

A DELICATE POINT OF LAW.

A delicate point of law was to-day suggested here by a gentleman deep in legal lore. This suggestion was not the outgrowth of any personal interest, but is the outcome of careful perusal of the statute under which kemmler has been sentenced, and of the form of the sentence that directs Kemmler shall be killed in the week beginning Monday, Aug. 4. Here is the point raised: That the week beginning Monday, Aug. 4. Here is the point raised: That the week beginning Aug. 4 ends with Sunday. The warden has arbitrary power to defer the execution until Sunday, Aug. 1). On Sunday it is held that the general law would intervene to prevent the killing on that day upon the ground that any execution of legal rocesses upon Sunday is not legal.

Directly at this point the case is touched by that general principal of law that, if the sentence under which Kemmler is expected to be killed is void in part, it must be wholly void. Brought to a close application the assumption is that if it is illegal to kill Kemmler on the seventh day of the veek designated, then it would be itlegal to kill him on any other day of the week designated. The situation, it is held, would be different if Sunday intervened as part of the seven days.
