Calgary Board of Health Will Meet This Morning to Check the Spread of Typhoid; Estey Comes out of Trance and Will Order Tests of Milk Made

MEETING of the Calgary Board of Health, the first in many months, will be called at 11 o'clock this morning in the office of Mayor J. W. Mitchell to consider measures to stop a threatened epidemic of typhoid fever.

Spurred into activity by the Albertan's disclosure of the fact that the local hospitals were crowded with typhoid patients, although Mayor Mitchell, City Engineer J. T. Child, W. H. Manary, Alderman J. G. Hester, and Dr. Egbert, Alderman Hester communicated with the mayor and Dr. Egbert and both agreed that in view of the exposures, it would be best to call a meeting of the board at once and take steps to see that the health of the citizens of Calgary is safeguarded as zealously as the Canadian Pacific railway is guarding the health of its employees.

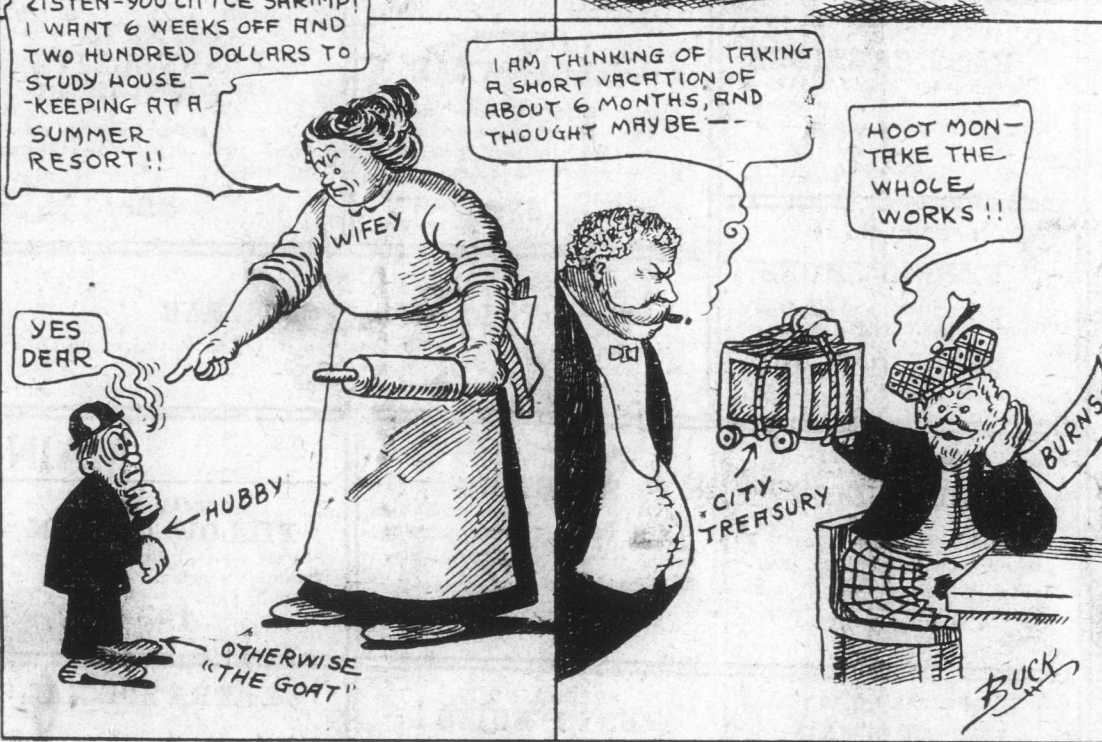

Senator Lougheed Back of New Vaudeville House for Calgary; to be Erected Adjoining the Empire Theatre

THAT Calgary rapidly is assuming a place of importance on the theatrical map of Western Canada again is emphasized by the announcement yesterday that Senator J. A. Lougheed is to build a fine new theatre on the roof feet of ground just west of the present Empire theatre, Eighth avenue near First street west.

"I have not yet determined just how much I shall put into the building," said Senator Lougheed yesterday, "but it will be an up-to-date theatre building of the most modern type. The theatre will be for vaudeville and will be arranged on lines to provide the utmost comfort for patrons."

Senator Lougheed, who is the financial magnate back of the Sherman Grand theatre also, says the new theatre will house the first-class line of vaudeville which is now presented in the old Empire building.

Suffragettes Who Committed Outrages When Premier Asquith Visited Ireland, Have Trial—Glady's Evans Found Guilty of Firing Theatre—Sentence Reserved

DUBLIN, Ireland, Aug. 6.—Four militant suffragettes were put on trial today on the charge of having committed serious outrages at the time of the visit to Dublin of the British prime minister. Glady's Evans was found guilty of setting fire, July 18, to the Theatre Royal, where Mr. Asquith was scheduled to speak the following day on home rule.

The charge against Mabel Capper, who was accused of being an accomplice of Glady's Evans was withdrawn, while Lizzie Baker, also charged as an accessory, pleaded guilty to damaging property.

A great crowd filled the court room and gathered outside. Timothy Healy, chief counsel for the women, was hooted when he entered. He demanded the exclusion from the jury of all members of the society of Molly Maguires. He said that he refused to be insulted by them, and did not doubt that they were there by the government's orders.

The attorney general for Ireland, C. A. O'Connor, with three assistants, conducted the prosecution. He described the attempt to burn the theatre, and said it was only by a miracle that it escaped destruction.

