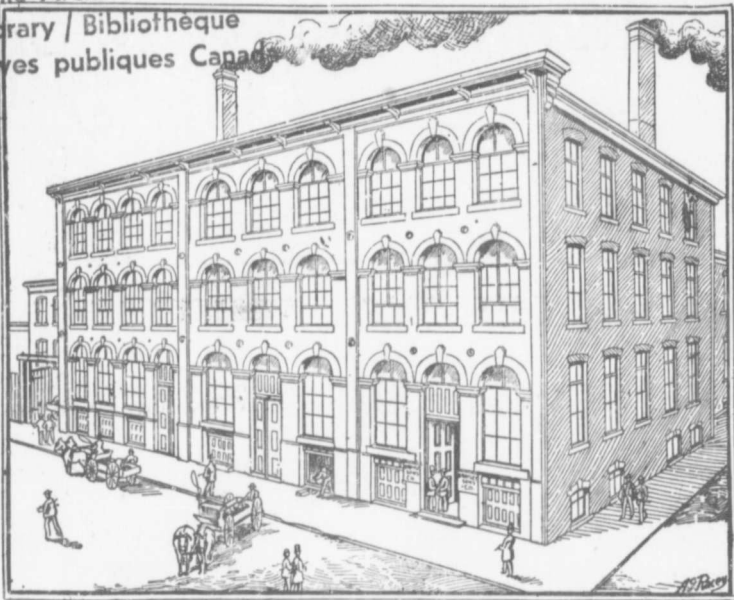

TO OUR READERS.

BRAYLEY'S FAMILY MEDICAL ALMANAC has been recognized as a Household Guide in Canada for more than twenty years. At first, as might have been expected, its influence was merely local. Its first number was published in Fredericton, N.B., in the year 1869, more as a neighborly act than for any other reason, and but a small edition was printed. But, to the astonishment of its publisher, it, at once, became exceedingly popular, and the demand was larger than the supply. The medical recipes and remedies given in it were found to be most valuable. Thus the knowledge of them and the knowledge of the almanac spread together.

Then followed a call for the distribution of the almanac throughout the Dominion. This soon grew too strong to be neglected. It became necessary that a city nearer the centre of the country be chosen as the manufacturing and distributing point. Montreal was selected, and from that time Brayley's Family Medical Almanac has been issued from Canada's Commercial Metropolis.

As the years developed and experience in preparing the almanac grew, the demand for it continually became greater, as well as the call for the family remedies it recommended. Both had secured a firm hold on the confidence of the public, because the people had been benefited by them and were not slow to acknowledge the benefit. Gradually the business widened, not by bounds, but slowly and

ECLIPSES.

- In the year 1894 there will be four eclipses, two of the Sun and two of the Moon, and a Transit of Mercury over the Sun's disk.
- I.—A partial eclipse of the Moon, March 21st, invisible over Eastern Canada, the beginning visible in the extreme Western portion of North America, the ending visible in Alaska. Middle of eclipse 9h. 30m. morning, Montreal time.
 - II.—An annular eclipse of the Sun, April 6th, invisible over Canada, but visible over Hindostan, China, Western Siberia and Alaska.
 - III.—A partial eclipse of the Moon, September 14-15, visible at Montreal and over Canada. Moon enters shadow, 10h. 42m. evening, middle of eclipse, 11h. 38m., Moon leaves shadow, 6h. 33m. morning, Montreal mean time.
 - IV.—A total eclipse of the Sun, September 29th, invisible in Canada. Visible over the Indian and Antarctic Oceans.
 - V.—A Transit of Mercury over the Sun's disk, November 10th, visible at Montreal and over Canada. Ingress, exterior contact, 11h. 01m. morning; interior contact, 11h. 03m. morning; Middle of Transit, 1h. 40m. evening; Egress, interior contact, 4h. 17m., exterior contact, 4h. 18m., Montreal mean time.

In consequence of this growing need, in 1878, a large building was secured in which to manufacture, store and ship the increased output of goods; but in 1882 this had become far too small, and the business was removed to a large five-storey building. Again this was outgrown, and now, ten years later, to secure the much needed increased facilities for trade, another removal had to be made, and the mammoth establishment of Brayley, Sons & Co. is found at the large double building numbers 43 and 45 William Street. Here, under the one roof are to be found the printing, the Turkish Dyes, the laboratory, storage and shipping departments and the general offices of this great business, which has reached a magnitude unthought of a few years ago.

