



### SO MANY PEOPLE U. S. RAILWAYS **ORDER BRITISH COAL** ARE NERVOUS

One United States railway has orlered 1,000,000 tons of coal from Eng and, and other railways have also placed heavy orders. A British coal firm's representative stated that U. S. railroads and dealers and brokers vere rushing into the British market with huge orders. This was causing the price to harden. The unfilled United States orders for Welsh anthracite now amount to about one and a half million tons.

### Stumpage Rates **Reduced By The Provincial Gov't**.

Announcement was made in conection with the meeting of the pro vincial government, that a temporary reduction in the rate of stump age on timber cut on Crown lands, had been made for the current year ending Aug. 1, 1923. Hon. C. W. Robinson, Minister of Lands and Mines, announced the rates as follows: spruce, pine, etc., \$4 per 1,000 feet reduced from \$5; fir \$3, reduced from \$4; railroad ties, 12 cents, re duced from 17 cents; spoolwood and hardwood logs remain as before. \$2 and \$1.25. Spruce bud-worm killed timber and fire killed timber will have a half rate. It was emphasiz ed that this reduction in the case of stumpage was not a permanent one. The expectation is that the value of timber will increase with an improved market.

It was announced that there will be an open season for partridge, from October 1 to October 31, inclusive. Premier Foster said that it had been called to his attention that, last year, the law forbidding the sale of partridge had been quite generally violated. It was the intention to enforce the law rigidly this year, and violators will be prosecuted

## MEDICAL INSPECTION **AFTER SEPT.** 1

Province Divided Into Six Districts---Appointment of **Inspectors** Not Yet Announced

Hon. W. F. Roberts Minister of Health has announced that the Executive Committee of the International Health Board through which the Rockfeller Foundation functions, on the 14th inst adopted a resolution providing \$27,000 a year for two years beginning September 1st for rural health program in New Bruns wick. This will provide for fulltime medical inspection in schools The Minister stated in view of that fact it was expected to put the system of medical inspection in schools in operation about September 1st.

**District** Formed

The provincial government at its session which closed Tuesday night passed the regulations which are necessary in that connection. The appointments of the inspectors are not yet completed but the province has been divided into six districts as follows:-

No. 1. Madawaska, Restigouche and Gloucester with headquarters at Campbellton.

No. 2, Northumberland, Kent and Westmorland, less Moncton City with headquarters at Newcastle or Moncton.

No. 3, Cities of Moncton and Fredericton and towa of St. Stephen with headquarters at Fredericton.

No. 4. Charlotte, less St. Stephen King's Queen's and Albert with headquarters at Hampton or Sussex No. 5, Victoria Carleton, York &

Sunbury, with headquarters at Fredericton or Woodstock. No. 6, St. John City and County, with headquarters at St. John City.




