WANTED IN MONTREAL.
All Toronto's Three Crack Regiments, But it is Questionable if They Will Go.
Montreal wants to have Toronto's three crack regiments—Queen's Own, Royal Grenadiers and Highlanders—for the Queen's Birthday military manoeuvres. The commanding officers of the regiments each received an invitation from the big city yesterday for the soldiers to spend May 23 and 24 in Montreal.
It is hardly likely that the invitation will be accepted. In the first place, the cost of transportation would be very large, and added to this, the cost of subsistence would make it an expensive trip for the soldiers. Then as the holiday comes in the middle of the week and the distance is so far, it would be a wearisome trip and would take up too much of the men's time. Many could not get away.
It is hardly likely that any of the three regiments will leave town on the Queen's Birthday this year, as a brigade camp has been ordered for June 30, July 1 and 2.

Anniversary Services.
The managers of Chalmers Presbyterian Church, corner of Dovercourt road and Dundas-street, have made great preparations for their anniversary services, it being the tenth one. Dr. Lyle of Central Presbyterian Church, Hamilton, one of the foremost pulpits of Canada, will preach at the morning service, 11 a.m. Dr. Couric, editor of the Christian Guardian, will conduct afternoon services at 3 p.m. The pastor, Dr. McClements, will preach in the evening, 7 p.m. The choir have prepared some special music under the leadership of Mr. Hewat, which will be rendered at all services, assisted by Miss Fleishman and Mr. W. E. Rundle. A concert will also be given in the church Monday evening.

Who the Officers Are.
The officers elected at the annual meeting of the American Railway Association held in Detroit this week are as follows: President, T. P. Love, general manager of the western section of the Pennsylvania Railway; first vice-president, W. H. Boleburn, Jr., president of Long Island Railroad; and second vice-president, T. Hanahan, vice-president of the Illinois Central Railway. The next meeting will be held in New York in October.

TERRIFIC THUNDERSTORMS.
Much Damage in the Neighborhood of Ogdensburg, N.Y.
Ogdensburg, N.Y., April 14.—This locality was visited last night by terrific electrical storms. In the Village of Parishville a dozen residences and business blocks were struck by lightning. The Butler Tub Manufacturing Company's three-story building, 40 by 100, was fired and completely destroyed. Electric light and telephone poles were struck by lightning, and sidewalks were torn up. The damage is estimated at \$50,000; two men were seriously injured by electrical shocks.

Non-Suit in Berry Case.
The suit of W. H. Smith against the G. T. R. was brought to a sudden termination yesterday in the Assize Court by Mr. Justice Robertson ordering a non-suit. His Lordship held that the car of strawberries was shipped at the owner's risk. The car was sealed when delivered to the G. T. R. at Suspension Bridge, and the contract of carriage was between Smith and the American lines over which the car came and not the defendant company.
Two applications, one to dismiss on account of the non-production of papers, and the other to postpone to the next court, were made in the two actions of Elliott v. Fawcett, and the suits were set for trial to-day. The case of Macdonald v. Ellsworth is also on the preceptory list.

Murray-Hill Recalled.
Power was yesterday granted to Lucia Ann Lunness to administer the estate of her husband, William Lunness, cattle dealer, who lost his life in the Murray disaster. The estate is valued at \$1530.70. The items are: \$100 in household goods, \$250 stock in trade, \$125 in horses, \$28 in cattle, \$207.70 in book debts.
The will of the late Amelia Susan Lane of York Township was also entered for probate. She left \$822.62 in cash, \$30 in cattle and \$62 in household goods to her two brothers.

Actors by Special Train.
The members of Sousa's Band will arrive to-day at noon hour from Buffalo by a special C. P. R. train. They will return tomorrow at 12.30 p.m. and the trip, it is said, will be a record-breaker in the way of speed. A special train will also carry the "Dangerous Maid" Company through Boston, leaving here at 2 o'clock to-morrow morning by way of Hamilton.

