The Health of the City.

Yesterday we quoted part of the Report of the Commission of Public Health, which showed the deplorable condition of the health of the city, even as compared with the rest of the island. For years we have been directing attention to this lamentable state of affairs. With all its natural advantages, St. John's death rate is abnormal as compared with the cities of the Empire. In addition to the regular inroads of consumption, &c., we are subject to periodic outbreaks of dirt diseases. Witness the typhus, typhoid and diphtheria outbreaks of the present winter. We are glad to notice that Dr. Sinclair Tait, who holds a Diploma of Public Health, this morning publishes a letter in the Daily News on the City's Health. In it he says, with the force and truth which the least observant cannot fail to see and confirm:

"However, whatever views we may entertain we have the evidence of all our senses that the city to-day is in a most dangerous condition. Go where we will, and this of the most disagreeable and disgusting kind. My two first visits this morning were to Rossiter's Lane and the foot of Pleasant Street. In both places, diphtheria was present, three in number, and all of a virulent type. Largely for the purpose of inspection, I continued my way across Central Street, down Cuddihy St., through Colner's Lane, up Lime Street over Cabot St., down Goodview, through Wickford and Moore, and finally down James' Street to Duckworth Street. In everyone of these streets it was almost impossible to get along without treading on night soil, and filth and dirt of all kinds. I witnessed hens scratching upon the margin of cess-pools; dogs and cats rumaging among refuse; children playing with shovel and slide amidst the most loathsome surroundings. Some of these children I saw fall from their little waggon or slide and roll over and over in filthy gutters, their clothes becoming

saturated with abnormal matter. In one and all of these streets was witnessed anywhere and everywhere refuse of the worse kind—decayed and decaying vegetables, old shoes, tin cans, ashes, and—worse of all, night soil in every stage of decomposition. On the margin of every hill-slope were cartloads of putrid material, while down every street and over these ramparts ran streams of polluted water. These continuing down the declivity baptized hundreds of homes, around and beneath which it trickled and proceeded on its way to the lower levels."

He is bringing up to date the warnings given by "Reform" in his telling articles and adding to them the voice of one who speaks with authority and of what he sees daily and fears hourly.

Inspected City Thoroughfares.

His Excellency Sir Ralph Williams, accompanied by Acting Mayor Martin, Dr. Tait and Secretary J. L. Slattery, of the City Council, took a walk this morning through the western part of the city. Starting from James Street they went through Cabot, Goodview, Central, Brazil and Lime Streets. They entered some of the residences in each street and saw for themselves the condition of the thoroughfares visited and of some of the families who reside on them. There was found a good deal of ashes, &c., on the streets and declivities which had been placed there during the winter to enable people to go over the ice-covered streets, but there was not in evidence as much refuse and dirt as might be expected at this season of the year. In an interview which the Telegram had with Mr. Slattery, he stated that the streets were nothing worse this year at this season than others. After last night's meeting of the Council it was determined to put on a large gang of men to clean up the city streets.

MAKING GOOD RUN.—The barquentine Olinda passed Cape Race at 2.30 this morning. She is from Barbados and is making a quick run, being out only 16 days.

The Prospero passed Cape Race bound west, at 8.35 this morning. She was evidently in port all night out of the storm on the Southern Shore.

This Morning's Fire.

A fire broke out at Mrs. Nell Carrigan's flat over Hogan's grocery store, New Gower Street, at 8.30 this morning. Mrs. Carrigan occupied the third flat, and fire falling from the stove of the cooking room there after she had gone out to work burnt through the floor. She banked the fire down and believed that there would be no danger. Another woman who occupies a room there with her, saw the bed-room filling with smoke, got up and cleared out. She told the neighbors that the flat was on fire and some one went to box 32 and sent in an alarm. The Central and West End firemen responded. The latter got their hose ready and put out the fire in ten minutes. A large hole was burned in the floor, big enough for a man to get through. The furniture, both of that room and the one underneath, was a good deal injured by water, and even some of the goods in the grocery on the ground flat were spoiled by the water coming down. There was a small room off Mrs. Carrigan's bedroom which she used as a henery. Ten or a dozen hens there were found dead—suffocated by the smoke.

Stella Maris Here.

The s.s. Stella Maris arrived here at 12.30 p.m. to-day from the north. Capt. W. Winsor stayed off at Westville on account of the death of his child, and Edgar Hann, the mate, took charge. The Stella Maris entered all the usual ports of call except Twillingate, Fogo and Change Islands. Those harbors were filled with ice and the mails had to be sent ashore from the offing. Except this harbor ice in several places the three great bays of Trinity, Bonavista and Notre Dame are free to navigation, and there is no sign of the drift ice. The Stella Maris brought 44 passengers. Those in saloon were: A. Green, Alex. March, Chas. Snelgrove, F. C. Somerton, Miss M. Brown, Miss Minnie Brown and 27 in steerage.

