

KNOX CHURCH SOIREE.

The soiree given by the young people in connection with the congregation of Knox's Church last (Wednesday) evening was a perfect success, both as regards the attendance, and the manner in which the arrangements were carried out. In introducing his subject—"Home Influence the foundation of good government."

The future historian of the United States will be puzzled to know how to accurately describe the present state of affairs in that country. Fourth of July orators sound its praises, and describe it as the freest and best nation in the world; but at other times it is denounced in the strongest possible manner, in the press and in the pulpit, and by those too who drew their first breath on her soil. The fountain head of all good government must be purified before morality and virtue can sway the minds of the multitude. The time is coming when we must direct primary attention to good government. The family is the oldest institution in the world, and from families come the elements out of which governments and churches must be formed. They are the nurseries of affection and virtue, and how necessary it is that the fireside should be made the most attractive spot of all. In the early days of the world, the family was ignored—children were taken at a tender age from their parents and educated for the pursuit of war—mere physical development was attended to. Morals and religion were studiously kept in abeyance, and men became as near beasts of prey as possible—strong as the tiger and cunning as the fox. Bearing in mind the age and its false ideas, we may moderate our censure at this course of training, and ask what have our governments in latter times done for the education of the establishment of our Common Schools in Canada, nothing has been done by government to stem vice and corruption. Although the amount contributed may be considered very liberal, still the heavy cost of transport renders the representative in provisions at Fort Garry-quite limited, considering the large number entirely dependent upon the Relief Fund for subsistence. It is highly important, in point of economy, that intending contributions should be under contract for delivery at Abercrombie before the spring thaw commences, the transport then being much more difficult and expensive.

Madrid, Jan. 27.—The Government has laid claim to all libraries, archives and works of art possessed by the churches as property of State. It was while carrying out the orders of the Government that the Governor of Burgos was assessinated. The event causes great excitement. Violent demonstrations have been made by the people in the city against the Papal Nuncio, and the Government has withdrawn its official recognition of the diplomatic powers.

Paris, Jan. 27.—Later advices from Rio Janiero state that the Paraguaya army though badly defeated at Viletta, still occupies the stronghold of Angostura. The damage by the burning of the Custom-house at Rio Janiero was largely over estimated.

London, Jan. 27.—Mr. Ernest Jones, well known politician, died yesterday. He had just been informally chosen by ballot over Mr. Milner Gibson, a liberal candidate, to succeed Birley, one of the present members of Parliament from Manchester, in case the latter be unseated on charge of bribery.

London, Jan. 27.—Official despatches have been received at the War Office from New Zealand. They announce that a battle has taken place between the British and the Maori rebels, at Poverty Bay; and the latter were defeated with great loss in killed, wounded, and prisoners. The victory has restored tranquility in that quarter of the Colony.

The Directors of the Bank of Overend, Gurney & Co., have been held on trial in bonds of \$20,000 each.

Dublin, Jan. 27.—A meeting of influential citizens was held last night, when resolutions were adopted urging the Government to pardon the Fenian Convicts.

American Despatches

New York, Jan. 28.—A Herald's special from Havana, 25th, via Key Wess, 27th, says: Puerto Principæ was captured by the patriot forces under Gen. Quesyba, on the 16th inst., the same day that Valmazeda entered Bayanio.

A reign of terror has commenced in this city, caused by the breaking out of open hostilities between the Cuban and Spanish factions, whose hatred for each other cannot be described. There is very little security outside the city walls. The Cubans, from their house tops, fire upon the volunteers and soldiers passing through the streets. The military enter the houses from which shots are fired and massacre. The volunteers by their behaviour provoke the resistance of the people, and then fire into them indiscriminately. The officers and men of the regular force are opposed to giving such discretionary powers to the volunteers. Many private persons and foreigners have been fired upou.

Key West, Jan. 27—Many persons have arrived here this morning from Havana, and it is stated that more are coming.

New York, Jan. 28.—The steamship Alaska, from Aspinwall, and the City of London, from Exergenol, have arrived.

Countin, SC. Jan. 27.—A joint resolution passed the Lighalarte authorizing the Governor to employ armed force for the preservation of peace.

The House passed the bill to enforce the Civil Rights Bill of Congress.

THE NEW ASSESSMENT LAW.—The new Assessment Act passed during the late session of Parliament came into force on Saturday last, and under that Act the Assessments must be made for the current year. The difference between the new and old Act are very important, and the Assesors will be required to notice these differences with great care to avoid falling into error.