It is with much gratitude to the public that this announcement is made, and also with the resolve that the confidence placed in Brayley's Family Medical Almanac and in the remedies it recommends, will always be retained. That this confidence may be increased the readers of this almanac are invited to visit the premises when in Montreal and to read the originals of the testimonials quoted in these pages as well as many others that are kept on file.

PLANETS IN JANUARY, 1894.—The Moon is near Mars on the 3rd, passes Mercury on the 5th, and Venus on the 10th. Venus is at "Greatest Brilliance" on the 10th. Saturn is at Quadrature (overhead at 6 mo.) on the 14th. The Moon is near Jupiter on the 16th, passes Saturn on the 27th, and Uranus on the 29th. Mercury is at Conjunction with the Sun (Superior) on the 29th, at 7h. mo.

NOTE.—The third column gives the Moon's place in the "Signs," the cross heads give the Planets' places, "Jupiter in Taurus," etc., which denote the "Constellations."

PLANETS IN FEBRUARY, 1894.—The Moon is near Mars on the 1st. Saturn is stationary among the stars on the 3rd, and Uranus in Quadrature (overhead at 6 morn.) the same day. Venus is in Perihelion on the 5th. The Moon is close to Mercury and Venus on the 6th, the two latter being in Conjunction on the 9th. On the 11th Jupiter is in Quadrature (overhead at 6 ev.) He is near Mars on the 15th. Venus is in Inferior Conjunction with the Sun on the 16th, when she becomes a "Morning Star." The Moon is near Saturn on the 23rd, and Mercury at Greatest Elongation East on the 26th, when he is visible in the West after sunset.

TURKISH DYES DO NOT SMUT.

he took no account except in the matter of appetite, he looked upon as a personal affront. When the remnants had been rescued, the old lady said, "John, take away this rabbit pie for Mr. Holdam and eat it." John obeyed only too gladly, and quietly disposed of the pie in the way to give most pleasure to himself. It was not long before Mr. Oldham came in, and his good wife discoursed to him of the virtues of the pie and the difficulty she had found in keeping a little for him "just to taste." Then she rang the bell and John came in, looking as pleased and full and innocent as the family cat after it has disposed of the pet canary. "John, bring in the pie," said Mrs. Oldham in a dignified tone. "I can't, madam," was his reply. "I ate it." "What!" she exclaimed in great indignation, "you heat it. I didn't tell you to heat it; I told you to 'eat it.'" Which all goes to show how important a letter is sometimes.

But this is a very long way from my dyeing class.

Messrs. Brayley, Sons & Co. for several years, as you all should know, have been accustomed to give prizes at several county fairs for the best specimens of dyeing from the Turkish dyes. One of these prizes I won. Now who I am is no particular difference to you, and I am not open to cross-examination. Let me simply say that the exhibits in my county were first-class, but I got in a little ahead merely because, I think, my exhibit was the most artistically arranged. But it so happened that I was the only exhibitor from my end of the county.

When the ladies of my neighborhood saw what I had done, and how beautiful the colors looked, and found that I made things last almost twice as long by dyeing them when they become soiled and faded, they came to me and asked me to teach them.

They wouldn't believe that I had learned the whole thing from the book, "How to Dye well," which accompanies every package of dyes, and I had to give in to them. Anyway it struck me that it would enable us to pass some long winter nights profitably during the winter, and perhaps teach some who wouldn't learn in any other way.

Mrs. Simpson was the wife of one of the school trustees, and Mrs. Jones was the wife of another. Mrs. Hard and Mrs. Smith were the wives of two general store-keepers, and Miss Tompkins and

Mrs. Andrews and Miss Struthers were the wife and daughters of farmers. Well, these were the people who were tormenting me the most, and I got them together and I said: "Now you, Mrs. Simpson and Mrs. Jones, you get your husbands to let us have the new brick School-house to do what we want with it; and you, Mrs. Hard and Mrs. Smith, get your husbands to give us candles, and faded clothes and Turkish dyes—no other will do, mind; and you, Miss Tompkins, Mrs. Andrews and Miss Struthers, you bring some yarn of your own spinning, and all of you bring all your friends every Friday night in December, at 8 o'clock, except Christmas week, and we will have a dyeing class."

