The Provincial Parliament passed an act in 1897 prohibiting the exportation of all logs, which Act was construed by the Canadian officials to apply even to timber purchased and paid for by Americans prior to the passage of the Act. The injustice of this construction is emphasized by the fact that because of the free exportation of logs from Canada a large amount of money had been invested in mills on the American side to manufacture the logs, and in plants on the Canadian side for cutting and handling the timber in addition to the amount paid the Government of Ontario for the timber itself.

Proposed Appeal to Britain.

Upon these conditions becoming known to American timber owners they memorialized the Government of the United States to make reclamation from Great Britain. Representations were made by the United States to the Government of Great Britain, but activity in this movement was deferred owing to the assembling of the Joint High Commission at Quebec, to whom the matter was referred by both Governments. The commission failed to reach an agreement, but just prior to its final adjournment a committee of the timber owners, headed by Governor Rich of Michigan, came to Washington and asked the Secretary of the Treasury to invoke the retaliatory clause of the Dingley bill which provided that if any country or dependency should impose an export duty upon logs/he Secretary of the Treasury was authorized to impose an additional duty of that amount upon Canadian lumber.

Decided to Put on the Screws. Proposed Appeal to Britain.

Secretary Gage has had the question under careful consideration and it is learned that the Administration has determined to apply the retaliatory clause by prohibiting the importation of Canadian lumber, if in the construction of the Provincial Act, which will take effect in a few days, it is reade to apply to timber-purchased by Americans prior to the passage of that Act. The Dominion Government, therefore, will have an opportunity of nullifying the Outario statute so far as Canadian stumpage purchased by Americans prior to its passage is concerned, but should no action be taken no more Canadian lumber will be allowed to enter the United States. Decided to Put on the Screws.

No Scare at Ottawa. Ottawa, April 14.—Little notice is taken here of the story from Detroit that the United States Government will issue a proclamation prohibiting the importation of Canadian lumber. The prohibition of the importation of Canadian lumber would be an extraordinary course. It is possible, though, that the United States Government will declare the manufacturing clause the equivalent of an export duty, and, acting as authorized by the permissive clause of the Dingley tariff, raise the duty on lumber to what would be practically a prohibitive figure.

Lumbermen in Toronto look upon the proposal as a bluff on the part of Mr. Dickinson in the interest of Michigan lumber agitators. Mr. John Waldle of the Victoria Harbor Lumber Company says President Harbor Lumber Company says President McKinley would take no such step, as it would injure his own people more than the Canadians. The time for the Dominion Covernment to the contract of the contract to the Government to take action has passed, and that Government had declared it would not

interfere.

A leading Georgian Bay lumberman, discussing the matter, said that the Unit discussing the matter, said that the United States could not take any deliberate action, but would have to legislate, and that was a most unlikely thing. "Why." remarked the gentleman, "it simply means cutting off their nose to spite their face." In case such an enactment was made, it would affect all Ontario, but more especially the district of Georgian Bay.

They add that the functions of the commissioners will be to strive to agree to the measures necessary for a peaceful solution of the difficulties, but the conclusions they individually reach will of course be sent to their respective Governments, between whom further negotiations will then occur in regard to the final settlement.

REPORT FROM KAUTZ. Additional Light Thrown on the Complications Which Led to

Washington, April 14.-The Cabinet meeting to-day, which lasted longer than usual, was devoted principally to the discussion of the Samoan situation. A complete written report concerning the preliminaries leading up to the hostilities, which was made to the Secretary of the Navy by Admiral Kautz, was read to the Cabinet by Secretary Long. It throws some additional light upon the complications prior to the admiral's arrival, the most important facts brought out being that the three Consuls, American, British and German, at the time of the admiral's arrival at Apia, had recognized the revolutionists under Mataafa. The Mataafa uprising after Chief Justice Chambers' decision in favor of Mailetoa Tanu, the admiral indicates, was fomented large'ty by the German Consul, who insisted upon recognizing Mataafa as king. Chaos was threatened, and the American and British residents considered themselves in peril of their lives. 





He referred to the charges made against Sir Hector Langevin by Mr. Edgar against Sir Adolphe Caron, to show that these charges were openly and plainly made, but these charges preferred against the Minister of the Interior were not made on any better authority than that of mere tittle-tattle of hotel corridors or the stories current in steamboats.

Davies Also Called Down Davies Also Called Down.

He charged the Opposition with dishonesty in making these insinuations and was promptly called to order, after which he calmed down and deprecated that such insinuations should be made against a Minister of the Crown. The charges made were entirely foundiess, and if they were made in the proper manner he guaranteed that the commission asked for would be granted. [Government cheers.] He held that no judicial investigation could be held unless specific charges were made, and again challenged the Opposition to make specific charges against the Minister of Interior. No judge could undertake such in investigation as the amendment proposed.

