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



MR. EMERSON'S APPOINTMENT

MR. C. EMERSON, M.H.A., was

vesterday appointed Registrar of the Supreme Court. The position has been vacant for about eighteen months. Mr. Emerson considered himself entitled to this position and has insistently insisted upon getting it. The Premher in reply to Mr. Coaker's questions in the House the past ses sion, relative to filling this vacancy, said it would be filled when the House closed. The public therefore expected Mr. Emerson's appointment.

The position is worth \$5000.00 a year and is from a financial point of view equal to the Chief Justice's salary.

The appointment for some un explained mystery has been made acting. That means that the Premier has again descended to use this high position for political purposes and in spite of Mr. Emerson drawing a salary of \$5000 and occupying a high position in the Supreme Court, that he is taking just as large a part in political matters as he did before the appointment. He will remain a member of the Executive Council and House of Assembly, contrary to all rules of decency and morality.

Will the Judges of the Supreme Court tolerate such political trickery, if so, the people will surely note it and it will not be conductive of that high standard of confidence and esteem with which the people should always regard the Supreme Court officials. Will the Judges of the Supreme Court tolerate such political expediency? If the country possess a Government so dead to all sense of dignity and honor as to appoint a

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