Larceny at Bell Island.

This morning, Const. Tucker and Crocker arrived here from Broad Cove with a man named Geo. Jennings, who is accused of entering the shack of a man named Bryan, of Bell Island, a few night ago and stealing therefrom 4 quilts, 6 plates, 6 knives, 6 forks, an oil can and other articles, valued at \$10. The officers went out last night and arrested him at his house. They had a hard time driving in and out over the road. Jennings was taken to Portugal Cove to-day and will go to the island to stand his trial.

Glencoe's Movements.

The s.s. Glencoe, now on the Bruce route, was unable to get into Port aux Basques on her arrival from Louisbourg with the mails and passengers last evening because the harbor was filled with ice. She came east and put up at Dublin Cove till daylight this morning, when the captain left to try again to get into Port aux Basques. The ice was moving out there at noon, and she will likely be able to get to the pier this evening. When she leaves Louisbourg next trip she will come on direct to St. John's and will be ready to leave here again Tuesday night with the mails and passengers for Louisbourg.

Premier Visiting Burin District.

Sir Edward Morris left this morning for Placentia, where he will join the S. S. Fiona and visit Grand Bank and Fortune. According to the Daily News, he will also visit other leading settlements in the Burin Electoral District. No one will, of course, doubt his visit through the district has reference to the vacancy which now exists, owing to the lamentable death of the late Mr. Edward Davey. It is somewhat strange, however, that Sir Edward should have selected April 1st for opening his campaign.

Sick People Arrive.

Five patients for hospital came here from the north by the S. S. Stella Maris to-day, viz., a boy named March, from Old Perlican, with spinal disease; a man named Garrett from Bay-de-Verde, with tuberculosis; Humphries, from Cape Freels, with his arm in a sling; and Hickley, from Newtown, in consumption. Messrs. Crosbie and Whiteway, M. H. A.'s, and then sent on to the Hospital in carriages.

Fell on the Street.

Mr. Geo. Bartlett, 90 years of age, fell on the ice on Springdale Street last evening. He was seriously injured in the leg, and was unable to rise, and had to be assisted to his feet. Mr. J. H. Monroe came along and very kindly put his carriage at Mr. Bartlett's disposal to have him taken to his home.

Marine Notes.

The Olinda arrived from Barbados to-day, 19 days out, to Steer Bros. with molasses.
The Water Witch, Moore, arrived at Bahia yesterday, 41 days out from St. John's with fish for Crosbie & Co.
Mr. James Grieve, of Greenock, Scotland, arrived here by the Rosalind to-day and will in future be attached to the staff of Balne Johnston & Co's office.



Municipal Council.

The City Council met last night at 7.30. Deputy Mayor Martin presided in his usual able manner.

A long discussion occurred over the dirty condition of the streets.

Councillor Mullaly.—He did not believe that the Council was getting the best value for the money spent in cleaning the streets of snow and opening the drains.

Deputy Mayor did not agree with him and thought that the Council was doing the best possible under the circumstances.

Councillor Myrick said that the money referred to by Councillor Mullaly had been spent in clearing the ice from the drains and gullies, and Councillor Mullaly did not understand the subject when he talked of cleaning the streets.

Councillor Mullaly replied that on one or two streets had been given particular attention, and in other streets people's cellars were flooded with water. He thought that the most necessary work should be done first and that the Council should get as good value for the money as a private employer. He himself, had asked to have several gullies and drains attended to, but nothing had been done.

Deputy Mayor Martin confronted him on this statement by reminding him that what he (Councillor Mullaly) had asked him to have performed had in every case been attended to.

In reference to the complaint made about dirty snow deposited by the R. N. Co. near the C. of E. Rectory, the E. N. Co. wrote to say that they had been given permission by the Engineer to put the snow there where there also had deposited snow.

A complaint was sent in by Hon. D. Morrison on behalf of residents of Renie's Mill Road. They said that rubbish and bad smelling offal was being dumped on the north side of Renie's River. He also sent in a letter from Supt. Sullivan, Dr. Brehm and others on the same subject. The Sanitary Supt. asked about it said that the statements of the complaints were exaggerated. The Council decided to stop throwing rubbish there.

As a result of complaint of the R. N. Co. the Council will remove the truck crusher to Flavin Street.

T. J. Roach sent in a complaint about Cove Road. Council cannot grant request owing to the cost.

Tenders for stone blocks were received from Burridge, Kelly and N. Murphy. Burridge's tender offered to supply the stone for 7½ cents, and it was the lowest and therefore accepted.