NOTHING NEW OF NORTON NAY.
His Mother Meets Every Arriving Train—C.P.R. Officials Interested—His Ticket Not In.
There is still no trace of Norton Nay, the young man who disappeared while on his way home to Renfrew from Detroit.
His mother visits the Union Station every day, and waits in vain for her lost son at the arrival of every train.
The C.P.R. is also assisting to locate his whereabouts. General Superintendent Leonard has sent out descriptions of the young man to the various station agents requesting that a close watch be made for him.
Nay's ticket, which was issued from Detroit, has not as yet been turned in, although it should have been recorded the day afterwards. The conductor who was on the train says he remembers seeing Nay's ticket while on the journey, but he did not take it up.

Regarding Quarantine Grain.
The freight department of the C. P. R. sent out a circular yesterday to the shipper notifying them that the company will undertake to guarantee to deliver to Montreal or ocean steamships, if the grain is loaded to the steamer direct from the elevator of Owen Sound. The company received at Owen Sound, the quantity of grain in the out-turn from the buyer considered final. The company will deliver to barges or steamers, if alongside of elevator, the quantity received from the buyer but not will not be responsible for any subsequent shortage of grain. A copy of the circular has been forwarded to Secretary Willis of the Board of Trade.

Independent Forestry.
The Supreme Chief Ranger, Dr. Oronhy-ateah, visited New York during the week for the purpose of making arrangements for the extension of the order. H. A. Collins, the Supreme Forester, has been busy among the courts in Michigan during the past few days, addressing public meetings in the interest of Independent Forestry. On Monday evening Dr. C. Day Clarke, assistant supreme forester, delivered an address upon Forestry at a gathering of Foresters at Kingston, which place boasts of one of the largest courts in the High Court of Eastern Ontario.





THE GOVERNMENT OF SAMOA

Lord Salisbury Has Agreed to Provisional Measures for the Keeping of Order.

DECISIONS OF COMMISSIONERS

Will be Submitted to the Respective Governments Interested for Further Negotiation.

London, April 14.—The officials of the British Foreign Office say that the Marquis of Salisbury has agreed that the decisions regarding the provisional measures to be taken in keeping order in Samoa will be observed. They add that the functions of the commissioners will be to strive to agree to the measures necessary for a peaceful solution of the difficulties, but the conclusions they individually reach will of course be sent to their respective governments, between whom further negotiations will then occur in regard to the final settlement.

REPORT FROM KAUIA

Additional Light Thrown on the Complications Which Led to the Late Fighting.

Washington, April 14.—The cabinet meeting to-day, which lasted longer than usual, was devoted principally to the discussion of the Samoan situation. A complete written report concerning the preliminaries leading up to the hostilities, which was made to the Secretary of the Navy by Admiral Kautz, was read to the cabinet by Secretary Long. It throws some additional light upon the complications prior to the admiral's arrival, the most important fact brought out being that the three Consuls, American, British and German, at the time of the admiral's arrival at Apia, had recognized the revolutionists under Matafafa. The Matafafa uprising after Chief Justice Chambers' decision in favor of Malletta Tano, the admiral's decision, was fomented largely by the German Consul, who had been recognizing Matafafa as king. Chaos was threatened, and the American and British residents considered themselves in peril of their lives. A massacre was feared, and under these circumstances the American and British Consuls joined with the German in recognizing the provisional government under Matafafa. The admiral's decision upon his arrival, however, the British and American Consuls explained that they had been forced to this action by the duress of the situation. The admiral at the conference aboard the Philadelphia, having satisfied himself that Chief Justice Chambers' decision was in accordance with the Berlin treaty, informed the Consuls that they had no power to violate its provisions, and with the full acquiescence of the British and American Consuls he issued his manifesto, dissolving the provisional government and Malletta was crowned king. The counter proclamation of the German Consul and the feeling of the native villages, as recounted in the press despatches, followed.

They Have Surely Agreed.

Washington, April 14.—After hearing this morning from the British and German Embassies, the State Department was enabled to announce positively and finally that the three parties to the Berlin treaty had agreed upon the instructions to be given their Samoan Commissioners, and that it was certain that the commission would convene on the 25th inst. for Samoa on board the Badger.

