the dividend payable to creditors would be a small one. He had very little means and, if possible, less credit.

THE quantity of wheat marketed at Virden, Man., since the commencement of the season amounts to about 400,000 bushels, and it is estimated that there are 200,600 bushels yet to be delivered.

A Kingston syndicate is considering the purchase of the Military Colonization ranche near Calgary, formerly superintended by General Strange, on which are 1,500 cattle and 500 horses

THE receipts at the Custom House for the port of Montreal for the month of March just ended were \$645,427 as compared with \$702,-626 for the same month of last year, showing a decrease for this year of \$57,192.

THE Canadian Pacific Car and Passenger Company, with a capital of \$80,000, has been incorporated for the purpose of conducting a treight and passenger ferry across the St. Lawrence from Prescott to Ogdensburg.

THE depth to which natural gas wells are excavated varies with the locality. Gas has been found at 700 feet, or even less, in so called pockets, and again a depth of 2,000 feet was reached before a vein was discovered.

A MEETING of creditors of Messrs. U. Germain & Frere, for the appointment of a curator, was held on the third of April. The total amount of the firm's liabilities is \$55,740, of which \$20,000 is due to Mrs. Germain.

NATURAL gas is reported to have been discovered at Petersborough, England. The clay there, when subjected to heat in a close vessel, yielded a dense smoke which, when lighted, burned like coal gas for a considerable time.

ANOTHER gold discovery has been made in the Nippissing district in the township of Cartier. The discoverer is an Indian named Joe Ohorze, and an assay of the find gives \$800 to the ton. The mine is within a mile of the C.P.R. track.

An attachment has been issued against the stock of boots and shoes of T. H. Ley, of St. Thomas, sold before his departure to J. H. Leading Wholesale Trade of Montreal.

THE customs returns for the Port of Ottawa for he month ending to-day show :-- Value of imports, free goods, \$58,391; dutiable goods, \$115,892; total, \$174,113. There were entered for consumption \$120,270, the amount of duty collected being \$34,403.

A COMPANY is being formed in Dresden, Ont., for the purpose of boring to find either gas, oil or salt. This company will first endeavor to find one of the articles named, and then proceed to erect the necessary structures for preparing the same for market.

RICHARD WILSON, general storekeeper of Manotick, Que., has assigned. He was supposed to be working up a good business, but, having no capital to start on, has been compelled to push his sales largely on credit, and nowadays returns are slow in coming in.

WM. McDonald, general storekeeper of North Bay, Ont., assigned in June 1884 when he obtained a settlement at 60 cents in the dollar payable in 12 months. This he paid, but since then has only barely held his own and is now driven to another assignment.

Tue Master-in-Ordinary, after consideration of a financial statement of the affairs of the Central Bank presented by the liquidators, has intimated to them that he will authorize them to declare a dividend of 333 per cent., if they think they can safely venture thereupon.

A CLAIM for \$100,000 has been made by the Dutch steamer Amsterdam against the Belgian steamer Nederland for services in towing the latter into Halifax last week, the Nederland having lost her propeller. BANKRUPT STOCKS.

Merchants in large cities do not always realize the amount of injury that the sudden placing of a bankrupt stock upon the market is calculated to do when the stock in question is slaughtered in a small town or village. In cities like Montreal or Toronto its effect upon the general current of trade is absolutely unperceptible. Like a small tributary entering the mighty St. Lawrence it becomes merged in the great aggregate of sales, and thus its power for evil becomes reduced to an absolute minimum and its effect upon the volume of trade done by individual stores is really nothing.

But, confident in our powers of consumption, we seem to overlook the fact that the case is very different when such a stock is suddenly put upon the market at a sacrifice in a community, whose purchasing powers at the very best can only be looked upon as limited. Because the evil effects of selling off bankrupt stocks for what they will fetch are neutralized by the large consuming powers of this locality, and thus the unfair competition of these stocks is reduced to a minimum by the size of the field they enter, we are too apt to forget that in smaller markets these mitigating circumstances do not exist, and that therefore the amount of injury done to the retail trade of a small community by the sacrifice of a bankrupt stock, purchased at a small percentage in the dollar, cannot be estimated by the standard applicable to the same stock when offered in a large town or city.

The sudden marketing of such a stock as this may mean the loss of the entire season's trade to those storekeepers in the locality who are paying one hundred cents in the dollar. Their circle of custom is a limited one, and one whose wants are easily supplied. Tempted by the prospect of obtaining goods under their legitimate value their customers are prone to purchase so heavily of the slaughtered stock as to fill their requirements for the season and thus the honest storekeeper is compelled to retain his goods untouched upon the shelves, simply because the local demand is exhausted. Should it happen that he is not sufficiently strong to carry this load, he is driven to assign also, and by the forcing of his stock upon the market in its turn, to increase the odds against his neighbors and cause still further disasters.

Even should the selling off of bankrupt stocks not entirely swamp the local demand, it is certain to materially decrease it; and that too, often in the direction of the most profitable staples. Another point is that these stocks are usually sold for cash, and consequently the available ready money of the locality is absorbed with the natural result that the buyers are compelled to make their storekeeper wait. He in turn must obtain delay from his wholesalers, who in consequence begin to look upon his account with suspicion. Should they press him, he must either obtain a loan at usurious interest from some local money lender or else give up the struggle and assign, and probably the latter decision is really the wisest in the long run for, if he be successful in obtaining financial assistance to tide over his difficulties, it is usually only at the cost of tying round his neck such a millstone of interest as must eventually sap him of his resources.

It may be claimed that the sacrifice of a bankrupt stock is an advantage to the purchaser, if to no one else, since by this

means he obtains his goods at a lower cost and acquires the habit of paying cash; but this contention will hardly hold water. In many cases he is tempted to purchase beyond, his needs simply because the prices appear low, forgetting the axiom that nothing is cheap which we do not want, and thus will often overload himself with goods which become dirty and shelf worn before they pass into use. Again, most purchasers at these sales find afterwards that the prices they paid are quite as high and perhaps higher than those charged in other stores. The ingenious dry goods man who cut up his unsaleable seven cent prints and sold them readily at the twelve cent "remnant" counter was too keen a judge of human nature not to have found imitators, and similar tactics are often indulged in at these sales of bankrupt stocks in order to make the rush of credulous buyers pay a larger profit to the shrewd speculator. In fact some of these sales bear a close resemblance to the familiar "mock" auction, and the supposed bankrupt stock is really a collection of showy job lots of loaded cottons, shoddy tweeds and other cheap imitations of genuine fabrics which are palmed off on the buyer at prices above their real

If then it be conceded that the sacrificing of bankrupt stocks forms a distinct injury to the mercantile community of the locality in which it takes place, it behooves us at once to seek a remedy. It is perfectly evident that a sale of the stock is necessary in order to recoup the creditors for a portion of their losses, but could it not be fixed as a rule that this sale should only take place in a large city where its evil effects would be minimized? acknowledge that this would involve outlay for rail freight and packing, but would not this small loss be an inconsiderable factor in comparison with the damage to local interests that its sacrifice upon the spot would cause? Such a course would in the long run benefit the creditors as well, since it is hardly likely that the insolvent would be their only customer in the district and consequently they have a direct interest in maintaining the credit of their customers and in keeping their field of operations intact. If then the advantage be mutual why should not this course be followed? The removal of the unfair competition of bankrupt stocks would have a most beneficial effect upon the trade of the smaller business centres since it would remove what of late has grown to the dimensions of an evil. If the merchants in small trade centres are to have an equal chance of success with their competitors in the larger markets it is evident that some means of lifting the present incubus of bankrupt stocks from their shoulders is imperatively called for. It now remains

with the retail storekeepers themselves to put such pressure on the wholesale trade as will induce them to accede to their representations and in future to confine the slaughter of bankrupt stocks exclusively to those markets where the consumptive power is sufficient to reduce the harm they do to a minimum.

