The young salmon which are now beeng hatched at the Harrison Lake institution are sockeye, sohoes and spring salmon, but the sockeyes compose by far the greater part of the control of th hatch. There are approximately twenty-six million sockeyes, two mil-

The ova were collected over a long season and consequently are hatching at various periods. Historical Treatise on a Theme Which Engaged Explorers' Attention for Ages.

Polar research and the numerous at-tempts to reach the North Pole, which began as far back as the minth century, are replete with daring adventure, romance and tragedy. Since authenticated records have been preserved more than 700 men have lost their lives in efforts to reach the geographical spot known as the North Pole. By these efforts much scientific knowledge has been given to the world, and something more than a year ago the International Geographical Congress, in session at Washington, warmly indorsed polar exploration as work of the highest geographic and scientific value. The only knowledge of the polar regions with which the ancients can be credited was a rumor concerning Thule, an island on the Arctic Circle. This rumor had Phtheas as its author. The report was doubted, but in the mir century a body of Irish monks visited Iceland and reported that there was no darkness during the summer solstice. This record, furnished by the writings

of the monk Dicuil, is the first account of the monk Dicuil, is the first account of any polar expedition.

In the first book of his translation of Orosius, King Alfred told of the first voyages for discovery made by Other and Wulfstan. While the localities mentioned cannot now be located, it seems probable that Other rounded North Cape and visited the coast of Lapland.



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
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