The scheme is an excellent one and should result in increased business for the enterprising originator.

New Orleans, La., April 14.—Charles Dudley Warner, who is ill with pneumonia, continues to improve. The physicians are hopeful of his recovery.

Another Combine.

Pittsburg, Pa., April 14.—Arrangements have just been completed for the consolidation of all the hood iron and cotton tin interests in the country. The capital of the new company will be \$25,000,000.

O. M. U. New Directors.

Waterloo, Ont., April 14.—At a meeting of the Board of the Ontario Mutual Life Assurance Company held to-day, the Hon. W. Borden and the Hon. J. G. Garrow were elected directors to fill the existing vacancies.

RAN UPON A NEST OF REBELS

General Lawton's Command is Driving the Filipinos, But Not Without Losses.

FIVE NORTH DAKOTANS KILLED.

Americans Entered San Antonio Without Resistance—Captured Country is Very Rich.

Manila, April 14.—7.55 p.m.—Gen. Lawton is marching north along the road between the hills and the lake with the army gunboats Napidan and Laguna de Bay abreast of his troops. The enemy is retreating northward. On Wednesday the troops crossed the Paganjan and concentrated at Lambun at the mouth of the river. After leaving two companies of the Fourteenth Regiment to guard the entrance of the river, the troops marched to Longas and found it deserted. Furniture which had been dropped in the flight of the natives was scattered along the trails leading into the hills. Maj. or Weizenberger's sharpshooters were sent toward Pactes Antontona in the afternoon. They ran upon a nest of rebels in some thick bushes, which afforded a splendid covering. Five men of the North Dakota Regiment were killed and two were wounded, two of the former dying after having been brought to Longas Church, where Father McKinnon administered the sacrament to them.

Rushed From Their Dinner.

The main body of the American troops, while at dinner at Longas, heard the firing and advanced to the support of the sharpshooters. A scout from a hill saw the little band of rebels running into the hills. The Laguna de Bay at the beginning of the night steered the hills, making them hot for the enemy. The Americans entered San Antonio at sunset without meeting with any resistance. Twenty unarmed prisoners, bearing copies of the proclamation of the United States Philippine Commission, which they had some time ago secured, were afterward released and sent outside our lines with bundles of provisions to distribute to the natives. The Fourth Cavalry is guarding Santa Cruz.

Expect a Busy Season.



STOWING OF HUMAN CARGOES.
 A most ingenious device is the new wrinkle for doubling the seating accommodation in street cars. The inventor of the device clearly recognized the economy that might be effected if each passenger who was seated would support another passenger in his lap. This idea was the germ of his invention. But it would be of course out of the question to request one passenger to allow another to sit on his or her lap. Such a custom would not only be the cause of great inconvenience, but it would often prove extremely embarrassing. Under these conditions the inventor had to work his brains and the outcome of it was his patent lap seat. In the car that has been fitted with the new device the old-time strap passenger does not actually sit on the lap of his friend who has been fortunate enough to get a seat, but on a little round saucer that comes into position over the lap of the sitting passenger. The man who devised this arrangement has a great head on him, to be sure, but he has not yet exhausted his subjects. A month or so ago a copy has been written on the question of overcrowding in the Montreal street cars. It advises the company to give more attention to the stowing of human cargoes and recommends the distribution among its conductors of copies of "Kenyon on Stowage," the manual of which might enable them to display more of the skill of the stevered in loading the cars. A study of the method of packing sardines might give the inventor of the lap seat and the conductors some valuable pointers. We also refer them to an invention patented only last week in a dozen countries. When the lap seats are all occupied there is still a space of 20 inches between the two rows of lap-sitters. The new invention is a device for occupying this space with swing seats. When not in use these seats are up against the roof of the car. By manipulating a string one may be pulled down and the passenger then seats himself in a regular swing. As soon as the passenger gets up the swing seat automatically ascends to the roof. The mechanism for this action consists of counterbalances running down grooves in the ceiling and hanging down on the outside of the car. But this does not exhaust the possibilities of cargo-stowing as applied to street cars. There is considerable valuable space above the heads of the passengers, on the level of the advertisements, that should not be allowed to go to waste. We suggest for this purpose the adoption of the sleeping car idea. Four, or perhaps six, passengers could find accommodation on each side of the car. The recumbent posture would be appreciated by many a hard-working citizen on his way home after a hard day's toil. The subject of stowing is evidently a big one and will admit of endless discussion.

