Watford Council Favors 4th Line Highway

As Route For Sarnia-London Provincial Highway—Interests of Urban Municipalities Between Border and London Given Consideration by Government— Fourth Line, the Logical Route, Would Serve and Satisfy All Interests—Strong Reso-lution Endorsed.

Council met in Library Board oom on Monday evening for regular May meeting.

Present:-Reeve Connolly, Coun-cillors Hollingsworth, Doar, Saunders and Hawn.

The following resolution was moved by J. Doar, seconded by N. Hawn, and unanimously carried:----

WHEREAS, the construction of a WHEREAS, the construction of a connecting link of pavement between the Northern Provincial Highway at Sarnia and the Southern Provincial Highway at London is being consid-ered by the Provincial Government to amplify the present Provincial Road System, and whereas, there are various routes for such a connecting link, viz. link, viz:-

(a) From Sarnia to London vi (a) From Sarnia to London via the Egremont Road (Sarnia Gravel.)
 (b) From Sarnia along the Sar-nia Gravel to Wyoming sideroad, thence southerly along the sideroad to the Fourth Line at Wyoming; thence easterly along the Fourth Line though Wanstead and Watford of Structure, thence continent along

Line though Wanstead and Watford to Strathroy; thence southeast along the Mt. Brydges Road through Mt. Brydges to strike the Southern High-way south of Deleware. (c) As Route (b) to Strathroy, thence easterly along the Townline between Adelaide and Canadoc to strike the Sarnia Gravel at Hickory Corners, thence through Poplar Hill and Hyde Park to London. And Whereas the first route would

And Whereas, the first route would not touch a single urban centre be-tween Sarnia and London; requires several miles more of pavement to connect the two highways and two substantial bridges with additional

Robert McKenzie and C. E. Janes acted as scrutineers for the unionists and Kenneth Ross and James Thomp-son as scrutineers for the nonconcur-ring members. ring members. Watford Presbyterian Church has already voted, by a large majority, in favor of union, so the adverse vote in Knox Church means the breaking apart of two churches which have been together under pastoral care for 75 years.

Rail ballast will be laid out over Rail ballast will be laid out over 200 miles of track on the London division of the Canadian National Railways this summer, requiring 150 extra men who will be taken on at different points in the division. The double track main line of the C.N.R. from Sarnia to Niagara Falls and the single track connecting link between Windsor and Sarnia lines from Glencoe and Komoka are to be completely re-ballasted. The work will require extra gangs, totalling

Ballasting will be kept up over the other lines of the division in order but there will be no wholesale ballast-ing program such as will be carried out on the Sarnia to Niagara Falls double track line.
