The Health of the City

Yesterday we quoted part of the Health, which showed the deplorable ondition of the health of the city, even as compared with the rest of the Island. For years we have been directing attention to this lamentable state of affairs. With all its natural advantages, St. John's death rate is abnormal as compared with the cities of the Empire. In addition to the regular inroads of consumption, &c., we are subject to periodic outbreaks f dirt diseases. Witness the typhus, notice that Dr. Sinclair Tait, who holds a Diploma of Public Health. this morning publishes a letter in the Daily News on the City's Health. In it he says, with the force and truth which the least observant cannot fail

to see and confirm: agreeable and disgusting kind.

My two first visits this morning were to Rossiter's Lane and the foot of Pleasant Street. In poth places, diphtheria was present, threee in number, and all of a virulent type. Largely for the purpose of inspection Cabot St., down Goodview, through Wickford and Moore, and finally down James' Street to Duckworth Street. In everyone of these streets it was almost impossible to get along without treading on night soil, and filth and dirt of all kinds. I witnessed hens pools; dogs and cats rumaging among refuse; children playing with shovel and slide amidst the most loathsome surroundings. 