FREE LUMBER.

The placing of lumber on the free list as proposed by the present United States Congress, cannot fail, should the measure carry, to influence favorably the value of Canadian timber limits. It is openly asserted that considerable American capital is now being placed in the hands of banks or invested in readily available securities for the purpose of investment in lumber properties, and that its owners are awaiting the decision of Congress upon the proposed free admission of Canadian lumber before they decide whether to invest in Canadian white pine limits or to seek the yet well wooded sections of the Southern States.

The pine lands of the Northwestern States have for some years back been showing unmistakeable signs of exhaustion, and naturally lumbermen are anxiously on the look out for fresh limits. Pending a decision of the tariff question large purchases of Southern limits have already been made, but notwithstanding the amount of funds thus invested the steady release of capital by the depletion of northern limits and the manufacture and sale of their lumber, now aggregates nearly twenty millions of dollars annually in the three pine producing states, and this sum is now seeking investment in desirable timber limits, preferably in Canada, as it is needless to say that Southern pine is much inferior in size to that of the North, but failing a relief from the existing duty, in Louisiana, Arkansas or Florida. About three years ago a Chicago lumber syndicate took the pioneer step in this direction by purchasing nearly 400 square miles in the interior of Louisiana at an average cost of \$1.50 per acre, or equal to about 15 cents per thousand of lumber in the tree. Next a Muskegon firm bought about 300 square miles in Mississippi at the same price; and recently another company acquired 82,000 acres in Louisiana and Arkansas. Another purchase of 92,000 acres has also been made in Louisiana, and yet other tracts have been acquired in Georgia and Florida. These purchases were made in view of the fact that the total amount of uncut pine in Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota is not estimated to be more than 140,000 millions of feet, and since the yearly output is now 7,500 millions, the limit of exhaustion will be reached inside of twenty years and it will then be necessary to seek fresh fields of operation.

Were the tariff on lumber abrogated, the current of investment would speedily turn in the direction of Canada, with the natural consequence that the value of Canadian timber limits would be enhanced, the wages of lumbermen and the cost of supplies would move up near the standard now paid across the border, and Canadian lumbermen would be compelled to face the competition of powerful and wealthy American syndicates with ample resources and a large market to back them. The handsome profit visible from their standpoint in Canadian pine has caused a remarkable change in the attitude of American lumber men on the tariff question. In fact many large operators in eastern Michigan have abandoned their high tariff convictions and have become enthusiastic for reciprocal freedom in lumber so that the interest taken in the probability of being able to secure Canadian pine lands may be said to have been one of the most powerful proselytizing influences that the tariff reformers can boast of.

This all tends to show that any alteration in the tariff would simply raise the value of timber and timber limits and would in no way lower prices on the American side. With all this capital ready to jump in and secure all the available pine land in Canada it is easy to see that free lumber would simply mean the pouring in of American firms into our territory and the consequent raising of the value of limits, wages, supplies, etc., to the United States level. Amply supplied with funds and with large manufacturing concorns behind them ready to take their pine as fast as it could be cut, they would eventually drive the Canadian lumbermen from the field and deplete our forests no less recklessly than they have their own. Indeed, the present U.S. tariff on lumber wears the appearance rather of being a protection to Canadian interests also since it. prevents the inrush of American lumbermen into the country. If the fariff be revised in the direction of free lumber the Canadian lumber interests will be compelled to commence a struggle for existence against the energetic and powerful syndicates of the United States that will tax their resources to the very utmost. We need not refer here to the salutary influence of our own export duty on logs, a measure first recommended in these columns.

THE ENGLISH BUDGET.

Consideration of the English budget is of value to every business man, whatever his nationality or branch of trade. England is the commercial centre of the globe, and it is no exaggeration to say that the

prices of the entire world, no matter in what staple, are governed and fixed by those current in the British markets. These in their turn are dominated by the prosperity or adversity of the mercantile community of the country and, since they find a faithful reflex in the ebb and flow of taxation, the result of the Government's financial operations for the year indicates with astonishing accuracy the course of general trade and may fairly be relied upon as a basis upon which we may found anticipations as to the future.

Under these circumstances it is satisfactory to find that the English Budget is one of the best that has been laid before the country for the past sixteen years, and that it indicates an increase of prosperity in the past and seems to point to a general revival of trade in the future. The increased revenue from stamps of over \$5,600,000 shows clearly the general prosperity of business, since, as was pointed out by Mr. Gladstone, the sale of the penny revenue stamp (without which no receipt or cheque in England is legal) is the most accurate criterion of the volume of trade. The total surplus realized was, in rough figures, a little over \$10,800,000; the best showing in this respect since 1874; but the bare figures do not give any idea of the course of trade, and it is only when we examine into the details that we find how promising the budget is. The sale of stamps and the duties from wines and spirits are the two most reliable points by which to guage the year's business, and in both these items there is a gratifying increase. The income tax returns are less satisfactory; but this is probably owing to the gradual change in the methods of doing business, the substitution of fluctuating for fixed incomes, the lower scale of wages paid to mercantile clerks, and the number of employes now doing their work partly upon commission who pay this tax only upon their actual salary.

The mere fact that the national debt has been reduced during the year by \$38,000,000 is sufficient to point out that the year just past has been an exceptional one, and since Mr. Goschen commences 1888 with a further balance of over thirtyseven million dollars in hand, it is evident that he will be able to pay off such holders of consols as may choose to reliquish their holdings rather than accept a reduced rate of interest, without in any way tampering with incoming funds. The estimates for the coming year show a decrease of two and a-half million dollars in expenditure from those of the one just past, and a careful review of the probable revenue discloses an expected surplus of nearly twelve million dollars. From this surplus it is intended to use half in taking a penny off the income tax, the balance to

levied principally on what may be fairly termed luxuries. It is proposed to levy a tax of one pound upon every pleasure house, a duty of five pounds upon every race horse, and five shillings per dozen on bottled wines. These new taxes fall exclusively upon the rich, who will not feel their burden, while the relief will be most felt by the class whose small incomes fall just above the line where the income tax comes into force. In other words the small clerk who receives a fixed income just above the one hundred pound limit will benefit by a reduction of the income tax, while the funds necessary for the purpose will be contributed by a wealthy class whose incomes are often not amenable to this tax at all.

Referring to the increased expenditure necessary ro fortify ports and coal stations, it is the intention of the Government to utilize the revenue derived from the Suez Canal shares held by them. These shares pay an annual dividend of \$2,750,000, and it is intended on this security to raise a loan of \$11,500,000 to meet expenditure under this head without imposing any additional burden on the taxpayer. This is a question in which Canada is interested, as a proportion of this appropriation is be expended in fortifying the western terminus of the Canadian Pacific in British Columbia in order to secure that end of the transcontinental route from any hostile descent in event of war. The construction of the all-Canadian railroad has naturally made British Columbia an object of much value in the eyes of the Imperial naval authorities, and it is now certain that a considerable expenditure of Imperial funds will take place within her borders.

