

#### Are We Slaves to an Accursed System?

Yesterday we were privileged to listen to an informal discussion on fish, which took place in the office of a firm on Water Street, where some specimens of Iceland soft cured cod were on view. Side by side with the foreign product was a Labrador fish of last season's catch, and even after one had made every allowance for that fact, the contrast between the appearance of the two as food commodities was most marked. The former was is dirty and has many bloodspots. white and looked appetizing,-the latter, dark in colour, and it did not appear particularly palatable. The former showed that scrupulous care had been observed in the cleaning process; the latter, with a clot of dried blood where the bone had been severed, another clot adhering to the nape, and marks of slime on the back, indicated that little regard had been shown in the matter of ordinary cleanliness, and that appearances had been sacrificed in the anxiety to conserve energy.

Now no one will for a moment contend that the fish caught elsewhere can compare in flavour and general excellence with the properly cured Labrador product. No one for a moment will assert that the Newfoundland fisherman is lazy, indifferent to cleanliness, or ignorant of his business. Everyone will, however, at once admit that at present a considerable quantity of the fish cured, not only on the Labrador, but around the coast of the Island, leaves much to be desired in two essentials in any PARKER & MONROE, LTD. food product, cleanliness and appearance.





#### Flogging Still Legal in Maryland

Flogging as punishment, has been legalized by Maryland statute laws under every constitution the State has had from 1776 to the present time. It was common in the Colony before the Revolution. Under the statute of 1723, forgery, theft, counterfeiting, Sabbath breaking and blashemy were equally punishable by the lash. A person who swore in the presence of a magistrate or other public official was liable to a fine of 2s. 6d. for each "cussword"; and if the fine was not paid he received up to 39 lashes.

In those days floggings were public. It was not until about 1810 that scandalized Marylanders succeeded in having the exhibitions cut off from popular views by a law which required those punishments to be administered behind walls of jails or prisons.



They warm us with moist heat in winter, and as the air over the land is cooler, into clouds and rain, and in the process liberates an additional amount of heat The loss of heat from the earth is diminished by the increased quantity of moisture. In this way these

winds raise our winter temperature. In summer the south winds have an opposite effect. They bring less heat than those blowing from the large land surfaces of the European and Asian continents because naturally the surface of the sea in the Atlantic does not become so hot as these dry lands. Thus the south wind is rendered cool and moist, the sky is kept more or less cloudy, and the summer

When the wind is due north we get the comparatively intense heat of Spain. In summer, Russia and Siberia have a dry, hot climate, and it is this that the east and northeast winds bring us at that season, whereas in the winter they bring us their dry







and not in that of any individual official thereof. (3) The several Public Departments and their substitution dary offices in the Outports have been directed to refuse to accept, in payment of amounts due the Government, any cheques which are not properly endorsed and stamped and which have not been certified by the Bank on which they are drawn, or the paying Bank in the case of cheques drawn

outside of Newfoundland. (4) In view of the lack of general compliance with the law in respect of stamping receipts as provided for by the Stamp Act (Consolidated Statutes 3rd Series Cap. 28), the attention of the Public is drawn to the following provisions thereof, viz:

#### **Magistrates Court**

YESTERDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

The action arising out of the seizure of the Herbert Green was resumed at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, in the Magistrate's Court before Mr. Mc-Carthy, J.P., when Mr. C. J. Fox, for the Crown asked leave to recall Customs Officer Wilson. This was granted. In answer to one of the questions put by Mr. Fox, witness stated that Super-cargo Ryan joined the Herbert Green at nine o'clock on the morning of the 4th. Witness further stated that two individuals were seen to come ashore from the Herbert Green, each having a bottle of liquor in his possession. Customs Officer Roberts relieved the individuals of the bottles and returned them to Super-cargo Ryan, and he gave a further warning by stating that if any more bottles were seen to come ashore he would report the matter to the proper authorities. Witness was present on two occasions when a warning was given by Customs Officer Roberts to Super-cargo Ryan prohibiting the iquor going ashore.

Augustus Green, sworn and examined by Mr. Fox:-Witness said he was Customs officer doing general duty along the Water front. He went to the Furness Withy wharf on Saturday at 8 p.m., and while on the premises he saw Capt. Bryne of the schooner Orleans walking towards the Herbert Green, and stopped to talk to Mr. Wilson. Witness then took up a position on the dock, aft of the cabin where the Herbert Green was lying While witness was in hiding, he having overheard Capt. Bryne, Capt. Nauffts and Super-cargo Ryan talking in the cabin. The conversation of the trio centred generally on whiskey and rum running. Witness remembered hearing Capt. Bryne asking Supercargo Ryan to sell 4 or 5 cases of whiskey. Witness was unable to state the exact amount Bryne wanted, but he referred to 4 or 5 cases several times, and he was particularly anxious to have the very best brand-Ambassador's whiskey preferred. They even compared a comparative price of Controller's liquor with those they had on board. Witness next heard Capt. Bryne to remark, "Put the stuff over the outside." Super-cargo Ryan replied, "It is just as unlawful that way as to land it on the whart." A

short while later Super-cargo Ryan

was heard to say "Nothing doing now

come back later." Mr. Green then

left his hiding place and proceeded

around the liquor stores on the same

remises where he spoke to Wilson,

and gave certain instructions.

At eleven o'clock that night witness ecognized Guy Shears, defendant in row boat at the N.E. corner of the dock. Witness turned around and went up to the street, where Captain Bryne passed him with an oar in hand. A short while later, witness saw Bryne sculling the boat towards the front of the Furness Withy wharf, and it was then that witness went over to the stores and communicated with the police. Kendrick then came towards witness and said something about liquors being lowered into the boat. Witness then went to the front of the wharf and saw one case going over the starboard rail. He heard Capt. Naufits shout out to Capt. Bryne to throw the darn stuff overboard. The captain then went into the wheel house and started an argument with the police. Witness then shouted to the police on board that he would follow the ship in the Customs boat with the other officers. At that time the engines of the Herbert Green were going causing a big strain on the lines. As the stern line parted the ship steamed out the harbour. Witness remembered Const. Russell telling the captain to stop his ship, as it was under arrest, but he paid no heed. The captain stated the ship was ordered to sea at 12 o'clock, and to sea she was going. Engineer Jones then shouted to the stokers below to shake her up, and for someone to come up on the deck and throw the sons of overboard. At this junction Mr. Feneon was not ready to proceed with the

oss-examination of witness. Mr. Fox then recalled Customs Ofcer Keurickk, who recognized the bottle of whiskey that had been given him by Super-cargo Ryan, on board the Herbert Green. The bottle was then put in as an exhibit.

In answer to a question put by Mr. Fenelon, witness knew the bottle by the name and label, besides he had previously made a small cut on one of the labels as an identification mark. The court arose at 4.30 until 11 o'- the Harbor between the Float- TOWN — Children's Skuffer clock this morning.
