House of Assembly

At yesterday's afternoon sitting much business of a routine nature was disposed of, the rules of the House having been suspended so that all matters were put through speedily. Petitions were presented by Mr. Stone, Mr. Trinity, Mr. Downey, from St. George's, and Mr. Bennett from St. John's fishermen re trap berths. This petition was supported by Messrs. Morine, Higgins, Walsh, Stone, Lloyd and Grimes. On motion of the Finance Minister, the House resolved itself into Committee of the Whole to consider the War Tax on Incomes resolutions. (Explained elsewhere). On motion of Minister of Marine and Fisheries the House went into Committee of the Whole to consider "An Act to Amend the Shipbuilding Bounty Act," which provides that no bounty will be paid for vessels built since October 1917, of over 120 tons. The House was also moved into Committee of the Whole by the Prime Minister to consider certain resolutions relating to the taxation of Telegraph and Cable Companies. The chief object of this Bill is to place all such Companies on the same footing in the matter of taxation. The Western Union, Direct and Commercial Cable Companies will now have to pay the tax and as the Bill is retrospective, these will have to pay as from July 1st, 1910. \$200,000 back duties is anticipated to be realisable from this source. House then went into Committee on motion of Minister of Finance, on Ways and Means, and the Public Service Act was subsequently introduced. Bills giving effect to the new Revenue proposals were adopted. After putting through, without amendment, "An Act to Amend the War Pensions Act, 1917," the House took recess till 8 p.m.

NIGHT SESSION.

House in Committee to consider certain retiring allowances. Mr. Morine criticised the Poor Relief Bill and windows and censured the Government for continuing the disgracefully low sum allowed these women. Mr. Currie concurred, as also did Mr. Currie, who commented strongly on a pension list vote for a Game Warden and Game Board, properly. All aged persons are not treated alike and are particularly in need of the new Revenue line repairer in the district who was entitled to some attention. Mr. Downey agreed similar instances in his district. Considerable discussion ensued on the Bill. "An Act to Amend the Municipal Act" in which Mr. Currie, the Prime Minister, Mr. Higgins, Mr. Morine and Mr. Bennett took part. The Bill, however, passed without amendment. The Minister of Shipping gave the House some information re Coal and Salt supplies. With 6,000 tons of the latter, en route, the country will have, providing the ship arrives safely, 23,500 tons on hand. 3,000 tons have been purchased at Liverpool, England, and arrangements are being made to get another ship to bring a cargo of 6,000 tons. Should this be secured, there will be enough to meet needs until the end of June. After that period it was a matter of speculation. The coal situation did not look too promising. The sailing steamers were unable to bring within 25,000 tons of the necessary supply, even if all of them were put into the trade. Other help was hoped for. If two steamers were chartered to do the New York service, the coastal boats would be able to keep the route open between St. John's and Sydney and the Reid Co. are putting on some new machines and 50 extra box cars, to handle increased freight. A steamer would be secured for one coal trip, 3,000 tons of which will have to be given to the Reid Co. to operate the road from the coast. The House then adjourned until the usual hour.

THE PITCHER.

There are two kinds of pitchers; those who do and those who don't. Also, roughly speaking, which is the way to speak to some pitchers, all hurlers may be divided into two classes, those who pitch with their right fins and those who use their left paws. Patriotic Association

LAST NIGHT'S MEETING.

At last night's meeting of the Patriotic Association, Sir W. H. Horwood presided until the arrival of His Excellency the Governor, who was especially invited to attend. It was proposed by Mr. R. G. Rendell and seconded by Judge Morris that His Excellency be asked to take the chair. His Excellency in accepting the chairmanship of the Association, asked that his mind be made clear on the efforts of the body. He understood that certain functions of the Association had been taken over by the Military Department, and he now wished that the efforts of the Association in its new existence be clearly defined. He referred to the importance of the matter in dealing with the returned soldiers. The functions of the different committees in the past were explained by Sir W. H. Horwood, Sir P. T. McGrath, Mr. R. G. Rendell, Mayor Gosling, Capt. Rennie, Mr. R. B. Job and others who pointed out that the difficulties to be confronted in dealing with the returned soldiers will not be overcome by any pension scheme.