Taken all round, and more especially when combined with the successful scheme for the conversion of the consols, the budget now under discussion is one of the most gratifying ever presented to the British public. It represents the largest payment off the national debt for sixteen years back, as well as one of the largest balances on hand for a still longer period. Taken in conjunction with the saving in interest upon consols, it provides for a prospective reduction of twopence halfpenny in the income tax. Naturally such a favorable showing is only possible under prosperous commercial conditions. The English budget is a faithful reflex of English commerce; a good report from the Chancellor of the Exchequer is one of the most convincing proofs of increasing national prosperity; and since prosperity in England means higher prices and better demand for Canadian produce, of all the encouraging signs for the coming year's business the improved tone of the British markets is one of the most reassuring. Given an ordinary harvest in Ontario next year we shall have no call to complain of

1888; and it is evident from the present estimate of British wheat requirements that England will be glad to take all the grain we can offer at an advance upon present prices.

THE FISHERIES QUESTION.

If the official figures as to the disposition of the products of Canadian fisheries are to be relied upon, it is evident that the fears of those writers who prognosticate that the possible closing of the United States markets to Canadian fish would result disastrously to the Maritime Provinces, are altogether fallacious. The statistics appear to warrant the belief that, so far from the United States being able to dictate to Canada as to what of our fishery products they will or will not take, the American consumer is practically at the mercy of the Canadian fisherman, and is compelled to rely upon him absolutely for his share of our fish products.

In fact Canada forms the sole source of supply for the American market; and so long as the present policy of preventing American fishermen from poaching upon our preserves is carried out, this condition of affairs must continue. So long as we are able to protect our fishing grounds from spoliation at the hands of Gloucester fishermen, the game is practically in our own hands. The American fisheries are depleted by the destructive methods practiced by their fishermen and they are now dependent for supplies solely on Canadian waters; so long then as we refuse to allow them to practice similar methods in our waters and retain our fishing grounds for the use of Canadian fishermen only, so long will they be compelled to purchase their fish from us, and from us alone.

We are aware that this view of the case is not often dwelt upon, even by Canadian writers, and certainly not by our neighbors across the border. They are always anxious to point out that out of our total export of \$70,865 quintals of cod, they took 165,075, and of the export of 108,462 barrels mackerel, they took 93,416 barrels; but why? Simply because they could not obtain the supply anywhere else. They must buy their fish in Canada or go without; since the destructive methods practised by the Gloucestermen have long since rendered their own fishing grounds barren and unproductive. The American market will always be ours so long as we have mackerel and cod to sell; provided we maintain as strict a guard over our fisheries in the future as we have in the past. It is now abundantly evident that should Congress impose any additional duty upon Canadian fish, with the idea of thereby helping the American fisherman, the duty will simply be added to the price and will be paid, as it is now, by the consumer.

United States to-day, and compare with that of two years ago, and it is evident at once that this is the case. The catch in Canada is practically the same now as then, but, owing to the American fishermen being forcibly prevented from fishing in our waters, the amount available is so much less that the consumer is compelled not only to pay the amount of the protective duty imposed upon Canadian fish, but also an advance in price of at least two dollars per quintal. In the case of mackerel a similar condition of affairs is manifest. The demand for Canadian mackerel has never been better than now, and consequently not only is the American consumer paying the extra duty imposed by his own government, but also an advance of nearly 100 per cent. f. o. b. in price over last year's rates. Is not the fishery question then solving itself?

Canada, in short, holds the key of the situation; and, if the present vigorous policy of the Government be maintained and the American fishermen be rigorously prevented from poaching in our waters, she will continue to do so from this out. If the United States require fish, must either come to us for it or take it out of our waters. If the latter be prevented and poaching rendered impossible, they must buy it in the Canadian market and pay the market price therefor. This is really the whole point of the question. Free trade and free fishing would be far more likely to do harm to our interests than guarding our own rights and risking increased duties or retaliation. The increased duties the American consumer must pay in the long run, together with a handsome profit to the Canadian fishermen, and retaliation would prove too expensive a luxury to be indulged in to help the interests of a small class of fish dealers. So long as we guard strictly what we have. the fishery question is practically solved, but if we yield to corcion or cajolery, we shall soon have to lament a similar condition of our shore fisheries to that which the cupidity of the Gloucestermen has brought about in the United States.

AUTOMATIC SPRINKLERS.

The phenomenal freedom from fire losses shown by the Mill Mutuals during the past twelve months has naturally directed a great deal of attention to the safeguards against fire they insist upon before assuming a risk. When it is remembered that during an exceptionally disastrous year for ordinary fire companies, like the one just past, their losses amounted to under sixteen per cent., it is eviden' that a valuable lesson is to be drawn from their method of inspection and their demands as to what fire extinguishing appliances Take simply the price of cod in the I must be present on the premises they in-

sure. But of late there has been a tendency to overrate the efficiency of these appliances, and especially in the case of sprinkler risks there have been granted insurance rates altogether out of proportion to the amount of protection that these devices really afford. Underwriters seem to have placed such implicit faith in the representations of manufacturers of these appliances as in many cases to grant ridiculously low rates on sprinkler risks, and the natural result has been that a number of heavy losses have been made, and, as a consequence, the word "sprinkled" is now no longer such an infallible argument in favor of the acceptance of a risk, no matter how dangerous in its inherent hazard, as it was before bitter experience proved that the sprinkler system often turned out to be ineffective at the very moment when its efficiency was most sorely needed.

The real fact seems to be that these sprinkler systems are simply adopted, in in many cases, for the purpose of lowering the cost of insurance; their efficacy in time of fire being a very secondary consideration. As a consequence both the plant and materials are often of poor quality and not fitted up in a workmanlike manner. The frequent careful examination which is necessary to maintain the equipment in such a condition of efficiency as to render its operation, when occasion arises, an absolute certainty, is entirely neglected, and the risk taken at sprinkler rates is, so far as the fire hazard is concerned, merely an ordinary one and should be only insured at ordinary rates.

It must be remembered too that even should the plant be of excellent quality and properly erected, there are frequent contingencies that arise that will destroy its usefulness as a safeguard against fire. In this climate the danger of freezing often destroys the usefulness of sprinkler plants for weeks at a time. Even in New York. five sprinkler systems were disabled by frost in one week alone. Again, they are very apt to be tampered with by careless or malicious employes, and, in one instance at all events, the existence of a small leak caused the water supply to be turned off at the very moment when the fire occurred. Valves too may fail to act or goods be so piled as to prevent the free action of the water, and sometimes the water pressure is too slight to render the service efficient. These are all evils of the sprinkler system, against which it is impossible to maintain a constant watch, and hence we may draw the moral that the advantages of sprinklers are far less practical than theoretical, and that their worth as fire extinguishers has been much over-estimated.

No doubt the automatic sprinkler, properly equipped and maintained, is one of the best protective appliances yet discover-

ed. The mere fact that the mill mutuals reduced their rate on textile mills protected with sprinklers by one half is quite sufficient proof of this. But underwriters are apt to forget that it is only the constant, thorough, inspection of the system maintained by these associations that gives them their value. Under the lax and perfunctory inspection prevalent in only too many of our towns and villages, the advantages of sprinkler plant dwindle at once, and become too often the cause of neglecting the efficiency of other fire extinguishing appliances in consequence of the confidence engendered by their possession. If this rule of constant inspection be forgotten, the underwriter who pins his faith to sprinkler risks is very apt to suffer severe loss, and then to blame the inefficiency of a means of protection simply because he has not insisted upon its being maintained in an operative condition. If the underwriter or inspector performs his duty, the sprinklers will do theirs, but if he neglects to satisfy himself at short intervals of their operative condition, he has only himself to blame when the loss occurs.

SATEENS AND GINGHAMS.

New cottons are now commencing to appear gradually upon the counters and are attracting more attention day by day, but until a spell of warm sunny weather shall melt the snow and ice from our streets and thereby give an impetus to the purchase of summer goods, they will continue to be more the subject of a feminine curiosity as to the probable bent of fashion than in any sense saleable fabrics.

