated in the following manner: At the period of invasion, and during the following period of collapse, the external measures recommended for premonitory symptoms are to be continued,—that

is to say, keeping the sick in a recumbent position in bed, between woollen sheets or blankets, dry and warm; frictions under the bedding, to avoid the action of cold air; the use of hot bricks, sinapisms, turpentine stupes and other stimulating agents, not, however, carried to vesication or blistering the skin; in one word, appliances to the surface of the body to restore the animal heat.

At this stage ordinary stimulants may be used internally, to endeavour to revive the

pulse and powers of the organization generally.

The period of reaction, when well characterized by subsidence of the worst symptons

and not accompanied with congestion, requires no special treatment.

In case of sign of congestion and non-reappearance or continuous scarcity of urine, the only remedies which can be attempted without danger by a stranger to medicine would be the warm foot bath, friction with mustard or other rubeficient to the feet and calves of the legs, and diluent drinks, like linseed tea, not too thick, poultices in the region of the kidneys (or hollowed part of the back), in order to restore the urinary functions.

Congestion may be detected by non-medical attendants sometimes, by noticing an extra turgescence and redness of the face, if the head is threatened, or by a sensation of fullness

if another part is the seat of the rush of blood, an increased anxiety in both cases.

If the period of termination is accompanied with no unfavorable symptoms, and if the urinary functions are well established, the better plan is to let the patient alone—as far as medication is concerned, and to begin feeding him gradually; but if symptons of a typhoid type supervene (which may be noticed principally by the oppressed aspect of the patient, anxiety, unsteadiness and a somewhat stupid appearance of countenance, accompanied or followed by delirium), some stimulants in small quantities are to be given to the patient, and beef tea administered to him, as exhaustion and want of action is generally the cause of the complication at that period of Cholera. Of course such remarks are only intended for the guidance of people in the absence of medical attendance.

To attempt more than such a simple treatment, carried out with care, attention and

perseverance, would be, to say the least, risking a good deal.

A precept to be invariably followed is to leave the sick entirely to nature's care rather than to try drugs and remedies, the effects and results of which are almost perfectly un-

known and unascertainable at certain periods of the malady.

It has been thought a duty not to close these remarks without touching a point of great magnitude as well as of great delicacy, that is, in case of the actual death of a pregnant woman the Cæsarean section ought to be performed, if allowed by the family; although there is probably very little chance of saving the child, for the reason that no harm is done on one side, and that a great result may possibly be obtained on the other.

Section 6.—A SERVICE TO BE RENDERED TO SOCIETY.

Medical science being founded in a great measure on the study of facts grouped together, the importance of collecting the facts connected with the lamentable events of such a noticeable character as the passage of Cholera in a country become self-evident. Unfortunately very little has been recorded of the statistics of former epidemics in Canada, and this very little even can only be gathered by the very tedious, imperfect, and not very reliable mode of collecting them from the several newspapers of the time, with the exception of some interesting official reports and papers, which are, however, limited to special points.

If Canada is again visited by the threatening scourge, precautions should be taken

that the experience acquired during its prevalence be not lost to science.

Statistics ought to be collected by local Boards and directed to the Central Board. Even the most limited fields of observation are very apt, when brought together, to throw light on a subject of such interest. It has been ascertained in some European countries that the observations made in small localities, when collected by men of real tact, have a particular interest, being generally more accurately made. The officers charged with such labor in large cities are over-burdened with work, and not being so well, and often not at all acquainted with the persons and their circumstances, cannot sometimes give certain interesting particulars which are so easily ascertained in small places where everything is of public notoriety.

Blanks of a uniform plan should be furnished, to be filled by every elergyman, medical

practitioner, hospital official, health officer, sexton and other persons connected with the service of the sick and dead.

The returns of sickness and death ought to contain, as much as possible the following information: the number of cases of real cholera and the number of cases of other diseases, the number of deaths from cholera and the number of deaths from other diseases.

The date of the attack, the date of recovery or date of death, the age of the patient and sex, his profession or trade, his general habits, his nationality, the duration of the ailment.

To these statements might be added any remarks the collector of such statistics could

furnish, which would appear to him of any value.

Very interesting and very useful information could also be recorded; the way the cholera was introduced into the locality and the precise moment (if possible) of its appearance and disappearance; what was the dominant sickness before the appearance of Cholera, and whether sickness and mortality from other causes have decreased or increased during the prevalence of the disease, and whether they have kept away or returned back, as the case may be, after the disappearance of the scourge. The apparent effect of certain local influences and of the hygienic conditions on the malady, the description of the measures adopted for the prophylaxy or the mitigation of Cholera and all other information in regard to the sanitary conditions of the locality as a whole and of the dwellings and premises.

It would be very useful to collect thermometrical, and when possible, barometrical and hygrometrical observations made from day to day, before, during and after the epidemic. A description of the locality; the quality and distribution of its waters, rivers, lakes, marshes, &c., and the quotation of number of cases and of deaths as compared with the

geographical situation.

If such a mass of information could be accurately brought together, it would be paying to science and to mankind a tribute every country owes to the human confraternity, by not allowing to be wasted such dearly acquired experience.

REPORT

OF THE

CENTRAL BOARD OF HEALTH,

OF CANADA.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable CHARLES STANLEY, Viscount MONGK, Governor General of British North America, &c., &c., &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

The Central Board of Health, appointed by Commission, under the Hand and Seal of Your Excellency, and bearing date the fourteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, respectfully report as follows:—

According to the Act chapter 38 of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, the Commission constituting this Board will be ipso facto determined to-morrow, by the expiration of the six months elapsed from the date of Your Excellency's proclamation of the 10th of April, declaring the above-cited Act to be in force in this Province.

Previous to the termination of their duties, the Central Board of Health must acquaint Your Excellency of their proceedings during the time of the occupancy of their office.

The country having fortunately escaped the scourge by which it was threatened at the time of Your Excellency's issuing the Proclamation, the present Report will—neces-

sarily as well as happily—be a short one.

Previous to declaring in force the Act respecting the preservation of the Public Health, Your Excellency had called together a Medical Conference, by an Order in Council, bearing date the 20th of February, 1866, the duties of that Conference being to discuss, in its general bearing, the subject of Epidemic Cholera, together with the best means to be adopted to check the introduction and spread of such a dreadful malady in the country. The said Conference, of which almost all the members of the now reporting Central Board of Health formed part, adopted a "Memorandum" containing the views of its members on the subject of their investigation, coupled with such advice and directions as would make the local authorities familiar and the public in general acquainted with sufficient knowledge of what should be done and what should be avoided in time of Epidemic.

This Memorandum was printed both in French and English, and widely distributed through the different parts of the Province; as were also copies of the Act respecting the Preservation of the Public Health, in this way placing every one in possession of the

knowledge of their public and private duties under the circumstances.

The Central Board of Health was called together on the 28th of April, to organize which, was done by the election of Dr. R. L. MacDonnell for President, of Dr. Hamnett

Hill for Vice-President, and of Dr. A. J. Grant, as Secretary.

The Board then immediately set to work to prepare the regulations contemplated by the Act, and agreed upon a series of such regulations, which were confirmed by Your Excellency in Council on the 3rd day of May, under the provisions of the 8th section of the said Act, respecting the preservation of the Public Health.

The regulations so approved of by Your Excellency were also distributed for the information of the local authorities, as in these regulations their duties and powers were clearly defined.

The Central Board of Health has held, since its organization, fifty-one meetings, during which the members thereof have devoted their time in directing the Secretary of the Board in its correspondence with the local authorities and, in one instance, with the Metropolitan Board of Health of the City of New York, in watching the progress of Cholera in Europe, and especially on this Continent, and in discussing, generally, the subject of Epidemics.

The Board, while closely observing the progress of Cholera abroad, was, at the same time, most careful not to create any unnecessary alarm. At the end of July the epidemic was spreading in the United States, and legitimate fears were entertained that the malady

was on the eve of invading the country.

The Board thought that it was their duty at the time to issue a circular to the Municipal authorities through the whole Province, and to such Local Boards as had not reported to the Control Board.

to the Central Board.

This short circular was to the effect that the Central Board of Health without wishing to excite unnecessary alarm, but at the same time being fully impressed as to the increase and fatality of Cholera in various parts of the United States, strongly recommended the Local Boards to exercise every precaution in carrying out those sanitary measures requisite to stay the spread of disease.

As already stated in this Report, those requisite sanitary measures had been already fully detailed in the memorandum alluded to heretofore, and which was in the hands of all

the Local Authorities.

Being fully impressed with the utility of collecting Statistics, should the epidemic invade our shores, the Board after mature discussion adopted blank forms for the collection of such Statistics, intending to have them printed and distributed, and to be filled up by health officers, medical men, clergymen and other persons connected with the service of the sick.

Those forms, however, have neither been distributed nor even printed, because the Board in order to avoid creating unnecessary fears on the one hand and useless expenditure on the other, had determined to wait until the moment of absolute need, which happily did not come.

The Quarantine Station at Grosse Isle being under the immediate control of the Department of Agriculture and subjected besides to the Inspection of the Inspectors of

Asylums, Prisons, &c., this Board had no occasion to interfere with it.

However, some changes adopted in the localization of the different quarters of the Quarantine Station, at Grosse Isle, having been courteously communicated to members of this Board, there could be no harm in mentioning that they evidently constitute a most desirable as well as a necessary alteration.

The minutes of the Board, the Register of Letters received, the Book of Letters sent, as well as the papers forming the records of the Central Board of Health have been deposited in the Department of the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture, for future

information if necessary.

Before closing this, fortunately, very limited Report, the Central Board of Health cannot refrain from making a few observations on the prospects of the forthcoming warm

season as regards Cholera:

The disease at present is travelling from city to city, both in Europe and America, affecting as it seems an insidious character, not spreading much, but fatal in the majority of cases. Under such circumstances the probability is that the epidemic will have its influence more or less localized in warm climates during the winter, to travel north with the re-appearance of the mild season.

If we were to judge of the course of the disease, on the present occasion, through the world, by what was observed in the previous cholera epidemics, it is more than probable that we may be subjected to a visitation of the scourge next year; for, should our country escape entirely from an attack of Cholera this time, it would form a solitary exception to

the experience of past years.

In conclusion, the Board is happy to notice that the reparations made by the local

authorities of cities, towns and villages, in view of the threatening malady, have contributed to materially improve the sanitary conditions of the country; although there is ample room still left for further improvements.

The whole, nevertheless, humbly submitted.

APPENDIX TO THE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

REGULATIONS

Adopted by the Central Board of Health, pursuant to the 5th Section of Chapter 38 of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, now in force.

WHEREAS by the thirty-eighth chapter of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, intituled: An Act respecting the Preservation of the Public Health, it is amongst other

things enacted that-

"The Central Board of Health, or any three or more members thereof, may from time to time issue such regulations as they think fit, for the prevention, as far as possible, or the mitigation of such epidemic, endemic or contagious diseases, and may revoke, renew or alter any such regulations, or substitute such new regulations as to them or any

three of them may appear expedient.

"The said Board may by such regulations provide for the frequent and effectual cleansing of streets, by the Surveyors or Overseers of highways and others intrusted with the care and management thereof, or by the owners or occupiers of houses and tenements adjoining thereto; and for the cleansing, purifying, ventilating and disinfecting of houses, dwellings, churches, buildings and places of assembly, by the owners or occupiers, and persons having the care and ordering thereof; for the removal of nuisances, for the speedy interment of the dead; and, generally, for preventing or mitigating such epidemic, endemic or contagious diseases, in such manner as to the said Central Board seems ex-

"The said Central Board may by any such regulations authorize and require the Local Boards of Health to superintend and see to the execution of any such regulations, and (where it appears that there may be default or delay in the execution thereof, by want or neglect of such Surveyors or others intrusted as aforesaid, or by reason of poverty of occupiers, or otherwise,) to execute or aid in executing the same within their respective limits, and to provide for the dispensing of medicines, and for affording to persons afflicted by or threatened with such epidemic, endemic or contagious diseases, such medical aid as may be required, and to do and provide all such acts, matters and things as are necessary for superintending or aiding in the execution of such regulations, or for executing the

same, as the case may require.

"The said Central Board of Health may also by any such regulations, authorize and require the Local Boards of Health, in all cases in which diseases of a malignant and fatal character are discovered to exist in any dwelling-house or out-house, temporarily occupied as a dwelling, situated in an unhealthy or crowded locality, or being in a neglected or filthy state, in the exercise of a sound discretion, and at the proper costs and charges of such Local Boards of Health, to compel the inhabitants of any such dwelling-house or outhouse to remove therefrom, and to place them in sheds or tents, or other good shelter, in some more salubrious situation, until measures can be taken, by and under the directions of the Local Boards of Health, for the immediate cleansing, ventilation, purification and disinfection of the said dwelling-house or out-house;
"And the directions and regulations to be issued as aforesaid shall extend to all

parts or places in which this Act shall, for the time being, be in force under any such Proclamation as aforesaid, unless such regulations be expressly confined to some of such parts or places, and then to such parts or places as in such directions and regulations shall be specified, and (subject to the power of revocation and alteration herein contained) shall continue in force so long as this Act shall be in force under such Proclamation, in the

parts or places to which such regulations extend."

In pursuance of, and under the authority so given and conferred by the said Act, the Central Board of Health do hereby enact the several regulations hereinafter mentioned, and all the Local Boards of Health, and Health and other Public Officers mentioned in the said Act, are hereby authorized and required to exercise, within the limits of the Province and of their respective jurisdiction, the powers mentioned in the Act above cited

and in the said regulations, which are as follows, that is to say :-

1. All streets and highways must be cleared, as speedily as possible, of all vegetable and animal substances in a state of decomposition; such filthy materials are to be carted away from the interior and immediate neighbourhood of cities, towns and villages, and, if not actually employed for manuring farm land, to be buried in pits which are not, when closed, to be interfered with until the Cholera season has passed over.

2. The contents of cesspools, composts, offals, heaps of manure, carcases of animals, soakage and other filthy substances, must be removed from yards and other places situated within the limits or in the immediate vicinity of cities, towns and villages, before the hot season sets in, to be dealt with in the same manner as prescribed by the preceding regu-

lations.

3. Pools of stagnant water, open sewers and open drains containing offensive matter must be disinfected and either emptied or covered, and, whenever practicable, underdrains are to be supplied to all stables, cow-houses and privies that are at present deficient

in such particulars.

4. The gathering and slaughtering of cattle, the collection and storing of debris of animals, such as skins, intestines, hoofs, bones, &c., piggeries, manufactories of acids, lime, vegetable and animal charcoal, artificial manure, coal oil refineries, soap and candle factories, tanneries, and all such equally obnoxious establishments, must be removed from the interior of cities and towns.

5. Litter and manure of horses and other animals allowed to be kept within the limits of cities and towns must be frequently removed to a safe distance from such centres

of population.

6. All drains in and about cities and towns are to be properly directed and trapped, and every possible means must be adopted to provide a sufficient water supply of pure quality, uncontaminated by the discharge from such drains.

7. The sale of rags and old clothes and vestments in market-places, crowded streets

and the hawking of them from house to house must be prohibited.

8. Privies connected with dwellings must be frequently inspected and put through the process of disinfection and of interment whenever necessary. In order to carry out the desired object of disinfecting, chloride of lime, sulphates of iron and copper, quick lime, dry earth and charcoal may be made use of.

9. The privies and urinals of steamers, railway cars, railway stations and public places, must be inspected and ordered to be properly kept within the jurisdiction of the Local

Boards of Health by the Health Officers.

- 10. The railway cars used in the conveyance of live stock must be removed beyond the limits of cities and towns in order to be cleaned and thoroughly ventilated.
- 11. All articles of common food and drink must be the subject of special attention, so as to prevent adulteration; and the sale of decayed meat and vegetables, unripe fruit, fish and game out of season, and all such like must be prohibited.

12. Should Cholera be in existence, the holding of fairs, races, theatres and circuses are to be prohibited; and the early closing of taverns, public halls, and such like

to be enforced.

13. In cities and towns having a population over 6,000 inhabitants, one or more cholera hospitals must be provided in somewhat isolated positions where the poor are to

be removed for care and treatment in cases of necessity.

14. In every city or town having a population over 6,000 inhabitants, one or more dispensaries, quite separate from the cholora hospitals, are to be established and furnished with such medicines, disinfectants and even articles of clothing and bedding as may be required for the ready use specially of the poor.

15. Refuges to receive convalescent poor, whenever it is thought necessary to guard against the danger of some focus or hot-bed of pestilence being formed in overcrowded lodgings visited by the disease, must be provided by the local authorities of cities and

towns.

16. In every city or town of some importance one or more Health Medical Officers must be appointed, whose duty it shall be to visit and examine carefully into the sanitary

condition of such city or town, to enforce the carrying out of the dispositions of the law and of the present Regulations, and to report the same to the Local Board of Health.

17. The dwellings recently or actually visited by Cholera must be inspected, in order to enforce hygienic precautions concerning the removal of the dejections of the sick and the disinfecting and cleansing of sick clothing and bedding.

18. Overcrowding of hotels, public lodgings, steamers and railways, is to be prevented

as much as possible.

19. Everything which may become a subject of sufficient importance or of more than ordinary difficulty is to be reported to the Central Board of Health, in order that they may be dealt with in further Regulations which may become necessary to issue, from time to time, as by law provided.

The above Regulations were submitted to and confirmed by His Excellency the Governor General in Council, on 3rd day of May, 1866, under the provisions of the 8th section of the 38th chapter of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada.

"The Central Board of Health, without wishing to excite unnecessary alarm, at the

same time fully impressed as to the increase and fatality of Cholera in various parts of the United States, would strongly recommend the Local Boards of Health to exercise every precaution in carrying out those sanitary measures requisite in order to stay the spread of disease."

As but few of the Local Boards have reported themselves to the Central Board, this Resolution is forwarded to the Mayors of the various Municipalities, so that Local Boards may be organized according to law, and placed in communication with this Board.

OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY ON THE REGISTRATION OF

BIRTHS, MARRIAGES AND DEATHS

IN UPPER CANADA, 1865.