Dr. J. A. Robinson believed that if attention were given to some of the points suggested, invaluable service might be performed. Mr. J. W. Withers felt the Association would be a centre from which would radiate many activities such as looking after the returned soldiers. He also believed our educational system was simply rotten and that a better one should be developed. Dr. Robinson felt the educational question is one of the dealing with which would put the Governor in a delicate position. Mr. W. R. Warren, Mr. W. R. Howley and Dr. Burke also made some capital suggestions.

His Excellency judged from the opinions given that all were in favor of the Association continuing its existence. He had intimated to the Secretary that his position might be that of Honorary President, but in view of the feeling shown he would accept the active chairmanship. Work in connection with the various committees was then discussed, and on motion of Mr. Howley it was unanimously decided that a committee be appointed to confer with the Military Department and have the lines and efforts of both bodies clearly defined. The following were appointed: Sir P. T. McGrath, Messrs. W. R. Warren, W. R. Howley, R. B. Job, R. G. Rendell and J. Browning. At His Excellency's suggestion the Association will meet monthly.

Public Notice

I am directed by His Excellency the Governor in Council to issue the following notice under Authority of Minute in Council passed 28th February, 1918.

Augmentation of the Pay of Royal Naval Reservists Newfoundland.

The Government of Newfoundland have decided to augment the pay of Newfoundland Royal Naval Reservists so as to place them on the same footing as men of the Newfoundland Regiment.

Under the provision of the War Measure Act, authority is given to the Minister of Militia to deal with the matter of augmentation of pay of the Royal Naval Reservists, Nfld., in consultation with the Senior Naval Officer, St. John's.

It is ordered that a sum of 33c. per day be placed to the credit of each Naval Reservist from the time of commencement of the war, in cases where men were then serving, or otherwise, from the time when their services began up to the time of discharge, or of death, or to the 30th of September, 1917, inclusive.

As the rate of pay of Naval Reservists was increased from October 1st, 1917, and as the difference between the amount they receive and that allowed the members of The Royal Newfoundland Regiment is 17c. per day, this difference will also be credited them from that date.

The foregoing amounts will not in any case be made a payment from Admiralty sources. The Minister of Militia, St. John's, Nfld., is solely responsible for the issue of any sums due.

Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve men serving in any of H. M. Ships, including all members of the Trawler Reserve and those in Defensively Armed Merchant Ships etc., are eligible for the pay as set forth, and should be informed of the following alternatives as regards the method of payment:—

- (a) Payment will be made on personal application to the Minister of Militia, St. John's.
- (b) Payment will be made to the nominee of any Reserve man, on written application duly witnessed, to the Minister of Militia, St. John's.
- (c) Sums due will be placed to the credit of Reservist men who do not desire to avail themselves of the foregoing and can be drawn by them at the expiration of their service.

The following form is to be compiled and forwarded direct to the Minister of Militia, St. John's, Newfoundland, at the earliest possible date:—

All communications of any description with regard to these payments are to be made to the Minister of Militia, St. John's, direct.

Payment will commence on 1st May, 1918.

In cases where members of the Royal Naval Reserve (Newfoundland) have been killed in action or died of wounds or sickness, or through any other cause, the amount due as Augmentation Pay will go to the Estate of the deceased. The authority to obtain the Estate of the deceased is, in case of a Will, Letters of Probate; and in case there is not a Will, Letters of Administration. Such letters are issued by the Supreme Court of Newfoundland on the Petition and Proofs of Executor of the Will, or the next of kin. If the Estate does not exceed \$500.00, after the proof of the facts has been obtained the petition can be applied for by the Minister of Justice.