The new ginghams show a marked improvement in weave and finish, and are more elegant and expensive than any cotton goods brought into this market before. They are as soft and fine as a taffeta silk, and in fact in the finer qualities so closely resemble silk as to be with difficulty distinguishable from it. For morning dresses fine check patterns in black and white, indigo and white, azure. and white, and gray and white, are much fancied, and are intended to be made up with white embroidery. The lace striped and figured lines are shown in a variety of beautiful colors and shades. They can be purchased in stripes and plain colors for combination; in sets of stripes of two widths, or for plain costumes of hair line stripes or solid color. A novelty is shown in the shape of stripes of two delicate tones of the same color, one slightly paler than the other, intended to be separated in the combination by lace or embroidery. In pretty rose tints and pale turquoise blues these combinations are very pretty and effective, and for quieter tastes two shades of silver gray should sell well. The most costly ginghams are in rich effective plaids of cream blocks and delicate colors. In one case the cream ground is figured with a single tiny palm leaf inbright colors and having the effect of embroidery on the goods, and in another we have raised crescents one within the other. These two patterns exactly resemble plush figures on a silk ground, and would scarcely at first sight be taken for cottons at all.

Sateens are perceptibly more showy and striking in pattern than last year, but the printing is more artistic and the finish of the goods as beautiful as foulard or satin .. The majority show large showy designs of rings, blocks and other odd shapes which, although very striking when shown in the piece, are somewhat trying to most figures. Still there is a fair percentage of small patterns in flowers, stars, dots and rings, and for the better class trade these will undoubtedly sell best, but it is evident that the tendency, as yet, is towards more pronounced patterns and more showy colors, and there is a feeling for bright cardinal either in solid color or in combination with white. In mourning lines we find pongee ginghams which closely resemble sateens, except in a more silky finish. These come in black with scattered white figures, and are intended for those who wish for black in a high class cotton fabric.

Indian, Eastern and Egyptian fancies are now furnishing designs largely for sateens and ginghams. The patterns are showy, but not particularly appropriate, and in some cases have a decidedly wallpapery appearance. One new design showed two Coptic C's interlaced in various contrasts of color on a cream ground. Another showed striated shells in ecru on garnet, and another groups of wheat ears in straw color on ultramarine blue. In smaller patterns, set figures, chintz leaves and flowers and circular disks arranged in graduated crescents are offered. In all. however poor the pattern, the beauty of the finish and the delicacy of the colors and printing is most noticeable. Each manufacturer has striven to out-do his competitors, and hence we have now cotton fabrics that possess all the lustre and sheen of silk at prices that seem absurdly cheap when compared with the amount of artistic taste and mechanical skill required for their production.

THE ATLAS ASSURANCE CO.

The annual report of the Atlas Assurance company for the eightieth year of its existence betokens an amount of material advancement that easts into the shade the progress of many a younger competitor. In both its life and fire departments the Atlas shows the influence of skillful and conservative management. The report, which will be found in

full in another column, shows an increase in the premium income on life risks of \$65,000 over that of 1886; and in the case of fire risks the company can boost of an increase of \$73,400 during the twelve months. The ratio of fire losses to fire premiums is now only 49 per cent,, while in the year preceding it reached 64.3 per cent. This is a figure that few companies on this continent can equal, and is one which evidences that its risks have been selected with due care. The fire fund has been increased by \$113,000, and now reaches the unusual amount of \$1,000,000 or \$277,000 more than the total fire premiums. The life funds stand at \$7,000,000 and the total assets at \$9,275,000 in round figures. This alone would form an excellent showing, but when we add to this the fact that a dividend of not less than 20 cent. has been carned upon the paid-up capital during the year, we can estimate how well the business of the company has been managed. It is abundantly evident that the Atlas does not belie its name, and that its shoulders, like that of its classical namesake, are broad enough to bear the insurance burdens of the world. The company's business in Canada is is making substantial progress under the management of Mr. L. H. Boult and his associate, Mr. Owen Murphy, M.P.P., and ex-mayor of Quebec.

Cnor reports from the United States show that winter wheat is in the most backward condition of any spring in the past five years. During February and March the country has had ample surface rains, but very general lack of sunshine. March has been a general disappointment to farmers and practically no farm work has been done. In Dakota there will be less spring wheat sown than usual, although in Northern Dakota the ground is in fair condition. Minnesota has had severe blizzards and with the most favorable weather spring seeding will be very late. The trying March weather has also lightened the prospects of the anticipated large average of oats. Last year the bulk of the crop was seeded at this date, while this year nothing has been done. Further backward weather will tend to greatly cut the crop of 1888 short. In California seeding is practically over, and conditions are generally good. Texas has had abundant rains, and promises the finest crop of winter wheat in her history. In Tennessee and Kentucky the promising crop has been seriously injured by the Minnesota blizzard. The same is true, only more so, in the wheat centres of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois. Michigan has been more protected by snow, and in Kansas the prospect is good. Crops are suffering only from lack of reserves of moisture. Missouri promises a fair average crop.

The Winnipeg Free Press announces that the estate of Max Goldstein, clothier, of that city, has been sold by the sheriff to satisfy the \$7000 judgment in favor of his wife as her dower claim. The stock was knocked down to L. Vineberg on his behalf and it is supposed the business will be continued by Goldstein in his wife's name. Previous to the sale, the claims of several of Goldstein's Winnipeg creditors, whose judgments followed that of Goldstein's wife, were bought up by him at fifty cents in the dollar in order to hold control of the stock. The Eastern creditors of the estate, whose judgments come in later, get nothing. The paper to the amount of \$12,000, which Goldstein had endorsed for Cohn, his father-in-law, will also be completely worthless. Goldstein has thus obtained possession of \$20,000 worth of goods at a fraction of the original cost, which will enable him to sell at a figure with which honest traders cannot compete.

As was expected, the decision of the judge in the case of L'Abbe versus several butchers who had given promissory notes to "Banker" Hickman for a supply of ice during the approaching season from the "Butchers'" Ice Company, and were sued upon them by the first mentioned gentleman, to whom they had been given by Hickman's contractor as collateral security for a loan of \$500, is that the notes were procured by false pretences, and that therefore they are valueless. The learned judge made some scathing remarks upon Hickman's methods of doing business, declaring that in his opinion the signatures were obtained surreptitiously, by false pretences, and that they are the outcome of fraud. The Montreal public have had their eyes pretty well opened of late to this so-called "banker's" style of business, and the general impression seems to be that he will find very few customers in future in this city.

THE annual meeting of shareholders of the Canada Northwest Land company has been held at Edinburgh, the chairman Sir George Warrender, presiding. The annual report which was presented was satisfactory. The sales of farm lands last year showed a marked improvement, and the magnificent harvest is expected to have a most favorable effect, and a largely increased immigration is predicted. The total sales of farm lands were 19,1132 acres, as compared with 8,2131 acres in 1886. Of this amount 6,8521 acres were in suspense at the end of the year. The sum of the nett proceeds of sales of town and village sites was was £4,292 8s. The receipts from land sales was £32,233, of which £13,178 was written off land account, and the balance in hand at the end of the year was £12,172. During the year 2,507 shares valued at £42,535 were accepted in payment of lands.

THE Bankers' Association of Buffalo has resolved to charge a discount on all Canadian bills deposited of two per cent. The new rule will go into force immediately. The cause of this is that the banks are taxed on their de-

posits, and the money taken in must be sent to Canada in exchanges. The usual custom is to ship \$1,000 at a time and the banks must lose the interest on that amount. The new rule does not apply to Canadian silver, though in this country there is a discount on United Financiers and brokers in States coin. Toronto state that the effect of the decision will be to drive Canadian currency out of the United States and force people to take the precaution of getting their money exchanged in Canada before leaving for the other side. Merchants to avoid the tax while paying accounts in the United States will do so entirely by New York drafts.