The Select Committee, appointed to consider and report as to the means to be adopted for securing a better system of Registering Births, Marriages and Deaths in Upper Canada, beg leave to report that they have considered the subject referred to them, and taken evidence with regard thereto; and further, that they have come to the conclusion that the system now in force in Upper Canada for the purpose of obtaining accurate Statistical Returns of Births, Marriages and Deaths, occurring in that section of the Province, is wholly inadequate to that end.

The Act of the Consolidated Statutes of Upper Canada, Cap. 72, provides that every clergyman or minister who celebrates a marriage in Upper Canada shall enter in a book a true record of the marriage, and shall, on or before the 1st of February in each year, return a complete list of all marriages solemnized by him, during the year ending on the 31st day of December next preceding, to the Registrar of the County in which the marriages have taken place, and shall, at the time of making the Return, pay or transmit to the Registrar

one dollar, as his fee thereon.

The Act of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, Cap. 331, respecting the Census, provides that each clergyman, teacher, or minister duly authorized by law to baptize, marry, or perform the funeral service in Upper Canada, shall keep a Registry shewing the persons whom he has baptized or married, or who have died within his care, and belonging to the congregation; and the said Registry is to be forwarded by him to the Clerk of the Peace of the County, or Clerk of the City or Town Council of the city or town where he resides or officiates at the time, or is, within five days after the 1st day of January in each year.

Where there is no minister, then the head of the family is required to notify any such births, marriages or deaths, which have taken place in his family, to thy Clerk of the Township in which he resides, or, if there be none, to the nearest Township officer.

The Clerk of the Township is required to forward the Returns to the Clerk of the Peace, and the Clerk of the Peace is required to forward them to the Board of Census and Statistics, on or before the first day of January in each year. Neglect on the part of any person to comply with any of these requirements is declared to be a misdemeanor, and to be punishable accordingly.

The Committee have ascertained that the Returns required by the first-mentioned Act have been transmitted by the clergymen generally with considerable regularity, especially during recent years, but that the Returns required to be supplied under the Census Act are so irregularly given as to be utterly worthless—the Act, in fact, in this respect, being a dead letter.

The Committee deem it unnecessary to dwell on the importance of obtaining accurate

Returns of the Births, Marriages and Deaths occurring yearly in the Province, and content themselves with suggesting that the systems now in force, with that object in view, should be changed, and a system based on the English Acts, and adapted to the Municipal system of Upper Canada, should be introduced in place thereof.

The Committee think that the Returns of Marriages should still be required from clergymen and ministers, but that they should be relieved from the payment to the Registrars of the fee of one dollar upon each Return, and a small fee assigned to them as

a compensation for the labor of preparing these Returns.

The Committee recommend that, as has been suggested by the witnesses, the duty of preparing Returns of the Births, Marriages and Deaths in each Township should be assigned to the Township Clerks and Assessors in each Township, and that the Clerks should report to the Registrars of the County, who should transmit an abstract of these Returns to the Board of Census and Statistics.

The Committee are of opinion that a moderate remuneration should be given to these

officers for the discharge of the duties thus devolving on them respectively.

The Committee do not enter further into detail, but content themselves with suggesting the direction which, in their judgment, the modification of the existing laws should take, in order to secure accurate and reliable Statistics of Births, Marriages and Deaths in Upper

The Committee transmit the Evidence taken before the Committee along with this Report.

To J. P. Leprohon, Esq., Clerk of Committee.

Sir,-I have the honor to answer to the question put to me by order of the "Committee of the Legislative Assembly appointed to consider and report as to the means to be adopted for securing a better system of registering Births, Marriages and Deaths in Upper Canada," which question I resume thus:—
1st. Is the system now in force in Upper Canada efficient?

2nd. What improvement could be made to the system to secure accurate Returns?

In answer to the first query, I beg leave to say:—The system now in force in Upper Canada, as regards the registering of Births and Deaths, is totally inefficient, and at this moment it is impossible to ascertain, in any way approaching accuracy, the number of Births and Deaths which have occurred in any particular year; not even by the Census The number of deaths quoted by the different Reports are, in the aggregate,

when compared with the given population, totally absurd to the eye of Statistical criticism. The registration of marriages,—judging from a Statement, for the year 1862, communicated to the House of Assembly, -seems to be accurately put down; but, by the enquiries sometimes made to the different Departments, it is easily seen that either they have not always been so for the past, or that, if registered at the time, the registers must have been

lost or allowed to go astray.

By the law, as it is for Upper Canada, in the case of the registration of Births and Deaths, the information could have been arrived at if the law had not remained a deadletter. In the case of registration of Marriages, the law seems to be obeyed, and consequently the informations are given at first; in both cases the legal provisions for the reception and safe-keeping of the records are totally insufficient.

In answer to the second query, I beg to state:—The question of the adoption of a system of Registration and Statistics is one surrounded with all sorts of difficulties? It is so everywhere; it has been so for the better organized countries of Europe; it is more so for the American Continent, with populations diffused on large tracts of country, and subjected to fluctuant migrations from the outside in, from the inside out, and from place to to place within the limits of the same territory. So I hope the Committee will not wonder at the reserve I feel bound to keep myself in when dealing with such an important subject, after only one year of preliminary official labor in such a difficult undertaking. For a quarter of a century this question has been the subject of constant enquiries, attempted enactments, laws and amendments in England, and no sooner than in 1836 has a law been passed for the adoption of a definite system; still the following year (1837) it was found necessary to suspend its operation, and afterwards to adopt material amendments.

A system of Registration is composed of three different elements, viz: 1st, the sources from which the informations are to come; 2nd, the channel through which they are to be conveyed; 3rd, the receptacle in which they are to be received and kept for

actual and future purposes.

In assigning by law to those three elements their role, the religious, the political and

social conditions of the population to be dealt with must be taken into account.

It is, by so doing, that the system of Registration of Births, Marriages and Deaths amongst the French population of Lower Canada is so perfect, that, notwithstanding all other changes and perils of destruction, vital statistics of every family and mostly every individual buried or living in the country can be ascertained, from the beginning of the establishment of the country in the commencement of the seventeenth century to this very day.

The population of Upper Canada being nearer the population of the British Isles than any other, I think that we cannot do better than to adopt the system now followed with an increasing success in England and Wales, with such variations rendered necessary

by local circumstances and by the necessity of limiting the expenses.

The system is embodied in two of the Statutes of England, namely the 6th and 7th

William the fourth, chapter 86, and in the 1st Victoria, chapter 22.

The system of England and Wales has the advantage of not ignoring the religious organization of the different denominations and moreover of making use of it for the object intended

The main deviations from the English law would concern what I call the second and third elements of Statistics. For instance, instead of creating a special office of Registrar General, the actual Board of Registration and Statistics could, with its Secretary, perform the task imposed upon the Registrar General in England; again, the local registrars and superintendents could be selected by the Board of Registration and Statistics from the better qualified judicial, municipal or educational officers of each County or Registration District.

This letter is already long, and I feel that going too much in details without sufficient time to consider would be running the risk of getting into error, and of rendering less clear and less striking the general remarks I have just made. I need not say that to suggest on all its intricacy of details a good system of Registration, well adapted for the country, will require a great deal of study, consideration, and consequently of time. Having been appointed a year ago Secretary of the Board of Statisties, it has been my duty to enter deeply into the subject, but I am bound to say that some time again will elapse before I have given the matter all the thoughts and enquiries it needs, having besides many other things to do. The permanent success of a system of Registration depends, naturally enough, on the way it will be conceived and started to operate. The experience of the English registration system shows the importance of a good beginning when it was felt necessary to suspend the operation of a law which was the fruit of years' studies in order to amend it maturely before entering into its working.

Hoping that my answers to your questions will in the mean time meet with the approval of the Committee, whose investigations are a necessary step towards the final settlement of

a very important problem,

SIR,—In reply to your question as to the best method of obtaining correct Returns of Births, Marriages and Deaths in Upper Canada, I enclose an extract from a paper I read before the Literary and Historical Society here upon the Census. I am not aware that I can add anything to the system as there sketched out. It would, however, be advisable to examine the Registration Laws in the New England States, in most, if not all, of which an analogous plan is followed, under circumstances not very dissimilar to those existing in Upper Canada.

EXTRACT.

The system which I would recommend as most likely to produce a valuable body of Statistics would be the following: -It might still be desirable to require the clergy of the several dominations to make Returns of their Marriages, Baptisms and Burials, as at present; but the baptisms and burials after all only approximately represent the births and deaths, and experience has shewn that it is almost impossible to obtain, in this way, punctual and correct Returns; and in Upper Canada especially, as in other countries where there are a great variety of religious dominations, it would be hopeless to expect any accuracy from such a source. These Returns might act as a check upon the facts as otherwise obtained; but there can be no sytem of registration approaching to completeness other than a compulsory civil registration, as in England and most European countries. and in some of the States of the neighboring Union. Every person should be bound under a penalty to register with some local officer within a given time, every death or birth occurring in his family, and in order to remunerate the officer, and to give him an interest in the completeness of the registry, a small fee should be payable to him on each entry. I would take advantage as far as possible of our present municipal organization, and, in Upper Canada at least, the local officer might be the Township Clerk. As the Township Clerk is often changed and as there is generally no proper office in which the registers could be safely kept, I would require the 'Township Clerk to file the originals with the Registrar of the County at the end of every quarter. These registers, besides their use for Statistical purposes, would serve as an authentic record of births and deaths, which, together with the registration of marriages, which is already made in the Registrar's books, would be always open for reference in questions of succession to property. Both objects should be kept in view, and the form of the registers might perhaps be something like the following: -The Township Clerks might be supplied by the Registrar with sheets ruled in columns shewing, for births, date or birth, sex, name, father, or mothers' name, signature of person making the registry, date of registry; and for deaths, date of death, name, age, disease, signature of person making the registry, date of registry. Each sheet, when returned to the Registrar, should bear the certificate of the clerk. It should also be incumbent upon the assessor to have a column in his roll for the numbers in each family. This used always to be done in Upper Canada before the union, and gave very little trouble, and the numbers under fifteen are still given for school purposes. It might be desirable to distinguish males from females, and to have some general classification as to ages, as 5 5 to 15, 15 to 40, above 40, but it would not be wise to enter into too much detail. This portion of his roll should be made out separately, and should be handed over by the Clerk to the County Registrar.

I would throw upon the Registrar the duty of compiling from these materials the Returns to be made annually to Government in forms to be furnished to him, which should not enter into too much detail, and I would pay him out of Provincial funds for the work. The remuneration need not be very high, and the total cost would be an insignificant item; but I hold it as a most essential part of any such scheme that everybody should be paid for the work imposed upon them. It is the only way in which correct and punctual

Returns can be expected. However conscientiously even the best men may perform an act required of them as a duty, they will do it more readily and more certainly if, besides discharging the duty, they make \$20 or \$30 by the transaction.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 2nd instant, stating that you were instructed by the Committee (of the Legislative Assembly) appointed to consider and report as to the best means to be adopted for securing a better system of registering Births, Marriages and Deaths in Upper Canada, to request me to state whether the system now in force in Upper Canada for procuring Returns of Births, Marriages and Deaths works efficiently, and, if not, can I make any suggestions for improving the system and securing accurate Returns.

In reply, I beg respectfully to state that I am not aware of any system in force in Upper Canada for procuring Returns of Births and Deaths. I have not heard of or seen any arrangements for that purpose; and I believe it would be impossible to obtain such a Return. With all the appliances and powers granted for taking the Census, the Returns

of Births and Deaths are most unsatisfactory.

The Registers of Baptisms, Marriages and Burials kept by the respective churches are satisfactory so far as they go; but they do not, as regards Births and Deaths, include vast numbers who are pratically unconnected with any church. They do not include the numerous births of infants who die at a very early age, and are buried without register or record of any kind; the many persons who die in the outlying parts of the country and are buried on the farm which they occupied; nor the children of the denominations of Baptists; but are merely the registers of those who are members of each respective church or congregations, and they cannot be considered as the Provincial Registers of Births and Deaths.

The provisions of the Consolidated Statute 22 Vict., cap. 33, secs. 32, 33, 34, have been, I believe, entirely neglected; had they, however, been fully carried out, they would

have been open to the same objection.

The Registers of Marriages are, however, on a more satisfactory footing. By the Act 20 Vict., cap. 66, certain persons are authorized to solemnize marriages, and they are bound to deposit a duplicate copy of the register at the close of each year with the Registrar of the county.

The suggestions required by the Committee refer, therefore, more especially to Births

and Deaths.

In making arrangements for obtaining this information, the great difficulty is not so much in the appointment of the official staff for receiving the information as in devising some plan that shall oblige parties to convey the information to the appointed authorities. These difficulties have been found very great in Great Britain, and it is only after an opposition and experience of 25 years that the system is getting into good working order.

Following to some extent the enactments of 22 Vict., cap. 33, Con. Stat. U. C., I would respectfully suggest that the Clerk of each township should be the Registrar for

that township.

That the Township Registrar should, at the close of each year, deposit his register

with the Registrar of the county.

That, within a given time, the Registrar of the county should send a certified copy of

all the registers to the Board of Registration and Statistics.

That fees for entering, fyling, and copying be allowed to the Township Registrar, and the County Registrar, payable by the county, and the amount so paid certified to the Board of Registration and Statistics at the close of each year.

That it be compulsory upon the nearest relative, resident in the house, or present at

the time of a birth, to give information to the Registrar within a given time.

That every medical practitioner and midwife be required to send, on a printed form, information of the birth of a child.

That the Registrars be required to use proper diligence in obtaining such particulars, with full power to demand the same, if requisite.

With regard to deaths-similar arrangements as to sending information to the

Registrar.

Also, that every burial-ground be registered with the Clerk of the township, and no

burial permitted without a certificate of registration of death.

In conclusion, I would suggest a plan as similar to that adopted in Great Britain as circumstances would permit; and that all printed forms be supplied by the Board of Registration and Statistics to secure uniformity.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR OF AGENCIES.

Office of the Inspector of Agencies, Ottawa, March 1, 1867.

Honorable J. C. CHAPAIS,

Commissioner of Public Works, &c., &c.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit to you a statement of the Colonization Works,

executed in Lower Canada during the year 1866.

However small the sums appropriated for the opening or completion of the several roads, they have not failed to produce results which, in many cases, exceeded the expectations of the friends of colonization. Settlers are always desirous of acquiring lots contiguous to the new arteries of colonization, and the old parishes are but too glad to send forth their redundant population into the townships, whenever the new roads open a way into the forest.

The aggregate length of roads opened in 1866, under the direction of this office, is 163 miles 22 arpents. Of this amount, 44 miles 25 arpents, together with 84 miles 25½ arpents previously opened, have been completed, making a total of 129 miles 22½ arpents.

Bridges have been built, the roadway of which measures in the aggregate 8,607 feet. A distance of 14 miles 27½ arpents has been crosswayed or laid with brush, besides which

works, 104 miles 25 arpents of existing roads have been repaired or improved.

I feel sincere pleasure in stating that these several works have been accomplished, by the different superintendents, with economy and intelligence, aided by a thorough knowledge of the wants of the localities, and a wish to subserve the work of colonization. No doubt their exertions have great effect in securing the settlement of the new lines of road, and promoting the success of agriculture; and, as might be expected, their success

as been in many places most satisfactory.

One circumstance there is, however, which, in many cases, proves an obstacle to the progress of settling and clearing new lands, deterring many from attempting this work in the townships. In the old parishes the subdivision of property is a habit so prevalent, and so deeply rooted, that children inheriting from their parents the most trifling bit of the paternal estate, persist in their attachment to their home in their native parish, either ignorant of the advantages they would find in the township, or afraid of encountering, in the toil of clearing, difficulties too great to be surmounted. Accordingly, they settle on their paltry portion of their family property, and remain till a time comes when, the whole being overburthened with mortgages, they are driven to give it up to their creditors; then, and then only, they bend their steps towards the forest, oppressed by debt and totally destitute of the means of carrying on the first labor of clearing. Then they lose heart, and their next inevitable step is to emigrate to the United States, the natural consequence of their blindness and obstinacy. Had they entered the newly opened lands with some small capital, they might, in a few years, have become the owners of a prosperous farm,

and have escaped the unfortunate fever of emigration, which has made them exiles from their native land. The farmer ought not to delay his exodus from the old settlements until he has spent his last dollar, in which case he is almost sure to fail, and by his example to deter many of his fellow-countrymen from making the attempt—as the latter, not aware of the true cause of his failure, naturally attribute it to the poorness of the soil, or to difficulties with which he may be unable to cope.

Free grants of land can alone prevent these misfortunes, and turn our fellow-countrymen aside from the road to self-banishment. Many localities have been saved by this system of free grants, and are indebted to it for their rapid progress. One example of which is that of Wotton, first settled in 1849, by Mr. Arcand, which had by 1854, that is, in

five years, grown to two very populous parishes.

The system, when actively set at work, in certain sections, by the Government opening roads in different parts of the country, is one of the most certain means of checking the emigration of Canadians, and cannot fail to favor the progress of agriculture.

In former reports, I have had the honor to point out the importance of encouraging the opening of main lines of communication, and carrying out the scheme that led to the

opening of the Taché Road.

In Gaspesia they feel the want of such encouragement to colonization. There a line crossing the 4th or 5th range of the several townships is particularly required. Such a road would favor the settlement of a double range of parishes along the northern shore of the Bay of Chalcurs, as is the case along the St. Lawrence. The lands are magnificent, and the work of bringing them under the plough would attach to the soil a large body of young men, now addicted exclusively to the fisheries.

One impediment to colonization in these parts appears to be the monopoly enjoyed by the Gaspé Mining Company, who hold nearly the whole interior of Gaspesia. Settlers either absolutely refuse to buy from them, or hesitate to do so. This is a matter of regret. Government, in its anxiety to abate an evil, will no doubt devise means of remedying this,

if such can be found.

In certain sections, as the eastern part of the Township of New Richmond, and the western side of Hamilton, the value of real estate has considerably increased, as well as population; and it is remarked that the rising generation are better skilled in agriculture than their fathers. These lands are rapidly preparing for settlers; roads penetrate the forest in various directions; bridges, some of them of considerable length, are constructed; comfortable dwellings are being built, as if by enchantment, and school-houses are being erected. All these things speak of progress. The population is French-Acadian.

