THE RED LIGHT IN THE SKY. Explanation of the Fiery Phenemenon

For the past three or four evenings phenomenon has been noticed in the shape of a red light which illuminated the western sky as though a great conflagration was throwing its glare over the heavens.

Meteorologists say that this light is probably the reflection from a stratum of decomposed vapors in the upper atmosphere. Electric storms in the sun and in our atmosphere storms in the sun and in our atmosphere have produced this decomposition. This opinion is based on experiments reported by Professor Tyndall of the reflective properties of vapors decomposed by electric action on a strong sunlight.

To show the extent of country over which the strong sunlight it may be men-

this phenomenon prevails, it may be mentioned that despatches have been received from a number of places in Canada and the United States stating that the light had been mistaken for a conflagration and the fire brigade called out.

Under the provisions of the departmental "instructions" to agents in Great Britain any adult, irrespective of vocation, may obtain "assisted passage" to Canada, and under its cover agents encourage and send all manner of people to the dominion.