With reference to the foregoing, it is suggested that the next of kin of Reservists who are now serving should communicate with them and request them to send their instructions to the Militia Department. No action can be taken until such instructions are received.

Next of kin of deceased Reservists will be communicated with in due course when their claims have been proved.

Proclamation

His Excellency Sir Charles Alexander, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Commander of the Royal Victorian Order, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, in and over the Dominion of Newfoundland.

WHEREAS under the provisions of the Military Service Act, 1914-1917, the Governor in Council was empowered to make certain military forces in the Dominion of Newfoundland, and to place such of the said Volunteers as might be required for service abroad under the command of such Officers of His Majesty's Army as His Majesty might appoint or designate, and in pursuance of such provisions the presence of such military forces in the Dominion of Newfoundland has been permitted and placed at the disposal of His Majesty as an expeditionary force for service in the present war.

And whereas the said Regiment is engaged in active service overseas for the defence and security of Newfoundland, the preservation of the peace and of human liberty, and it being necessary owing to the exigencies of the war to provide reinforcements for the said Regiment in addition to the men whose inclusion or circumstances have permitted them to volunteer.

And whereas it was accordingly enacted in and by the provisions of the Military Service Act, 1914-1917, that every unattached male British subject who is within one of the classes defined in the said Act shall be liable to be called out on active service in the Royal Newfoundland Regiment, either within or beyond Newfoundland, and that his service shall be for the duration of the present war and demobilization after the cessation of the war.

And whereas the men who under the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, are liable to be called out on active service in the said Regiment, are comprised in four classes of which the first is, by the provisions of the said Act, defined to consist of all male British subjects ordinarily, or at any time since the 4th day of August 1914, resident in Newfoundland, who have attained the age of nineteen years, who were born not earlier than the year 1895, and were on the 10th day of April unmarried or widowers not having no child and who are not included in any of the following enumerated Exemptions:

- Men who hold a certificate granted under the provisions of the said Military Service Act, 1914, and in force.
- Members of His Majesty's Regular or Reserve, or auxiliary forces as defined by the Army Act.
- Members of the Military forces raised by the Government of any of His Majesty's other Dominions, or by the Government of India.
- Men serving in the Royal Navy, or in the Royal Marines, or in the Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve, and members of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment.
- Men who have since August 4th, 1914, been or shall be called out on active service in the Naval forces of Great Britain or her Allies in any theatre of actual war and have been honourably discharged therefrom.
- Men, including members of any recognized order of an exclusively religious character, and ministers of all religious denominations existing in Newfoundland at the date of the passing of the said Military Service Act, who are under instruction in any theological or classical studies who are under instruction or have completed their course of study for the military or naval service in any college or university in Newfoundland and their religious denomination.
- Men who are more over provided in the said Military Service Act, that the Governor in Council may, from time to time, by Proclamation, call out on active service, as aforesaid, any class of men in the said Act, and that all men within the scope of such proclamation be deemed to be called out on active service in the said Act, and that the said Act shall apply to the said class of men as if they had been called out on active service in the said Act, and that the said Act shall apply to the said class of men as if they had been called out on active service in the said Act.
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- Men who are more over provided in the said Military Service Act, that the Governor in Council may, from time to time, by Proclamation, call out on active service, as aforesaid, any class of men in the said Act, and that all men within the scope of such proclamation be deemed to be called out on active service in the said Act, and that the said Act shall apply to the said class of men as if they had been called out on active service in the said Act.

And I do hereby proclaim and announce that for greater convenience I have directed that prescribed forms for reporting for service and for applying for exemption from service, may, at any time on or before the said 24th day of May, 1918, be obtained at any Post Office in the Dominion of Newfoundland; and that reports for service and applications for exemption from service if obtained at such Post Office and forwarded to the Postmaster at the Post Office from which the same are obtained in their proper destinations as by regulations prescribed, free of postage or any other charge.