The opening of a road from Quebec to Lake St. John is of great importance both to

settlers and for the purposes of trade, and the friends of colonization will rejoice to hear

that as a winter road it is accomplished.

The inhabitants of Hebertville have opened a winter road from that place to Belle Rivière Lake, about 26 miles from Métabetchouan, where it falls in with the main road to Lake St. John, diminishing the distance by seven leagues for themselves, as well as for the settlers of the Lower Saguenay.

Another line of communication which it is important to have completed is that from Quebec to the St. Maurice, in length not more than 20 leagues, passing through St. Ray-

mond and Colbert.

This part of the country is watered by a considerable number of lakes and streams. The official returns inform us that the lands promise well for agriculture, and the climate is rather milder than that of Quebec. There is room for thousands of settlers. The sum of \$300, granted last year for the purpose, will be applied to the exploration of the district next summer.

It is desirable that the Taché Road should be finished as soon as the funds granted for the purpose render it practicable. The lands intersected by it are remarkable for their fertility. The country about Rimouski presents an immense field for the labors of the agriculturist. On the banks of the River Rimouski particularly there are magnificent groves of elm. The fertility of the soil seems inexhaustible. The size of the timber presents a store of natural wealth, which the settlers may turn to profitable account as an rticle of trade and industry. Accordingly the anxiety to take these lands is very great

In the Township of Langevin colonisation has made great progress, clearings having been made to the extent of 1200 arpents in four years and a half. In Ware 180 arpents have been cleared, and 1600 at Lake Etchemin. In Langevin the population has increased to 300 souls, and at Lake Etchemin to 430. Notwithstanding this remarkable progress, the state of the road is not such as it ought to be, and if it were improved, no doubt, twice or three times the extent of land would be taken up, as its excellence is well known.

The completion of the Etchemin Road, in Cranbourne, is a subject of great anxiety among the settlers, as it would bring about the settlement of the splendid lands in the southern part of the township, passing directly through the auriferous region of St. Francis and Cranbourne. There are considerable works in progress at the River Gilbert for crushing the quartz, and it is important that the lands in that quarter should be in the

hands of native born citizens, rather than in those of foreigners.

The Townships of Mailloux, Roux, Bellechasse, and Daaquam, stretching across the Mailloux Road, are ready for settlement throughout their whole extent, and the soil is admirable for agriculture. The lots on the grand line adjacent to the Mailloux Road have been nearly all taken, and, at certain places, settlers are resident as far back as the third and fourth ranges on each side. In Roux a church is in course of erection.

It is of extreme importance that the works on the Masson Road should be pushed forward, as it is indispensable to persons crossing the Laurentine chain of Mountains, and those seeking access to the immense and magnificent territory so much celebrated as the field of colonization for the over flowing population of the north shore in the District

of Montreal.

The Valley of Mantawa comprises an area of more than 5,000,000 acres of excellent and well-timbered land. The Rev. J. L. Brassard, whose seal for the colonization of this territory knows no abatement, does not hesitate to declare that there is room for 40,000 families. This large estimate shews what might be expected by the Government from the

settlement of this part of the country.

I cannot recommend too strenuously the appropriation of considerable sums for the opening of colonization roads since so much remains to be done, and as Lower Canada is destined to form a part of a large empire, and to become the pivot of a national representation, under a Federal régime, the interest and the honor of our section is concerned in the increase of our population, and the clearing of our forest lands. Favoring colonization, the Government will receive a speedy and a rich return for the sums which are expended

in the opening of roads.

I cannot conclude, sir, without noticing a fact which has come to my knowledge, and which affords a proof of the strong national feeling prevalent among Lower Canadians. Mr. Joseph Casavant, of St. Hyacinthe, a person who is not rich, but of competent fortune, with a degree of liberality not exactly proportioned to his pecuniary resources, presented, last autumn, the sum of \$1,200 for the promotion of colonization in the Township of Compton. This sum he deposited in the hands of the Curé of the place, to be loaned, without interest, to young settlers of sober and industrious habits, to assist them in settling and accomplishing the clearing of their lands. In a few years, the sums in which the advances are made will be repaid to the Curé then incumbent, who will loan them again to other settlers, and so on forever.

KINOGAMI ROAD.

FIRST SECTION.

Mr. Gaudin has this year made three miles and 75 chains of road fit for the passage of summer vehicles, but of that extent one mile and 49 chains require to be turnpiked.

Some small bridges, having an aggregate length of 101 feet of roadway, have been

built.

The building of the bridge over the River Kaskouia was given out by contract, on the 10th February, 1866, to A. Dufour, for the sum of \$600. It was completed last spring, and was received after being inspected. It is 600 feet in length.

The construction of this bridge will be highly advantageous to the settlers, who were unable to cross the river in the spring on their way to Lake St. John, in consequence of

the height of the water in Lake Kinogami.

Mr. Langlois has also had work done in this section along an extent of 12 miles and 24 chains. This portion has been slashed throughout its entire length and levelled to the width of a wheeled vehicle, but no part of it is completed. He has built 35 bridges, measuring 234 feet in length, at a cost of \$117, and has also laid 41 arpents of brushwork

and 8 or 9 arpents of crossway.

"The soil," says Mr. Gaudin, "through which this section of the road passes is generally very stony; where there are no stones, it is of excellent quality. Notwithstanding this disadvantage, along each side of the road from Portage des Roches to the Kaskouia River, a distance of about 12 miles, some tolerably extensive clearings are to be seen, which shew that a proportionate number of settlers will establish themselves there. Several already reside on the spot, and have got in good crops. Now that the road is passable for summer vehicles, I have no hesitation in saying that, in two or three years, houses will spring up along its whole extent. It will also be of great use to the settlers who have established themselves beyond Lake Kinogami. Since it has been opened more than twenty vehicles a day pass over it with persons on their way to transact business at Chicoutimi and even at Bay St. Paul."

A chapel was built, during the year, at Anse au Foin. There are thoughts of

constructing one at the Kaskouia River.

It is estimated that a sum of \$1,000 will be required to complete this section of the road.

SECOND SECTION.

This section of the Kinogami Road, which extends from the settlements at Hébertville, in Labarre, to Metabetchouan, and is 20 miles and 68 chains in length, is now completed.

The sum granted was applied to the completion of one mile and 20 chains, merely slashed in the preceding year, and to the building of a scow on the Metabetchouan River.

which cost \$145.

The soil through which the road passes is of good quality, and adapted for agriculture. The good land appears to extend to a considerable distance on each side of the road.

A church has been built at Couchepéganiche. 16

THIRD SECTION.

In this section, which is $10\frac{1}{2}$ miles in length, and which was opened in previous years as a good winter road, there was completed this year, as a summer road, an extent of 5 miles and 18 arpents, and $4\frac{1}{2}$ arpents only require to be turnpiked. The cost of the completed road has been \$275 a mile. exclusive of bridges.

completed road has been \$275 a mile, exclusive of bridges.

This year 29 bridges have been built, measuring about 1200 feet in length; these have cost \$300. Besides these, two wharfs, 270 feet in length, have been constructed at

a cost of \$50. Seven and a half arpents of brushwork have also been laid.

The portion completed is situated in the most difficult part of the section. In order to make the road passable throughout its whole extent, Mr. Drapeau has improved the part which still remains to be completed, so that loads of eight or nine hundred weigh can be conveyed over it.

The soil is sandy on the high land, and the bottoms consist of clay, over which lies a bed of black soil from 15 to 18 inches in depth; the whole is well adapted to agriculture.

The woods are black and white birch, spruce, fir and elm.

There are water powers on the Metabetchouan and Ouiatchouan rivers. There is

also a very fine limestone quarry upon the third mile of this section of the road.

Mr. Drapeau writes to me that the progress of colonization in the Townships of Roberval, Metabetchouan, Labarre, Mésé, Signaï, and Caron, has been very considerable, and that the population has more than doubled in the last five years.

An extent of 450 arpents has been cleared this year.

To complete this section of the road, a further sum of \$1,200 will be required.

ALMA ROAD.

Superintendent:-N. Rossignol.

The Alma Road begins at Turgeon street, in the village of Hébertville, and is to terminate at the Saguenay River, at some point not yet fixed upon, to establish communication between the mainland and the Island of Alma.

With the sum granted, the road has been opened as a winter road to an extent of

eight miles and eight arpents.

The stumps and roots have been removed from three miles of road, and that portion merely requires to be turnpiked in order to complete it as a summer road. Along the remainder of the road the stumps only have been removed. Its average width is from 13 to 15 feet.

Beyond the part which has been opened there is a lumbering road, which runs along the line of the road, and may be used as a winter road as far as the River Saguenay. It was in view of this circumstance that the Superintendent considered it expedient merely to open the road, to the end that it might be of greater use, when opened as a summer road.

The part which has been opened crosses six water-courses, which entail the building of bridges from 25 to 30 feet in length. Beyond that portion the largest water-course is not more than 25 feet wide.

The length of the Alma Road will be about twelve miles.

With the exception of the swamp lying in the low land fronting the River Des Aulnes, Mr. Rossignol informs me that the road crosses very fine land, and gives access to the fine concessions in the interior of the Township of Signaï, at the same time opening up the fertile land of the Island of Alma, which contains about one hundred lots.

"Extensive clearings," says Mr. Rossignol, "have been made in various places, and

particularly on the 7th and 8th ranges of Signai.

"A large number of settlers propose to go to work actively next spring on the lots situated along the line of road, and in the interior of Signaï, as well as on the land situated on the Saguenay River. About sixty lots, in the 7th and 8th ranges of Signaï, have been taken; 30 upon the outlet, and all the lots on the line of the opened road. On the Island of Alma, I think, all are taken.

"There are several water powers, both on the River Bedard and upon the outlet.

The largest is that which supplies water to the slide built by the Government.

"Upon the prompt completion of this road depends the establishment of five or six hundred families.

"I consider it right to state that there are but few colonization roads upon which the money destined to be so employed can be applied with greater advantage, and with more immediately profitable results, than the Alma Road."

Mr. Rossignol says that the complete opening of the road will entail the expenditure

of about \$5,000.

SYDENHAM ROAD.

Superintendent:-Jos. FORTIN.

The grant of this year has sufficed to complete the road throughout its whole extent. The ditches have been boxed in on both sides of the road along an extent of five arpents, and then covered over with clay.

In another place where some damage had been done by fire, six arpents of road have

also been covered with a layer of clay six inches in thickness.

Three discharge drains, having a total length of 21 arpents, and the ditches along each side of 1½ mile of road, have been cleared out. Besides this, two bridges, 10 feet in length, have been renewed.

This road, which is two miles long, is now completed, and presents a level and turn-

piked surface, so that summer vehicles pass over it with facility.

"All who have had occasion," says Mr. Fortin, "to cross from Grand Bay to Chicoutimi, have been in a position to testify to the importance of the Sydenham Road, which connects our fine port of Ha! Ha! Bay with the county town.

"If now this road was connected by a branch with that leading from Bagotville to Grand Brulé, in a few years the great savanne crossed by the present road would be completely drained, and would at once afford to our agriculturists an easy field of labor.

"To attain this end, the first thing to be done would be to continue the road to the

south-east.

"I take the liberty of making this suggestion, because I consider that in view of the prompt occupation of this great extent of land, and the revenue which would result from the sale of lots, the opening of this road is deserving of the attention of the Government.

"A large number of families from the parishes along the north shore have, again this year, penetrated the Saguenay district. Most of them have bent their steps towards Lake St. John."

ANSE ST. JEAN ROAD.

Superintendent:-L. E. OTIS.

Last year the settlers having advanced two miles beyond the opened road, that portion was only imperfectly slashed, so as to allow them egress with their crops; hence the work done in 1865 upon those two miles mentioned as a summer road. But the work, though well done, could not be useful unless subsequently again worked over, in order that the road might be durably completed.

The \$300 granted this year have been applied to the completion of these two miles of road, so that that portion is now finished as far as the confines of the township, comprising a distance of five miles.

The remainder, opened as a winter road, crosses the adjacent Township of Périgny, throughout its whole extent. That township was surveyed in 1866. The land is generally level and of good quality, and it will be rapidly occupied by settlers. It is, therefore, highly important that that part of the road should be completed as soon as possible as far as the Marais Road, where it terminates.

COUNTY OF CHARLEVOIX.

ROAD FROM ST. URBAIN TO GRAND BAY.

Of this road 1½ mile has been completed this year. This part includes the great hills of Ha! Ha! Lake, which may now be surmounted with heavy loads. Seven miles of road have also been opened in such manner as to allow of the passage of wheeled vehicles.

Although much remains to be done before the road is completed, still I have the satisfaction of being able to inform you that it may be travelled in wheeled vehicles

throughout its whole extent from St. Urbain to Grand Bay.

A scow, of red tamarack, has been built upon the Malbay river; it is very strongly put together and works very well. It is moved by means of a cable of zinc wire stretched from shore to shore, and firmly attached to strong posts, protected from the action of the high water by abutments filled with stone. The scow is 30 feet long, and 20 feet across the deck; several vehicles can cross at once conveniently.

To protect it from the ice, Mr. Gauthier has procured powerful tackle, and has constructed a crab, by means of which the guardian, who resides at the camp, will be able to raise the scow upon the ice, and thus place it out of the way of accident, it being impossible to draw it up on the shore in consequence of the steepness of the banks.

The building of the scow, including the fittings and the abutments, cost \$200.

Mr. Gauthier also paid \$30 to Mr. Louis Fournier for his claim to the camp on the Malbay River.

An extent of 14 arpents has been crosswayed or laid with brush.

Considerable water-powers are found along the road, and iron ore is abundant.

Mr. Gauthier says in his report—"It is hardly necessary for me to say what I might with regard to the advantages afforded by this road, the necessity of the opening of this great artery of communication being so universally acknowledged. I am happy to be able to state that the work done this year has been productive of immense benefit to the numerous travellers who frequent the road, and it is extraordinary to see what a large number of vehicles and of cattle of all kinds have passed along this route since it has been simply opened, and the crossing of the Malbay River has been rendered more easy.

"It is impossible for me to make an exact estimate of the amount which will be necessary to complete the road. With the exception of three or four leagues which were completed in former years, the whole of the remainder is deteriorated to such an extent that it is difficult to pass along it with wheeled vehicles, and I am convinced that the whole of the portion requiring repairs will become impassable before long unless sufficient repairs are done to complete the road at present opened. I have, however, reason to believe that some

thousands of dollars judiciously expended, would suffice to complete it."

A balance of \$17, from former years, remained in the hands of Mr. André Bouchard, of Grand Bay; with that small sum Mr. Bouchard has repaired several dangerous places in the last four miles of the road. He has covered nine little bridges with cedar, and improved two hills where slides had occurred. He has also brought to the spot one half of the timber necessary for the rebuilding of a bridge 20 feet in length, which had been carried away by the stream. Several other bridges also stand in need of repairs.

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COUNTY OF MONTMORENCY.

This road, which begins at St. Ferréol, is to terminate at the road from St. Urbain to Grand Bay, at a place called "Passe des Monts." Its length will be 27 miles.

This year an extent of three miles has been opened; this has not been completed with the exception of a hill, 42 arpents in length. The whole of the part opened, however, from the commencement to St. Joseph, a distance of 18 miles, may be travelled in wheeled vehicles. There are still 9 miles to be opened, three of which cross cleared land.

An extent of 3 arpents has been crosswayed. The soil along the road is sandy, but

tolerably fertile. The wood is mixed.

Mr. Pierre Cauchon, who overlooked the works on the road, writes me that a double range may be easily formed along the road. He says that since the bridge over the River St. Anne was built at the commencement of the road, the seminary of Quebec has caused a by-road to be opened connecting the Cauchon road with the Caps road, which will greatly facilitate communication between the three parishes of St. Joachim, St. Tite and St. Ferréol.

Ten lots of land have been taken this year along the road, and a certain extent has been cleared.

This hill, which is situated in the parish of St. Joachim, and is 1200 feet in length, has been improved throughout its whole extent. It lies over a limestone quarry, so that much blasting had to be done. Four stone bridges had to be built.

In order to remove the obstacles which obstructed the Quarry Road, it has also been

necessary to blast some large stones along two miles of the line of road.

COUNTY OF QUEBEC.

LAKE ST. JOHN ROAD.

I have the pleasure of being in a position to inform you that this road, which extends from Stoneham to Metabetchouan, and is from 130 to 135 miles long, is now open as a winter road throughout its whole extent.

An extent of 30 miles, midway between Lake Jacques Cartier and Lake St. John remained to be opened; the whole of this has been opened this year, under the superinten-

dence of Mr. Jean Gagnon.

In view of the remoteness of the scene of labor, the incessant rain of this year, and, later in the season, the cold and snow, those engaged in the work had to exercise great perseverance in order to open the 30 miles in question, which cost only \$20 a mile.

Besides the completion of the winter road, Mr. Tremblay caused an extent of 45 arpents, outwards from Stoneham, to be made into a good summer road, under the superintendence of Mr. Moise Vachon. Along this portion five bridges were built, 52 feet in length, at a cost of \$100. Crossway, 900 feet long, was also laid with timber, from 7 to 9 inches in diameter, flatted on one side, to render travel more easy, and resting on similar pieces, as sleepers, with ditches along each side. The work is solidly and durably done, and cost \$300.

These 45 arpents of road were very difficult to make. The timber is very thick and very large, and the soil was literally covered with great stones, which had to be blasted. This portion has always been considered an insurmountable obstacle to the making of a road; fortunately the obstacle has been removed, and there is every reason to hope that the rest of the road will be much more easy to make.

"The crops," says Mr. Tremblay, "suffered slightly from the frost in the lower Saguenay, but not at Lake St. John; the settlers established there are contented and satisfied,

their harvest having been abundant."

COUNTY OF PORTNEUF.

VALCARTIER AND ST. RAYMOND ROAD.

Superintendent: - MICHAEL DERY.

The amount of the grant has been applied to the completion of rather more than two miles of road, opened last year; of this 17 arpents had to be bridged.

This road, which begins at lot No. 27, in the third range of Gosford, and ends at the

This road, which begins at lot No. 27, in the third range of Gosford, and ends at the road leading to Valcartier, a distance of ten miles 15 chains and 78 links, is now finished and fit for travel in wheeled vehicles throughout its whole extent.

