VESTRY MEETING.

A Special Meeting of the Vestry was held on the 15th June, the Rector in the chair, to further consider the question of painting and decorating the Church.

Mr. Chadwick reported that he had seen Mr. Frank Darling on the subject of the resolution passed at the previous special meeting, and Mr. Darling had declined to prepare drawings in the way proposed, but had agreed to give his advice and assistance with reference to the designs already prepared.

On motion of Mr. Chadwick, seconded by Mr. A. M. Browne, a Committee was appointed to decide upon the manner, style, and designs of the decorations, consisting of the Rector and Church-

wardens, Mr. W. J. Baines, and Mr. A. J. Close, with power to add to their number.

The By-law for a credit of \$2,500, to be applied in slating the roof, and painting and decorating the interior of the Church, was then read a second and third time, and passed.

After the Vestry Meeting had adjourned the Committee met and discussed the matter generally, having before them the designs prepared, with notes and suggestions made by Mr. Darling, and a preliminary course of action in the matter was decided upon.

THE MISSION.

Some who cannot *give* much to the Mission Room, would like to unite with others in prayer on behalf of the Mission Work. The Rector suggests the following as a suitable prayer, in reliance on our Lord's promise, that if we agree on earth as touching anything that we shall ask it shall be done for us of His Father, which is in Heaven:

O Heavenly Father, we beseech Thee to bless the Mission Work in this Parish. Seek out and save the lost; teach the ignorant; turn the hearts of sinners; uphold the weak and falling; comfort the sorrowful; heal the sick; and look with pity and compassion upon all, for Jesus Christ's sake, Amen.

The Rector takes this opportunity of suggesting to the Church Workers, and to all who know the value of Intercessory Prayer, to make use of the Friday Evensong at 5.30, and the Early Communion on the First Sunday in the month, for special Intercession on behalf of the Parish, its people, and its work. With this view, special prayers for the Parish will be offered on Friday afternoon. Let it be understood throughout the Parish, that these two services are the Church Workers' Prayer Meeting and Communion. The offerings at the Early Communion on the First Sunday in the month, and on Saints' Days, will be devoted to the Mission Room.

Offertory Envelopes will be supplied to those who are willing to contribute in this way to the maintenance of the Church and Ministry.

PAROCHIAL NEEDS.—Besides the means of meeting ordinary expenditure—

1. Debt \$3,500, should be paid off, or at least reduced, but the ordinary revenue is insufficient to provide funds for this purpose. One dollar monthly from every pewholder would soon extinguish it.
2. The improvement of the Church, to render it more worthy and suitable for the sacred purpose to which it is consecrated. \$3,000 is wanted for this, and would be provided if every family in the Congregation gave a moderate sum towards it.
3. \$1,000 for the erection of the Phœbe Street Mission Hall, and subscriptions to maintain the Mission.
4. Donations and bequests towards an endowment, of which there is at present a sum of \$295 only.