THE MOTE IN THE BEAM

That the Calgary city administration is discrediting itself in wilfully refusing to put into effect the recommendations of the committee which was appointed to make an investigation of public affairs there can be no doubt.

The investigation was held as a result of a feeling that had become very general about the city that there was much in connection with the management of the business of the city which was not good.

Among other things it was unanimously held by the investigating committee that the medical health officer of the city had been grossly lax in his use of a stronger term.

The recommendation of the investigating committee with reference to the medical officer was placed, in the main, upon the revelations made before the committee with reference to the conduct of the isolation hospital.

Monday, however, word reached The Albertan that there was a large number of cases of typhoid in Calgary and an investigation was instituted. The result was published in yesterday morning's issue.

The medical health officer told The Albertan when questioned Monday, that he knew of but eight cases of typhoid in the city, yet he draws a comfortable salary from the city for the express purpose of protecting the health of Calgary.

It is, we think, a singular commentary upon the fitness of men to conduct the affairs of a city who can allow themselves to be responsible for such a condition.

Especially do we think the situation is grave in view of the fact that we are inviting a great concourse of people to assemble in Calgary within a few days.

And when you get back to the meat of the matter, there is probably little doubt that the great share of the responsibility rests upon those who have prevented the enforcement of the recommendations of the investigation committee.

It would seem that these men are deliberately bringing discredit upon themselves.

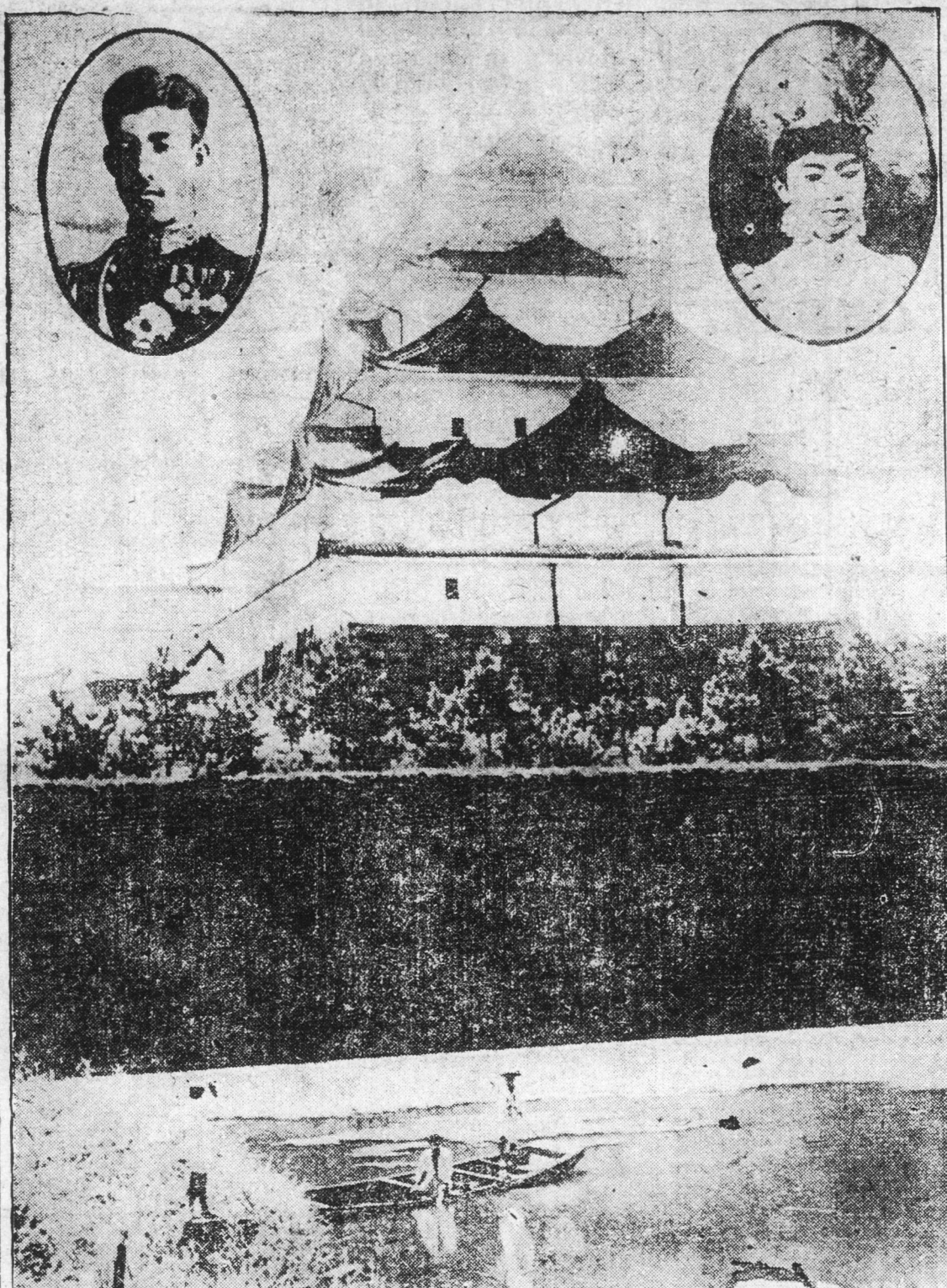