The soil along the road is generally good, and much timber fit for manufacture is found along it. There are also several fine water-powers which will be is of great advantage to the settlers who are establishing themselves in Gosford.

Grain of all kinds is grown, and the crops this year were good.

The road is verbalised as far as lot No. 23, inclusive.

Mr. Déry writes to me as follows:—"In my report of last year I directed your attention to the vast extent of land situated to the north-west of the townships of Colbert and Roemont, which had always been considered unfit for cultivation; but as I have since visited a portion of that locality, I will venture to offer certain remarks, which, I consider, will be of advantage to my fellow-countrymen.

"To the north-west of the Townships of Colbert and Rocmont, extending as far as Boston River, a distance of 40 miles, there is a magnificent tract of land, the soil of which is eminently adapted for cultivation. Several parishes might be formed there, and would prove the finest and richest in the country, the climate appearing to be less severe than

along the river shore.

"The tract is watered by a large number of lakes and rivers, and is covered with fine timber.

"If a road was opened from Colbert, in a north-westerly direction across the Pierre and Batiscan Rivers, as far as Boston River, a few years would see that vast forest give place to cultivated fields, capable of yielding support to thousands of families.

"Persons worthy of credence, who have passed over the locality, assure me that from

Boston River to the valley of Lake St. John, a good road might be made with ease."

COLBERT ROAD.

Superintendent:—HENRI DERY.

This road, which commences 35 arpents below River St. Anne, is to end at the Batiscan River, a distance of 18 miles.

An extent of two miles and 20 arpents was opened last year in such a manner as to allow of its being travelled in wheeled vehicles. It is now opened 20 arpents beyond Black River.

It has cost about \$110 a mile.

Two bridges have been built, one of which is 41 feet in length, and the other 63. These cost \$94. Three and a quarter arpents of the road also have been crosswayed.

The soil in the rear is of superior quality, and is covered with all sorts of timber.

There are several good water-powers in the vicinity.

A considerable number of settlers are already resident in Colbert, and several lots

have been taken by persons who propose to settle upon them.

It is estimated that a sum of from \$1,000 to \$1,200 will be required to complete the road.

COUNTY OF CHAMPLAIN.

MADELEINE ROAD.

Superintendent :- D. G. LABARRE.

This road, which is situated in the Seigniory of La Madeleine, begins at the St. Felix range, follows the course of the River St. Maurice, and is to end at Les Piles. From the St. Felix range downwards, the road is opened as far as the River St. Lawrence. This portion of the road is completed; twenty-five arpents of road have been opened and completed this year, as have also been two hills 3 and 3½ arpents in extent on each side of the River Cachée. A temporary bridge, 42 feet in length, has been erected over that River.

There are water powers on the Cachée River, and iron ore is every where found in

large quantities.

Mr. LaBarre writes to me that the road crosses the finest tract of land in the Seigniory of Cap de la Madeleine. The soil is very rich and easy of cultivation. The soil is partly wheat growing land covered with mixed wood, and partly good yellow loam, bearing hardwood. The adjacent land is of the same description.

The excellence of the soil along this road, the quantity of merchantable timber upon it, and the abundance of iron ore, for which the settler can find a market at the foundries established near the road, offer great advantages to colonization. In a few years two fine parishes will be formed; these would have been already established if the road had been sooner opened.

Within the last five years several settlements have been formed in the vicinity of the

road, and the land is in part taken up.

GRANDES PILES ROAD.

Superintendent: -Ls. ARCAND.

In consequence of the rain of last season the works were carried on with much difficulty in the great swamp through which this road passes.

The ditches have been cleansed over an extent of 24 arpents of bog-land. Another water-course has been constructed for the drainage of a lowland three arpents in extent. And lastly, 8½ arpents of road have been crosswayed, laid with brush and covered with eight inches of earth, so as to afford a good passage to wheeled vehicles.

The most difficult part of the work has now been completed. There are still some small swamps to be passed before Lac à la Tortue is reached, but the work will be com-

paratively light.

ST. NARCISSE ROAD.

The work of the past season consists in the opening, as a winter road, of a distance of 40 arpents through standing forest of very thick and large growth, in which numerous old pine stumps have been left, which were very difficult to extract.

The length of road opened is now 31 miles. No lots have been taken up this year, but Mr. Trudel tells me that the division of the lots is anxiously awaited, and that had

the division taken place, clearings would have been begun next spring.

COTE ST. PAUL ROAD.

This road begins at the cordon of Cote St. Paul, and will extend to the Rivière des Envies, in the Parish of St. Tite, a distance of three miles and 27 arpents.

The amount granted has been expended in the completion of 33 arpents, which had been opened only last year, and in the opening and completion of three arpents more. Of these, 24 arpents have been crosswayed.

The lands through which the road passes, and in the vicinity, are of good quality, and are being rapidly cleared. This road will open a communication between St. Tite and St. Stanislas, and afford access to grist and saw mills.

\$800 will be required fully to complete this road.

ST. TITE ROAD.

With this amount Mr. Trudel has completed 35 arpents and 5 perches of road, and placed railings along 2½ arpents. He has also made 1½ arpent of crossway, four small bridges, and carried the road over four hills 8½ arpents long, and over very rocky land. On these works \$297.60 have been expended.

He has also expended \$25 in repairing damages caused in different places by the spring rains. A few dollars remaining in hand, Mr. Trudel sent five men on 3rd November to repair certain parts of the road made in former years, and to clear out the ditches, which were filled up. The weather, however, proved unfavorable, and he, therefore, postponed the work until next spring.

The sum of \$200 is required to complete this road, which extends from the Church

of St. Tite to the Grandes Piles, on the St. Maurice.

The road has been a good deal used this year by persons carrying provisions to the shanties on the St. Maurice, and the lakes behind St. Tite.

The grant of 1865 not having sufficed to complete this work, a further grant of \$100 was made for the purpose, and a contract for the work was passed, on 25th August last, between the Municipal Council of St. Stanislas and Messrs. Ephrem and Joseph Proteau.

This ice fender, erected opposite the first pier on the north-eastern side, at a distance of 40 feet, is to be 30 feet in length, 14 feet wide at the bottom, and 10 feet wide at the top, with sufficient incline, and similar in height to the other fenders to this bridge. It will be completely filled with stone.

The work was to be completed on the 25th December last.

COUNTY OF ST. MAURICE.

ROAD FROM HUNTERSTOWN TO ST. ETIENNE.

This road begins at Hunterstown, and is to extend to St. Etienne, a distance of about 12 miles. Eight miles are completed, and three miles opened as a good winter road.

One mile remains to be opened. The length completed this year is 49 arpents, and three miles have been opened.

The cost of the completed road has been about \$80 per mile.

A bridge, 74 feet long, has been built, and three arpents of crosswaying have been begun, but are not yet completed.

Four water-powers exist in this vicinity, which are all employed. There is also a

bed of limestone, and indications of copper are found.

Colonization is advancing, and the population has more than doubled during the last five years. All the lots are taken up by Canadian settlers, some of whom have returned from the United States. A hundred arpents have been cleared.

There are three chapels in course of erection in this neighborhood.

Mr. Gélinas thinks that \$2,000 will be required to finish this road. It is verbalized for a distance of 7½ miles.

COUNTY OF MASKINONGE.

Ten arpents of road remained, which had been only opened last year. This has been completed during the present year. Seventy-five arpents have also been opened to the full breadth, and six arpents to a width sufficient for the passage of winter vehicles.

The work has been pushed forward with a view of giving more ready access to the fine hardwood lands in the vicinity of Lake Bonneterre. Thirty arpents of road, previously

opened, have been improved.

These works have rendered necessary 1,100 feet of ditch-cutting, 600 feet of brushwork, and 650 feet of crossway. The crosswaying has cost \$57.60, and the brush-work \$48.40.

It has also been found necessary to excavate and remove rocks in various places.

A number of persons propose to take up lands in Peterborough, and to settle upon

them so soon as the road is completed to Lake Bonneterre.

"This road," says Mr. Maigret, "which is verbalized as far as Lake Bonneterre, where it is to be joined by the Rivière aux Ecorces Road, and is to continue in the same direction towards the interior of the township, will, without doubt, be the great opening to the colonization of the Mantawa, for all the County of Maskinongé, and the greater portion of the District of Three Rivers."

Mr. Maigret asks for a further sum of \$1,200 to continue the works on this road.

RIVER DU LOUP ROAD.

Superintendent: -F. X. A. RIVARD.

By the advice of persons well informed on the subject, Mr. Rivard has employed this year's grant, which was to have been expended on the continuation of the Rivière aux Ecorces Road, in resuming work upon the road situated on the north-east side of River du Loup, in the Parish of St. Paulin, the works on which had been suspended since 1862.

The reason given by Mr. Rivard, in support of his determination, is that a certain number of settlers, located beyond the end of the road, had asked for its extension, so as

to have an outlet afforded them.

This road, which begins at the ferry on the River du Loup, on the Bout du Monde concession, had been previously opened, and completed for a distance of six miles.

There still remained 12 miles to be opened to reach Pins Rouges, where a large extent of most excellent land is situated, timbered for the most part with hardwood, and very

suitable for settlement.

Mr. Rivard resumed the works at the place at which they had been suspended, and with the amount at his disposal, he has opened and completed a length of three miles and 11 arpents of road, with a breadth of 16 feet, which has only cost \$69.16 per mile, not including the bridges.

Seventeen bridges have been constructed, forming together 468 feet of bridging, and

which have cost \$160.

The soil along the whole length of the River du Loup is of good quality, covered for the most part with hardwood, and is said to be good as far as the Pins Rouges. A large number of lots were taken up, even before the opening of the road, and upwards of a hundred arpents have been cleared.

A church was erected last autumn on the banks of the River du Loup, on the west

side, near the outlet of Lake Sacacomy.

The road is verbalized.

COUNTIES OF BERTHIER AND JOLIETTE.

MANTAWA ROAD.

Superintendent:-T. L. BRASSARD.

This year the road has been opened for 11 miles, and 7 miles have been completed. Mr. Brassard has, moreover, improved the whole length of the road.

Of the whole length of the road, which is 39 miles long, beginning at Lac Noir, and extending to Mr. Brassard's mills, there are four miles which can only be used as a winter road. The rest, although in bad order, may be travelled by wheeled vehicles.

Two large bridges have been constructed, measuring together 114 feet in length, and several smaller ones, measuring 87 feet in all. The cost of the whole was \$191.78. Four

hundred feet of crossway have been completed at a cost of \$100.

"The Mantawa Road," writes Mr. Brassard, "traverses the Laurentine chain, the north-west watershed of which, from the 47th degree of latitude to the Ottawa River, is composed of excellent soil, well adapted for cultivation, and extends to the immense plateau bounded by the Laurentine chain, the 47th degree of latitude, the Gatineau River, and the District of Ottawa, and containing more than 5,000,000 acres of good land well timbered, having a beautiful climate, and on which forty thousand families might be established, if good roads existed.

"From the foregoing the conclusion arrived at is colonization, commerce, increase of

the population, &c., &c'.'

Mr. Brassard is of opinion that from six to seven thousand dollars will be required to complete this road.

COUNTY OF JOLIETTE.

RIVER ASSOMPTION ROAD.

Superintendent: -J. A. RENAUD.

The works upon this road were resumed this year at the place at which they had been suspended, on account of the bad weather, in the autumn of 1865.

Mr. Renaud, with the amount of the grant, and the balance remaining from last year,

has been enabled to open 75 arpents and five perches of road, of which 41 arpents and six

perches have been completed.

Five bridges have been built three 40 feet in length, one 36 feet, and one 30 feet. cost \$125. Six pieces of crossway on sleepers have also been laid, at a cost of \$66. The total length of these is two arpents and ten feet.

"The soil," Mr. Renaud writes, "is a yellow loam, with but few stones. The timber is mixed, consisting of pine, spruce, cedar, black birch, and beech.

"A parish has been formed since the opening of the road, and a saw and grist mill have been built; so much in respect of colonization. Trade comes in for potash, sawed lumber, and good harvests." The mills were built this year, on a magnificent water power.

Colonization has made great progress this year in Cathcart. Thirteen lots have been taken, and 300 arpents have been cleared. Among the new settlers are several who have returned from the United States. Finally, the increase of the population, since last year, has been 350 souls.

The site of the church of the new parish of St. Come was, this year, fixed by

ecclesiastical authority.

Lots, which no one would accept before the opening of the road, were latterly taken by settlers who now refuse \$200 for them, notwithstanding the little work which has been done upon them. Mr. Renaud mentions a settler who paid \$250 for a 200 acre lot, and who, at the expiration of a year, refused \$750 for it. The same settler this year sold a quarter of his property for \$400.

In order to complete the road to the rear of the 9th range of Cathcart, on lot No. 26, and so attain the centre of the Parish of St. Come, where the church will be completed next summer, a further sum of \$400 would be required. This would cover also the cost

of building two bridges, which would amount to \$50 each.

COUNTY OF MONTCALM.

ST. JULIENNE ROAD.

This road, which is opened throughout its entire extent, begins at the 10th range of Kilkenny, and ends at the grand line between the Townships of Kilkenny and Rawdon.

An extent of 16 or 18 arpents was completed this year. It may be travelled in wheeled vehicles, though in several places with difficulty. The cost of the work was \$83.90.

A bridge, 70 feet in length, has been built, at a cost of \$115.29, including a piece of crossway of round timber on the north side, 35 feet in length by three high, made to render the hill more easy.

The land along the road is tolerably good, but very stony. The timber is mixed. There is much cedar, in which a considerable trade is carried on. There are also water-

powers in the vicinity.

Colonization has made considerable progress of late years in the Townships of Kil-

kenny and Wexford, and this year a great extent of land has been cleared.

Mr. Lavoie thinks that a sum of \$400 will be required to complete the road throughout its whole extent.

It is verbalised.

Of this road one mile, in the 10th range of Kilkenny, and three-quarters of a mile in the 1st range of Wexford have been completed. The remainder, as far as the 4th range, is merely opened.

About five arpents of road have been laid with brush and terraced.

Four lots have been taken this year along the road, and a certain extent has been cleared.

Mr. Dufresne estimates that a grant of \$500 will be necessary to complete the road.

The part situated in Kilkenny is verbalised.

MASSON ROAD.

Superintendent: T. S. PROVOST.

This is a continuation of the Kilkenny and Wexford Road, and begins at the Hon. Edouard Masson's settlement on lot No. 24, in the 6th range of Wexford, crosses the Township of Doncaster, and is to end at the Mantawa River, at a place called Grande Prairie, near the outlet of Cypress Lake.

Mr. Provost, in the beginning of August, first traced the road from the 6th range of Wexford to the 6th range of Doncaster, a distance of 10 miles. He then, in the month

of September, continued the tracing to the rear of Mantawa.

Work was done on six miles of road, including one mile and 17 arpents on the hither side of the point of commencement, so as to communicate with the Kilkenny Road leading to the town of Terrebonne, thus shortening a journey of eighteen leagues, which had previously to be travelled, by eight leagues.

Although this road is not entirely completed, it may be travelled in wheeled vehicles. On the east branch of the North River a bridge has been built 88 feet long, 18 feet wide, with railings, and resting on benches 15 feet high. Fifteen arpents of crossway

have also been laid at a height of one foot above the level of the land.

All the lots along the road, as far as the 6th range of Doncaster, are taken, and nearly all are occupied. From this part, along the traced line of road, the soil everywhere, with some rare exceptions, is most advantageous to colonization.

The land is generally timbered with hardwood, and the adjacent lands are of superior quality, and acknowledged to be so by a large number of persons, who are awaiting the

making of this road to proceed to settle upon them.

Good water-powers are found at distances along the whole line of road, especially at

Lake St. Michel, at River St. Anne, and at Lake Chapais.

Mr. Provost writes me follows:—"As a proof of the progress of colonization in Wexford, suffice to say, that there are no more disposable lots in that township, and that the first six ranges of Doncaster are now in part occupied. It has also been ascertained that, while the work on the road was going on, all the adjacent lots which were vacant were taken up.

"A church is now in course of erection on lot No. 24, in the 6th range of Wexford, where the road begins. Another religious centre of settlement is proposed to be establish-

ed on lot No. 25, in the 6th range of Doncaster."

As the object in this case is to open a great artery of colonization, which is intended to cross the great Laurentine chain, and open upon the Mantawa River, and so give access to that immense territory which has been frequently spoken of as a colonization ground for the whole population of the district, a sum of from ten to twelve thousand dollars would be requisite to open the road, which has now become indispensably necessary.

Mr. Provost has in hand a balance of \$482.88, which will be employed as early as

possible next spring.

In tracing the road, Mr. Provost was able to dispense with the services of a surveyor, which enables him to expend on the road the amount which would have been applied to the remuneration of such an officer.

COUNTY OF ARGENTEUIL.

EAST OUTLET ROAD.

Of this sum \$100 was intended to continue the opening of the Mille Isles section of the Argenteuil Road, but as the line of that road passed over a spot which was inundated in the spring by the waters of Lake St. Anne, and as, after an exploration in Wentworth, it was found impossible to carry the road in any other direction, Mr. Ford applied the entire balance in hand, last autumn, to the continuation of the East Outlet Road in Wentworth, beginning at the line dividing Wentworth, Mille Isles, and Morin.

Four miles of road were thus opened. The timber found on the road consists of

hard maple, black birch, beech, cedar, and resinous woods.

Mr. Ford thinks that a grant of \$1,000 will be required to complete these four miles

and to continue the road three miles further.

A sum of \$250 was granted this year for the road, but the season being too far advanced, the application of that amount was postponed till next summer.

The works this year consist of the opening of 12 arpents of road through the forest, in a difficult place, about seven arpents of which required ditching and crosswaying. A part of the latter required to be raised to the height of five feet, so as to raise it above the action of the high water.

The road is now completed as far as the centre of lot No. 57, and would have been so as far as the division line between lots Nos. 58 and 59, had it not been for the heavy rain, which entailed the expenditure of a certain sum to repair the damage caused by it.

Mr. Hamilton says that a further sum of \$150 will be required to complete the road

as far as the line of Wentworth.

This road, 90 miles in length, is passable for wheeled vehicles, but with much difficulty, for a distance of 30 miles. The remainder is a winter road.