The death from paralysis of the Hon. John Hamilton removes a very well known figure from Montreal's commercial community. He was the third son of Colonel George Hamilton, of Hawkesbury, and was born at Quebec in 1827. He was a member of the great lumber firm of Hamilton Brothers, of Hawkesbury, was a director of the Bank of Montreal and other mercantile and manufacturing corporations, and for some time was president of the Merchants Bank. From 1860 to 1867 he represented the Inherman division of Lower Canada in the old Legislative council. In the latter year he was called by royal proclamation to the newly constituted Senate of Canada, a position he resigned in May of last

THE United States Government have given warning notice in the British Columbia papers to those about to engage in the seal fishery on the subject of the laws of the United States on sealers and the penalties inflicted by those laws found killing seals in any part of Behring Sca. The Government of Canada have also warned the seal fishermen of Canada against going in armed vessels, as it would be highly detrimental to the negotiations now being conducted between Great Britain and the United States in respect to killing scals on that sea. No warning, however, has been given by the Canadian authorities to vessels about to prosecute peacefully their business in that quarter.

The demand for cannel lobster has increased materially of late both for local and foreign account. Numerous sales have been made of small quantities, and deliveries upon these purchases have served to lessen the available stock and strengthened the market for remaining goods. The prices realized in New York are \$1 50 for standard 1-lb Provincial brands, and \$1 80@\$1 85 for fancy stock. Confidence is strongly entertained in the future of these goods, as the pack the coming season will undoubtedly be much smaller than usual, and with the United States and Great Britain dependant largely upon Canadian supplies, many in the trade do not hesitate to predict an appreciation in value before the season closes.

The huskless oats swindle has been extensively worked in the vicinity of Belleville, Ont., during the past two years. Last year the sellers redeemed their promise to purchase the product of the oats sold at \$10 per bushel year before for \$7.50 per bushel, but paid for them in the notes of those farmers who bought last year on the strength of the seeming good faith kept with the buyers of the previous year. There are no purchasers now, however, for last year's product, and the dupes are seeking to have their notes voided. These, it may be added, have been sold to shavers in Belleville at a considerable discount and there is trouble all around. The amount involved is from \$30,000 to \$35,000.

The severe depression of the fishing industry is causing the spread of the emigration movement among the fishermen on the coast of Scotland. Several pioneers have just left Moray Firth for Halifax to ascertain the prospects for settlement in Nova Scotia. If that province is not thought favorable the pioneers intend to visit British Columbia. A party of highly respectable Scotch farmers also left Glasgow for the Commercial Colonization Company's colony at Langenburg in the North-West. Several parties of selected child emigrants are leaving this week.

There are still complaints in Winnipeg wholesale trade circles as to the slowness with which paper is met, but only for large amounts. Small dealers are reported to be paying up better than previously. Farmers' payments have been far ahead of last year. The payments of interest on and the wiping out of mortgages on farms have been well met and agricultural implement dealers have had exceptionally good reason for congratulation, many back accounts having been wiped out. There is a decided movement in farm lands and real estate men are jubilant.

Mr. W. Case, an oil expert of Pennsylvania, who has returned from several weeks' explorations in the Riding Mountain district, south of the Vermillion River, and eighteen miles from Lake Dauphin, says at a depth of fifty-nine feet he found oil in considerable quantities. Mr. Case brought a vialfull with him as a sample. It burned so freely that many of the settlers took quantities home to burn in their own lamps. A company will be organized at once to proceed out with the necessary machinery before the spring thaw sets in.

INSTEAD of two vessels plying between Port Arthur and Owen Sound, as was the case last year, there will be three, the Campana taking the place of the ill-fated Algoma, until such time as the new steel ship being built at Scotland is completed. Besides this, two steamers will run from the Soo to Owen Sound, making close connection with all the trains leaving this point. These advances on the part of the Canadian Pacific Rallway,

together with those of other companies, point to a brisk and voluminous trade at the Soo during the season of navigation of 1888.

The mines of Nova Scotia yielded a good return last year. There were 1,502,611 tons of coal raised, 23,362 ounces of gold mined, 44,388 tons of iron ore, 123,703 tons of gypsum and a large quantity of manganese barytes antimony, limestone and other minerals handled. Quebec took 650,838 tons of the coal, Nova Scotia consumed 469,464 tons, New Brunswick 186,511, Newfoundland 82,062, P. E. Island 50,615, United States 73,892. Last year's operations were profitable and the outlook for this year is even more promising.

The Chicago and Grand Trunk, in retaliation for the action of the Michigan Central in cutting rates to Montreal and other Canadian points, has notified that company that it will reduce its local passenger rates to all of the principal Michigan stations. The Michigan Central in retaliation will make a slash in rates to Toronto, Montreal and all other points common to the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific. The through rate to Buffalo is also reduced fifty cents, by making the rate, Chicago to Detroit, \$6 50.

Prince Edward Island pointo dealers having found trade with the States in somewhat unsatisfactory condition during the past season, recently held a meeting for the purpose of consultation looking to a remedy. They recommend that farmers improve the quality of potatoes by changing the variety of seed and growing a larger proportion of white grades, and that greater care be taken in culling, handling and shipping, in order that the stock be put upon the market in best form possible.

MR. D. E. L. ATKINSON, manager of the Gammoque corset factory, waited upon the Minister of Customs to ask that the brass clasps and trimming used in the manufacture of corsets be admitted free of duty. The present duty is 30 per cent., and as this class of goods is not made in the country, and the Canadian manufacturers meet with strong competition from cheap German goods of similar description, they think they are entitled to some tariff concession such as that suggested.

The debate upon the reciprocity question caused one of the liveliest skirmishes that have taken place in the House for some time past. In defining the position of the Government on this subject Sir Charles Tupper said that the universal policy of both sides of the house and of both parties in the country has been steadily directed to obtaining the free interchange of the natural products of the two countries,—that from the date of the abrogation of the reciprocity treaty both sides of the house, whether in the Government or in the Opposition, have always been prepared to do everything that

was possible to lead to a renewal of the reciprocity treaty, or if that were not possible, to obtain a reciprocity of tariffs, and as far as possible to obtain the free interchange of the various natural products of the two countries, like the treaty of 1854. That is the policy of the Government to-day, and any measure that they can make to carry it forward will be taken.

It is reported on apparently good authority that the firm of John A. Tees & Co., wholesale grocers, of Winnipeg, have suspended payment; but no particulars as to liabilities are yet to hand. It has been suspected of late that the firm in question have been cutting prices too fine for profit and reports have been current as to their ability to succeed. Mr. Tees was formerly in St. Johns, Que., and went west about six years ago engaging in the commission business in which he was fairly successful. He then went into the wholesale grocery business; which was a mistake, as since then he has not done well His troubles will affect a brother carrying on business in Moosomin.

The Winnipeg Power & Navigation company has been formed, and is seeking power to utilize the water power of the Assiniboine river by damning the stream, and then to construct a canal connecting Lake Manitoba and the Assiniboine and Saskatchewan rivers, with a view of making Winnipeg the milling centre of Canada, as the water power that would thus be created would be equal to that at Rat Portage. The company also asked power to operate a line of vessels on said waters.

The following tribute, dated the 28th ult., from a subscriber in Wallacetown, Ont., affords some evidence that our endeavors to furnish the retail merchant with information valuable to him in his business are not very wide of the mark:—"Dear sir,—I enclose herewith two dollars, being amount of my subscription for your valuable and instructive paper, and also with you every success and prosperity with increased circulation, and a continuation of your valuable services to the business community. I am, dear sir, yours very truly, A. D. U."