They promised, and, what is much better, they did.

The first Friday the school-room was full of women and men and children. That school-house never had such an interested class before.

That day I had put a granite or agate kettle on the square box stove, and had washed and sorted the things which had been brought me to dye. They consisted of shop worn and faded stockings, some flannels of good quality and poor color, an old coat which had been ripped all ready to use, a cotton dress, and a few odds and ends, some of which I will mention later on.

I must confess that I was a little taken back when I stood up to face all these people. There was the minister and his wife, and I was afraid that he would mark all my grammatical errors. I felt so anxious to creep out of the whole business, that I almost made up my mind to call on him to open the meeting with prayer and slide out when he had his eyes shut. But I comforted myself with the fact that I knew more about dyeing—with an e—than he did. Then there were the Blaisdell girls, who used to turn up their noses at home-made things; but their father's business got a set-back that very winter and they had to buckle to themselves, and they did it like the plucky, good-hearted girls they were at the core, and I honor them for it. And there was—, but I haven't time to tell you about everybody who was there.

Well, I got my breath and began to talk something like this:

wool or silk. Navy blue, scarlet, yellow, orange, brown, blue, heron gray, cardinal, red and black Turkish dyes for cotton are especially fine, and contain about all that anybody wants for this purpose. For cotton or silk you can get any and every shade you like. Be careful, I repeat, and see that the Turkish Dyes you want for cotton have cotton marked on them, and those for wool are so marked. Now, I have cleansed these garments by washing in boiling water, in which I have placed borax. It can be used in either cold or warm water. I prefer the borax, it cannot do the garments any harm, and it is cheap. These are three first-class characteristics. After cleansing, I was very particular to rinse the articles out well, so that nothing adhered to them. I did not use any soap. This can be used after drying, but not before.

This vessel I have on the stove to dye in is of agate ware. This is undoubtedly the best, but a new tin one in which there is no iron exposed would do. You will notice that it is not very large. The smaller it is, as long as it answers the purpose, the better, and it does not require so much dye.

I want to make this dress a dark brown, and therefore I let the liquor boil for eighteen minutes before I put the garment in it. If I were wanting to dye it a light color I would let it boil but ten minutes, but heavy or dark colors require from five to ten minutes longer. I was very careful to thoroughly mix the dye liquor so that the article would not be dyed in streaks, which does not add to its beauty. However, with the Turkish Dyes there is little trouble in this respect, as they dissolve very quickly, easily and evenly.

Now the liquor is well boiled, and I will let it cool off a little till I can put my hand into it. Now I put in the garment. I want it to match this piece of ribbon in my hand. Brown is a peculiar color, composed of blue, yellow and red; while blue and yellow alone make green. As I lift the garment out a few moments after I immersed it, you will notice that it has taken up the blue and yellow first, making a green—and not a bad green either. But it is a brown I want, so I place it in again. By rights I shouldn't have taken it out, but I wanted to illustrate an interesting point in coloring. Now it is in again. The red in the dye is showing, and the brown appears. You will notice that the maker of the Turkish

Dyes has made these combinations in the dye itself. I simply buy the shade I want and place the responsibility of the combination on him. He can stand it. As the brown I want is a dark one, it will take a little time to take on the full color. I am particular, you notice, to keep the garment covered with the liquid. If I did not, the portion which is not fully covered will not take on the full shade. Now I snip off a piece of the garment and wash it, and compare with my ribbon. It is not quite dark enough yet, so I continue to boil. Now another test; the ribbon and the garment are the same, and I lift the dress out.

Now that the garment has been dyed, being a dark brown, I do not immediately wash it as I would if it were any color except dark brown or black; but I cover it to keep in the heat the moment I have taken it from the liquor. This will enable it to take on a darker color. Now it is cool, and being dyed in Turkish Dyes, I do not hesitate to use soap to wash it. The color is indelible, and you see that it is even, rich and bright. Nothing could be better.