The Engineer reported that the money spent the past winter in emergency work would leave very little for employing men the coming season. He also informed the Council that horses had gone over Twenty Mile Pond recently.

The Health Officer called attention to the dump on Water Street West, near the Railway Station. He thought that the throwing of garbage there should be stopped. His report showed ten new cases of diphtheria the past week, one typhoid, one typhoid death and one scarlet fever. In the city up to Thursday last there were 28 cases of diphtheria, two of typhoid and five of scarlet fever.

Councillor Myrick proposed that the sanitary staff be sent out to clean up the streets to-day, and that the iron carts be used to take away the garbage and sweepings. The motion was carried unanimously.

A consultation about the fitting of the City Hall was held with Architect Barter.

After passing pay rolls the meeting adjourned at 9 o'clock.

B. I. S. Debate.

The weekly debate held by the B.I.S. L. & A. boys last night was on the question "Should the Government subsidize local manufacturers despite their costing the consumer more than the previous price of the imported article?" Messrs. T. P. Hally, J. I. Walsh and J. McKenle spoke for the affirmative, and Messrs. E. L. Carter, J. Darcey and M. Keah argued for the negative. General discussion followed in which Messrs. J. P. Crotty, J. Dee, W. J. Mahoney, J. Keough, J. Campbell, J. Foley and J. M. Devin took part. A vote being taken the affirmative side was found to have won. Mr. J. C. Pippy, the Chairman announced that next Friday night Mr. J. M. Devine would read a paper on the "Unthinking Crowd."

BERLIN, March 31. The Reichstag, by a large majority, rejected the Socialist motion calling upon the Government to take immediate steps leading towards an international agreement concerning universal limitation of armaments and the abolition of the right of capture at sea.

LONDON, March 31. The King's Bench division to-day awarded \$200 damages to former Inspector Dew of Scotland Yard, in a libel suit brought by him against the Darby Chronicle, in connection with the Crippen murder case. The alleged libel was contained in a cable despatch to the Chronicle from Quebec in which it was asserted that Dew had informed the correspondent that Dr. Crippen had confessed.

EL PASO, March 31.

The bloodiest battle of the Mexican Revolution is reported to be still raging around the town of Ures in the State of Sonora. A thousand have already been killed, and the town of Ures has fallen into the hands of the revolutionists. The nearby town of San Rafael has been sacked and destroyed. The federal troops are encamped about Ures and a long battle is being fought, both sides awaiting reinforcements. The insurgents entrapped 20 federals in the Municipal building of Ures. They poured a galling fire into the structure, killing all. The regulars fought gallantly to death. By forced marches the insurgents surprised the regular troops, and a hand to hand battle in the streets of the town ensued.

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Ice Impedes Glencoe.

The S. S. Glencoe arrived at Dublin's Cove at 6 p.m. yesterday from Louisburg, as Fort aux Basques is blocked with ice. She left Louisburg at 11.30 a.m. Thursday for Port aux Basques but could not enter there, and Capt Spracklin determined to run around to Dublin's Cove and remain until the blockade is raised, when she will go to her destination.

Damages estimated in thousands, one side of beacon carried away. Will require rebuilding or extensive repairs. Lantern intact and light could be kept going by temporarily stopping openings. Every available man engaged repairing vessels."

The Bell Island Ice Blockade.

And we are still existing after the ice blockade, which was the worst for fully 15 years.

The average reader of the Telegram is fully aware of the hardships of the winter just passed. He has experienced his share of it in one form or another, but to none has the winter of 1911 been such a hardship as to the miner at Wabana Mine on Bell Island.

On the 10th of February the heavy Arctic ice drifted in the bay and remained in blocking the Tickle till about the 14th March. During this period an odd chance offered whereby communication was opened with the mainland, but only temporarily, the ice always closing in after a few hours. During this blockade several well known citizens were blockaded in town, amongst them being the manager of the D. L. & S. Co., and the Bell Island Postmaster, with many others. The experiences related from

the hardships endured are interesting. At one time several were ice-bound in Spaniard's Bay, others at Kelligrews, more at Portugal Cove, and the wise element in St. John's, all awaiting an opportunity to get to Bell Island from these points. It ended that eventually all embarked from the Cove, some walking across when the chance offered, taking two hours to cover the distance; some rowing across when no steamer was available, and others getting across snugly on board our "royal" mail steamer or the staunch ship Mary.

At one time on Bell Island provisions were getting short, and were it not for the arrival of the Mary from St. John's round the back of the Island while the Tickle was blocked, things would have been gloomy. Fresh meat was a scarce commodity, and flour was verily the staff of life. The men got back to the companies, merchants and inhabitants in the delays thus caused in the mail service was severe, but Providence had intervened and all had to take things good naturedly.