And I do further inform and notify them that the said Tribunal has been established for the hearing of applications for exemption from service upon any of the statutory grounds, as hereinbefore set out; that the Tribunal will continue to sit at St. John's and such other place or places as may be necessary or convenient, and as by it shall be duly notified until all applications for exemption from service shall have been heard and disposed of; also that men belonging to the class hereby called out who have not previously to the said 24th day of May, 1918, reported for service, or forwarded applications for exemption through any of our Post Offices as aforesaid, may make application in person or by proxy from service to the said Tribunal.

And we do hereby moreover notify and inform those who are in the Class hereby called out, that if, on or before the 24th day of May, 1918, they report themselves for Military Service, or if, on or before that day, application for exemption from service is made by them or on their behalf, they will not be required to report for duty, or be placed upon active service as aforesaid until a day which will be by the Registrar notified to them in writing by registered post at their respective addresses as given in their reports for service, or applications for exemption from service, or at such substituted addresses as they may have respectively signified by inform, forewarn and admonish, the men belonging to the Class hereby called out that if any of them shall, without just and sufficient cause, fail to report for duty at the time and place required by notice in writing so posted, or shall fail to report for duty as otherwise by law required, he shall be subject to the procedure, pains and penalties by Law prescribed as against Military deserters.

Of all of which said persons whom these presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice, rendering strict obedience to and compliance with all these commands, directions and requirements, and governing themselves accordingly.

RULES OF THE TRIBUNAL.

Under Sub-section 9 of Section 5 of the Military Service Act, 1918.

- The Tribunal will sit at the Court House, St. John's, and at any other place or places of which it shall from time to time give notice in the 'Royal Gazette.' It shall first sit at the Court House, St. John's, on the 13th day of the month of May, and thereafter pursuant to adjournment.
- Applications shall be made to the Registrar and shall be in form No. 1 of the Schedule.
- Applications may be made either by the man whose exemption is sought or, on his behalf, by his employer or any person associated with him in business, or by a near relative.
- Such applications may be submitted within the time limited by the Registrar, or by the calling out, or any authorized extension of such time.
- Immediately upon the receipt by him of applications, the Registrar shall retain a duplicate of the order in which he receives them, and forward them without delay to the Clerk, retaining a duplicate.
- As soon as each application reaches the Clerk he shall endorse thereon the day and date and the hour at which he received it, and shall enter particulars thereof in a register to be kept by him. Applications shall be entered in the register in the order in which they are numbered by the Registrar. The register shall also contain the following particulars:—the name in full, age, address, description, name, address and occupation of the employer (if any) of the applicant, and the grounds upon which exemption is claimed; the date of the application, and the acknowledgment of such receipt sent by him to the Registrar, and any adjournment, and other order or direction made or given by the Tribunal in regard to the hearing of the application, and the date of the order or direction made or given by the Tribunal in respect of the application, and like particulars in respect of any rehearing or appeal.
- All appeals from the decision of a single member of the Tribunal shall be by way of rehearing.
- Applications will, so far as convenient, be heard and determined in the order in which they are received from the Registrar.
- The Tribunal may adjourn the hearing or determination of any application, or may require such further information, particulars or evidence in relation thereto as it may deem necessary to a proper decision thereon, and where more than one ground of exemption is claimed, it may hear such grounds at the same time or at different times as it may deem convenient.
- If an address given in any application for exemption, or any of the new address shall immediately be given to the Registrar—the last notified address shall be deemed the true address.
- Notices or other documents required to be given or submitted to the Tribunal, if not sent in the manner hereinbefore prescribed, may be delivered at the office of the Clerk in the Court House, St. John's, or at any other place where the Tribunal may be sitting.
- A Military Representative, but not more than one at the same time, may appear as a party to each application heard by the Tribunal.
- An application by one person on behalf of another shall not, nor shall

service as aforesaid until a day which will be by the Registrar notified to them in writing by registered post at their respective addresses as given in their reports for service, or applications for exemption from service, or at such substituted addresses as they may have respectively signified by inform, forewarn and admonish, the men belonging to the Class hereby called out that if any of them shall, without just and sufficient cause, fail to report for duty at the time and place required by notice in writing so posted, or shall fail to report for duty as otherwise by law required, he shall be subject to the procedure, pains and penalties by Law prescribed as against Military deserters.

section one of section eight of the Act shall be for the grant of a conditional certificate only.

