Heavy Fines

Within the last few weeks the Temperance people of the province have been taking most aggressive action against all forms of violation of the Local Option law, and the result has been the imposition of some heavy fines. Last week's pioneer records a few.

In Northern Ontario 27 convictions for illegal sale were secured in one week and the fines imposed amounted to \$3,050.

A Galt man, representing a brewery, kept a supply of liquor in a Local Option municipality and was fined \$106.

A man was convicted of keeping liquor for sale at a roadhouse near Hamilton and was fined \$500. A grocer of that city, for the same offence, was fined \$100.

J. W. Trowsdall, Sydenham, was fined \$20.00 and costs or thirty days in jail for being intoxicated in a Local Option municipality, under new law.

From the amount of these fines it is fair to infer that the old moral suasion fine of \$2 and costs is being abandoned and that instead the educative power of heavy penalties is being tried.

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



Killing the Dandelions

There are two ways of opening the campaign against the dandelions this spring. One is to cut them out by hand and the other and more modern method is to spray the weeds with copperas, iron sulphate. If you cut the plants out by hand it is necessary to cut well below the crown with a long sharp knife. It is claimed by weed experts that the weeds do not propagate from the roots so much as from the crown. To use the iron sulphate, or copperas, dissolve one and one fourth pounds of it to a gallon of water, and apply it to the lawn with a spray pump. Cover the lawn thoroughly. There will be no injury to the grass. Repeat the operation two or three times at intervals of a couple of weeks.