A COMBINATION OF ICE JAMS
 Which Caused Much Damage to the Carpet Factory and Other Establishments.

Elora, April 14.—(Special)—The greatest flood within the recollection of residents of fifty years occurred at this point last evening between 6 and 7 o'clock. An immense ice jam held just above Fergus broke loose and joined forces with another jam a mile or so below. This combination came on with relentless way, carrying everything before it. Huge pieces of ice, varying from two to four feet in thickness, with timber from bridges, dunes and dams, with the accumulation of water caused by the melting of the snow, together with the recent rains, will give some idea of the causes for such a flood. The water rose eight feet in less than an hour. The grinding and crushing of the swirl of freed ice and the rush went was a wonderful sight. The damage to the carpet factory was very great. All the outbuildings, the frame and the base-housed mill, the grinding and crushing machinery, are almost a complete wreck. The other factories and mills along the river suffered alike. At one time it was thought the bridge would go, as all the braces had been swept away and the ice was constantly throwing against the bridge. With the exception of a local jam in March of 1884, when the water rose four feet higher, this, as well as being the greatest flood, was also the highest.

DAMAGE AT HESPELER.
 Brodie's Bridge Partially Destroyed, But the Water Has Receded.

Hesperia, Ont., April 14.—The damage from the high water in the River Speed here eliminated this forenoon in the partial destruction of Mr. A. W. Brodie's bridge, a structure spanning the river between his mill property just below the town and a substantially supported by stone piers. The great rush of water destroyed two of these abutments and carried away two sections of the bridge, one of which struck the large iron bridge on the highway with great force and destroyed it. The other section moving the latter structure. The other section of the bridge, which was supported by a stone pier, was also destroyed. Besides this serious damage to the bridge, Mr. Brodie sustained a considerable loss in the partial destruction of his mill and timbers of the dam and the washing out of the stone wall skirting the river. The abutments under the town bridge have also been considerably damaged. The water has now receded, and it is thought the danger is higher. The cars on the G. & H. Electric Railway resumed their regular trips this afternoon.

At Other Points.
 Guelph and Galt had an anxious time yesterday forenoon, but by good fortune danger was thought to be past.

At Brampton the water washed away 50 or 60 feet of the dyke, and through this gap a torrent poured down through the fair grounds and into Oak Grove and Oxford streets, causing considerable damage. The water rushed across the streets in its way to the river, and here the dam of the electric and power works. Many of the dwelling-houses in this district and the surrounding families have been flooded with several feet of water. The city fire boat has been in constant requisition, removing families from their flooded homes.

The general was born in Minnesota about 32 years ago, the family having moved from Lanark prior to that time. A. Bower Campbell of the Frontenac Milling Company, Kingston, is a cousin of the general, and Charles McArthur of Dalhousie, near Watson's Corners, is an uncle.

Little Girl Burned to Death.
 Cornwall, April 14.—While playing in their father's sugar bush and boiling down sugar, Sadras Maroux, the 5-year-old daughter of a French merchant, died of an accident, was burned to death. Sparks from the fire caught in the child's apron and she was soon enveloped in flames. Her young sister in endeavoring to extinguish the fire was terribly burned and it is feared will lose both her hands.

Falling Ice Killed Her.
 Ottawa, April 14.—Anna Nichol, domestic servant, 17 years old, was out for a night with her sister when ice fell from the veranda of the house of F. M. Snelid, at Albert and Lyon-streets, striking and killing the girl. Such injuries that she died an hour later.

QUERIES FOR A MISSING CHILD.

Toronto Police Asked to Locate the Child of Mr. and Mrs. Moore of Brooklyn.

