#### IRELAND AND SCOTLAND.

The Society has recently bestowed much attention on the subject of efforts for Ireland, and the importance of taking steps for a wider circulation of Bibles, Prayer Books, books and tracts in that country.

With this view, and with special reference to

who in a letter dated Palace, Holywood, Belfast,

"In reply to your letter of the 11th, I beg to say that a small grant of Prayer Books would be most acceptable at present, when so many are attending all the services of our Church, who never attended before. My confirmations in Belfast will, I am sure, when concluded, show the number of young persons confirmed as more than four times the usual annual average. I should also be most thankful for a few books to form a lending library in one or two parishes, as one of my clergy mentioned to me lately, when visiting a remote country parish, that the young men in the parish asked him for books to read during the winter evenings. Before this, they would the winter evenings. have spent their evenings in the public houses."

The Board agreed to place books to the value of £10 at the Bishop's discretion, and to intimate that more would be sent if he should desire them.

The Dean of Down having opened a lending library in the cathedral town of Downpatrick, and wishing to turn the present religious feeling in Ireland to good account, requested a grant of books towards a lending library in the cathedral town of Downpatrick.

The Rev. T. Höern é. eighteen years Church

Missionary at Secundra, near Agra, having lost the whole of his private and missionary library at that place during the great mutiny in 1857. applied for a grant of maps and prints, which he specified, as well as for some Common Praver Books, for the use of native christians. letter was accompanied by one of the Society's large Scripture prints, to which he had attached a translation of the text, illustrative of the subject in Hindustani and Hindi, as a specimen of other similar translations for use in the Indian native schools.

The Prayer Books and maps, to the value of £10, were granted from the Special Indian Fund

The specimen of the translation having been approved, other like translations, with the prints, have been added.

The following are extracts from Mr. Höernle's

letter:— "Our accounts of the progress, knowledge, and kingdom of Christ in Northern India are becoming daily more cheering. The Lord has been, and still is overruling the calamities and losses of the mutiny to the furtherance of His cause. It is a most remarkable fact, that in towns where the fury of the enemy raged most violently, such as Meerut, Delhi, Agra, Cawnpore, Furruttabad, Lucknow. &c., a spirit of earnest inquiry into the christian truth and faith is spreading among the natives. As in some of these places, e. g. in Agra, Delhi, Mccrut, &c., where small branch depôts of your Society existed before the mutiny, your books were extensively read, and your maps, &c. used in our English and vernacular schools, you will be glad to know that though a severe and calamitous storm passed over the country, the good seed sown before has not been destroyed. but is beginning to spring up in a measure never

experienced before the mutinv.

Of the new conversions in the neighbourhood of Meerut, brought about under the most remarkable circumstances, you will have read in the Church Missionary Society's publications. In Agra, too, several Hindus and Mahommedans were lately haptised by the missionaries. Among them are a native assistant surgeon and a Mohammedan of Delhi, who now acts as a teacher of the Persian language in our missionary college On his side is a converted Hindu who teaches Hindi and Sanscrit. A few more natives are under instruction, and in a few neighbouring villages others are inquiring after salvation by Christ In Delhi, as the Rev. Mr. Schneider reports there is a great stir among the natives, both Mahommedans and Hundus. Several hundreds of inquirers have lately come forward, applying for instruction to the missionaries These are most remarkable facts, if contrasted with the ravages of the mutiny at this place. Delhi was the chief stronghold of the mutineers. Here the new king was proclaimed, of whom, a Moslem, an enemy of christianity and its professors, it was expected that he would, as a matter of course, erase the christian faith from India, and make Islam once more triumphant over the country. And lo! all these attempts of Satan and his hosts have passed away; the standard of Christ is exalted higher than it was before, and hundreds of natives are gathering round about it, ready to do homage to the King of kings, whose reign was to have been abolished!

"At Umritsir, Peshawur, and other stations in the Punjab, many native soldiers have embraced the christian faith."

## MADRAS.

The communications made from time to time during the year by the Rev. David Simpson, the energetic and efficient Secretary of the Madras

Diocesan Committee, have been of a very interesting character. In one of his letters he sent the names of forty-five gentlemen of that Presidency who were desirous of becoming members of the Parent Society. He said :-

"I am very glad to be able to inform you, on behalf of the Committee, that the native female boarding schools, established by the aid of the special grant of £1000 made to us by the Parent Society, are progressing favourably. There is no occasion for me at present to enter into any details of the working of these schools, as the half-yearly reports have been published in full in the Madras Committee's 'Intelligencer,' from time to time."