It would require a sum of \$300 to finish it completely as far as the 7th range of

I regret to state that the bridge built last year on Rivière au Diable, in the 1st range of Salaberry, at a cost of \$301.60, was carried away by the flood last spring.

Mr. Campbell tells me that a large number of settlers have taken land in the townships I have just mentioned, and that the population has increased by fifteen hundred within the past five years.

A building has been erected in Wentworth to serve as a church and school-house.

The road is verbalized.

This road commences at the front line of lot No. 5, of the 7th range of the augmentation to Grenville, and runs in a direct line to the front of the 10th, range; it then takes a north-east direction as far as River Rouge, at the front line of Harrington; thence it runs in an zig-zag course, to meet the wants of the settlers, through the valley of the River Maskinongé. It is now open to a point a short distance above the northern extremity of Lake Papineau.

This road is to cross the River Maskinongé at the rear of lot No. 25, of the third range of Ponsonby, where it will be necessary hereafter to construct a bridge eighty feet in length. The road will terminate at the line between the Townships of Ponsonby and Amherst.

The length of road opened and finished this year is two miles and seven arpents. The cost has been \$80 per mile, exclusive of bridges.

Ten bridges, of an average length of twenty feet each, have been constructed.

In the neighborhood of the road the soil is generally light, and timbered with black birch, beech and maple.

The road is verbalised as far as the line of Harrington.

For a description of these roads see my report of last year.

In these different roads there have been five and a half miles opened this year, three of which have been completed. Eight miles of road opened last year have also been completed. Moreover, the River Creuse road has been improved for a distance of twenty-one miles.

These roads are now passable for wheeled vehicles for a distance of sixty-one miles.

Four bridges have been constructed of the united length of 163 feet, at a cost of \$212, and 1\frac{1}{2} mile has been brush-laid, ditched on both sides, and covered with clay; a quarter mile of crossway has also been made. These works cost \$142. The cost of the road completed, without the bridges, has been only \$35 per mile.

Along these roads and in the vicinity are to be found large tracts of land exceedingly

well suited for agricultural purposes.

The soil is alluvion, mixed with sand and gravel.

Limestone is found on Calumet Island, in Litchfield, Mansfield, Leslie and Thorne, and there are fine water-powers on the Coulonge, Black and Nikabo Rivers, and in Sheen and Chichester.

Mr. Gray says it would take a sum of \$300 to finish the Calumet and River Creuse

Road, and \$400 for the road from Litchfield to Thorne and Leslie.

There remains in Mr. Gray's hands a sum of \$241, which the bad weather prevented him from expending this fall. This amount will be expended next summer.

COUNTY OF OTTAWA.

RIVIERE DU DÉSERT ROAD.

Superintendent :- T. McGoey.

Work was resumed on the road, this year, at the line between the Townships of Wright and Bouchette, in a northerly direction. The length of roadway finished in this place is 3\frac{3}{4} miles. The first quarter mile was covered with large boulders, and with pine and birch stumps, and involved a great deal of labor. A gorge, thirty feet in length, and very steep, has been excavated to a depth of three feet, and a width of thirty, and the surplus earth carried to the foot of the hill.

In this section five large bridges and twenty-eight others of smaller dimensions have been constructed. Moreover, 117 yards of roadway has been excavated to a depth of

from 18 inches to five feet.

The first of these bridges, built at Dunning's Creek, is 183 feet in length by 18 in width. The piers are thirty feet in height. The whole structure is substantially built and very solid. It has cost \$277.40.

The second bridge, which crosses McConnell's Creek, is 78 feet in length by 17 in

height, and has cost \$93.10.

The third, on Carroll's Creek, is 39 feet in length, and 9½ in height. The fourth, on Johnson's Creek, is 35 feet in length by 7 in height.

The fifth, on Beed's Creek, is 20 feet in length by 4½ in height.

These bridges have cost \$460.

As there are no more bridges to be made short of River du Désert, the road remaining to be completed to that point will be far less expensive to make, in proportion to its length.

After carrying out these works, Mr. McGoey improved Brennan's hill, in the Town-

ship of Lowe.

The works done at this point have been very difficult, and, in fact, beyond description. The works are a complete success, and this spot, which was formerly impassable, is now as easily travelled as any other portion of the road.

The length of new roadway which it has been found necessary to open in this locality is

10 arpents.

For information as to the quality of the lands traversed by this road, and as to the advantages its offers for colonization and commerce, I take the liberty of referring you to my report of works done in 1865.

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COUNTY OF GASPE.

MAGDALEN ISLAND ROADS.

Mr. Nadeau finished a hill already commenced, and then worked at the improvement of the mail road, for a distance of twenty arpents, at a place called Bois Brulé. This road is now finished. A very bad hill at Amherst Harbour has been lowered and improved for a distance of three arpents. Another very difficult hill, at the place called Le Moulin, has been improved for a space of one arpent. It was found necessary to excavate the rock to a depth of four feet.

After these works, Mr. Nadeau proceeded to the Etang des Caps Road, at the west point, opened in 1861, under the superintendence of Mr. Chevrier, and has there finished 25 arpents of roadway.

Mr. Nadeau says that some more money will be required to finish the Etang Road.

In order to give you an exact idea of the work done this year, on these roads, and on the bridge across Anse aux Griffons River, I think I cannot do better than transcribe the report sent me by Mr. Painchaud, under date of the 10th December.

YORK ROAD.

This road, which is intended to unite Gaspé Basin with the River St. John, and which crosses the first and second concessions of the Township of York, has been extended this year a distance of one mile and nine chains, of which a total of 71 chains have been graded and finished. A further length of 39 chains has been opened through the bush.

The road is now finished for a total distance of three miles and nine chains, and may be said to be passable as far as the River St. John, inasmuch as it extends to the various wood roads opened by the settlers along that river.

There has been expended up to this date a total sum of \$1,075, making about \$350 per mile, exclusive of culverts and a bridge, which must be built across a small stream which is now crossed on round logs.

I presume it will take from \$400 to \$500 to complete the road as far as the River St. John.

In view of the numerous difficulties and constant delays involved in crossing by scow at the outlet of the basin of the River St. John, and taking into account the danger incurred by those who cross this strait in the spring and fall, too much expedition cannot be used in completing a road which will remove these numerous drawbacks and dangers, and relieve the public from the necessity of crossing this river in a scow. The river presents no serious obstacle to the construction of a bridge, and its banks still abound with cedar and other timber suitable for building purposes.

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ANSE À LOUISE ROAD.

This road, with a total length of nine miles, extends from Anse aux Griffons to Cap Rosier, and opens direct communication between the light-house built on that Cape and the great postal road from the peninsula to River au Renard.

The amount expended on this road this year has been only \$154, including a balance

from last year of \$54.

The work was given out to two contractors, who had put in the lowest tenders. One of them made a section of three arpents, at a cost of \$14, and the other a section of about

13 arpents, at a total cost of \$100.

The latter section included a cedar swamp which crosses the road, and it was found necessary to remove a great part of the black earth. I also had two cedar culverts made, at a cost of \$4 each. I think that this road is now in a sufficiently forward state to be left under the control of the municipality and maintained by them, the more so, in as much as all the lots on this road have now been located; I may state that many of these farms are now in a very forward state.

ANSE AUX GRIFFON'S BRIDGE.

This bridge will be complete in about three weeks; I shall put off until that time my report on this work.

This road is now open for a distance of about 10½ miles, of which 3 miles only are finished; the remainder is passable for winter vehicles. There still remains five miles of road to be opened.

Two bridges have been built, measuring together 70 feet of roadway.

The soil, along the road and in the neighborhood, is of good quality, and covered with good timber. It offers many advantages for colonization.

A church is now being built in the new parish of Ste. Adélaide.

Mr Hurley says that in order to complete the road, the sum of \$240 per mile, would be required.

This road is verbalized.

BOIS BRULÉ ROAD.

With this sum, and the balance remaining in his hands from last year, Mr. Faurel has had three bridges built, at a united cost of \$187.20, in the section of road already opened, and finished the work remaining to be done on lot No. 1; so that the road is now complete from Point St. Pierre, towards Gaspé Basin, through the "Chien Blanc" settlements, for a distance of 4½ miles. And, as he states in his last year's report, on the remainder of the road, as far as Bois Brulé, the timber has been cut down to the width of from 8 to 10 feet.

This year, the building of a Catholic Church has been commenced at Chien Blanc; five new houses have been built on the Bois Brulé road, and a considerable extent of land

has been cleared.

The Cochrane Road, which extends from the 4th to the 7th concession of New Richmond, has been opened as far as the middle of 5th range.

The Leblanc Road, which also extends from the 4th to the 7th concession, has been

opened through two-thirds of the 5th range.

The Petite Rivière Road, which commences at the 3rd range and ends at the 7th, is open to a point within five arpents of the 5th concession.

These roads are passable throughout for wheeled vehicles.

A certain extent of crossway has also been made.

The lands through which these roads pass are of excellent quality, and highly suitable for agriculture. Good water-powers are available. Since these roads have been commenced all the lots have been taken up as far as the 7th range.

A site for a church has been selected in the township.

Mr. Lynd estimates that to complete these roads it would take \$150 for the 1st, \$400 for the 2nd, and \$360 for the 3rd.

The first of these roads commences at the Ristigouche Road, about 1½ mile below the mouth of the River Matapedia, and was opened in 1865 as far as the head of the ravine, a distance of about 1½ mile, half-a-mile of which was completed. This year a quarter mile has been finished.

The 2nd road commences at the Kempt Road, near the residence of David Nelson, and has been opened by the settlers as far as the 2nd concession, a distance of 1½ mile.

No portion of this road has been finished. It is to be opened as far as the McDavid Road, in the interior of the Township of Ristigouche. The amount of this year's grant has been expended in building a bridge 130 feet in length, on a water-course called the west branch of La Petite Rivière. It is passable for vehicles, but not entirely finished. It will take a sum of \$30 to finish it, and \$50 to pay the settlers who have furnished the material. So that the cost of this structure will be \$130.

The New Glasgow Road commences at the Kempt Road, near the west line of lot No. 2 of the 1st range of Ristigouche, and is open as far as the 2nd concession, a distance of three-quarters of a mile, of which half-a-mile had been previously completed. The other quarter mile has been finished this year. This road is finished.

The McDavid and Keppeltringan Roads, when opened further back, will give access

The McDavid and Keppeltringan Roads, when opened further back, will give access to a tract of ten to twelve thousand acres of fertile land, timbered with birch, maple, pine and cedar, and capable of accommodating a colony of at least one hundred families.

Water-powers and lime abound in the vicinity of these roads. Traces of iron have also been found.

A site for the construction of a Presbyterian Church at Ristigouche has been selected

this year.

It would take a sum of \$700 to complete the McDavid Road, and a further sum of \$800 for the Keppeltringan Road.

All these roads are verbalised.

JOHN TRAVERS AND C. MAUGER ROAD.

This road, situated in the Township of Hope, commences at the main road, and is to extend seven or eight miles into the interior.

The extent completed this year is 2½ miles, of which 20 arpents had been merely opened in 1865. Moreover, a winter road has been opened for a distance of half-a-mile.

The cost of the roadway finished has been \$330 per mile, including two crossways through swamps, one of which is 1½ arpent in length, and the other 1¼ arpent. It has been found necessary to lay pieces of timber on the hills, fastened together with cross pieces, and the whole filled up with brush, earth and gravel. In some places these crossways are two feet in height. These works cost \$120. A bridge, 90 feet in length and six feet in height, has also been constructed for the sum of \$50.

In addition 200 feet of roadway has been brush filled. These works cost \$25.

The land in these localities is of very good quality, and fit for settlement, for a distance of over nine miles back. The timber is birch, maple, cedar and spruce, but hardwood predominates.

Ten families have settled on the 3rd range of Hope. Twenty other families have taken lots on which some hundred acres have been cleared. The remaining lots have been taken up by settlers who propose locating shortly.

There are many water-powers in the vicinity, and there is a good bed of limestone,

running east and west, at the back of the 3rd range.

This road is verbalised.

In the Sandy Hill Road ten arpents have been completed this year. It is also open for winter vehicles for a distance of three-quarters of a mile.

The Mann and Shoolbred Road has been finished for a distance of four arpents and three perches. It is now passable for summer vehicles for a distance of three-quarters of a mile, and for winter vehicles an additional half mile.

The cost, finished, is \$372.08.

In this road five small bridges have been made, and 15 perches brush-laid.

The timber is maple, birch, pine and cedar.

The opening of these roads will give access to a large extent of good land adapted for agriculture.

There is a water-power on each of these roads.

To complete the part of the roads which has been merely opened, a sum of \$250 would be required.

The roads are verbalised.

This road is in Carleton. Mr. Allard first built a bridge, 60 feet long by 18 feet wide, over a large stream. It cost \$56. The balance of the grant was applied to the completion of four arpents of road already opened, and to opening eight arpents which are ready for turnpiking.

The extent of road now finished is 20 arpents, and 43 arpents may be used as a

winter road.

According to Mr. Allard's report, this route leads to a large plain extending to the rear from the 3rd and 4th concessions. From information received, it is considered that this great extent of good land will be about 20 miles in frontage, and still more in depth.

A sum of \$200 would be required to make the road across a cedar swamp and to

build three little bridges. The road would then lie over solid and level land.

It is desirable that the road should be opened as far as the plain, for there are many young settlers who are desirous of proceeding thither to establish themselves, and who are prevented from doing so by the want of a road.

Work was resumed at lot No. 7, Green range, Township of Maria, and the road was opened and made passable for wheeled vehicles to the extent of one mile and four chains, as far as lot No. 13.

A bridge of cedar, 21 feet in length, was built over a stream known by the name of Beaver Dam.

To avoid a lake situated on lots Nos. 10 and 11 it was necessary to make a rock cutting three feet deep, 80 feet long, and 15 feet wide. Then one arpent and 2½ perches of road had to be laid with brush and covered with gravel to the depth of three feet.

Alluding to the advantages which the opening of this road will afford to settlers, Mr. Giroux adds: "Seed grain and provisions could only be conveyed on men's shoulders, and when a man with a numerous family dependent upon him had labored for a long week clearing his land, and was absolutely compelled to fetch his seed grain and provisions for his family from the 1st range, he had no time at his disposal for this purpose except the night, and then he had to make the journey on foot and carry the whole on his shoulders."

There are several lots in the rear considerably improved. Some are already settled

on, and others will only be so when the road is made.

When this road is once finished it will produce a most satisfactory movement of colonization along its whole course, and will further yield the advantage of easy communication between the Cascapedia River and the old Irish settlements.

Mr. Giroux considers that a sum of \$400 would be necessary to complete the road as

far as the Escuminac River.

This road, of which 10½ arpents were completed last year, is now open a distance of 25 arpents.

Six little bridges have been built, and an extent of 52 arpents has been laid with

brush and covered with earth.

"The soil," says Mr. Cary, "is everywhere fertile. In the swampy cedar bush already mentioned, the subsoil is a blue clay. From the middle of the first concession towards the rear there is little variation in the soil; it is a yellow rich loam which may be cultivated for a long time without any manure, and which is equally well adapted for either hay or grain. The land is level and free from stones. I venture to assert that these statements are applicable to all the concessions of the Township of Hamilton. The timber nearly everywhere is very fine and mixed.

"Hamilton offers great advantages for the timber trade. At New Richmond there are persons who carry it on upon a large scale, and who work the fine pine groves which cover the concessions of Bonaventure to a considerable distance. But that those forests should be worked to advantage, they should be withdrawn from the monopoly of the Gaspé Mining Company, which, holding nearly the whole interior of Gaspesia, everywhere impedes and retards the progress of trade and colonization."

At Caplin River there is a saw and grist mill. Not far from the place where Mr. Cary worked this year, there is a fall upon that river which might be utilised as an extensive water-power.

In the 2nd concession of New Richmond, and the 3rd of Hamilton, there a quarry

of excellent limestone, which is continued in the direction of Gaspé.

A chapel was built a year ago at the commencement of the road in Hamilton, and in New Richmond a new church has been begun.

It is considered that a sum of about \$200 would be necessary to complete the road as far as the 2nd concession.

That part of the road is verbalised.

The first of these roads begins at Kearney Bridge, and is continued to the River Ristigouche, a distance of two miles. The second begins at the river road to the east of the Escuminac Bridge, and is open three miles along the river in a north-westerly direction. Its length will be about nine miles.

The Kearney Road is open throughout its whole length, which is two miles. That of East Escuminac is opened to an extent of three miles, and should be so to an extent of nine miles and more, there being settlements along the line of road to that distance.

Mr. Fallu has had work done on these roads in such a way as to allow of their being

used, though with difficulty, by summer vehicles, but they are not completed.

A temporary bridge, 50 feet in length, has been built of round timber on the Kearney Road, so as to allow passage for the year only. It should be rebuilt. This work cost only \$7. One hundred feet of crossway and 1½ arpent of brushwork have also been laid. The whole cost \$40.

Limestone is found in abundance on the East Escuminac Road.

"The soil," Mr. Fallu writes to me, "is excellent, and the timber mixed. The land adjacent is also of good quality. The Kearney Road especially, is highly advantageous to trade and agriculture, while that of East Escuminac is more so to agriculture than to trade. When once the latter road is completed, the settlers will repair more often and more easily to market to dispose of their produce, whereas at present they sacrifice them for want of communication. I am satisfied that so soon as that road is completed all the land will be taken up."

Three Catholic churches are at present in course of construction; the first of these is situated at Little Bonaventure, otherwise known as Jean Caplan River; the second at Cascapediac or New Richmond, and the third in the Township of Nouvelle.

Mr. Fallu estimates that \$600 would be required to complete the Kearney Road, and

\$1,500 for the other road.

Both are verbalised.

GREAT RIVER CASCAPEDIA ROAD.

The works on this road were begun at lot No. 16, and were continued to a spot near

lot No. 20, a distance of one mile and 22½ arpents.

Two bridges have been built; one on lot No. 16, 90 feet long by 15 wide and three feet above the level of the soil, and the other on lot No. 18, 108 feet long by 13 wide and nine feet above the level of the soil. These are built of cedar. At the commencement of the road on lot No. 16, it was found necessary to lower 60 feet of a hill to a depth of three feet.

