





and Its Blind

odious. But when comparison incites effort to emulation or betterment the odium may well be overlooked. It is with this idea in mind that I propose to give my readers a short resume of what has been accomplished for the blind in our island home, and in those other countries of the world, concerning which I have in a short time been able to obtain definite facts.

As far as the blind in Newfoundland are concerned, beyond the opportunity of fitting themselves to take their places side by side with their seeing fellow men in the great struggle of life, which has been afforded to some few through the medium of the Halifax School for the Blind. Hitle or nothing has been done for them. This resolves itself into the claim made in a previous article to the effect that their condition is due to neglect to provide means for the blind to receive the benefit of their training after having graduated from Halifax. The time has come for our rulers and our people to erase the stain of past omissions by interesting themselves in and helping along, the cause of the blind.

The following statistics will tend to prove the truth of the statement here made for the second time. In the year 1887 Newfoundland decided to take advantage of the opportunities afforded by the School for the Blind at Halifax, and in that year two Newfoundlanders entered the instituation. Our country has since that date maintained annually an increasing number of our blind at Halifax—the total in recent years reaching eighteen. I understand that provision is





The Postal Service

How old is the Postal Branch of the Civil Service in this country? I just ficials from time immemorial—poor authority, whilst the rank and file do the work. That's the story of the

I know a thing or two about the pay sheet of Postal offices in other countries, and the difference is so vast that it borders on the ludicrous, with the laughs on us. What's the matter with our several Governments that they have never attempted to do justice to this important branch of the Civil Service?. In England the Postal servants are the best paid officials in the Civil Service. In Canada the Post office employee gets double and in many cases three times as much wage as is paid in Newfoundland. In the United States the same official gets not only a splendid salary, but according to his office, a bonus and perquisites that total so valuable a recognition as would give some of our thinskinned politicians heart disease if I were to quote figuratively.

Here in Newfoundland the Post Office pay sheet is a joke, and one of the Civil Service forces. How and why? Just this. To pay a man who has been from 35 45 years in the service \$90.00 month, is a farce. To ask officials to do responsible work—work that means recourse to the most honest principles and to hand him from \$50.00 to \$60.00 per month is simply worse. To expect men to handle the most Trusted and private affairs of the public, to act for that public, and to become as it were the custodians of public confidence, and all for the rotten emolment that seems so large in the eyes of a niggardly Government, is the greatest absurdity and joke of all. 
