What will it be like if cholera comes? In conclusion it would seem imperative from a sanitary point of view that a channel should convey clean water into the bay, and there should be a clean north shore from end to end.

The Toronto Bay is bad enough where there is a clean shore. What would it be like if it were fringed all along the seaward polluted north side by growth of weeds and rubbish?
