Germany's Neighbours.

The increasing uneasi-ness of the small neutral countries that adjoin Germany cannot be altogether without founda-tion. Denmark has little cause for apprehension but it is not so with large element of the Swiss population not merely pro-German but actual Germans, and the frontier that looks into Germany is virtually undefended It would do Germany no good but much eventual harm to attack Switzerland, but this may not be allowed to outweigh the temporary advantage that a sudden rush through the mountain passes, in conjunction with massed Austrian attack upon Italy might be thought likely to contain Germany faces a desperate situation and may take desperate action. So with Holland, though in that case a German invasion seems less likely because less reasonable. In all probability the preparations which the frontier are defensive precautions against aggression by Holland herself

bability the preparations which the enemy are plainly making on that however remote that possibility may seem now. In all Germany's present moves can be discerned more or less clearly a sert of feverish anxiety to forestall or divert the avalanche that she knows is shortly to descend upon

These are days of tremendous preparation, of which but a minute portion shows upon the surface: the lull before the terrific storm that will soon burst. Whatever may be argued for the merits of other fronts it is certain that it will burst in the west, in Belgium and France, where the German lines will be subjected to an iron deluge that will pour pitilessly for weeks or months until its purpose is achieved. The long lead which the Allies have achieved in ammunition output has been inconceivably increased of late, and this factor, with that of complete aeronautical suprem-acy, which they are determined to maintain, will leave the issue beyond all doubt and the date of its arrival alone uncertain. The recent exten-sion of the danger zone by the British to include the waters around Heligoland is to be read with the other events that indicate Britain's preparations, for she knows the in-evitable effect upon the German navy of the death agonies of her army. No risks are to be taken in these coming

The suggestion lately published of the Italian General Marazzi is an interesting commentary upon the unity of action the Allies at last enjoy. It is not likely that either alternative will be adopted in action, the crushing of Austria by a tremendous attack from eventful months. be adopted in action, the crushing of Austria by a tremendous attack from both sides, the British fleet in the Adriatic supporting the Italian right wing, or an equally tremendous massed drive through Alsace Lorraine; but that they should be advocated is eloquent of the closer co-ordination of Italy's plans with those of the other Allies.
