





King George V. Institute.

OPENED BY DEPUTY GOVERNOR.

Yesterday a large and representative gathering took their places in the fine auditorium of the Seamen's Institute for the formal opening. Mr. Withers was in the chair, and on the platform with him were the Deputy Governor, Sir William H. Horwood, Lady Horwood, Mr. Archibald, the Chairman of the R.N.M.D.S.F., Dr. Van Dyke, the Chairman of the American Committee; Mr. J. A. Macdonald, a representative of the Y.M.C.A. of Canada; His Honor Mayor Ellis, Canon White and Mr. J. Browning, Mr. Gosling and others.

The proceedings opened with the singing of "O God our help in ages past," after which the Chairman made a few introductory remarks commending the success of the effort which had resulted in the erection of

the great building with its magnificent fittings, and the zeal of Dr. Grenfell which had made the undertaking possible.

The Deputy Governor delivered a fine speech in the course of which he called upon Mr. Archibald, the Chairman of the Deep Sea Mission, to read a message he had received from His Majesty the King. During the reading of it the audience stood and afterwards sang the National Anthem. Sir William then proceeded with his speech and formally declared the Institute open.

Mr. Archibald prefaced his speech by reading messages from President Taft, Queen Alexandra and from several fleets of fishermen around the coast of Great Britain. He spoke of the difficulties experienced by zealous missionaries on the Labrador and in the north previous to the advent of Dr. Grenfell, and the advantages which had been derived by the supplementary surgical, medical, social and religious aids which Dr. Grenfell had brought to bear on them. The personal magnetism of Dr. Grenfell had enlisted the services of many men and women to take up these services. The building itself was a monument of the desire of the English speaking world to help their fellows.

The Premier, Sir Edward Morris, paid a tribute to the work of Dr. Grenfell, and said that the success of the Institute would depend largely on

its management. If kept clean and attractive and free from the taint of charity, he had anticipated its success would be great.

Dr. Van Dyke said Dr. Grenfell's greatest achievement was not what he had done on the Labrador but in Canada, the States and England, where he had brought out the sympathetic feeling of man to man and pointed out opportunities for social service. He hoped all the Patron Saints of the city would bless the Institute. That St. George would fight the dragon of evil, St. Andrew spur brother to help brother, St. Patrick scotch the snake of intemperance, St. John the Baptist inspire men with courage and boldness, and St. John the Divine teach men to love.

Mr. J. A. Macdonald gave his experience of Y. M. C. A.'s, and showed how necessary it was to avoid airs of patronage and taints of charity. He thought success depended largely on allowing men to work out their own social salvation on good lines.

His Honor Mayor Ellis considered the building was a monument to the skill of the artisans of the city. In proposing a vote of thanks to donors and helpers, Dr. Grenfell said he considered a man who gave of his substance was benefitting himself more than others by bringing out the best that was in him. The largest donor of all was the firm of Bowring Brothers, and indeed many of the larger donations had come from the city. Among outside donors Dr. Van Dyke was one of the largest givers. He would be away himself mostly and he now put it up to the local committee to carry on the Institute successfully. There would be many difficulties to face, but he believed the committee had now a building sufficiently commodious and attractive to make the movement a success. Mr. Fearn seconded the motion. The prayer for God's blessing on the work was offered by Canon White.

Messages and letters conveying congratulations and good wishes, were read from His Majesty King George, the Queen Mother, President Taft, Colonel Roosevelt, the fishermen of Millford Haven, the Newlyn Bible Class, the fishermen of Grimsby, the fishermen of the Dogger Bank, the fishermen of the great Northern Fleet, the Hospital steamer "Queen Alexandra" and others. FROM THE DUKE OF CONNAUGHT.

Government House, Ottawa.

May 27th, 1912.

Your Excellency—I understand that the King George V. Institute is to be opened by you on June 22nd. Though this Institution is not on the soil of the Dominion where I represent His Majesty, I feel that it would not be out of place for me to ask you to give a message to those present. I should like to say how much I rejoice in the completion of this international tribute of sympathy with the men of the sea, which, erected by English speaking people, irrespective of creed or nationality, forms a bond of union between the elements of the Anglo-Saxon race and asserts their joint heritage of the ocean.

A college president who was lecturing on the type of girl who succeeds, and the type of girl, who fails, declared that one of the most common members of that latter class is the girl who always tries to blame anything untoward that happens to her, upon someone else. This kind of girl, he said, if she was passing through a gate and there was nobody else in sight, and she should tear her gown, would still think that the accident was somebody's fault.

We all know people like that—people who regard every unfortunate happening in the home or outside of it as somebody's fault, and are perfectly frantic if they cannot find someone to blame for anything that disturbs or inconveniences them.

When anything disagreeable occurs, these folks must immediately let off steam by blaming someone, and when, as sometimes happens, the disagreeable occurrence cannot really be traced to anyone, these people become absolutely explosive with pent-up blame.

For instance, in an office in which I once worked, the head man was of this type. One summer day when all the windows were open as a matter of course, the whole office force happened to be out of the room. One girl was at dinner, by his permission; another had gone downstairs with him to take down an important interview; and the office boy had been sent on an errand. During this period a quick summer shower came up and some important papers were injured by the rain. It was really impossible for

that man to blame anyone for this unfortunate happening, and we almost feared that his pent-up irritation would do him physical injury.

In all too many households, where some of the family have this desire to blame someone for everything that troubles them, the patient mother is the scapegoat of every accident and every irritation.

"Why wasn't the telephone answered to-day?" demands the son of the family. "I tried six times to get the house and they told me you didn't answer. It's too bad, mother. I don't see any use in our having a telephone if you can't answer it." Whereupon the patient Mrs. Griselda attempts to palliate her son's irritation by explaining that it was the maid's afternoon out, that her daughter was making candy in the kitchen, and that she herself had gone out on an errand for father.