25. The Tribunal may, at any stage, if the proceeding require the man in respect of whom the exemption is sought to attend before a medical board or examiners, and to produce a certificate from that board as to his physical fitness for military service.
26. If an applicant for exemption be, by reason of such condition, permanently unfit for military service by reason of complete physical incapacity or mental unsoundness, it will be considered by the Tribunal in any other ground than that of ill-health or infirmity, and will determine the application accordingly.
27. If a claim for exemption be made in respect of any man on any ground other than his physical condition, and if the man is exempted from service by reason of such condition, the applicant shall have the right, if the man's services should be thereafter required for military duty, to urge such other ground of exemption, whether or not it were considered by the Tribunal in the first instance.
28. If in pursuance of paragraph (d) of sub-section two of section eight of the Act a man holds a conditional certificate giving notice to the Registrar that the conditions stated therein have ceased to exist, or that his exemption has terminated, the Registrar shall forthwith communicate in writing particulars of the case to the Tribunal, and the case shall be dealt with by the Tribunal.
29. An application for renewal of a certificate shall be made by sending notice of such application to the Registrar before the date on which the certificate ceases to be in force; and the application shall be dealt with in the same manner as an application for exemption.
- The holder of a certificate, or the Military Representative, may at any time apply, by giving notice to the Registrar, for the withdrawal or variation thereof.
31. Upon receiving notice of an application for withdrawal or variation of a certificate the Tribunal shall fix a date for the hearing of the application, of which three clear days' notice shall be given to the parties interested.
32. Duplicate of any lost, destroyed or defaced certificate shall be issued by the Registrar, and at the request of the man to whom it was granted, upon payment to the Registrar of a fee of fifty cents.
33. All notices, subpoenas or other papers issued by the Tribunal, and its decisions shall be signed by the Clerk.
34. Where a subpoena is required for the attendance of a witness it shall be issued by the Clerk in the form No. 2 of the schedule, or with such variations as the case may require, and as many witnesses as are required.
35. A subpoena shall be served by delivering a copy thereof to the witness and producing the original if required to do so.
36. Any person aggrieved by a decision of a member sitting apart may appeal for rehearing to the Tribunal constituted of any two or three of the members, by giving notice to the Registrar not later than three clear days after the date on which the decision of the Tribunal was received by the appellant, and the Registrar shall forthwith send notice of such appeal to the other parties to the application, and the Tribunal shall sit on the day of the hearing, and shall hear the appeal, and its decision shall be final.
37. On receipt of such appeal the Tribunal will appoint a day for the hearing, which shall take place after three days' notice to the parties.
38. The Tribunal will hold that in all cases the burden of proof of the claim to exemption lies on the person seeking a certificate of exemption.
39. Witnesses shall be entitled to be paid the same conduct-money and expenses as are paid to witnesses in an action in the Supreme Court.
40. In these rules, unless the context requires otherwise—
 - (a) "The Act" means The Military Service Act, 1918.
 - (b) "The Registrar" means the Registrar appointed under the said Act.
 - (c) "The Clerk" means the Clerk of the Tribunal.
 - (d) "Application" means application for certificate of exemption.
 - (e) "Certificate" means a certificate of exemption.
 - (f) "Military Representative" means a person authorized by the Minister of Militia to represent the Military Authorities before the Tribunal.
 - (g) "Days" shall be construed as in the Judicature Act, 1904, and "Clear Days" as in Order 52 of the County Court Rules (imperial), 1889.
 - (h) Sunday, Christmas Day, and Good Friday, or any public holiday, shall not be reckoned "days."
 - (i) Where any notice is required to be given to the Military Representative (or the Military Authorities), it may be given to the Registrar.
 - (j) Any notice or document required to be given to the Tribunal, to the Registrar, to any party to the proceeding, or to other person who has specified his address to the Tribunal may be given by posting the same, (prepaid, unless entitled to free transmission), to the official or specified address as the case may be.
 - (k) Any notice or document sent by registered post shall be deemed to have been received by the addressee on the day of its delivery to the post office.
 - (l) The forms set out in the Schedule may be used, with such variations as circumstances may require.
 - (m) Notices or documents intended for the Tribunal shall be addressed to the Clerk of the Tribunal, the Court House, St. John's.