Now, shall I throw the water away? No. Here is a faded child's dress, almost white when new. I will put it in the liquor again. Now I wash it immediately it is out. Here it is, a beautiful drab. This is an experiment which requires practice, and it generally pays to use only the liquor once and make it new for each color.

Here are some stockings of all shades and sizes. I want to make them black. This is the most difficult thing in dyeing, and a few years ago it was considered impossible to get a perfectly satisfactory result. Let us try. I have prepared the liquor as previously. Now I boil; now I cover; now I wash. Take them in your hands. Don't be afraid! They won't smut. You might play ball or tennis with them, or pitch hay with them on when the thermometer is ninety in the shade, and the color would not come off. This is peculiar to the Turkish Dyes.

Then I took some pieces of wood and stained them cherry, mahogany, maple, and other colors with the Turkish Dyes; made varnish, ink, laundry bluing, kalsomine and leather dressing with them, and did so many things that the audience grew excited; and as each use of the Turkish Dyes was illustrated they cheered and cheered until I was glad that it was the new school-house we were in and not

the old one, as the roof might not have stood it.

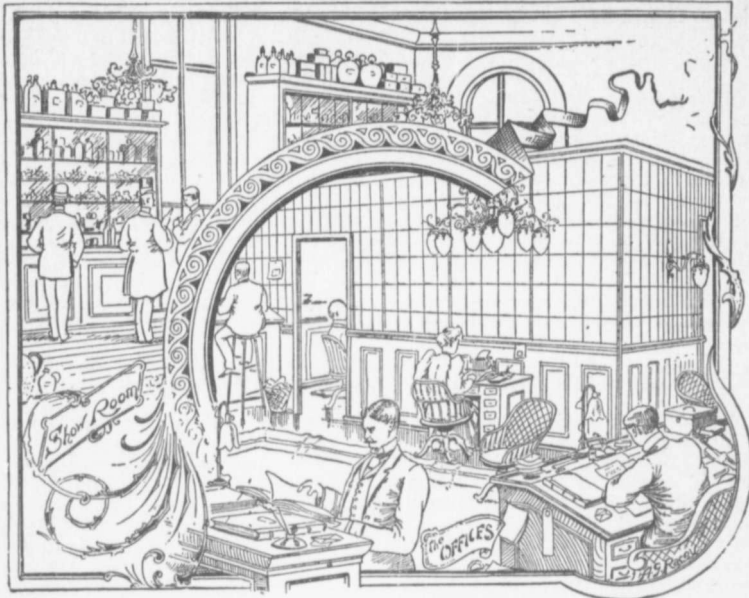

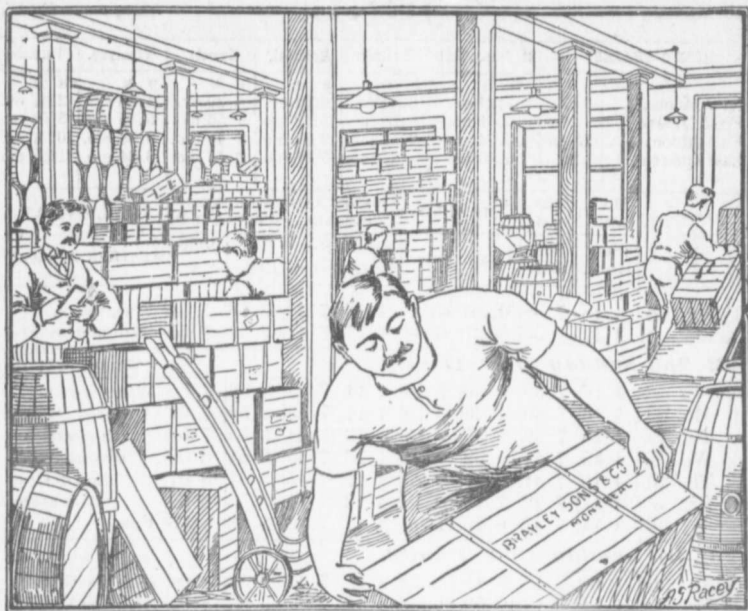