A little further on 135 feet of crossway were laid on a low and swampy piece of ground. On lot No. 19 a further extent of 60 feet of road was crosswayed.

All the lots along the road, and even those in the interior as far as the junction of

the Escuminac and Cascapedia Rivers, are settled upon.

"All the lots along this magnificent river," writes Mr. Giroux, "are without exception fertile and adapted for cultivation, and, I have no doubt, but that so soon as the settlers are in a position to convey their produce to market by a land route, a considerable increase will take place in the number of families and clearings.

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"I cannot refrain from directing the attention of the department to the great encouragement which the Government would afford to the cause of colonization by granting the money necessary for the continuation of the Thibodeau by-road, as far as the

settlements on the 3rd range.

"From the most exact information I have been able to obtain, I have ascertained that the work done on that range during the year has exceeded all expectation; the care which has been taken to prepare the soil, and to get in the seed at the proper time, notwithstanding the great difficulties which had to be encountered in the transport of seed grain, give grounds for hope that the harvest will amply repay the labor of the poor settlers, who have certainly given proofs of unusual courage."

ROAD FROM MATAPEDIA TO UPSALQUITCH.

The making of this road was given out by contract on the 1st October last, by the Municipal Council of Matapedia. It was divided into nine sections, each 20 perches long, and these were distributed to as many contractors.

These 18 arpents of road have been completed to the satisfaction of the Council

Inspector, who examined them.

ACADIAN ROAD.

Superintendent :-- M. DE BLAQUIÈRE.

Five miles of this road were completed this year. Of this extent 1½ mile on the second range had been already opened as a winter road. The distance completed now amounts to 11 miles.

Three bridges, measuring together 60 feet in length, have been built, and 14 arpent

of brushwork has been laid. These works cost \$55.

The whole of the road runs over good land, covered with hard maple, black birch, beech, spruce and cedar. The further we advance into the interior, the more favorable are the lands to agriculture.

In the vicinity there are three water-powers, upon one of which a grist mill is at pre-

sent being erected.

Colonization has made great progress in these parts of late years. The settlers come for the most part from Prince Edward Island. The population now amounts to 450 souls. An extent of 200 arpents has been cleared this year, and the value of real property amounts to \$1,200.

The crop of grain and of potatoes has been good this year.

A large bridge will have to be built. The estimated cost of this is \$200.

The road will shortly be verbalised.

Of this road there was this year completed an extent of two miles, 22 chains and 30 links. Besides this, one mile and 67 chains have been opened to a width of from 13 to 16 feet on dry land, and 26 feet in swampy land.

Of this extent, three miles 62 chains and 52 links may be easily used by wheeled

vehicles, and one mile and three chains may be used as a winter road only.

Two bridges, having a total length of 162 feet, have been built at a cost of \$101.85. The laying with brush of 31 chains cost \$135.40, including the drains and ditches. Besides this, a hill, where the road was left unfinished in 1862, was improved.

It will be further necessary to cart earth upon 15 arpents of brushwork.

In the neighborhood of the part of the road which has been opened, there are two water-powers. Limestone also abounds.

About 3½ miles of the road are verbalised.

Mr. Lepage speaks as follows, in his report upon the progress of colonization along this section of the Taché Road: "As regards the quality of the soil over which the opened road and the traced line runs, as far as Kamouraska, and over which I have passed, I can but repeat what I have stated in my former reports. The whole tract includes an immense extent of land highly favorable to colonization, which may afford to our industrious settlers as easy means of livelihood as are enjoyed by our good farmers in the most favored parts of the Province. To those who are willing to undergo the labor which the clearing of new land calls for, without doubt this tract offers an immense field of action, to say nothing of the magnificent elm groves on the banks of the Rimouski River, where the fertility of the soil appears to be inexhaustible.

"Everywhere are found numerous water-powers which may be adapted with ease to the more important, as well as to the minor branches of industry. The timber is magnificent. Hard maple, black birch, fir, spruce and cedar predominate. Their size not only shows the fertility of the soil, but constitutes a source of natural riches which the settler

may work with profit, as an article of trade and industry.

"To shew the progress made on this part of the Taché Road since the commence-

ment of the work in 1862, I give the following analysis: -

"The extent cleared is 876 acres, of which 630 are under cultivation, and 240 are

merely slashed.

"All the land situated along the part of the road opened this year was taken last year, and much clearing was done; but in the hope that the work on the road will be continued next year, several persons have taken land beyond the part opened on the traced line in the Township of Neigette. I have been informed that some twenty settlers also proceeded lately to select lots on the traced line in the Township of Macpès, to say nothing of the great number who are establishing themselves on the same line in the Townships of Hocquart and Demers, in the County of Temiscouata.

"The building of the chapel on lot No. 18, in the 4th range of Fleurian, has been put off until another year. This delay is to be attributed to the almost incessant bad weather of last season, which prevented the burning of the slashed timber on the spot

selected for the erection of the edifice.

"The descriptions of grain harvested in the greatest quantity were wheat, barley and cats, as shewn by the following statement:—

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"The cattle belonging to the settlers consists of 30 horses, 39 milch cows, 42 steers and heifers, 116 sheep, 53 fat hogs and 67 hogs not fatted.

"These statistics shew the importance of the road. They are also a proof of the powerful effect of free grants."

FLEURIAN BY-ROAD.

The voluntary contribution of the settlers who worked upon this road, amounting to \$85.05, including \$5.85, the balance of the grant of 1865, was expended this year.

An extent of 26 arpents was improved in wet places, which it was necessary to lay with brush and cover with earth.

Three water-courses, with discharge drains, and 36 chains of ditching were opened. Although these works were carried on with great economy, the road could not be

repaired throughout its whole length.

Mr. Lepage asks for a grant of from \$150 to \$200 to complete the road, which is absolutely necessary, it being the only means of communication between the Parishes of St. Luce, St. Donat, St. Anaclet, and the Taché Road.

EAST ST. DENIS ROAD.

This sum was applied first to the opening of six arpents of road to the width of the part already opened, and of 3½ arpents to one-half that width. Then nine arpents and two perches of ditching were dug, of sufficient width and depth to drain the road.

An extent of 12 arpents and six perches, on the place already opened, was laid with

brush and then covered with earth.

The completion of this road will be highly favorable to the opening of the Township of St. Denis. A great number of lots have been taken by settlers along the road, and considerable clearings have been made upon them. The settlers have sowed more than a hundred bushels of grain this year, and more than 30 families will winter on their lots.

The road should be opened further towards the rear, as the settlers have taken a

certain number of lots in the upper ranges, where the land is more easy to clear.

Mr. Turcot thinks that a grant of \$400 will be required to complete the part of the road already opened.

WEST ST. DENIS ROAD.

This road, which begins at the cordon of the Seigniory of Matane, is now open as far as the 5th range of the Township of St. Denis, but is only completed as far as the 4th range. It is to end in the rear of the township.

This year 23 arpents have been completed, and five arpents have been merely opened.

Eighty-six feet of crossway have also been made.

The completed road has cost about \$200 a mile. The land in the Township of St. Denis is excellent.

Colonization is making rapid progress there, and a certain number of settlers are already resident there. A large number of lots have been taken this year, and clearings have been made. Within five years real property has increased one hundred per cent. in value.

Mr. Forbes thinks that \$500 would be necessary to complete the road.

WHITE RIVER ROAD.

This road begins at the River St. Lawrence, and is to end at the 6th range of Matane, a distance of six miles.

It is open as far as the 4th range, and completed as far as the 3rd. It is to be opened through two ranges more.

No part of the road has been completed this year, but an extent of one mile and 16

arpents has been opened.

The soil over which the road passes is level, free from stones, and of good quality. It is timbered partly with hard maple, and partly with black birch, and partly with wood of all descriptions. There is a very fine water-power near the road, sufficient to set in motion any kind of mill, at all seasons of the year. There is also a very fine limestone quarry.

Fifteen lots have been taken this year along the road, and about 30 arpents have been

cleared.

A sum of \$200 is required to complete the part of the road merely opened, and a similar sum to construct a bridge over the river between the 2nd and 3rd range.

SANDY BAY ROAD.

Superintendent: -Z. LANOUETTE.

This road, extending from the River St. Lawrence to the 13th range of McNider, is

now opened as far as the 8th range, and partially completed as far as the 9th.

This year 35 arpents of road were completed on the 4th, 5th and 6th ranges. Wheeled vehicles may pass over it as far as the 7th range, and the settlers convey over it loads of from six to seven hundred pounds, with tolerable facility.

from six to seven hundred pounds, with tolerable facility.

Of the 35 arpents completed this year, 7½ arpents of cedar and ash swamps were laid with brush and covered with earth. Two bridges, 40 feet long, and four small bridges,

have also been constructed.

In several places it was found necessary to remove the trees, in order to give a sufficient width to the road, which was too narrow. Six arpents of hill were cut down, and 20 arpents of ditching were dug.

Several lots of land were taken this year on the 7th and 8th ranges of McNider.

Mr. Lanouette writes to me that colonization is making great progress in McNider, and the neighboring townships. The harvest this year was much better than in previous years. From a farm which Mr. Lanouette holds in the 7th range, he got in 300 bushels of barley and 150 bushels of potatoes. He calculates that more than 200 arpents of land will be sown in the 7th range next spring. A settler from the Parish of Bic took two lots on the 7th range, and has slashed 10 arpents this summer. This progress is to be attributed to the opening of the road.

The part of the road remaining to be opened will not entail so much work, there being hardly any hills, and not nearly so many cedar swamps as in the part already opened.

It is considered that \$250 a mile will suffice to complete it.

MACPÈS ROAD.

The grant of this year was applied to the completion of 13 arpents cleared last year, and to the opening, as a winter road, of five arpents and eight perches, as far as the front of the 3rd range of Macpès.

An extent of six arpents and 5½ perches was crosswayed or laid with brush, and of

this a certain portion was covered with earth.

These works were executed beyond the lowland to which allusion was made, and over which a bridge, 125 feet in length, will have to be built, the estimated cost of which is \$130.

All the land along the road, and in the whole township, is adapted for the cultivation

of all kinds of grain.

Several lots have been taken this year on the 4th range, and the settlers are only waiting for the opening of the road to take up their residence upon them.

The road is verbalised.

CHÉNIER AND BEDARD ROAD.

Superintendent: -J. B. Hudon.

The work of this year consists of the completion of six acres of road already opened, and the clearing of 10 more acres.

A bridge, 20 feet in length, has been constructed, also four acres of corduroy. A

portion of the old road has also been improved.

The land in the vicinity of this road is of good quality, and generally covered with mixed timber, including a large quantity of maples. On that portion already opened there are several water-powers.

This road will be well adapted to colonization, as the settlements in the rear, as far as the Taché Road, contain very fine lots of land, and the settlers are anxiously awaiting

its completion to take possession of them.

Mr. Hudon makes an estimate of \$800 to complete the portion of the road already opened.

TARTIGON ROAD.

Superintendent :- V. Gosselin.

This road, which is to extend nine miles from the river, is now open four miles and nine acres, 25 acres of which have been completed, and 30 acres opened as a winter road, this year. Three acres have been laid down in corduroy.

Six miles from the river there is a good water-power, with calcareous stone in

quantities.

The lots are taken up as the road is opened, and some settlers have established themselves even beyond the open road. Twenty lots have been taken up this year, and 50 acres have been cleared.

The kinds of grain raised on these lots are wheat, barley and rye. The crops did not

suffer this year.

This road will cost \$150 per mile.

It is soon to be verbalised.

DUQUESNE ROAD.

Superintendent: -F. X. DUFOUR.

 This road has been opened and completed, this year, over an area of 14 acres. In addition to this, eight acres have been opened and cleared of timber. It is now completed as far as eight acres from Little Rimouski. Summer vehicles can now be taken over the road easily from the river to a distance of nine miles. One mile further can be reached by winter vehicles. This road leads to Fond d'Ormes, about 12 miles from Petit Rimouski.

No bridge has been built this year, but the road has been laid down with corduroy

over an extent of four acres.

The soil on this road is generally good and fertile, and the timber is mixed.

There are several good water-powers on the Little River Rimouski.

The general progress of colonization in the Duquesne settlement has been satisfactory, and a certain area of land has been cleared.

Mr. Dufour states that it would cost about \$600 to open the road to Black River, a distance of about 4½ miles from Little Rimouski.

NEIGETTE ROAD.

The portion of this road opened during the past few years, about three miles in length, extends from the 4th range of the seigniory to the 2nd range of Neigette. On its whole length it is fit for summer vehicles, but it is not yet completed.

This year, it has been laid in corduroy, and covered with earth, over a distance of

six acres, with a ditch on each side.

An extensive water-course has also been dug out to dry or drain that portion of the road which passes through a very low cedar swamp.

This road should be extended to the Taché Road, as it would pass through some very

good land

There are water-powers and limestone in the 2nd and 3rd ranges.

Colonization has progressed in this neighborhood. During the past five years, the increase in population in the 1st range alone has reached the figure of 83 souls. The number of lots taken up this year is 16, and the settlers are awaiting the continuation of the road to clear their lots.

The soil is good and suited to the production of all kinds of grain.

It would require a sum of \$150 to complete that part of the road already commenced.

COUNTY OF TEMISCOUATA.

BÉGON ROAD.

This road, which starts from the line that divides the Seigniory of Trois-Pistoles from the Bégon settlement, is now completed for a distance of seven miles south of the River Bouabouscachée. It is traced nine miles further, and should, in the interests of trade and colonization, be continued to Lake Témiscouata.

Forty-nine acres and five perches have been opened up this year, 42 acres and nine

perches of which have been completed.

The cost of the finished portion is about \$220 per mile. Three-and-a-half acres have been bridged and fascined.

Mr. Pelletier states that the road passes over high ground, a portion of which is covered with long and strong maples; the remainder with mixed timber. This road leads to fine lands, in which are very fine sugaries, now worked on a large scale.

There are several water-powers in the vicinity of this road.

Colonization has made great progress in Bégon since 1861. At the present moment, in addition to several scattered habitations, there are three small villages which give indications of the formation of a large parish in a few years. Nevertheless the population has not increased as much as expected, owing to the emigration of several of the settlers to that much lauded country—the United States.

About 30 lots have been taken up this year, and about 60 acres have been cleared. During the past few years, the value of land in Bégon has increased about four hundred per cent.

Grain of all kinds has been harvested this year in the vicinity of the road, without

suffering from frost.

It would require from \$600 to \$800 to complete this road.

DÉTOUR DU LAC ROAD.

This road has been completed, this year, over a distance of 41 acres, and 5½ acres have been merely opened.

The cost of completed road per mile has been \$267.

It is now completed over a distance of two miles nine acres six perches and 12 feet from a point near the Detour du Lac Church. It is intended to carry it as far as the mouth of the Bleue River, 20 miles from the Temiscouata Road.

One hundred and sixteen feet of corduroy, covered with 10 inches of sand, have been laid down, and 380 feet of uncovered corduroy, and 126 feet of fascining have also been laid down; the whole at a cost of \$70.

There are two fine water-powers on this road.

Mr. Clouthier writes as follows: "This road passes through an extensive territory. The soil is of good quality for agricultural purposes, and is covered with fine forests of hardwood, principally of maple and birch. As a commercial highway, and as a channel of communication in the interests of colonization, this road affords great advantages. It will ultimately link an extensive territory of extraordinary fertility with the Temiscouata Road, which is the channel of communication between Canada and New Brunswick.

"The progress of settlement in the vicinity of this road, and those which it intersects,

has been very rapid. There are now in the Seigniory of Madawaska 1,350 souls.

"In the Botsford settlement, eight lots have been taken up at the end of the road. Sixty lots have been taken in Cabane.

"In the Madawaska Seigniory, all the lots have been taken up, on both sides of the

road, over a length of six miles.

" Four settlers in Cabane have cleared 15 acres of land, and a great number of others will settle there when the road is completed.

"Two chapels have been built this year in the Seigniory of Madawaska.

"The value of landed property has doubled in five years."

It is supposed that it will take \$350 a mile to complete this road.

RIVIÈRE BLEUE ROAD.

This road commences at the Temiscouata Road, in the Armand settlement, on lot 35 of range C, and is intended to terminate at the mouth of the Rivière Bleue. Its length will be about 20 miles. Three miles and four acres had been opened up last year. year three miles and 22 acres have been opened up, forming in all six miles and 26 acres of good winter road, over which even summer vehicles may pass, but with great difficulty.

It will be necessary to build a bridge of 30 to 40 feet in length over one of the branches of the Rivière Bleue; nevertheless, as the stream is fordable in summer, and

even in the fall, a small scow will suffice for some time.

The soil is so well adapted to the construction of a road, that but 12 acres will require

fascining.

There are still about two miles to open up to reach the shanty road which leads to the mouth of the Bleue River. This road, about 12 miles in length, has been so repaired and improved that in some parts, as Mr. Talbot reports, "one might drive a carriage

There are several water-powers on this road, two of which are sufficiently large to be

used for manufactories.

About 20 lots have been taken up this year in Cabane and Botsford. Mr. Talbot writes that a nice chapel has been built this year in Armand, on the Bleue River Road, and that, by order of the Bishop, four church sites have been laid out on the same road. The furthest off is at the head of Beau Lake. The distance between each is about six miles.

The crops this year have been good. J. Nadeau, who last year harvested 500 bushels

of grain, expects this year to have above 600 bushels.

It would require about \$200 per mile to complete that portion of the road now opened, and to complete the remaining 12 miles of shanty road \$100 per mile would

For a description of this road, I refer to my reports of the past few years.

Twenty-six acres of this road have been completed this year; small bridges have been built, and corduroy has been laid down over a certain length of cedar swamp.

The road is now passable for summer vehicles as far as the Taché Road, where it terminates, but it is not yet finished. The land near the Taché Road, and that lying beyond it, is of good quality, and easy to till.

Mr. Dionne suggests an extension of two miles of the Taché Road from the Mount Carmel Road to opposite the Parish of St. Alexandre, in order to procure access to the fine maple forests of the Chabot and Painchaud settlements.

Mr. Dionne is of opinion that \$3,000 would be sufficient to complete this road over

the whole length of 17 miles.