A FORMAL DENIAL.

WASHINGTON, May 13. United States Secretary of War Baker, to-day, added his formal denial to that of Lord Reading, regarding statements as to the disposition of American forces in France. He said the facts were directly opposed to the statements, and that American troops were being used actively in battle, and in such ways as to meet with the approval of General Foch and Pershing. The Secretary dictated the following statement made in the morning papers, purporting to come from Ottawa, "It seems that American forces in France will not be used actively for the present but will be conserved until they constitute a larger and independent American army." The facts, his statement continues, are exactly otherwise, and troops in France are being used actively in the battle and in the trenches, and while all of the plans of the War Department look to the development of the American Army, yet the various elements of it, now in France, are being used freely in the general cause, and in such ways as are deemed most effective. In accordance with General Pershing's action in placing all our forces at the discretion of the Allied Commanders, and of the supreme commander, Baker added, he had no information as to the source of the Ottawa despatch.

NEW SHIPPING CONTROL.

NEW YORK, To-day. To permit him more freedom of action in connection with shipping control, Sir Connop Guthrie, Director in this country for the British Ministry of Shipping, has been appointed special representative of the Ministry, and Tashley Sparke, Director in the United States of the Cunard Line, has been named to succeed Sir Connop as Director of Shipping. According to an announcement to-night by officers of the Cunard Line, the paramount interest of shipping in connection with the war is universally recognized, and as this country continues to take a larger and increasing share in those burdens, the necessity for a closer and more harmonious working with the British and other Allied shipping interests, becomes of first rate importance. Says the statement, the British shipping controller therefore pays a signal compliment, both to American shipping and Sir Connop Guthrie, in selecting to undertake that work, a man who by reason of his successful handling of British interests in this country, has proved himself eminently fitted to undertake the task.

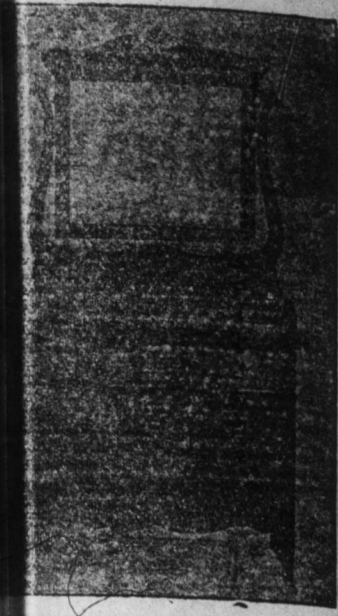

EARLY MESSAGES

WAR SUMMARY.

The resumption of the offensive against the Allies on the front, has not yet materialized in many sectors there have been operations, which have no effect on the situation as a whole, but the fact that the enemy is not moving up men and material for a new move in the mighty offensive on March 21st. Field Marshal Haig's report makes special mention of the German artillery north of Serre. This little town behind the Teutonic lines of Albert, and marks the apex of the offensive, the base of which is the Hebuterne and Buechel.