The following is a list of the Institutions supported by the Parent Society and the Madras Committee, viz.:

It appeared that the Diocesan Committee had been enabled to make liberal grants of books to missions and schools during the year. Mr. Simpson said they had also applied portions of their subscriptions to vernacular publications and

grants of school apparatus for schools.

"By the terms of the Parent Society's grant to us of £1000 from the Special Indian Fund, for Native Female education, we were allowed to draw on you in 1859 for £500, in 1860 for £300, and in 1861 for £200. I must earnestly ask, on behalf of the Madras Committee, that the grant for 1860 be increased. It is impossible to keep up efficiently the schools we have established on £300 per annum. Our own resources are already stretched to the utmost. Demands are made on us for fresh schools, and the only answer we can give is, 'We cannot aid you; the Parent Society's grant is much less than we had hoped for.'

"You will remember that our scheme required for its full carrying out a sum of £650 a year.

"I am desired to ask the aid of the Parent Society towards the publication of a quarto edition of the Tamil Common Prayer Book, for use in the reading-desks of the mission churches and chapels. It is proposed that the Prayer Book shall undergo careful correction, by a committee appointed by the Diocesan Committee and the Lord Bishop; that 800 copies shall be printed, the type to be bold and clear, the paper stout and good. We cannot expect that the work can be got up at a less cost than 3000 rupees, or £300; that is, £1 a copy. Each missionary will gladly purchase single copies at that price; but unless we can reduce it very considerably, there is no chance of its being introduced for use in the smaller places of worship."

The Standing Committee stated, that they had assigned, from the Special Indian Fund, £200 for the present year, in addition to the £300 for Native Female Education; and £100 towards a quarto edition of the Tamil Common Prayer Book.

The Madras Committe having requested some other grants, it was agreed to grant-

The Standing Committee stated that they had Special Indian Fund, towards printing Anglo-Indian Narrative Tracts, the sum of £50.

A letter from the Rev A. R. Symonds, Secretary of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel at Madral, detailed the benefits which had arisen from the Society's grant of £500 towards schools in the principal towns of the province of Tinnevely. This aid had enabled the Committee to take up entirely new positions in localities before unoccupied, and had strenghened the chris tian cause in places in which there had been no previous footing. The grent of 1858 having been so productive, the Madras Committee earnestly hoped that aid would be voted for 1860.

The Standing Committee have deemed it right to assign the further sum of £400 towards these good objects from the Special Fund for India.

A letter from Mr. Simpson, dated Madas, June 9, 1859, expressed, in the name of that branch, much regret on losing the services of Archdeacon Shorland, who was then about to leave India for England Mr Simpson said that the Committee had resolved to present a valedictory Address to the Archdeacon indicative of their esteem and gratitude.

The address to the Archdescon, who had been for many years the Secretary, and afterwards the Vice-President of the Committee, was laid, together with his reply, before the Board.

#### BOMBAY.

The mode of appropriation of the Special Indian grant forms the chief subject of the com-munications from Bombay. The Rev. F. J. Spring, Secretary of the Bombay Diocesan Committe, writing from Bombay, December 23, 1859, stated that at the last meeting of the Diocesan Committee.

"The principal subject of discussion was, how we could avail ourselves of the liberality of the Society in placing at our disposal £500 a year for five years for the purpose of establishing schools, &c. I enclose copies of our proceedings, also a copy of a 'sta'ement' read by the Rev. W. K Fletcher, the senior chaplain, in which he shows the necessity there is for the establishment of a good grammar school in this city, and also of a suitable school for the female children of our countrymen and other christian persons in the middle classes of society I am directed to offer the cordial thanks of the Committee to the Venerable Society for its munificent donation, and to assure you of our fervent desire to promote christian knowledge in the Diocese.

"You will see from tue proceeding, that the sum of £250 is to be appropriated out of the Society's grant to the establishment of a girls' school, in close connexion with 'the Young Ladies' Institution.' This Institution was set on foot about two years ago, as mentioned by Mr. Fletcher in his 'statement.' He is the secretary of it. It is believed that if the proposed school for girls is opened in connexion with this Institution, the parents of the children for whom it is intended will have confidence in its management; for the Institution has so far succeeded as to pay its current expenses. Its success is, I believe, entirely owing to the excellent Superintendent, an educated woman, the daughter of a clergyman, and one possessed of a missionary spirit. I am sure that if we can only get another like her, the proposed school will be established."