Another bulk oil-carrying steamship, named the Chester, built at Greenock, has sailed for Philadelphia, to load petroleum for the continent of Europe. Some idea of the vessel's size and capacity can be gleamed from the fact that she can carry over 1,000,000 gallons as a cargo. The new craft is 310 feet in length, 30 feet beam and 25 teet depth of hold, and registers 2,881 tens. About a dozen similar vessels have already been built in Europe, especially for carrying petroleum.

It is known here in railway and steamship circles that the Dominion Cabinet has pretty well decided upon its policy in connection with the Atlantic mail service, and that a subsidy of \$300,000 is to be divided amongst

the Allen and Dominion Lines. This reported settlement of the matter does not meet with the approval of a certain section of the business community here, who believe that it will not result in securing a service which can compete with New York.

AMENDMENTS are being made in the Consolidated Fund Act of the city of Halifax providing that the rate of interest shall not exceed 5 per cent. instead of a fixed rate of five per cent, as at present, and all permanent stock to be issued after this date can be called in after fifteen years on giving one year's notice. It is a misnomer to call such stock "permanent" if it is intended to recall it after a term of years. The stock now outstanding is perpetual and cannot be called in.

AMERICAN manufacturers of lime have protested against the proposition to place that article on the free list, and request that the same duty, 20 per cent., be imposed on lime imported from Canada that Canada places on their lime. Their memorial states that Canadian manufacturers shipped to New York in 1883 less than 5,000 casks, and in 1887 the quantity had increased to 138,000 casks. This year it is estimated that 200,000 casks will go forward.

About 700 men in all, belonging to the different trades unions in Hamilton, are affected by the present lock-out. A joint meeting of the Board of Directors of the Builders' Exchange and Architects of the city has been held, when it was decided to request the various unions affected by the present lock-out to send a deputation of three members to a meeting at which the Board of Directors of the Exchange will endeavor to effect a settlement.

ERTURNS from British Columbia show that the yield of gold last year was valued at \$693,709. Reports indicate that greater efforts will be made during the present year than in any previous year in the history of the province to develop the placer mining. The yield of coal is the largest of any year since Confederation. The home demand was larger, and the exports to the United States, especially to California, considerably increased.

As was expected, the failure of Ulric Germain & Frere, of Quebec, has brought down a number of other firms whose names were on their paper. Edmond Jullien, currier, of Hedleyville, has assigned, and P. Michaud & Co., tanners, of Lachevrotiere, have suspended owing some \$15,000, for which they have only \$3,000 worth of assets to show. In both these cases the exchange of accomodation paper with the Germains is the cause of failure.

RETIRING SUCCESSFULLY. -- Mr. Adam B. Fraser, grocer, 184 Bleury street, this city, who has been in this business for the last

twenty years, has decided to retire, having, by strict attention to business, been so successful as to amass sufficient to keep him comfortably for the remainder of his life, though he is still comparatively a young man. Young men about to engage in business, and some of thus, already in it, should ask Mr. Fraser for the secret of his success.

Winnier grain dealers will shortly withdraw all their buyers in Manitoba except at points where there are elevators. This action is due to the breaking up of loads, which leads to light deliveries, and so renders it unprofitable to dealers to employ a large staff of buyers. As yet deliveries have continued very large in volume for the season. For the last few days the deliveries at Winnipeg have averaged thirty thousand bushels daily.

The delegates who went from Meaford, Ont., to interview the Government to solicit a grant for a harbor, have returned. They report a willingness on the part of the Government to give \$5,000, provided the town raises \$3,000 more. At the last meeting of the council it was decided to submit a by-law to the ratepayers with a view to raise the required amount. The projects meets with a good deal of favor and will likely carry.

The statements made by a member for an eastern constituency who undertook to instruct the House upon the reciprocity question are not founded on the actual condition of the tariff. His statement that eggs were not on the free list is incorrect. Eggs are, and always have been free, and consequently his claborately built up line of argument falls to the ground for lack of foundation upon fact.

The fire losses in Boston for the year 1887 are shown to have been proportionately lower than those of any other American city. While the insurance men of New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, St. Louis, Minneapolis and other cities figure up their net losses as the result of their year's operations, the Boston insurance men can show that their companies have made considerable gains by their business.

A St. Cathables despatch says: Experts from the Pennsylvania coal region visited Smithville to-day and examined the alleged coal find there. The pronounce the deposit an excellent quality of anthracite, but it is only a vein and does not exceed eight inches in thickness. They doubt whether it would pay to work it, and probably the idea of mining operations, so far at least as coal is concerned, will be abandoned.

The London Index comes out with the following offer: "It now being the fashion of newspaper proprietors to convert their publications into insurance policies, we, in order not to be outdone in enterprise and

liberality, hereby give notice that if a subscriber to the *Index*, or any person having the current number in his possession, is struck by lightning, we agree to bury his or her next of kin free of charge."

Private advices by mail speak rather discouragingly of the prospects for the nutmeg crop in Banda. It is said that the hurricane of Jan. 2d was followed by one of still greater violence on the 10th, during which hundreds of trees well filled with fruit were blown down, besides which a large percentage of almost ripe nuts were blown off, and a shortage in the crop for first six months of the year is predicted.

This work of taking out phosphate has been going on at the mines in the Buckingham district during the winter, and hundreds of tons are now ready for shipment. The miners expect to have a good market this season for all they can turn out. The new English company are making improvements in the old Union mines, which will enable them to increase their output this summer.

LATE gales have made havoc with Nova Scotia and New Brunswick shipping, and as a consequence heavy demands are being made on the Halifax and St. John companies, associations and agencies, so that additional calls are necessitated, and the result will be that some of the companies will go out of the business. The winter of 1887-88 will be a memorable one to marine underwriters.

Coal shipments from the Cape Breton ports have already begun. North Sydney is clear of ice, and Cow Bay, Little Glace Bay and Big Glace Bay are waiting for tonnage to commence shipments. There is considerable enquiry for coal vessels for the St. Lawrence, Newfoundland and American ports. Freights rule higher than last year, and vessels on the berths are having quick despatch.

The business failures occurring throughout the country during the last seven days, as reported to Dun, Wiman & Co, number for the United States 179, and for Canada 42, or a total of 221 failures, as compared with a total of 243 last week and 228 the week previous to the last. For the corresponding week in 1887 the figures were 223, beirg 196 in the United States and 27 in Canada.

PROPLE should carefully examine all ten dollar bills that may be tendered them, from the fact that a large number of \$5 bills raised to \$10 have been discovered in circulation. They were principally on the Imperial Bank, with a few on the Traders'. Recently counterfeit \$5 United States silver certificates have been sont into circulation, b sides a large number of \$2 bills.

The reports of the results of the scal fishery are commencing to arrive. The steamer

Esquimaux is reported with 15,000 seals on board, and the Eagle with 10,000, while 40,000 seals have been taken at Partridge Point and 18,000 at the Horse islands. The Terra Nova has few seals. Six steamers passed Cape John yesterday, and their prospect of seals was good.

MESSRS. CRAIG & FILS, whose system of electric lighting is shown to good advantage in our Ste. Cunegonde municipality, are offering to light that large portion of Montreal not covered by the Royal Electric Co., at a cost not to exceed what is paid the gas company, guaranteeing 150 per cent. more light. This, surely, is a most acceptable offer.

A very important decision is that of the U.S. Treasury that tin cans containing fish which are exempt from duty under the act of March 3, 1883, are also entitled to free entry under the provision in said act for the usual and necessary covering.