On the 30th December, 1865, Mr. Dionne gave a contract to Mr. Stanislas Lévèque for the construction of a bridge over Rivière du Loup, on the Mont Carmel Road, for a sum of \$120.

This bridge is to be 16 feet in width, from 7 to 10 feet in height, according to circumstances, and 84 feet in length, 9 feet of which will be for terracing, 35 feet for an apron to be laid on four beams of cedar or tamarac, 12 inches by 10, and 40 feet for the two abutments, which are to be filled with stone. This bridge is to be provided with two fence-guards of round cedar. The work is to be received by Mr. Dionne, or by any other person selected by the Department.

Mr. Dionne wrote as follows, on the 3rd December last: "In accordance with the request of Mr. Stanislas Lévêque, contractor for the Rivière du Loup Bridge, on the Mont Carmel Road, I inspected the work on that bridge on the 20th of last month, and I have the honor to report that I found the necessary timber brought to the spot, and at

at least one-third of the work done.

"I regret that unavoidable circumstances have hitherto prevented the contractor from

fulfilling the terms of his contract.

"I am, however, satisfied that this bridge will be opened this fall to the public, and that the work will be completed early next spring."

COUNTY OF L'ISLET.

ARAGO ROAD.

This road has been completed, this year, over a length of 48 acres. Eight more acres have been slashed, and 12 acres opened as a winter road.

Mr. Breen states that the eight cleared acres being situated in a low soil, covered with water in the fall, it has been found impossible to complete them, as a road, without expending more than twice the amount such work would cost under favorable circumstances.

The cost per mile of the last two miles of this road, without bridges, has been \$680. Seven and one-half acres of deep swamp have been fascined, graded and filled, from 2 to 4½ feet in height, according to the nature of the soil, with good deep ditches on each side. In addition to this, about three acres of discharging ditch have been dug out, in order to drain the water which covers this part of the road in summer.

Mr. Breen writes as follows: "The first step towards the colonization of the Arago township was taken this summer, by a farmer of the Parish of St. Cyrille, and his two sons. On the 1st of October, they had succeeded in burning 20 acres in superficies of slashing, piled during the summer.

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"They have since labored with the view of enlarging their clearings, in order that they may be enabled to lay down under cultivation the greatest possible breadth of soil next year. From the information I have lately received, I think it perfectly clear that next summer the number of settlers will be largely increased in the Arago township, particularly if there be a chance of increase in the grant, with a view to an early completion of the road. These settlers are compelled to travel more than three leagues out of their way by an old shanty road to reach the Taché Road.

"Three lots were taken up this year in Arago, along the Taché Road, and seven lots of 50 acres in the Lessard township. The number of settlers in Lessard is 20, nine of

whom reside there with their families, and the others intend building next year.

"The kinds of grain generally raised are barley, oats and rye. The crops were saved this year without damage."

The following is a statement of the crops raised, and work done, by 20 settlers in Lessard in 1866:—159 square acres of slashing, 100 acres under cultivation, yielding 475 bushels of grain, 950 bushels of potatoes, and 2460 bundles of hay.

Mr. Breen writes: "The cost of this road, as compared with others, must no doubt appear very high, but the difference can be justified by the exceptional nature of the soil. The fact is that this year we have only had about four acres of easy soil, without too many stones, and about 7½ acres of swampy bog, in which the men had to work up to their knees in water. We also had to pass through about 27 acres of a burnt district, covered with a double layer of rocks, which had to be levelled and macadamised with broken stones and earth, brought from different patches on each side of the road. There are still about 20 acres of rocky land, after which the expenses will diminish gradually on the opening up of each new mile towards the Taché Road, as the soil is less rocky, and by far superior. There are now along the road about 600 pieces of timber, 6 to 10 inches by 14 feet, which can be used next year for crossway, also 18 beams of tamarac, 45 feet by 12 inches and over."

It would require about \$4,100 to complete the eight miles and 22 acres of this road

still to be opened to reach the Taché Road.

COUNTY OF MONTMAGNY.

ANSE À GILES ROAD.

This road has been completed over an extent of 23 acres, and 25½ acres have been Work has also been done on the shores of the Guimont stream. It took some time on account of the quantity of earth that had to be carted. The road is now completed as far as the 9th range of the Seigniory.

Two bridges have been built, and 91 acres of crossway and fascining have been

completed. This work has cost about \$100.

Mr. Frégeau writes as follows:—" Over the part of the road made this year the soil is dry, and the timber is small tamarac and fir. Under the action of fire the soil has been burned off, leaving the bare rock. In the low lands, small cedar groves are found from place to place, but the soil is unfit for cultivation."

This road leads to splendid land higher up in the vicinity of the Taché Road. About four miles higher up than the opened road, there are a large number of sugaries,

which are to be found all along the road, and are now worked.

The road is now opened as far as the St. Nicholas branch, over which it is necessary

to construct a large bridge, which will cost from \$300 to \$400.

The Superintendent writes me that he can procure the requisite timber at a short distance from the bridge, thus reducing the cost of the work. It is to be feared, however, that the timber will be stolen in the course of the winter, and in such case it would be necessary to travel four or five miles to procure more. For these reasons I have authorized Mr. Frégeau to expend the balance of \$91 in his hands to cut and square the necessary timber for this bridge.

It is estimated that \$3,000 will be required to complete the 10 or 12 miles still un-

opened to reach the Taché Road.

BEAUBIEN ROAD.

This road, which begins in the 2nd concession of St. Thomas, is completed as far as the 12th concession. The remainder is open as far as the Taché Road, but is not yet completed.

This year one mile and 27 acres have been completed, suitable for summer vehicles,

as far as the Taché Road. Nine small bridges have been completed.

Mr. Côté states that \$1,200 will be required to complete this road.

TACHÉ ROAD.

Seven small bridges have been built, and 19 acres in length have been fascined.

The soil in the neighborhood is of grey clay; the timber is mixed, but maple predominates.

There are three water-powers in this vicinity.

Eight lots of land have been taken up this year on this road, and a certain portion has been cleared.

In order to preserve the road it has been laid down in hay seed.

The road is verbalised from the Bellechasse line to the 32nd mile post.

SIROIS ROAD.

This sum has been used to repair and improve the worst portions of the road to facilitate the passage of summer vehicles.

Seven bridges have been built, in all 80 feet in length, and 71 acres of crossway and

fascining have been made.

The road is now suited to summer vehicles over the old Commissary Road, and to the south-east of La Rivière du Sud, in the township of Armagh, as far as the 5th range of the township of Montminy.

There are two water-powers in Armagh, on which two saw-mills were built in 1864.

In Montminy there are five water-powers which are used for saw-mills, with one grist-mill.

Mr. Talbot estimates at \$1,200, the amount required to complete the road, without including the blasting to be done, the cost of which he cannot establish, and certain improvements on the Commissary Road.

COUNTY OF BELLECHASSE.

MAILLOUX ROAD.

This road is now completed, on half-breadth, for 12 miles from the Taché Road. There are still 17 miles to complete to reach the line that divides Canada from the State of Maine. • The latter portion is now opened as a winter road.

Fifty-one acres have been completed this year. In this portion a small quantity of

earth remains to be carted over an extent of 21 acres of crossway.

The average cost of the work this year, without including bridges, has been \$248.17

per mile.

Seventeen bridges, forming on the whole a length of 69 feet, have been constructed at a cost of \$59. One of these bridges is 20 feet across, with 54 feet of abutment. There has also been laid down crossway and fascining at six different points, over a total length of 14 acres and 9 perches, at a cost of \$143. Mr. Audet constructed, by contract, a bridge over the Rivière Noire, in accordance with plans and specifications furnished by the Department, with certain trifling changes, which were subsequently approved of.

The north abutment of this bridge is 54 feet in length; the south 35 feet. The length of the bridge beams is 67 feet, supported by a pier in the middle. The pier is on the level of the beams 11 feet above the average water-mark. On the angle of the ice-breaker an iron cross-bar was laid, with wrought iron knees above and below, the whole fastened

with spikes.

The abutments are filled with stone, from top to bottom, as also the centre pier and the

ice-fender. A clear space of 50 feet has been made on each side of the bridge.

The persons appointed to inspect and examine the works, report that it has been executed with great care, and with sound and good materials. The cost of the road was \$400.

"The Mailloux Road" Mr. Audet tells me, "passes through the centre of a large tract of hardwood land, easy to be cleared. Generally, the soil is of excellent quality in rear of the mountain, as I myself ascertained. I believe I am able to state that the Townships of Roux, Bellechasse and Daaquam, intersected by the Mailloux Road, are all fit for settlement, and offer advantageous prospects to farmers. The soil is less stony, and of a richer quality than that of the townships north of the mountain.

"It is only necessary to mention that these townships are watered in all directions by considerable streams, as the St. John, the Daaquam, the Black and West Rivers, and that a large portion of them is covered with pine, spruce, cedar, and other timber fit for building purposes, to show that the interests of trade will be, and are already materially ad-

vanced by the opening of this road.

"The rivers above mentioned, and their numerous tributaries, afford an almost infinite number of water-powers. Limestone is also found in large quantities in the neighbourhood of the Black River.

"In Roux and Bellechasse, colonization advances very satisfactorily. Besides the grand line which lies along the Mailloux Road, and on which nearly all the lots are taken, the adjacent ranges are being rapidly cleared. In some places settlers are resident as far

back as the 3rd and 4th ranges, on each side of the road. Already there are at least 50 residents, besides a large number who have taken lots on which they work from time to time, but do not yet reside permanently.

"Where the blows of more than two hundred axes now ring through the forest, was heard, four or five years ago, no sound, save the notes of birds, or the wild cries of savage beasts. The number of arpents cleared in the Townships of Roux and Bellechasse, I estimate at 200.

A Catholic Church is building on lot No. 51, of the Township of Roux; likewise a saw mill and a grist mill, on the Black River, near the bridge above mentioned. These various buildings will be powerful aids to the advancement of colonization in these remote

regions.

"We may fairly venture to affirm that land has nearly trebled its value within three years. There are already farms valued at \$700, \$500, and \$300 The most ordinary kinds of grain are wheat, barley, rye, and buck-wheat, all of excellent quality, ripening thoroughly, notwithstanding the heavy rains of the season. One farmer, gathering his third crop, had 1200 bundles of hay, and 1100 sheaves of various kinds of grain; all of the best quality. It is to be remarked, that nearly all these settlers are poor, starting without other means than their own personal labor. Many of them, indeed, cannot devote the whole of their time to their own land, but are obliged to earn bread for their families, or to clear off old indebtedness, by hiring out to others.

"I have no where seen finer grain. One settler has penetrated six miles beyond Black River, to the 5th range of Bellechasse. He will be followed by many others as soon

as the road is completed to that distance."

Mr. Audet considers that \$4000 will be required to complete the road, exclusive of the bridges.

ARMAGH ROAD.

Superintendent: -ELIE AUDET.

One mile has been completed on the Armagh Road, so that there are now 5 miles in perfect order, and fit to be used by all kinds of vehicles. The remaining 3 miles are only slashed, although frequented by summer vehicles, so great is the utility of this road.

The lands adjacent to the Armagh Road are of tolerable quality, but very rocky, and hard to clear. There are very few good lots remaining untaken, except those on the northern declivity of the mountain.

\$400 would be required to finish the road.

COUNTY OF DORCHESTER.

LANGEVIN ROAD.

This sum was applied to the improvement of the road in the worst places, in order to

render it passable for summer carriages throughout its entire length.

Three bridges have been rebuilt of an aggregate length of 160 feet. The latter work cost \$365; of which \$150 was paid by the department; \$30 by the superintendent, out of his own purse; \$60 by the settlers, and \$50 by the friends of colonization at Quebec. A balance of \$60 remains due on the bridges, the payment of which I recommend to be made out of the next legislative grant.

Sixteen pieces of crossway have been made, 360 feet in length. The soil along the Langevin Road, and adjacent to it, is generally good, and mostly covered with hard wood.

There are several good water-powers, on this road, and on that of Lake Etchemin. Colonization advances, and if the Langevin and Lake Etchemin roads were completed a large portion of the land would be taken, being generally acknowledged to promise great advantages to settlers.

A chapel was built last year, in Langevin-40 feet by 32; and another at Lake Et-

chemin, 45 feet by 32.

The harvest of last year was good; a large quantity of winter and spring rye, and some

wheat, with abundance of oats, barley and buckwheat, were gathered in.

It is estimated that the sum of \$2000 would be required to complete this and the Lake Etchemin road.

The bridge over the River Etchemin, which was commenced last year, has been completed in the present. Its length is 170 feet, and the cost \$510.56.

This bridge is on the Etchemin road, in Cranbourne. It will be of great benefit to

colonization, by facilitating access to the fine lands adjacent, and in Cranbourne.

The north-west branch commences at the central road, near the Catholic church, and takes a westerly direction across lots No. 14, 13, 12, 11, 10, 9, 8, 7, 6, 5, and 4, of the fourth range in Cranbourne; it next passes 9 arpents between lots No. 3 and 4 of the same range, and then along the division line of the 3rd and 4th ranges, for a distance of 18 arpents. From that point it takes the division line between Cranbourne and the Seigniory of St. Joseph, to a distance of 46 arpents, and is to end at the road leading to the church of St. Joseph; a distance of 73 arpents in all, which has been made in the present year as a winter road, 22 feet wide.

The land adjacent to the Etchemin road is of good quality, with few stones, and is covered with vast forests of large spruce, fir, birch and cedar. The high lands have a growth of fine maple. The lands along the north-west branch, for a distance of two miles, are but middling; elsewhere on that line they are of the best quality. Mr. Cassidy writes to me that the lands on the Etchemin road are all settled to its extremity. Beyond that point, in the south part of Cranbourne, lies an immense tract of good lands, covered with forests, which woo the settler to turn them to account. The progress of colonization in the present year has been very great, especially in the 7th and 8th ranges of the township. About 22 clearings have been made, some of them very considerable. In the township of Ware, there are now from 75 to 100 families. In Langevin, there is scarcely a vacant lot along the colonization road.

Two churches have been built in the district, within the present year, and real estate

has increased in value fourfold.

The greater part of the road is verbalized.

In his report, Mr. Cassidy recommends to the attention of the department the making of the following roads:

1. One between the 7th and 8th ranges, in Cranbourne, to connect with the Langevin

road; in length about 6 miles, to cost \$600.

2. The next in importance; and what indeed is only a continuation of the first, is the north-west branch of the central road; estimated cost \$400.

3. The continuation of the Etchemin road, from the bridge southward, to connect with the road of the 7th and 8th ranges; estimated cost \$200.

ST. MALACHI ROAD.

This road commences at lot No. 17, at the point where the main road crosses the 11th range of St. Malachi. In the present year, it has been completed to the width of fifteen feet, for the distance of 2½ miles, which is passable for wheeled carriages. Half a mile still remains open for winter carriages only.

Of bridges, 22 small ones have been built, measuring altogether 3 chains and 68 links.

Moreover, 3 chains 74 links of crossway has been made.

These latter works cost \$43.20.

The road takes the direction of a considerable tract of land, belonging to the Crown, in the north-west corner of Cranbourne. It is crossed by two streams, on which mills have lately been built.

The lots on the road are taken. 120 acres are cleared.

Mr. Dillon considers that \$200 would be necessary to finish the road. It is verbalized.

IBERVILLE ROAD.

Mr. Catellier was authorized to apply the remaining \$300 to the construction of a bridge over the River du Loup, the work on which is to be commenced in the coming winter.

Mr. Catellier writes to me that considerable number of arpents are cleared every year; that the number of settlers is increasing yearly; and that many among them are in easy circumstances. In general, they live on the produce of their land. He noticed some very fine fields of oats, and especially one belonging to a person named Léger Quirion, which cannot yield less than 300 minots. Men who are willing to work, and are of sober habits, need not to fear any difficulty on these new lands, as they are excellent. Nothing is required but labour and seed to repay the efforts of the settler a hundredfold.

"In conclusion," Mr. Poudrier says, "I repeat that this road is of vast importance, both as encouraging colonization in this fine district, and likewise shortening, by more than one-half, the distance between the Townships of Lambton, Winslow, Gayhurst, Forsyth and Aylmer, and the Quebec market."

Mr. Poudrier says that \$2,700 is required to complete this section of the road, inclu-

ding bridges.

Besides this, the sum of \$180 was applied to the opening of a branch-road, to allow the settlers in the above ranges, on the north-east side of the road, to reach and use the main road. The cost of the work has been about \$130 per mile. Thirty-two small bridges have been built, none of which exceeds 4 feet span, costing in all \$20; and 270 feet of brush-work, laid for

The quality of the land is excellent. It is mostly covered with hard wood. Mr Thompson writes me that the opening of this road will be a great public benefit; as it will open to the settlers a much shorter line of approach to the Railway, than formerly existed. The part opened in the present year will also be highly important to the settlers in Thetford, who had previously no communication with the neighbouring townships. It will likewise encourage the colonization of Thetford and Adstock, where there are still extensive tracts unsettled. There are several good water-powers, as also indications of copper ore.

Colonization has made rapid progress in Thetford and Broughton within a few years.

In the present year, nine lots have been taken on the line of road, and the site of a Catholic Church has been chosen.

The road is verbalized throughout the whole part opened.

Mr. de Villers writes me the settlers in the 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th ranges have, in the present year, opened cross roads to connect with this road, which is indispensable to enable

them to communicate with the neighbouring ranges.

The road to the 14th range, commences in the front concession line of the 13th range, and is 4 miles in length. The sum of \$200 was laid out this year in finishing one mile of the road, and in raising a bridge two feet, the length of which is seventy-three feet, and which was built last year on the River Gentilly.

The water rose, in the spring, several feet above the ordinary flood level, and the bridge was in great danger of being carried away. Three miles of the road are now finished. Only one mile of roadway now remains to be made, the estimated cost being

Mr. de Villers informs me that a great deal of work has been done in the Township of Maddington, within the past three years, and that there is every reason to believe that within a few years a new parish will be formed in that township. The requisite steps have lately been taken by him to secure a lot on the 12th range road for a site for a church.

"Should our efforts prove successful," says Mr. De V., "there can be no doubt but our young settlers will work with increased vigor at the clearing of their lands, and strive

to locate themselves upon them as soon as possible, in the hope of having, within a few years, a priest residing in the midst of their new parish."