A good house had been taken in the Fort at a rent of 800 rupees per month. They had drawn on the Treasurers of the Society for £500 granted for one year.

#### COLOMBO.

The Lord Bishop of Colombo, adverting to the increased efforts in progress in Ceylon for the diffusion of religious education among the native races in the Colony, observed that the mass of the people can only be reached through the medium of their own tanguage: for although in the towns the desire of English instruction is universal, this is not the case in the rural districts.

"Wherever," he added, "there are Clergy at work, whether European or native, to give con-stant and responsible supervision, schools ought to be opened in all the surrounding villages, that from each station, as a centre, the light and influence of our christian teaching might radiate largely, till all are brought to partake of its blessin. But this cannot be done without a large extension of the work of female education, which must for some time be nearly, if not wholly, gratuitors. For the sake of advancement in life, parents will give their boys an English education, and gladly contribute from their own resources to obtain it; but they will not do from without, and the means too, before we shall get the future mothers of the whole people under the influence of christian training and instruction. And there is every reason in the East why this should be attempted more earnestly and systematically, not alone on account of the early influence to be exercised over the future household and the earliest training of the infant children, but especially on account of the late influence of the mother through life over her own offspring. Among the Singhalese this is far more powerful than among ourselves; and if quietly and judiciously used, may be made the instrument of much prospective and permanent good, under the guidance and with the blessing of God."

The Standing Committee having given notice of their intention to propose, at the general meeting in February, 1860, that five hundred pounds be placed at the discretion of the Bishop, for the purposes of native female education, in connexion with the Church of England, in his Diocese, with special reference to instruction in the vernacular languages; this grant was made accordingly.

The Rev. E. Mooyaart, Colonial Chaplain of Point-de Galle, Ceylon, applied for aid towards an endowment fund for a native christian orphan school at Point-de-Galle. He acknowledged with thanks the grant of £100 recently made by the Board towards the erection of a church at Galle, and said.

"An orphan boarding school, commenced fortyfive years ago, 'for the fatherless and the unfortunate,' by the late Mrs. Gibson of Galle, who lately died there at an advanced age, has been bequeathed by her, in trust, in connexion with the Church of England, for the education of the children of poor natives. This institution stands on a hill three miles from the Station, commanding a fine sea view, and is called 'Buona Vista.' where a hundred children of both sexes were gratuitously fed, clothed, and educated at considerable expense, under her maternal susperintendence. Industrial training was formerly combined with elementary instruction in English, the boys being brought up to useful trades, and the girls .taught plain and ornamental needlework. The boys' industrial department was given up, and the number of pupils has been reduced to twenty-four, of whom fifteen are boarders, chiefly Singhalese girls. A native male tencher is appointed for their tuition, and two female teachers for needlework. Religious instruction is given, and the children attend the English Church."

This application having been referred to the Bishop, with the recommendation of the Board, that such a portion of the £500 as his Lordship might see fit should be assigned to the Galle school, the Bishop has devoted £100 towards that object.

The Bishop wrote from Nuwura Eliya, April 19, 1860, saying that the Rev. C. C. McArthur, of the Nellore Mission, had, since his Lordship's visitation in 1858, brought the Church at that station into thorough repair; that he had built six schools; and is about to erect two more. Hehas ten times as many heathen boys under christian instruction as he had on the occasion of the Bishop's last visit; whilst the female boarding school has fifty native girls receiving daily teaching in religious truth. He is about to commence three more girls' schools in the neighbouring vilinges, the district being very populous. In addition to this he has opened two English schools in his own neighbourhood. His Lordship requested £10 or £15 to each of two chapels, "Cockcoville" and "Navatcully," which, said he, "this good man is about to build. One fruit of this increased seal is shown in the larger number attending the Sunday services, which has quadrupled since I was there; and in the last year the number of baptisms has been doubled. A gladdening sight it must be in a heathen landso grossly idolatrous, too, as this district is to see 200 children assembled every morning for prayer, and to hear them catechised in the elements of christian truth."

The Board agreed to grant £10 towards cacle of the two new chapels.

The Bishop in a letter dated on visitation, Kandy, requested £10 towards the erection of a small chapel for a cluster of little villages at the extremity of a district called "Egodeyene;" native clergyman, the Rev. C. Senanayaka, baving the spiritual charge of the people.

The Board granted £10 towards this chapel. Several grants of books have been voted for use in this Diocese.