Several telegrams have passed between Inspector Stark and the police of Brooklyn, N.Y., regarding the mysterious disappearance of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Moore, who left their home, 23 Main-street, Brooklyn, early Wednesday morning. The police say that the couple's sudden departure was to avoid further questioning respecting the whereabouts of their infant child, who was weak and sickly. There is no such address in Toronto, and Inspector Stark wired to Brooklyn yesterday for more particulars. The police believe that the parents gave this address only to gain time to leave the city.



Nothing, however, in the way of development is being done upon these properties at present, and the company seems to be devoting its attention to the Yukon country. Mr. R. S. Neville, the secretary-treasurer, recently wrote the following letter to a shareholder, who sought information: The expedition which went out to the gold fields, under the auspices of this and the Yukon company last April, located five claims in Northern British Columbia, about 35 miles from salt water. The ore is low grade, but of great extent, and free milling, and they say the prospects are very valuable. No expert reports have been received on this property, but an old experienced miner, who went with the men, said: "I am informed that they were the most satisfactory locations he had ever seen, and it is possible that the prospects may turn out very valuable, as our people hope they will." Very little work was done during the past year for this company. I expect to send out this expedition. Several of the men will return next month to the property, to go on with its development, and we may expect further news during the season. The address of Mr. Neville is 18 West King-street, Toronto. Mr. Fullerton, who sold most of the stock of this company placed in Toronto, is now doing business in Spokane, Wash., as the British Canadian Investment and Mining Syndicate.

An Ontario Zinc Mine. A Duluth wire reads: Another mineral industry has been added to the many of the Lake Superior country, and a successful beginning has been made in the mining since. Some time ago a company of Eastern Canadians, under an option, began mining and shipping zinc from a property on the north shore of the lake. They have now closed the deal, and are enlarging their operations materially with a view to becoming leading factors in the zinc market. They are now shipping about 300 tons of their product monthly to Brussels, and will add to this amount with the summer season. The ore is very rich, running as high as 64 per cent. in zinc and averaging about 60 per cent. Zinc is mined in this country at a profit runs no higher than 14 per cent. The mine has a number of strong veins exposed in the face of a cliff, and the work of mining is very easy and cheap. Geologists will be particularly interested in this development, as the presence of zinc about Lake Superior has not been commonly known.

quently larger than the net profit made by the miner. Mr. Ogilvie had said that the Government would get more money out of a two and a half per cent. royalty than out of a ten per cent. royalty and he drew with him. He wished to inform the Government that if a judicial inquiry could be produced to show that nothing could be obtained in the Yukon without bribery, he would be in the history of responsible government been made against public officials the fullest and most thorough investigation should be refused by those who were responsible for the appointment of the officials.

SIR LOUIS DAVIES Got into a State of Excitement and Said Things Unparliamentary - Was Called Down.

Sir Louis Davies characterized the manner in which these charges had been made against the Minister of the Interior as mean and contemptible, and challenged the leader of the Opposition to make the charges on his responsibility as a member of the House, that they could be proved or disproved. Sir Hector Langevin by Mr. Tarte and the charges made by Mr. Edgar against Sir Hector Langevin in regard to these charges were openly and plainly made, but these charges preferred against the Minister of the Interior were not made on any better authority than that of mere title-tattle of hotel corridors or the stories current in restaurants.

Davies Also Called Down. He charged the Opposition with dishonesty in making these charges and was promptly called to order, after which he calmed down and deprecated such intemperate charges. He made against a Minister of the Crown. The charges made were carefully considered and it was made in the proper manner he guaranteed that the commission asked for would be granted. (Government cheer.) He held that no judicial investigation could be held unless specific charges were made and again challenged the Opposition to make specific charges against the Minister of the Interior. No judge or magistrate such an investigation as the amendment proposed.

Not So Sure. He did not know whether or not there had been wrong doing amongst the minor officials, but preferred to give judgment. The commission, which had been issued to Mr. Ogilvie, gave him full power to investigate, and Mr. Ogilvie was an honest, upright, honorable man of high character, who knew more about the Yukon than any other man, and against whom no member of the Opposition could make any insinuation.

