Ballooning.

As a scientist, and almost a martyr to his zeal, Count Zeppelin will receive universal sympathy in the misfortune which has overtaken him in the destruction of his Balloon No. 4. He has devoted the best years of his life, and the whole of his private fortune, to his experiments with dirigible airships, and he certainly would seem to deserve better luck than has attended his recent endeavors.

While France has given attention to aeroplanes and similar heavier-than-air machines, Germany has pinned its faith to the balloon. And Count Zeppelin has done more than any other living man to render the balloon a valuable adjunct to armies in the field. From the scientific standpoint his efforts have been extremely interesting. Finding, as others before him have found, that large balloons were liable to become unmanageable, and were very susceptible to injury, because of the exterior wind and interior gas changing locality of pressure and distorting the reservoir—causing it to bulge in some places and contract in others—he employed a mental shield to keep the cloth in place. His airship, therefore, consists of a huge cigar-shaped vessel of aluminum, containing either one large or several small cloth balloons, by which the desired degree of levity is obtained. Backed by the German government, he has proceeded so far in this direction that he may be said to have scored a real success. Before Balloon No. 4 succumbed to a stroke of lightning, it had almost fulfilled excessively exacting requirements and had fully proven the practicability of the principles employed.

Interesting, however, as were Zeppelin's experiments from the purely scientific standpoint, it is almost ludicrous to see the manner in which his misfortunes have been received by the German people. They seem to have built high hopes on the "supremacy of the air" which he was to attain for them, as an offset to the undoubted supremacy of the sea maintained by Great Britain much to Germany's chagrin. National pride seems to have been touched. Much more than sympathy with an inventor and disappointment over a scientific defeat was behind the tears of German women and even German men when the truth dawned upon them. Patriotic aspiration should find something more substantial to exult over than shells lighter than air—lighter than the baseless fabric of a vision—apt one moment to be disabled by a wind-thrust against a shed, or another moment to go up in smoke at the touch of an electric tongue. Vaulting ambition may not yet overleap the clouds.

Town Council.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held on Thursday evening of last week with the Mayor and all Councillors present.

Reports were presented by the Streets, Police and Finance Committees.

The committee on electric lighting reported that they had secured the services of Mr. E. M. Archibald, electrical engineer, to examine the Gaspereau and Black Rivers with the view of ascertaining the available water power within reasonable distance of the town.

The town clerk presented a petition asking for two months' vacation, beginning early in September. This was referred to the Mayor and Finance Committee.

A largely signed petition of rate payers was presented asking that the resolution of June 3rd, restricting the use of the school grounds as playground, be reconsidered and that the school grounds be restored to the free use of the children of the town; and it was resolved that in compliance with the wish of the ratepayers as expressed in the petition in reference to the school ground that we reconsider the motion passed on June 3rd.

Saskatchewan.

To-day is election day in the province of Saskatchewan, and the excuses for plunging that new province into an election on three weeks' notice have been many and have been added to as the necessity occurred.

The fact remains that Premier Scott himself announced in the legislature that there would be another session before an election, and that immediately after his visit to Ottawa, whether he had been summoned to take orders from his masters, he announced a dissolution that not only the conservatives of the province, but the liberals as well, were taken by surprise, and that only one real motive can be discerned—a strong desire on the part of Sir Wilfred Laurier to win an apparent victory in at least one province, which he thinks he holds in the hollow of his hand, after his sudden decision to dissolve the Dominion parliament upon learning of the monster wheat crop—a natural development which is to give him a fresh opportunity to pose as the author of all prosperity. Though taken unawares, Mr. Haultain has had candidates placed in the field, and announced his policy. That policy is no less than a reversal of the results of the conspiracy by which Saskatchewan was deprived of its heritage—the government lands, and a school system was forced upon the people in harmony with the ideas of the papal ablegate at Ottawa, rather than in conformity with western and modern advancement.

If the election of two and a half years ago had been a fair one, it would doubtless have been Mr. Haultain and not Mr. Scott who would have been Premier.

Saskatchewan has been swarming with federal officials. Land inspectors, homestead agents, immigration employes, and camp followers of every sort have been at work among recent settlers and foreigners. It stands to reason and is obvious that settlers who have had dealings with Ottawa in homestead matters will be much under the influence of federal officials. Tricks of all kinds have not been wanting to hoodwink the hordes of ignorant Europeans. If a fraud was necessary to turn the scale in favor of the Dominion government, for it is really that government much more than the provincial that is anxiously bidding the event, Mr. Leach, the hero of the "thin red line" fame has been on the ground in full command, with Sifton as his master in the west, Oliver having refused to mix in the wretched business.

Mr. Haultain has found much to cheer him. Many liberals resent the domination of the Ottawa machine. Many of them now realize the true meaning of the conspiracy of three years ago. The seceder of Mr. Haultain's nomination was a liberal. Premier Scott abandoned his seat and is taking refuge in one deemed safe at Swift Current, where the electors are almost to a man, French Canadian. Attorney-General Turgeon likewise has fled from Prince Albert, and gone to Duck Lake, another purely French Canadian hive.

All in all the outlook is not altogether dark and forbidding for the Haultain party, but the chances are four to one against them so far as machine methods could provide.