The share of Canada's export trade done by the province of Ontario was 34.44 per cent. in 1885, 34.93 per cent. in 1886 and 35.56 per cent. in 1887. That of Quebec was, in the year 1885, 43.56 per cent., in 1886, 43.9 per cent, and in 1887, 44.72 per cent.

THE N. B. STUMPAGE TAX.

To the Editor of the Journal or Commerce :-

Sir,—It appears that Mr. Byram really has a wish to add to his knowledge on the stumpage question and therefore I will beg you to give me space for this my last letter on this subject. He states we still have as well wooded tracts in our Crown Lands as among the granted lands, and he cannot deny that on said granted lands paying operations can be conducted. Such being the case he must admit that he was in error when he stated previously that "the falling off of the output of lumber is due to the scarcity of it in a slaughtered forest."

I am surprised at his remarks on transportation. He surely must know better than he pretends; if not I will enlighten him. He compares freight charges of railways and tug boats but does he forget that railways run every day while his tugs only go when chartered with full loads? That railways run winter and summer, while his pet tug boat is a summer bird only? He claims that whereas railway charges on a barrel of flour would be a dollar, charges by tugboat would only be eighty cents, and I suppose he is right, providing the railway and the tugboat are not each confined to the same number of miles-but probably he expects the railway to carry a barrel five hundred miles to his tugboats fifty miles, and then would call this a fair comparison. My experience of the matter is that a barrel of flour can be sent by rail one hundred miles for thirty cents, and with this in view where can you get any steamer or tug to equal it?

He says he cannot agree with me when I say it would be worse for our farmers if we had fewer lumbermen, yet he also says, "they will depend on operators to purchase their

hay, oats and grassfed beef; they will allow their sons to hire out during the winter for the sake of a few dollars, and these lads growing dissatisfied with home, think they would like a larger field, such as the West." He then asks, "What then has the farmer to gain out of the operation?" It truly is disheartening when one strikes an arguer like Mr. P. O. Byram. He first admits that the lumberman provides a market for farm produce, that he gives employment to farmers' sons at a period of the year when a portion of the help on any farm cannot be profitably employed therein; and yet, after all this, he asks what the farmer has to gain out of the operation,

I deny that we have only broken banks and bankrupt lumbermen to represent our previous lumber operations. As for the virgin soil he talks about, our lumbermen in this section don't haul the soil off with the lumber, even though the stumpage is high. No, Mr. Byram, all honor to the farmers. I am with you in a wish that we may have many more and much better farmers than we now have. But this world is large; there must be consumers and producers; each helps the other; no class is all sufficient; the farmer uses lumber and the lumberer needs farm produce.

I would like to ask one question before I close, which is: If, as Mr. Byram states, lumbering is such a curse to the country, etc., why does he seek to continue the curse; why not let it run itself out and he will the sconer be rid of it?

*ATLAS ASSURANCE COMPANY.

At the annual general meeting of the Atlas Assurance Co. (of England) held recently, the Directors submitted to the Proprietors their 80th annual report, together with Accounts and Balance Sheets in statutory form for the above period as follows:—

The financial year of the Company having been made to terminate on the 31st instead of on the 24th December, in pursuance of a resolution of the Extraordinary Court of Proprietors held on 3rd June, 1887, the accompanying accounts are rendered for the period of twelve months and seven days as above stated.

In the Life Department 426 policies were issued assuring \$1,862,465 at annual premiums of \$51,280 and single premiums of \$45,980; the total new premium income being \$97,260. Re-assurances to the extent of \$317,195 were effected, at annual premiums of \$7,460, and single premiums of \$3,265. As a net result, 426 policies were placed up the Company's registers, assuring \$1,545,270 at annual premiums of \$43,820, and single premiums of \$42,715. Proposals to the extent of \$274,160 were declined.

The total premium income of the Life Department amounted to \$468,620, being an increase of \$64,910 over the previous year. A part of this increase is due to the exceptional amount of single premiums received, but the normal annual premium income has in itself increased to a satisfactory extent.

Claims arose under 161 policies, assuring with bonuses \$511,585. The number of policies is the same as in 1886, but the sums assured and bonuses are less by \$201,080. The difference is the partly to the claims ha

fallen on policies of smaller average amount, and partly because in an unusual number of cases the bonuses had either been commuted for a cash payment, or applied in reduction of premium.

Notwithstanding that a large new business was transacted, the directors are pleased to be able to report a diminution in the rate of expenses. They would call the attention of the proprietors and the public to the very prosperous condition of this department, and claim for it increased support. Both as regards the liberal conditions of assurance and prospects of bonus, the advantages compare favorably with those offered by other similar institutions.

The Life Assurance Fund increased during the year by \$100,110, and now stands at \$6,957,350.

The fire department shows for the past year a similar growth to that recorded in each of the three preceding years. The premiums for the twelve months, after deduction of sums paid away for re-assurance of surplus risks, amount to \$722,855, being an increase of \$73,425 upon those of 1886. The losses paid and outstanding are \$354,195, equal to 49 per cent. of the premiums as against 64.3 per cent in 1886. After charging commission and expenses, a surplus remains of \$144,260, which has been carried to profit and loss account.

The extension of the year to 31st December has rendered it necessary to bring into the account now submitted the renewal premiums due at Christmrs last, amounting to \$143,025, no part of which, however, has been appropriated. After charging losses which have occurred during the seven days, and full commission and expenses, the balance, amounting to \$93,386, has been added to the reserve for current risks, forming part of the fire fund.

The profit and loss account has been credited with the surplus on the close of the accident branch, and has been debited with the cost of furniture and fittings at the home and foreign branches. There remains an available profit of \$233,170, which the Directors have resolved to apply:

It has been thought advisable further to strengthen the Fire Fund by the transfer of \$233,445 from the Reserve; it will then stand at \$1,000,000 and afford an ample guarantee for the increasing liabilities consequent upon the grown of fire income. As the profits of the Company are mainly drawn fram the Fire Department, the Directors believe the Proprietors will appreciate their action in making its position so strong, as to continue to command public confidence and support.

After carrying back the sum of \$50,000 to the Reserve Fund (from which it was originally taken to start the Accident Branch), and crediting an amount in order to include the Company's Freehold Office among the Assets, this Fund will now stand at \$199,670.

The Proprietors Assets show an increase as compared with 1886 of. \$406,395

MONTREAL, Thursday, April 5th, 1888.

Money continues easy and, although call loans are still quoted at 41,005 per cent. and mercantile paper at 7@8 per cent., it is well known that these rates are being shaded. Remittances cannot be called satisfactory and the April payments were on the whole poorly met; a fact which causes some uneasiness as to the position of some of the weaker wholesalers. But at the same time that there is no scarcity of money in the city is evidenced by the heavy blocks of stock now being pur-

chased for investment, and leading merchants report a large volume of spring sales, in some cases exceeding last year's figures. Sterling exchange is slightly lower at 9 3-16@5-16 for sixties between banks and 91@9 over the counter. Demand 9 9-16@11-16 and 91@10. Cables 101@1. Posted rates in New York are 4.86 and 4.88 : actual being 4.851@1 and 4,863@4.87. Cheap money; the presence of a large short interest now anxious to cover; and a good demand for investment, have resulted in a strong, firm, market for stocks. During the week over \$300,000 worth of Gas stock has been purchased for investment and a similar state of affairs prevails in other firstclass stocks, so that there is really very little genuine stock now available for speculative purposes and consequently the "short" interest have just grounds to be afraid of a "squeeze." In fact the market rules strong all round, but until the Bank of Montreal dividend is announced there will always be an element of uncertainty present. The heavy failure announced from Winnipeg today did not affect prices in the least :

Advices from Madawaska, N. B., show that there is a considerable quantity of logs yet on the yards, but beautiful weather to get them The sleeper trade is active but wood is getting scarce not only for this but for shaved shingles, which are now made and hauled over 30 miles to station. - Application is about being made to our government to discontinue permits to cut lumber on small streams when settlers have erected a mill in order to manufacture lumber to meet the wants of our pioneers and settlers -The Vanburen shingle mills are in full blast ripping up province cedar into shingles, and to meet the demand of their greedy saws, several teams are hanling cedars from month of Grand River before the ice gives way .- The slanghtering of our fine cedars to be manufactured on American side will soon tell its tale,-Ward's mill will start next month on shingles and boards. Old sugar makers predict a poor crop only, they say the season has been too dry and cold.

MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

Thursday Evg., April 5, 1888.

In all branches trade continues moderate, but the bright April weather of the past few days has freshened up things a little in dry goods and some fancy lines. Prominent dark spots in the situation just now are the wretched condition of the roads and fears of floods in different parts of the country and in the city. Merchants are backward in ordering until the railway rates are brought down to summer level, and some will order sparingly until navigation opens. Remittances were not entertained.

Ashes.—Receipts increasing; demands easier: Sales of first pots at \$4; second \$3.65. Pearls \$7.50; no pearls remaining in store. Receipts since 1st January, 850 brls pots, 67 brls pearls; deliveries 777 brls pots, 72 brls pearls. Stock in store April 4, 6 p.m., 488 brls pots, 1 brl pearls.

DAIRY PRODUCE, AND PROVISIONS,-There is no change in butter. Good lines of old and the new make have a fair sale. Cheese quiet and nominally unchanged. Cable quotation 60s. Eggs were in large supply and prices are easier. Sales at 19c@20c. Receipts of maple syrup are increasing. We quote 90c@ \$1 per tin. Maple sugar 11c@12c. In local provisions prices are unchanged. For some weeks past there has been a very fair enquiry for pork and land. The Liverpool provision market was steady except land, which was worker and declined to 388 3d. Pork at 878 weaker and declined to 38s 3d. Pork at 67s 6d, bacon at 398@40s 9d, and tallow at 25s. In one day this week the Grand Trunk brought in 300 cases of eggs. A report of the Boston market says: Butter firm, and choice goods meet with a ready sale Market cleaned up close on eggs. Poultry moving slowly, Quotations steady. Beans steady. steady. Steady business in seed pointoes; common grades quiet. Choice Scotch steady. No change in hay. Truck quiet.

DRUGS, CHEMICALS AND DYESTUFFS.—There is a little more doing in these lines. A few changes will be found in our prices current. Bleaching powder is firmer, also blue-stone. Morphia has declined. Tin crystals are held stiflly, owing to the late advance in tin, Logwood, extracts and chips, are firmer and likely to be higher. The wood in log is said to be nearly double what it was last year, and dealers in producing countries have to go much

further into the interior for it. An English letter says: Chemicals still depressed, caustic soda being easier, and in the Tyne, sal soda is £1 193 3d per ton, net cash, gross weight. Bicarb. soda in round lots can be bought at £4 15s@£4 17s 6d. Linseed oil is quiet at £19 for raw, £20 5s for boiled.

Day Goods,-The bright cheery days of the early part of this month have had a good influence on the city retail trade for we are told business is brisk both in the city proper and the suburbs. Travellers, so far as heard from, are doing fairly well but stocks are reported not much broken in upon. Remittances are variously reported but we believe on the whole that while we write-the fourth-paper has been poorly met. The proportions we have not been able to ascertain. We find in the course of enquiry that a considerable amount of anxiety prevails as to the spring uprising of the St. Lawrence and as a consequence stocks appear to be larger, owing, no doubt, to some being obliged to empty their basements. On the whole we understand that stocks are not larger than usual at this se ison. Canadian manufactures are in active demand and prices seem to be maintained.

FISH AND OILS .- Prices of fish are nominal and there is nothing doing. There is a little more movement in oils and sales of steam refined pale scal are mentioned at 48c. Scaling reports from some parts of the coast are favorable while others are not. Some of the vessels were prevented from leaving Conception Bay on the 10th and letters dated the 23rd reported them still ice bound. private letter reports that 75,000 to 80,000 seals were taken on the shore at White and Green Bays. Another writer says that 50,000 or 60,000, mostly hoods, were taken in Green One merchant writes: The burning question of the day is confederation, which I am sure will be carried in two years. The mercantile community will suffer, also projerty holders. It is difficult to see how property holders will lose but the mercantile people may have keener competition. appears that most of the Northern Provinces, which are poor, will support confederation but the western outports will go the other way. Race and religion will be important factors. Montreal traders with Newfoun lland are taking increased interest in the question.

FLOUR AND GRAIN .-- A slightly improved demand can be reported for flour, and offerings are light and prices firm. Manitoba strong flour is selling stendily at former quotations Among recent sales were 125 barrels straight roller at \$4.10, 125 do at \$4.05 and 250 bags superfine at \$1.60. The demand for grain is still limited, and there is little business doing. Prices, however, are steady. The American markets are generally weaker for both wheat and corn The imports of breadstuffs into the United Kingdom for the past week show a decrease of 8,000 quarters wheat, an increase of 36,000 quarters corn and an increase of 92,000 barrels flour, compared with a week ago, and a decrease of 181,000 quarters wheat, a decrease of 81,000 quarters corn, and a decrease of 50,000 barrels of flour compared with the same time last year. A cable meesage says : Cargoes off coast, wheat quiet but stendy; corn nothing offering. Cargoes on passage and for shipment, wheat, slow; corn, quiet; Liverpool spot wheat, quiet. Liverpool mixed maize, 10d. Canadian peas, 5s 4d. Weather in England cold for the senson. The feature in the Chicago market at latest advices was weakness in grain. Provisions were steady. The following are prices now and a year ago: May wheat, 76%c and 82½; June 76%c and 81c; July 77c and 80%c. May corn 52%c and 39%; June 51%c and 40%c; July 51%c and 41%c. Jamaica can be bought as low as 16c and up to 21c. Other coffices are practi-cally unaltered. Teas are moving quietly and the market is not up to expectations for this season of the year. Lines under 16c are beginning to get scarce. Fine drawing teas, as usual at this season, are in demand. They are also hard to find. There has been some stir in Valencia raisins at 5 \\$ \mathre{0} \frac{3}{4} \cappc \text{ for large} lots. Stocks are very much reduced both here and abroad. Currants are firm at 61c@ 7c. Sweetstuffs are in fair demand and steady. Syrups very scarce; molasses may be quoted at 40@42c for Barbadocs, 30@32c for Trinidad, 33@34c for Porto Rico and 32c for Antigua. In canned goods there has been little done outside of lobsters and salmon. The former has sold at \$5/6\$5.25 per case for choice brands but they can be bought chenper. Prices generally on the basis of \$1962\$19 50 for No. 1 brands with the additional freight to Western points added. Some large sales of Calder brand are reported as sold to the leading stove founders in Western Canada. This brand with Sum merlee and Langloan seem to be recognized as best suited for this work. Prices on the British market are rather firmer since our last report and it seems as if they had touched bottom and are likely to advance on the least provocation. Bar iron continues to be sold freely at \$2.10. Tin plates remain as before with coke selling at \$3.75 for spring delivery; charcoals at \$4.25/2\$4.50 according to brands. Ingot tin still maintains its high figure and the current quotation here is 40c per lb. No new developments have shown themselves in any other branch of this department.