COUNTIES OF NICOLET AND ARTHABASKA.

HORTON ROAD.

Superintendent: -C. VERBONCŒUR.

This road extends from the Nicolet River, in the 3rd range of Horton, as far as the front road of the 10th range of Warwick. It is open throughout its whole length, but not finished.

This year's grant has been expended in opening the remainder of the road, and in building two bridges, measuring together 56 feet in length, of which the cost has been \$84.

This road passes through excellent lands in the 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th ranges of Horton, and crosses the 10th and 11th ranges of Warwick. It opens a direct communication between the St. Lawrence, opposite Three Rivers, the township of Warwick, and the Grand Trunk. There is still to be found in the vicinity a vast quantity of wild land, which will soon be settled.

There are a great number of water-powers on the Nicolet River, and copper mines in

the 10th range of Warwick.

Some ten lots of land have been taken up this year, and about one hundred acres have been cleared.

The new parishes of St. Samuel and St. Perpetua have been erected, and church sites selected. The buildings are to be put up in the spring.

The sum estimated for finishing this road is \$1,000.

COUNTIES OF ARTHABASKA AND DRUMMOND.

BULSTRODE AND WARWICK ROAD.

Superintendent: -- GEORGES DAUTH.

The work on this road has been well done, and the road is now finished.

There remained in the hands of the Superintendent a balance of about \$18, which he was authorized to expend in improving the by-road from St. Valère chapel to Bécan-

Mr. Dauth has given me no further details as to the extent and nature of the work performed by him.

STANFOLD AND VICTORIAVILLE ROAD.

Superintendent:—C. MARQUIS.

This road has been opened this year for a distance of four miles, but it is not yet finished. It is now open throughout, and may be travelled with wheeled vehicles, but not without difficulty. It is to terminate at the iron bridge in Stanfold. A bridge, 30 feet in length, has been made, and ten arpents of roadway brush laid.

This road passes through excellent land, generally of a sandy character. It will establish a short and easy communication between Stanfold, Somerset, Blanford, and the Victoriaville Station of the Three Rivers Railway. It will also connect the same

township with the chef-lieu of the district.

The estimated amount required for the completion of this road is \$500, but the Superintendent is of opinion that the Government should not grant more than \$200,

leaving the parties interested to furnish the remainder.

"Twenty-five years ago," says Mr. Marquis, "the Townships of Stanfold and Arthabaska were vast solitudes, completely unknown, except perhaps by some few hunters. To-day this territory is covered with beautiful and wealthy parishes and villages, which are in no respect inferior to settlements one hundred years old. In the Township of Arthabaska alone there are three fine churches; the judicial chef-lieu of the district of Arthabaska, with its fine court-house and gaol; three incorporated villages. This township is traversed by the Grand Trunk and Three Rivers Railways. It possesses a vast

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number of mills, and at Victoriaville is the manufactory of tannin, which is extracted from hemlock bark. The value of the yield from this article is from \$500 to \$600 per day.

"Mr. Hodge manufactures in Bulstrode an article of fuel consisting of black mould

or turf, which seems destined to supersede coal.

"A fine stone church is now being built.

"A college has been established at Stanfold. The Chester hills are being crowned with dwellings, and covered with fine parishes."

A certain number of lots have been taken up this year, and some hundred acres of land cleared.

BULSTRODE AND VICTORIAVILLE ROAD.

This road, which commences at the line between Bulstrode and Arthabaska, on lot No, 6 of the 12th range of Bulstrode, in the direction of Victoriaville, has been com-

The work consists in the completing of a certain extent of roadway already opened, of which the length is not mentioned in the Superintendent's report, and in the construction of four bridges, forming together 50 feet of roadway. In addition, three arpents of roadway has been brush-laid and covered with earth.

This road will be of great utility as a means of connecting Bulstrode with the Grand

Trunk depot at Victoriaville.

A contract for the building of a church in the vicinity of the road has been made, this year.

This road is verbalised.

CHENIER AND TINGWICK ROAD.

Superintendent: - HECTOR TREPANIER.

This road is now opened as far as the 11th range, and is to end at the Township of Wotton.

One mile has been finished this year, and another mile has been opened as a winter road, including the making of six bridges, measuring together 42 feet of roadway.

It has been necessary to make 30 arpents of ditching. There still remain two miles of roadway to be opened. The cost of the work has been \$150 per mile finished, and \$100 per mile when merely opened.

"This road," says Mr. Trepanier, "throughout its whole length passes through excellent well timbered lands, affording indications of copper. The crops produced by

these lands are wheat, Indian corn, rye, barley, peas and flax."

A large number of lots in these localities had been abandoned, but most of them have been taken up again since the opening of the road has been commenced, and the settlers are only awaiting the finishing of the road, in order to locate themselves permanently.

Mr. Trepanier thinks it would require a sum of \$650 to finish it.

This road is verbalised.

ST. GERMAIN ROAD.

Superintendent: -A. VEILLEUX.

Work was not commenced, last year on this road, owing to the great height of the

One mile of roadway has been opened this year in the 5th range, and made passable for wheeled vehicles. The trees and shrubs have all been removed to the full width of the road. A ditch, three feet in width, has been made on one side of the road throughout the whole mile, and five outlets to drain the ground.

Moreover, three small bridges have been made.

A sum of \$25.64, balance of grant of 1864, remained in Mr. Veilleux's hands. He has expended this balance in making two bridges on the side road of the 6th range; also in making ditches and lowering a hill.

The by-road of the 4th range still remains to be opened, a work which the settlers

are very anxious to see done.

DURHAM CENTRAL ROAD.

Superintendent: - EMILIEN BRASSARD.

Amount granted......\$400 00 Amount paid 400 00

This road falls into the postal route connecting the Townships of Durham, Wickham and Grantham with the Parishes of St. Zephirin and La Baie du Febvre, between lots 15 and 16 of Durham.

It is open to the 10th range of Durham, but finished only to the 9th range.

One mile previously opened has been finished this year, and another mile has been simply opened. Nevertheless, it is passable throughout for summer vehicles.

The cost of the roadway finished has been about \$261 per mile.

When finished, this road will be seven miles in length in a direct line, crossing the centre of the township from the main road between Drummondville and Melbourne, to the rear line of the township, and will be one of the most useful of public highways.

The land in the vicinity is generally high and rocky, but fit for cultivation. The

timber is mixed.

Mr. Brassard writes that this road has greatly benefitted the neighboring settlers, by furnishing them with an easy means of transporting hemlock bark, which is in great demand at the tannin factory now in operation in St. Fulgence. The quantity of bark now received is from 5000 to 6000 cords.

A sum of \$150 would suffice to complete this road.

It is verbalised.

ST. BONAVENTURE ROAD.

Superintendent: - LEON DESSERT.

This road forms part of the front road of the 3rd and 4th ranges of Upton, which extends from the Parish of St. Guillaume to the Church of the Parish of St. Bonaventure. The road was open throughout, but not finished.

The amount of the grant has been expended in embanking completely 14 arpents of roadway, which has been covered with a fresh layer of soil.

It is now passable throughout for wheeled vehicles.

A wooden chapel, commenced in 1865, has been finished this year.

This road is verbalised.

PACAUD ROAD.

Superintendent: -G. E. JACQUES.

This road, which had been opened some years ago, is now tolerably well finished throughout its whole length, 18 miles, with the exception of a certain extent of roadway at the starting point, which needs repairs. The sum granted this year has been expended in finishing—as far as possible, for the amount was not sufficient—one mile and a-half of roadway, and in lowering two very high and very bad hills in Ham.

This road is of great benefit to colonization, and affords direct communication between the Arthabaska Railway and Lake Megantic. The land along the road is of good quality,

the timber is fine, and affords an article of remunerative trade for the settlers.

The River Nicolet and its tributaries afford a large number of water-powers throughthe whole line of this road. Limestone has been found, and copper mines are abundant.

Mr. Jacques writes that since the opening of this road settlement has made great progress in the surrounding townships, and within the last five years the population has increased over a third.

Quite a number of lots have been taken up this year, the whole by French Canadians, some of whom are persons who have returned from the United States.

Within eight years the value of property in Chester and Ham has increased by one-half.

This road is verbalised.

COUNTIES OF WOLF AND RICHMOND.

STOKE AND WOTTON ROAD.

Superintendent: -G. RANDALL.

This sum has been expended in finishing one mile of the road, so that it is now passable for wheeled vehicles for a length of 6 miles.

A bridge, 20 feet in length, and 15 small bridges of different lengths have been con-

structed.

The soil in the vicinity of the road consists of a deep bed of vegetable earth, very suitable for culture and pasturage.

Maple abounds along the road; there is a great deal of merchantable timber.

The opening of this road will give access to a large extent of waste land, well suited for expiral treal extension.

for agricultural settlement.

Notwithstanding that the progress of settlement has been retarded in Stoke, by the high price of lands and the want of roads, nevertheless, the population has increased by two hundred within a few years. About ten lots have been taken up this year, and 200 arpents cleared.

There still remains about ten miles of roadway to finish, in order to complete the road throughout its whole length. As a great deal of work has already been done on the worst spots, these works would not cost more than \$100 per mile.

This road will shortly be verbalised.

BROMPTON ROAD.

Superintendent :- E. R. WEBB.

 The work performed on this road extends from lot No. 19 to lot No. 12 of the 4th concession of Brompton.

It is proposed to extend it to lot No.1, where it will meet a road leading to the village

of Melbourne, in one direction, and in the other to the Montreal road in Ely.

As far as lot No. 19 the road is already made, and connects with the highway from Sherbrooke to Melbourne.

The length of road opened is two miles. These works are quite forward, but the road is not passable for wheeled vehicles.

A bridge, 30 feet in length has been built, at a cost of \$20.

The lands in the vicinity of the road are good, and well timbered with maple, birch, hemlock, &c. It will afford easy access from Sherbrooke and Melbourne to a tract of land which settlers can secure at a low price. Mr. Webb says these lands will be settled as soon as the road shall have been opened.

The road leads directly to the slate quarries of Rockland and Melbourne. A Catholic

church has been opened at Brompton Falls.

It is thought that a sum of \$3,600 would be required to finish this road.

WOTTON AND WOLFESTOWN ROAD.

Superintendent: -J. T. LEBEL.

In order to afford an exit as soon as possible to the Ham settlers, Mr. LeBel has been authorized simply to trace out the road, but so as to afford a passage for wheeled vehicles; the finishing work will be done hereafter.

Work was begun on lot No. 1 of Ham, near the line of Wotton, and pushed on as far as lot No. 15 inclusively. The timber has been removed, and the road levelled to a sufficient width to permit the passage of wheeled vehicles.

Ten arpents of crossway, and several small bridges, have been made; the latter

measuring in all 87 feet.

The part of the road on which work has been done this year was already open as a winter road. It has been improved and rendered passable for wheeled vehicles for a distance of five miles and 10 arpents.

ROAD FROM ST. CAMILLE TO DUDSWELL.

Superintendent:—J. Z. C. MIQUELON.

This sum has been expended in removing the roots of trees taken out last year, and removing stones from the road for a distance of three-quarters of a mile. Of this a quarter of a mile has been completely finished. The trees have also been removed, and placed along the side of the road, over a distance of half a mile. By this means three-quarters of a mile has been added to the extent of roadway already passable for wheeled vehicles, and half a mile has been opened for winter vehicles.

The balance in hand will be expended next summer in finishing the low portion of

the road mentioned in the report of the Superintendent.

Mr. Miquelon writes that since he suspended work this fall, 600 arpents of land have been sold by the British American Land Company, and 1,100 acres by the local agent of the Government, in the 10th and 11th ranges of Dudswell, to inhabitants of the adjoining townships, who have purchased with a view to settling their children. These settlers immediately commenced the work of clearing their lands.

It would probably require a sum of \$1,600 to finish this road.

WEEDON AND HAM ROAD.

Superintendent: -H. A. WATIER.

This road, $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles in length, was opened as a winter road, and one mile finished in 1864.

The sum granted this year has been spent in removing roots and levelling the ground for a distance of $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles of roadway, which had been merely opened.

Four bridges have been built of a united length of 80 feet.

It is now a fine winter road, and is passable for wheeled vehicles during the summer.

Mr. Watier says: "The continued fine weather we had during the last three weeks of our work upon the road enabled me to visit, with greater care than in previous years, the adjacent lands. I am happy to state that the soil and timber are of a better quality than I had at first believed. Many persons who visited the lands while work was being done on the road have expressed the same opinion. I have no doubt whatever but that when this road shall have been finished a large number of settlers will locate themselves on the surrounding lands."

A site for a church has quite recently been selected at Weedon, by the ecclesiastical

authorities.

The road, though generally very high, is nevertheless intersected by small swamps, which it will be necessary to fill up with brush, in order to facilitate the passage of wheeled vehicles. As the longest of the swamps are situated on the first two miles, commencing at South Ham, Mr. Watier suggests that work should be commenced next year on that part of the road.

Mr. Watier thinks that a sum of \$300 per mile will be necessary to finish a good half-road.

WEEDON BRIDGE.

A contract has been entered into, for the building of this bridge, between the Municipal Council of Weedon and Mr. Louis Bélanger, of the Parish of St. Pie, under date the 26th Nov., 1866, for the sum of \$2,000, one-half payable by the Municipality, and the other by this Department.

The bridge is to be constructed across the River St. Francis, on a part of lot No. 11, in the 4th range of Weedon, and is to be 240 feet in length by 12 feet in width, inside,

in accordance with plans and estimates approved by the Department.

The work is to be done with good material, and received on the certificate of experts, and is to be finished on or before the 29th September, 1867.

COUNTY OF COMPTON.

MARSTON ROAD.

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In accordance with his instructions, Mr. Noble resumed operations on the road, at the line of Clinton and Marston, and worked back towards the point where he had stopped last year. He has in this way completed 1\frac{3}{4} miles, so that the road is passable for wheeled vehicles for a distance of 5 miles. In addition, 7 miles of roadway are open for winter travel.

The cost of the roadway finished has been about \$350 per mile.

The land along the road and in the vicinity is good, covered chiefly with hardwood, and well adapted for cultivation.

Indications of copper and iron have been found on lot No. 3 of the first range of Marston.

There still remain 13 miles of roadway to be opened, in order to reach the Province

line; the opening will cost about \$400 per mile.

Colonization has made very gratifying progress of late years in the surrounding townships, and the lands hardering the main road have generally been taken up as the road was

ships, and the lands bordering the main road have generally been taken up as the road was opened. The population has nearly doubled. 2,000 arpents of land have been taken by persons from Upper Canada.

The road is verbalised.

The Ditton and Chesham road has been completed for a distance of 13 mile on the south side of Salmon River, as far as lot No. 41, situated a the southern extremity of Megantic Mountain.

This road is traced as far as the River Arnold, in Woborn. There still remain,

therefore, from 15 to 16 miles of roadway to be opened.

The Ditton and Newport road is now finished through the township of Newport, as far as the Chesham road at the Ditton line, between the 4th and 5th ranges, where it ends.

The lands in these townships are of excellent quality, and well adapted for agricultural

purposes. The timber consists of fir, maple, beech and pine.

Most of the lands in Newport belong to the British American Land Company. This Company asks \$3 per acre for its lands, but the settler is allowed to make his own terms of payment. A large number of lots were taken up last year, and a large saw-mill has been built on the road, in the centre of Newport, by Mr. W. Bailey.

The lands in Ditton belong to the Government; a good many have been taken up in the course of the summer. The excellent quality and low price of the lands, and the good

road, attract a good many settlers into this township.

There are several good water-powers on or in the vicinity of the road. Gold, in pretty large quantities, has been found in the 8th and 9th ranges of Ditton, and this will, without any doubt, bring about the settlement of this section of the country within a short time.

"Two years ago," says Mr. Bailey, "only the west side of Newport, next to the township of Eaton, had been settled; we now have a good road through the centre of the township, of which 7 miles was finished last summer by the Municipal authorities, at a cost of \$2,400. A school-house and mill have been built, as well as a certain number of houses and other buildings."

The crops produced in these localities are corn, barley and oats; the harvest has been

good, and uninjured.

These roads have been verbalised.

PAQUETTEVILLE ROAD.

The cost of the completed road has been \$300 a mile.

Five bridges have been built, having an aggregate length of 100 feet; these cost \$125. There are several good-water powers in the vicinity of the road.

The soil generally is a yellow loam, and very well adapted for cultivation; hard wood

predominates.

Colonization has made great progress in these parts. Scarcely any families were to be met with four or five years ago, and now there are about a hundred. Considerable clearings have been made, and the value of property has greatly increased. A chapel was built at Paquetteville three years ago; and this year a church has been erected in the first range of Hereford.

Mr. Paquette thinks that \$700 more will be required to complete the road.

It is verbalised.

COUNTY OF SHEFFORD.

10TH AND 11TH RANGES OF NORTH ELY ROAD.

Superintendent:—Robert Edgar.

This road begins at the line between lots Nos. 23 and 24 in the 10th and 11th ranges of Ely, and ends at the Montreal road, at lot No. 37, in the same ranges.

It has been opened throughout its whole length, which is 1½ mile. It is not completed, and can only be used for winter vehicles.

Three bridges will have to be built on this road.

The land along the road is low and sandy. Limestone and traces of copper are found on lots No. 23 and 24, in the 11th range.

The completion of the road and the bridges will, in Mr. Edgar's opinion, cost \$250.

It is verbalised.

GRANBY ROAD.

This road, situated in Granby, begins at the line dividing that township from the Parish of Ange Gardien, at lot No. 25, between the 3rd and 4th ranges, and ends at the line between lots Nos. 18 and 19.

It has been opened to a distance of 54 arpents, of which 36 are completed to a width of 15 feet, with a ditch on one side. Within that distance 8½ arpents were crosswayed or laid with brush. This it will be necessary to cover with earth.

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Along the other 18 arpents the timber has been removed to a width of 18 feet, thus making a good winter road.

The road passes over good land, covered with hardwood on the heights, and with soft-

wood, with a mixture of ash, in the low places.

Several lots have been taken up by Canadians who have returned from the United States, and about 100 arpents have been cleared.

A church has been built in the township, and the site of another has been selected.

A sum of \$400 would be necessary to complete this road, which is verbalised.