"Why can't we ever have dinner ready on time?" asks father. "The meat didn't come until late? Why didn't you tell him what time you wanted it? You did? I don't believe you made it very plain. You're always telling about some thing or other being late. I should think you could manage to have things delivered when we want them. I pay enough for them."

A great many things happen in this world that are nobody's fault—some things just plain happen, and others are unfortunate accidents or mistakes. It is a relief to have someone to blame when any of these things irritates one, but a relief of which only selfish and unjust people avail themselves; and in the truly generous person's dictionary, "fault" is an entirely obsolete word; the words "mistake" or "accident" have quite taken its place.

Household Notes.

A crust of bread is best to clean a sticky board or cake pan. Never use a knife or anything that will scratch the surface; it invite more sticking thereafter.

Carrots should be cut into slices instead of cubes, because the outside part, which is the darkest, is the richest. If cut into slices, this part is more equally distributed.

For a steamed cottage pudding, add a cupful of dates to the ordinary cottage pudding and steam the mixture instead of baking. This will be found excellent, being tasty as well as nutritious.

An improved pie pan has a blade fastened to the center, which revolves around the bottom of the pan, beneath the pie crust, when the end protruding from the side of the dish is moved.

If leather in chair seats sticks to the clothing, sponge with a mixture of ether and alcohol, dampening the cloth lightly, and following it by wiping off with a clean flannel dampened with pure chloroform.

Jerusalem artichokes peeled and left in cold water to keep them from discoloring, and then sliced thin with a silver knife and served on lettuce leaves with a French dressing, make a delicious dinner salad.

game. These should be tossed in a French vinaigrette dressing of oil and vinegar, seasoned with salt and freshly ground black pepper.

When books become badly soiled on the edges, if not gilt edged, close the book tightly and erase the marks with an ink eraser. This will cut off all the rough edges, all soiled marks and leave the book quite clean.

Japanned ware should be washed with a sponge, dampened in warm water and dried immediately with a soft cloth. Obsolete spots can quickly be removed by rubbing with a woolen cloth dipped in sweet oil. Carrots will make delicious preserves. Take three-quarters of a pound of sugar to a pound of carrots. Add sufficient water to make a syrup and boil until the preserves are thick. A little ginger or lemon should be added to flavor.

The Bee.

The bee does not work at her trade in the winter time, owing to the scarcity of raw material, but during the summer she gathers large quantities of honey and weaves it into neat, 2-pound pellets.

THE LOAN.

Where the Premier's Policy Led Us.

Yesterday we inquired about the 1912 Loan. If the Premier had arranged its flotation we asked why he had been silent about it. In today's Daily News he says he arranged for its flotation just before he left England, moreover, the reason of his previous silence is apparent from his long and wearisome apologetic remarks about it is now apparent.

The 1910 Loan was issued at 97½, the 1906 Loan at 96. Morris's 1912 loan is being issued at 92. Taking the experience of the 1910 loan, we may anticipate that the Colony will get out of it about 88 and realize about one and three-quarter million dollars. The Premier's apology is that he struck a bad time on the money market. Securities are low and loans have been in great demand. Why then was the issue arranged for such a bad time? Hadn't the Government a million or so on hand to tide them over this season? The outlook is that the 1910 and 1912 loans will net about five and a half million dollars to do work already contracted which will cost at least \$7,000,000 and perhaps a good deal more. The astuteness of the Reid Nid. Co. in insisting on cash instead of bonds is now apparent. The Company is subject to no fluctuation of the bond markets. The Government takes this risk, and the risk in the present case may be measured by the fact that there has been a drop of 4½ points on 97½ in two years.

We cannot congratulate the Premier on his effort, nor can we condone his fault in placing a loan under such unfavourable circumstances, we can only condole the country on its misfortune in possessing a Premier and a policy which have led us into the financial market with such disappointing results.

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-Day.
The National Insurance Act goes into effect to-day. One of the most extraordinary features of the matter is that with all the discussion no one seems to understand clearly what it's all about. Only one or two points seem settled, one of these being that some fourteen million people are promised various sick benefits, doctors, hospital treatment, particularly treatments and sanatoria for consumptives, while as a matter of fact doctors with one accord have refused to treat patients for the sum the Act provides they be paid, and no sanatoria are yet available for consumptives. The country is to have 76 tuberculosis sanatoria with 2,500 beds. Something like 50,000 tuberculosis patients are ready to take immediate advantage of the Act. As the Daily Mail expresses it, the only advantage workers will receive for their tax will be compulsory codliver oil.

PLYMOUTH, To-Day.
The American Line steamer Philadelphia did not reach here until yesterday, having been delayed on the voyage from New York, whence she sailed on July 6, by bad firing, owing to inexperienced stokers—men who had been secured at Baltimore. According to their story they were told they were going to Boston, but when they got to sea were surprised to find they were on their way to England. They called a meeting of protest, but were induced to continue work, in which the stewards also took a hand.

HALIFAX, To-day.
Able seaman Brown, of the "Niobe" was struck and killed by a train near the dockyard.

STOCKHOLM, To-day.
The last of the track field sports at the Stadium brought no sensations. States comes first; Sweden comes second in total points; Britain third.

WASHINGTON, To-day.
In the Senate the fight over the Panama Bill was begun by Senator Burton.



CHILD FALLS OVER CLIFF—KILLED INSTANTLY.

Mr. D. Moore, who came in brakesman on the accommodation train at 12.30 p.m. to-day, had sad news from his brother-in-law, Mr. Frank Reid, keeper of the lighthouse at Ireland's Island, off La Poile.