The steamers also fared unluckily. The Euphrates and Progress being jammed in Spaniard's Bay a week while the former on another occasion was welded in the ice and carried as far as Bauline, where she was jammed nearly a week, the s.s. Adventure having to come to her rescue.

It is all over now and we can afford to write and talk of the experience. The writer has had his share of it and doesn't fail to say so. To most of us who can term ourselves "The Wabana blockade runners" the hardships endured on the catamaran drives over that familiar Cove Road are fresh in our memory. The scene of that white wilderness of ice stretching from Kelligrews to Bell Island, again from Portugal Cove to Bell Island; and often the scene of the whole bay presenting 26 miles of white northern scenery (with only one "Polar bear") still lingers within us.

In view of the foregoing attempt at a description of an ice-blockade in Newfoundland, we can easily understand why foreigners know our native land as "a land of ice." We also know why Newfoundlanders are so hardy and daring, and are a race justly remarkable for braving the elements. EUREKA. Wabana, Bell Island, March, 1911.

Bay De Verde Branch Railway.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir, Editor.—As we read in your paper a year ago the reported speeches of our representatives for Bay De Verde on the subject of branch lines, and noted the intense enthusiasm manifested by our members for such a branch line for the North Shore, we began to hope that this much neglected district was going to receive some recognition at the hands of the Government. We had looked through the district and failed to find a Government owned post office either in the larger towns or smaller villages. Not a single court house, although a Stipendiary Magistrate and constable are located in the district. An old store in Western Bay, worth say \$15 or \$20, is really all the public property the Government owns in the district. If I am wrong I am open to correction. This is no reflection upon our present representatives. When we heard that the "iron horse" would soon be snorting from Freshwater to Old Perlican we had begun "to build castles in the air" and to recount multifarious revolutionizing tendencies of this modern civilization; and we had dreams of better times for the thrifty and industrious 12,000 inhabitants of the Bay de Verde District. But alas!

Our Hopes Were Doomed, when a few days ago we learnt that a survey was going on for another branch line to Trinity Bay, although the last branch line ran right through the headquarters of Trinity District. This branch now under survey, we are told, will leave Broad Cove, near Whitbourne, and run to Dildo, New Harbor and Green's Harbor, and thence through 30 miles of uninhabited country to Heart's Content. All these places have splendid harbors and regular calls are made by steamer, or so can afford to wait a little longer; while the probability of developing an extensive traffic of passengers and freight is very uncertain as compared with the north shore of Conception Bay. Now, sir, if the railway were extended from Carbonear to Old Perlican, a distance of 35 miles, it would pass Freshwater and immediate sections, pass through Salmon Cove and Perry's Cove, and on to Spout Cove, Small Point, Broad Cove, Mully's Cove, Blackhead, Adam's Cove, through Western Bay with its five divisions of population, run through Ochre Pit Cove, Northern Bay, accommodating Gull Island and Burnt Point, pass Job's Cove to the popular town of Lower Island Cove, thence past Caplin Cove to Old Perlican. Between these towns and villages there is not more than from one to two miles of uninhabited territory. From Carbonear to Blackhead there is not a single harbor where the fisherman can moor an averaged sized schooner. The Ethie has three ports of call, but cannot be depended on except in fairly civil weather, and yet

Population is Five Times Greater than the corresponding shore of Trinity Bay, while the North Shore is practically cut off from St. John's for half of the year. Surely it is in the interest of both Government and contractor to build the railway where it will meet the needs of the largest numbers, and especially when the largest numbers have the greatest amount of natural drawbacks and inconveniences to surmount in fighting the battle of life, and also to the contractor who must subsequently operate the road when it is built. Five times more people, without harbor accommodation, must necessarily wait five times more of life's commodities, and consequently will pay five times more into the revenue, from whence the interest must come for the money borrowed for the construction and subsequent operation of the railway. It is high time that this much neglected district should receive the recognition of which it is worthy. It would surprise some other parts of the Colony to see the amount of good cleared land every-where. I can look through my window in the summer and autumn and see at a glance more cattle and sheep

than I have seen in nearly a quarter of a century in other outports. Every man, with a rare exception, has his farm and abundance of produce, and too inconveniently situated to reach a market. The pasturage is good. The potatoes, turnips, cabbage and beet are of most excellent quality, and no talk of potato canker! Given the railway and a chance to rise, the north shore of Conception Bay would Newfoundland far behind and take the foremost place in the Colony. The people are becoming aroused as never before, and we trust that the members of Bay de Verde District will bring such pressure to bear upon the Government at this particular and critical juncture, as that the interests of the North Shore shall be duly emphasized and guarded, and that the Government will instruct the contractor, in harmony with the wishes of their numerous supporters and well wishers, to build the next branch line on the north shore of Conception Bay.
