INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

Mr Williams, member for Hamilton, has introduced a Bill to establish Industrial Schools. It provides that a school in which industrial training is provided, and in which children

It provides that a school in which industrial training is provided, and in which children are lodged, clothed and fed, as well as taught, shall exclusively be deamned in Industrial School within the meaning of this Act, and shall be mader the control of the Board of School Trustees for the municipality in which the same is stituted, and, so far as applicable, be subject to the same rules and regulations as public schools. The Government may purchase for the public use of the Froynce in suitable places within the cities of Toronto, Hamilton, London, Ottawa and Kingston, on portition of the School Trustees of the city praying for the same, all such lands as may be necessary, and erect thereon a building for the Industrial School, and provide for the management of it.

Any person may bring before two Justices of the Peace any child apparently under 14 years that comes within any of the following descriptions, viz.
