### ANOTHER NEW STORY.

for at any moment during the past few years, produced a profound sensa-

few years, produced a profound sensation, as the people realize that the last visible link which connected the present political situation of the country with the reform, anti-slave trade, and freedom of the press agitations of 1810 and 1812, has been removed at a most vital moment in the history of Great Britain. The despatch states that he died easily. He fell into a pleasant slumber, from which he never awoke. Lord Brougham was born in Edinburgh, Sept. 9, 1778, and consequently but little more than four months was wanting to the completion of the ninetieth year of his age. His remarkable tenacity of life was due not only to a naturally vigorous constitution, but to habits of extraordinary activity, an elastic and versatile temperament, and singular executive energy. His early education was received at University of Edinburgh, where he obtained the reputation of wonderful precocity of genius, and evinced a decided taste for the more abstruse branches of mathematics and physical branches of mathematics and physical science. Having determined to adopt the legal profession, which at that HEROD-At Guelph, on Monday, the 11th inst. time was the principal avenue to distinction in British society, he commenced the study of Scottish law in Edinburgh, but before admission to the bar in 1800, he made a tour of several months on the continent of Eu

His connection with the "Speculative Club," a society for the discussion of philosophical and political questions, on his return to Edinburgh, brought him into intimate contact with Jeffrey, Francis Horner, Sydney Smith, and other men of ability and wit, with whom he maintained a constant friendship during their respective lives. Soon after the establishment of the "Edinburgh Review," in 1802, with whose original founders he cherished a warm social and political sympathy, he was admitted as a member of the staff, and after the issue of the third number, became one of the principal contributors to that journal. His fame as an advocate made rapid progress, and he was employed as insel in some very important cases. His eloquence as exhibited on some of these occasions attracted the attention of the leading Whips, with whom he soon became a distinguished favorite. and through their influence, was elected to the House of Commons as a member of the rotten borough of Camelford. He at once took a strong position against the claims of the Tories. His aggressive zeal, his ve

Camelford. He at once took a strong position against the claims of the Tories. His aggressive zeal, his vehemence in debate, and the unsparing severity of his sarcasm, made him a formidable opponent. One of his first steps was to introduce measures for the suppression of the slave-trade. In their labors for this end, Wilberforce and Clarkson had no more strenuous supporter than the fiery young Whig from Scotland.

But the great event of Mr. Brougham's life up to this time was his defence of Queen Caroline on her trial before the House of Lords in 1820 and 1821. In his capacity of attorney-general for the queen, he managed this celebrated case with extraordinary address and ability. His eloquence on this occasion has seldom been equalled. While he compelled the abandonment of the suit on the part of the Government he became the object of the warmest popular enthusiasm.

The basis of Lord Brougham's distinction was the union of rare intellectual vigor with a wonderful talent for execution. He was neither a philosopher nor a poet. He was destitute of the creative power which enlarges the domain of thought by the introduction of new ideas, and tempts the excursions of fancy by the charm of original images. He was an acute observer of men and of acts, an analyist of considerable refinement and even subtlety, a bold and eloquent asserter of his own convictions, and within a limited sphere, a courageous champion of human rights. But the great secret of his strength lay in his untiring power of action.

It was quickly followed by the disaster of Bothwell Brig, when fearful vengeance was taken on the defeated Presbyterians, and the years which followed were, by reason of the atrocities crowded into them, called "the killing time." Then it was that Glaverhouse sourced the west like a raging wild beast—be and his troopers, like so many wolves thirsting for blood. They had power to do as they listed, and what they listed would, if enumerated, make up a long, sad catalogue of indescribable horrors. It is said of the Israelites in Egypt that the more they were oppressed the more they multiplied and grew. So may it be said of the Covenanters under the Claverhouse regime. The effect intended was not produced. The Covenanters were not exterminated, but instead, they were driven to take a course which ultimately brought the land rest and deliverance—they publicly disowned the King, declared that he had forfeited his right to the British throne, and they no longer owned nor would render allegiance to him. The leaders in this bold decisive course did not enter on it without counting the cost. They knew that their lives would, in all probabilty be lost in prosecuting it, but, seeing clearly that through it alone lay hope for Scotland, they were content to give themselves in sacrifice for the truth and freedom of the land. And for this they had not made up their minds unnecessarily. Donald Cargill, the first to speak the bold words, was executed in Edinburgh. But though they thus fell their work was done. They died, but it prospered. The Sanguhar Declaration mys be compared to a cloud like a man's hand, which grew and grew till it spread over the whole British sky. The little leaven had leavened the whole lump—the kingdom was ripe for revolution, and in the very year of Renwick's martyrdom the Revolution came the Stuarts were ba

An utter change was produced by this event. The Covenanting struggle, in the physical sense of it, was terminated. Preshyterianism was re-established—confiscated estates were restored—ministers were brought back to their charges—and exiles came home in safety and honour.
