BRITISH ADVANCE ANOTHER NOTCH AND FRENCH HOLD GAINS ON SOMME AND AT VERDUN

Have Abandoned Positions on Isonzo

DEFENSIVE POSITIONS OF ISONZO

Only the Beginning of a New Campaign Which Will Have Important Results---Gorizia, Long Fought For, Almost in Italy's Hands

Bulletin, London, Aug. 9 .- 3.15 p.m. - The Austrians, pursued by Italian cavalry have abandoned nearly all their principal positions on the Isonzo and Carso fronts, following the taking of the Gorizia bridgehead by the Italians, according to a wireless despatch from . Rome this afternoon.

Only the Beginning Rome, Aug. 9, via Paris.—The successes won by the Italians on the Isonzo front are regarded in Rome as marking merely the beginning of the campaign. Although the news is received with great satisfaction, it has been long expected and no surprise is expresed, nor have their been any unusual public demonstrations. The attack was to have been inaugurated earlier in the summer, but was delayed by the Austrian offensibe.

"At last our waiting, planning and steadfast faith are bearing fruit," says the Giornale y'Italia.

Austria's Equipment Poor. London, Aug. 9 .- (New York Times cable) -A dispatch to The London Times from Italian headquarters says:

"The Austrian prisoners whom I have seen, were made up of satiwart youths and men over 40. There seemed to be none between. Drank Camels' Blood to Quench Their Thirst

Terrible Hardships Endured by Turkish Troops in Their Advance Across the Desert to Suez.

London, Aug. 9.-The Turkish army which was routed by the British at Romani, east of the Suez Canal, suffered terrible hardships in their march across the desert, according to a Reuter's Cairo despatch quoting stories of Turkish prisoners. The despatch says that batches of prisoners continue to arrive in Cairo.

Lack of water was one of the principal causes of the suffering of the Turkish troops. In some cases they suffered so frightfully from thirst that they killed their animals and drank the blood. The prisoners say the Turkish losses were exceedingly heavy as

they attacked in mass formation in ignorance of the strong defences of the British. The devastating machine gun fire with which the assault was met was the first indication the privates had of the task that confronted them. According to one of the troopers, a Turkish detachment which surrendered first killed their German officers.