For weeks military experts have been watching developments in the particular region for the reason that the logical point from which a great turning movement in the Arras sector. During the days of April, when the Allies held a final stand on the line which held the Germans, centering on the Serre front, the British front has been under heavy fire from the Germans, and this may indicate that the Germans are getting ready to make an effort to reach Amiens. On the West front the reports are of interest.

The true situation in the West front, the Austrians captured Montebello Saturday morning, the Austrians tried in vain to regain this peak south of Asiago, which has been met by strong resistance. In Mesopotamia the British forces progressed further up the Tigris and captured Kirkut, pursued the Turks for 20 miles to the north. The British are now 60 miles from the important city of Mosul, the ancient city of Nineveh and the crossing of numerous caravans.

The reports tell of the capture of the Germans of Dowager Emmanuela Fedorovna and Grand Duke Nicholas Nikolaevitch and Grand Duke Michaelovitch, who have been in a straightened circumstance.

BRITISH OFFICIAL.

LONDON, May 13. Field Marshal Haig's report from headquarters to-night reads: The hostile artillery developed considerable activity, early this morning north of Serre, and has been active during the day on the southern part of the British front and in the sector north of Kemmel. There is nothing further of special interest.

BOMBING OPERATIONS.

LONDON, May 12. The Admiralty announces that during the period of May 6 to 12, inclusive, air force contingents working from Dunkirk carried out successful bombing operations against the Ostend docks, and seaplane base, the Zebrugge mole, lock gates and enemy shipping in the vicinity. Several direct hits were obtained on the sheds on Zebrugge mole and a large shed at the seaplane base was completely burned up, the statement continues. In the course of the offensive on Paris, six enemy machines were destroyed, and two others were driven down out of control. One of ours is missing. On May 3 one of our seaplanes in the North Sea sighted a Zeppelin on patrol, and in a decisive action lasting half an hour was terminated by the Zeppelin retreating to its base.

FRENCH REPORT.

FRENCH HEADQUARTERS, May 12. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—In connection with the capture of the Grivesnes Park the French had retained the southern end of the park and the Chateau Grivesnes through the battles of April, but the Germans established themselves at the northern end of the park and held the ridge commanding the two valleys with the roads running along them which were their main means of access to the park. The French captured the whole of the ridge with 280 prisoners and sixty machine guns with the smallest loss within quarter of an hour, before the formidable German artillery and machine gun defences could come into play. It is unlikely the Germans will attempt a further push towards Amiens along the Luce Valley. They have more to gain by capturing the high ground of the Villers-Bretonnes, Esclara-Villers plateau, and so avoiding the marshes which form a natural barrier before Amiens. On the western side along the line of the Avre the enemy is organized for defence. His batteries are extraordinarily close to his front line which consists of a chain of organized shell craters with only one line of trenches. The enemy has dug himself in between Montvidier and Noyon and has already defence lines.

BRITISH REPORT.

FRANCE, May 12. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—The weather is grey and cheerless. On most of the battle front the enemy has fallen considerably behind in his amended timetable. In a diary found on a captured German officer there is an entry stating that a certain big attack planned near Albert has been abandoned because the second naval division had

broken into Albert and indulged in a wholesale riot. The diary added that the division was dealt with for disorderly behaviour and pillage. The same diary contains a running lament upon the havoc wrought by our airmen, punctuated by the many casualties caused by their bombs. Completed casualty returns now available show that German wireless statements regarding our losses in the early days of the offensive to have been greatly exaggerated. The 56th division which the German wireless stated was almost completely wiped out, lost in killed, wounded and prisoners, 43 officers and 1,425 men. French troops operating along the gully of Wyverbeek running southwards to Dikbeek busk like to the eastern front of Mount Kemmel had considerable successes.

FRENCH OFFICIAL.

PARIS, May 12. The official statement issued by the War Office to-night reads: There were no events of importance along the front to-day with the exception of bombardments which became quite lively on both banks of the Avre River.