An Ideal Court. The investigation, being held by Mr. Ogilvie, assisted by Mr. Clement, was an ideal court. He repelled the insinuation that Mr. Clement was not a lawyer of particular standing, and said: "I have known lawyers of the highest reputation who were in court all their lives and were great foils at the end of a hearty laughter on both sides of the House."

HON. MR. FOSTER Says the People Must be Satisfied With Reference to the Yukon Charges. Mr. Foster, who followed, claimed that the Government was ready to blame or not taking any steps for the sanitation of Dawson. It was known that thousands of people, but not one cent had been spent to improve the unhealthy condition of the town. Nor had a cent been spent on the trails into the country. He had denied the statement made by the Minister of Marine that charges of stealing or conspiracy at stealing had been made against Sir Hector Langevin, and challenged the Government to find Sir Hector Langevin's name mentioned by Mr. Tarte in his charges in 1891. He pointed out that in 1891 when the Liberal Opposition was examining into the civil service there were no formal charges made, and yet the Government of the day allowed the investigation and helped it on.

Beot on the Other Leg. The present was a very similar case, but the Government showed no anxiety now. As to the claim that judges ought not to be asked to make political investigations, he pointed out that judges had made political investigations in Canada and Great Britain, instancing the case of the late Justice Gwynne, who was made Judge of the Yukon. He said that if that was so he would like to know why the Government had appointed a commission to investigate at all, if it did not think this investigation was sufficient.

People Must be Satisfied. It would not satisfy the people of this country to have a paid clerk of the Department of the Interior hold an investigation of the administration of the Yukon. The report of Mr. Sifton's hired man would not be sufficient, either to the people of this country or of Great Britain. What was the Government afraid of? It was admitted that an enquiry was necessary. Why not have it made by judges instead of by Mr. Sifton's hired man? Mr. Fielding moved the adjournment of the debate.

U. S. Prohibition of Lumber. Sir Charles Tupper asked whether by the First Minister could anything about a despatch published in The Toronto Globe that the United States Government had issued a decree prohibiting the importation of Canadian lumber. Sir Wilfrid Laurier: "No officers of mine have been able to verify the statement and I must say I cannot believe it."

Liquor in the Yukon. Dr. Spronck read a telegram from Ottawa to The Montreal Witness, in which it was said that the importation of liquor into the Yukon district had been prohibited, and asked if it was correct. Sir Wilfrid Laurier: "Certain instances of the Yukon Council have been dissolved. The Northwest Government has nothing to do with the Yukon since the act of last session. The House then adjourned at 11.30.

MUST FURNISH PARTICULARS.

City Ordered to Furnish the Details Asked for by the Street Railway Company.
The Master-in-Chambers at Osgoode Hall yesterday afternoon decided that the city must furnish some of the particulars asked for in the city's suit to prevent overcrowding of street cars, and in relation to other matters affecting the Toronto Railway Company.

The Judgment.
The Master says that additional particulars as to overcrowding are unnecessary. He orders that particulars be given as to worn-out cars and those otherwise unfitted for service, as also of those alleged to be in a filthy condition. Particulars must also be given as to midnight transfers and the company's annual statement as to plants, tracks, cars, etc., and their value. The particulars are to be delivered within two weeks, the company to plead in four days thereafter.

Fast Train Service.
The Chicago and Northwestern Railway has lately put on a 10-hour train between Chicago and St. Paul. The distance is 408 miles. This train leaves Chicago every night at 10 o'clock and reaches St. Paul at 8 o'clock next morning. Passengers leaving Toronto and points in Western Ontario in the morning reach Chicago in time to connect with this train. At St. Paul connections are made with the fast morning trains of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific for the Kootenay district, Seattle, Vancouver and Victoria. OUR NATIONAL GRAIN ROUTE

Up-to-Date Citizens are Getting Tired of the Dilatory Action of Council.

AND ASK THEM TO GET A MOVE ON.