Not So Sure.

He did not know whether or not there has been wrong doing amongst the minor officials, but preferred to wait until the investigation was over before giving judgment. The commission, which had been issued to Mr. Ogilvie, gave him full power to investigate, and Mr. Ogilvie was an honest, upright, honorable man of high rharacter, who knew more about the Yukon than any other man, and against whom no member of the Opposition could make any insinuations.

An Ideal Court. An Ideal Court.

The investigation, being held by Mr. Oglivie, assisted by Mr. Clement, was an ideal court. He repelled the insinuation that Mr. Clement was not a lawyer of any particular standing, and said: "I have known lawyers of the highest reputation who have never been in court, and I have known men who were in court all their lives and were great fools at the end." [Hearty laughter on both sides of the House.]

HON. MR. FOSTER Says the People Must be Satisfied With Reference to the Yukon Charges.

Mr. Foster, who followed, claimed that the Government was greatly to blame for not taking any steps for the sanitation of Dawson. It was known that Dawson was the centre of a population of thousands of people, but not one cent had been spent to improve the unhealthy condition of the place. Nor had a cent been spent on the trails into the country. He flatly denied the statement made by the Minister of Marine that charges of stealing or connivance at stealing had been made by Mr. Tarte against Sir Hector Langevin, and challenged the Government to find Sir Hector Langevin's name mentioned by Mr. Tarte in his charges in 1891. He pointed put that in 1891 when the Liberal opposition was examining into the evil service. put that in 1891 when the Liberal opposi-lion was examining into the civil service there were no formal charges made, and yet the Government of the day allowed the investigation and helped it on.

As to the claim that judges ought not to be asked to make political investigations, he pointed out that judges had made political investigations in Canada and Great Britain, instancing the Parnell case. With reference to the claim by the Minister of Marine that the stories of corruption in the Yukon were mere tittle-tattle, he said that if that was so he would like to know why the Government had appointed a commission to investigate at all. He lid not think this investigation was sufficient.

The report of Mr. Sifton's hired man would not be sufficient to satisfy either the people of this country or of Great Britain, who were largely interested in the Yukon. What was the Government afraid of? It was admitted that an enquiry was necessary. Why not have it made by judges instead of by Mr. Sifton's hired man?







LOCAL LIVE STOCK.

The run of live stock at the Cattle Mar-

The run of live stock at the Cattle Market was not what could be called a large one, but in the present state of the market, it was larger than was needed. It consisted of 41 car loads, including 675 cattle, 150 sheep and yearling lambs, 7 spring lambs, 60 calves and 400 hogs.

These, together with 47 car loads on Thursday, the bulk of which were not sold on that day, made a total of 88 car loads on the market.

The quality of fat cattle was generally fair, but there were a large number of rough cows and bulls which did not help to improve prices that had a downward tendency.

Trade was easy. On account of the lower market reports from outside places, the bad weather, the scarcity of space on the beats, and the absence of a number of outside buyers, prices for all classes of fat cattle were lower, especially for the inferior grades, of which there were too many.

Export Cattle—Choice loads of heavy caport cattle sold at \$4.80 to \$4.90, and light exporters at \$4.50 to \$4.75 per cwt.

Export Bulls—Heavy export bulls of good quality \$3.75 to \$4.00, light export bulls \$3.40 to \$3.60 per cwt.

Loads of good butchers and exporters, mixed sold at \$4.35 to \$4.50 per cwt.

Butchers' Cattle—Choice picked lots of butchers' cattle, equal in quality to the best exporters, weighing from 1000 to 1100 lbs., sold at \$4.40 to \$4.60 per cwt.

Loads of good butchers' cattle sold at \$4.25 to \$4.35 with medium loads going at \$4.00 to \$4.15 per cwt.

Common butchers' cattle sold at \$3.55 to \$3.60, and inferior at \$3.25 to \$3.40 per cwt.

Freeding Bulls—Bulls suitable for the byres are worth about \$3 to \$3.50 per cwt.

Milch Cows—About 20 cows and springers generally of inferior quality, sold at \$25 to \$45 for the general run, while one sold down as low as \$15.75.

It is about time for the packers of this city to make another raise in prices for hogs, as it looks as though the drovers had either gone out of the business. or found other markets, that suited them better. We think that both causes have to do with the light runs on this market. Several drovers stated to-day that Hamilton and Collingwood were both better markets. The packers at these places do not cull so close as the Toronto packers and the Hamilton dealers were offering and paying \$4.45 per cwt., while our men were only giving \$4.37½ per cwt. At the same time the Hamilton men were not culling out nearly as many as our own packers.

David Duncan, an East York farmer, brought 16 hogs in his wagon, out of which 5 thick fats were culled, leaving 11 selects. The price paid Mr. Duncan equalled \$4.02 per cwt., all round.