RETURN TO WORK.

BETHLEHEM, Pa., May 13. Machinists and helpers employed at the Bethlehem steel works, who have been on strike nearly two weeks returned to work to-day. Their grievances are to be investigated by the National War Labor Board.

A WONDERFUL RECORD.

FRENCH HEADQUARTERS, May 12. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—Lieut. Fonck, mentioned in the official communication of Friday is credited officially with the destruction of 42 enemy aeroplanes, but he has actually accounted for at least sixty as the French official credit pilots only with enemy machines, the destruction of which is confirmed by French observers. Since almost all our air fights occur over the enemy lines, a large proportion of the Anglo-French air victories are never officially recorded. If the whole truth could be published the late Capt. Von Richthofen's record could easily be matched by those of Guyonere, Ball, Fonck, Nugesser and half a dozen others.

TO AID EMIGRANTS.

LONDON, May 13. (Via Reuter's.)—Rt. Hon. Walter Hume Long, Colonial Secretary, in the House of Commons introduced a bill to improve the organization for affording information and assistance to emigrants from the United Kingdom providing for the establishment of a

central emigration authority and supervision and control of passage brokers, their agents and emigration societies, and for purposes connected therewith.

BRITAIN'S VINDICATION.

LONDON, May 13. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—Lord Bryce in an article in the Daily Chronicle exhaustively analyzes the Lichnowsky memorandum as the most complete vindication of Britain's attitude in the war. He says the memorandum was written not to justify England, but to criticize the policy which led Germany to Austria. It exposed him to the anger and persecution of the German Government which is an evidence of the importance they attach to it as a condemnation of their conduct. Lord Bryce attributes the wild outburst of anti-English feeling in Germany to the fact that the German Government did everything in their power, not only to create hatred, but also to stifle every voice raised to let the people know the truth. They never permitted them to know the truth and the disappointment that fell upon them when the march to Paris was arrested with the help of the British fleet added fuel to their anger and made it ever since an easier matter to keep the truth from them.

ELECTED UNOPPOSED.

LONDON, May 13. (Via Reuter's.)—Edward Shortt, Chief Secretary for Ireland, was returned unopposed for Newcastle, in the bye-election made necessary by his accepting a post of emolument under the Crown as Cabinet Minister.

GERMAN EXPLANATION.

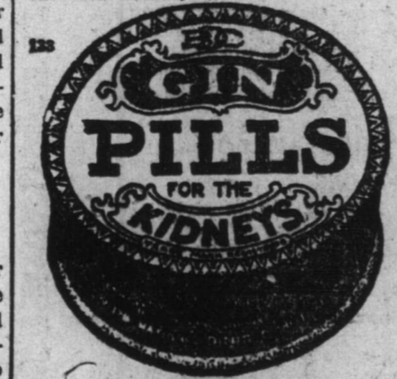
WASHINGTON, May 13. Recent exchanges between Russia and Germany over German intentions in the Crimea, made public to-day by the State Department, disclose that the German advance on Sebastopol was made, according to German explanations, because of attacks by the Russian Black Sea fleet on cities held by Germany. Sebastopol was captured, according to a German announcement, several days ago. The German Ambassador informed the Russians that the German Government had no intention of forcing on Crimea any particular form of Government, and that it would allow the Crimeans the right of self-determination. The military advance, it was said, would not interfere with Germany's political intentions. The Soviet Government replied that it could not take that view, and protested against the German military move.

AFTER THE TURKS.

LONDON, May 13. British mounted troops, after capturing Kirkut in Mesopotamia, pursued the Turks for a distance of two miles to the northward, says an official statement issued to-day by the War Office. On May 11th the Turks were driven across the Lesser Seabriver at Altyn Kupri. The latter place is sixty miles southeast of Mosul.

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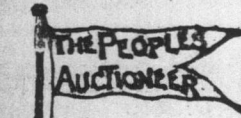
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