Will the Council Pass the Proposal to Pay \$1500 to the C.P.R. Company?

A resolution largely signed by the retail mercantile community, and bearing as well the subscriptions of certain members of the Board of Trade, will be presented in the Mayor's office probably to-day. The prayer of the petitioners, set forth in part hereunder, will speak for itself:
That at a public meeting, Feb. 2 last, citizens were appointed to act in conjunction with their younger days and it was from the Mabel Walz that American ingenuity took the popular air which they fitted the words of "Mother May I Go Out to Swim." The present generation will find its waiters in heavy national port-folio, and Dan Godfrey is the originator of all those amusing pieces played by Sousa and other great American bands in which the members are represented as going on strike and marching off, leaving one solitary drummer or trombone player with the deserted leader. The arrangements of Godfrey are played by military bands the world over. Thoroughly up to date, Lieut. Godfrey has written for his present American tour a new nautical number entitled "England and America," which represents the union of the British and American fleets, an event which actually happened in Samoa the other day, when according to the cable report, "The Americans and British fought splendidly together." This number will be heard at the approaching concert here by Lieut. Godfrey and his renowned British Guards Band, which has been winning everywhere the highest appreciation of the critics and the most remarkable receptions from the audience. Canadians will be interested in hearing the number which has caused the audiences in the large cities of the United States to rise to their feet and cheer to the echo the recited musicians. On Friday evening Mr. Ben Davies will assist, and on Friday afternoon the program will be specially designed to bring out the splendid soloists. The sale of seats begins on Monday morning at the hall.

Ben Davies Coming.
Mr. Ben Davies, the famous English tenor, will assist Lieut. Dan Godfrey's British Guards Band at their concert on Friday evening at the Metropolitan Hall. A splendid musical program will be rendered in the afternoon, in which the leading soloists of the band will be heard. The sale of seats begins on Monday morning at Massey Hall at popular prices.

An Old Teacher Dead.
The death is announced in California of James Anderson, who for twenty-six years was principal of Givens-street Public School. Deceased, who was 84 years of age, retired on a superannuation allowance in 1884 and settled in California. One of the sons, David Anderson, died in Toronto a year ago.

Of Interest to Insurance Companies.
The Divisional Court yesterday reserved judgment in the appeal of the Metropolitan Insurance Company against a decision of Judge Morgan, refunding \$200 in premiums paid by a wife on a policy effected without the husband's knowledge.

Not Yet Passed Council.
The working of the act is somewhat misleading. It would look as though the bill had awarded the contracts, and was bound thereby to swallow the C.P.R. bill. But the fact is that the tenders have been accepted only by the Board of Control, and that the acceptance has not yet been confirmed by Council. Council is, therefore, uncommitted, and there is every prospect that this recommendation will not go through without somebody getting their money's worth of fun.

Fraser Grant Down.
There was no possibility of granting \$1500 to Mr. Alex. Fraser to repair a souvenir pamphlet advertising Toronto, so the Board of Control, called for 10.30 a.m. to-day, will recommend the withdrawal of the statutory limit, \$500. The recommendation to Council, which was made by the Board, would have been to grant \$500 to Mr. Fraser, who would have been required to deliver free to the city, 500 to be bound in covers, and 500 in paper.

Was This Award Legal?
There is no report yet as to the legality of the granting, but there probably will be for the Board to-day.

City Hall Notes.
A sub-committee of the Board of Works yesterday recommended the moving back of an encroaching fence bounding the Hughes property on Pine Hill-road, at the city's expense.

A Day at the Police Court.
Old John Matthews was given two months in jail by Magistrate Deaton yesterday.

Convictions Quashed.
Barrister E. DuVerne appeared before Judge McLaughlin yesterday afternoon against the convictions made by Magistrate Deaton, some time ago, in the case of Alfred Jones, Fred Allen and Louis Becker, who were charged with being the frequenters of a common gaming house kept by Frank Bland. The keeper pleaded guilty when arraigned in the Police Court, and the other convictions followed. His Honor held that the information was bad, inasmuch as it did not disclose an offence, and quashed the conviction.
