## Commandant at Ladysmith Tells the Story of the Loss of His Column More in Detail—They all Fought to the End of Their Ammunition.

### Broken Cable and the Censor Cause of Little News From the Scene of Action—Hot Criticism in the London Papers—Was Col. Carleton's Column Sacrificed—Some of the Missing Ones Returning to Ladysmith.

News of a more reassuring character was received from Gen. White, in command at Ladysmith, by the War Office yesterday. It now appears that the column captured by the Boers was composed of the Tenth Mountain Battery, four half companies of the Gloucesters and six companies of the Royal Irish Fusiliers, and not the full battalions, as reported. The captured column did not "capitulate," as at first reported, but fired their last round of ammunition before falling into the hands of the enemy. The reserve ammunition of the column was lost owing to a stampede of the mules. The official list of casualties in this column has not yet reached the War Office. General White added a note to his despatch that the security of Ladysmith had been in no way affected by the loss of the column.

The situation in London, after the receipt of this reassuring message, is said to have assumed a brighter aspect.

The Boers are still shelling Ladysmith from the hills, but the British are full of confidence that they can hold their own.

Not counting the captured column, which Gen. White lost on Monday, the total British casualties since the outbreak figures thus: Officers—133; being 19 killed, 61 wounded and 93 captured. Men—783; being 137 killed, 492 wounded and 154 captured.

An unconfirmed report has reached London from Cape Town that Gen. Buller has gone to Ladysmith.

The best piece of news came this morning. A Pietermaritzburg despatch says: Stragglers from the Gloucestershire Regiment are arriving at Ladysmith. A number of mules with a portion of the Mountain Battery are also coming in.

### SOME OF THEM RETURN.

Men of the Gloucesters and Part of the Mountain Battery Back at Ladysmith. London, Nov. 2.—A special despatch from Pietermaritzburg, dated Tuesday morning, says: "Stragglers from the Gloucestershire regiment are arriving at Ladysmith. A number of mules, with a portion of the Mountain Battery, are also coming in."

### WHITE'S OFFICIAL STORY.

Stampeding of Mules Caused the Column to Lose Their Ammunition. London, Nov. 1.—The British War Office today made public a despatch received from General White, describing the operations of Monday. It was as follows: "Ladysmith, Oct. 31.—(7.50 p.m.)—I took out from Ladysmith a brigade of mounted troops, two brigade divisions of the Royal Artillery, the Natal Field Battery and two brigades of infantry to reconnoitre in force the enemy's main position to the north, and, if the opportunity should offer, to capture the hill behind Farquhar's farm, which had, on the previous day, been held in strength by the enemy.

"In connection with this advance a column, consisting of the Tenth Mountain Artillery, four half companies of the Gloucesters and six companies of the Royal Irish Fusiliers, the whole under Lieut-Col. Carleton and Major Adye, Deputy-Assistant Adjutant-General, was despatched at 11 p.m. on the 29th to march by night up Bell's Spruit and seize Nicholson's Nek, or some position near Nicholson's Nek, thus turning the enemy's right flank.

### A GOOD SUGGESTION.

London, Nov. 2.—The morning papers comment with the greatest satisfaction upon General White's suggestion regarding the sending of a second contingent to South Africa.

The infantry brigade and cavalry had been repulsed, the troops were slowly withdrawn to camp, pickets being left on observation.

"Late in the engagement the naval contingent, under Captain Lambton of H.M.S. Powerful, came into action and silenced, with their extremely accurate fire, the enemy's guns of position.

"The circumstances which attended the movement of Lieut-Col. Carleton's column are not yet fully known, but from reports received the column appears to have carried out the night march unimpeded until within two miles of Nicholson's Nek. At this point two boulders rolled from the hill and a few rifleshots stamped the infantry ammunition mules.

"The stampede spread to the battery which broke loose from their position and got away with practically the whole of the gun equipment and the greater portion of the regimental small arms ammunition. The reserve was similarly lost.

"The infantry battalions, however, fixed bayonets and, accompanied by the personnel of the artillery, seized a hill on the left of the roads, two miles from the Nek, with but little opposition.

"At dawn a skirmishing attack on our position was commenced by the enemy, but made no way until 9.30 a.m., when strong reinforcements enabled them to rush to the attack with great energy. Their fire became very searching, and two companies were ordered to fall back. The enemy then pressed to short range, the losses on our side becoming very numerous.

"At 2 p.m. our ammunition was practically exhausted, the position was captured and the survivors of the column fell into the enemy's hands. The enemy treated our wounded with humanity, General Joubert at once despatching a letter to me offering a safe conduct to doctors and ambulances to remove the wounded. A medical officer and parties to render first aid to the wounded were despatched from Ladysmith last night and the ambulance at dawn this morning.

"The want of success of the column was due to the misfortune of the mules stampeding and the consequent loss of the guns and small arms ammunition and the reserve. "The official list of casualties and prisoners will be reported shortly. The latter are understood to have been sent by rail to Pretoria.

### LITTLE NEWS FROM THE FRONT.

But the London Papers are indulging in Criticisms of Gen. White's Plans. London, Nov. 2.—The breakdown of the Delagoa cable route, combined with the monopolization of the available telegraph lines by the Government and the State officers, is responsible for the fact that notice further has arrived from South Africa. The Government has received despatches describing the casualty lists. These will be published to-day.

### Died From Overwork.

Up to midnight nothing had been received concerning Monday's casualties. The War Office officials are working under great strain. Captain Perrott, staff-captain to the Military Secretary, has just died, his end being hastened by anxiety and overwork.

### THE COLUMN WAS SACRIFICED.

The Morning Post comments severely upon the British contempt for the enemy, as shown by the belief that the large Boer force at Acton Homes could be held in check by Carleton's main column. It points out that, even if the British there had been supplied with ammunition, they could only have held out a few hours longer, inasmuch as they were in the most complete sense detached, and because nobody apparently at Ladysmith had any idea of the distress or took any measures to rescue them. "The column was sacrificed," says The Morning Post, "because it was sent into action gaged and blindfolded. It had neither scout nor patrol. Twelve hundred men were thrown into the fray, which would not have been missed from another part of the field."

### No Effort to Rescue Them.

The standard, which comments in similar terms upon the fact that Gen. White made no effort to extricate the column from the impossible situation into which he had thrust it," draws a sad picture of the mad hoping for relief and then realizing with bitterness of heart that some one had blundered, that they had been forgotten by their general and his staff and that nothing was left but surrender and imprisonment at Pretoria, until the end of the war.

"The Daily Chronicle says: It is evident that somebody blundered, but where details are required before the blame can be apportioned."

### Were Cape "Boys" Traitors?

The Times says: "The dangers of Sir George White's plans are patent even to civilians; but it is not impossible that the Cape 'boys' in charge of the mountain battery, who quite recently were suspected of disaffection, may have been tampered with by the Boers. Otherwise such a large and important stampede is a very extraordinary occurrence from such a slight cause."

### NO GOOD WITHOUT MONEY.

Society Formed in Paris to Enlist Men to Fight on Behalf of the Boers. Paris, Nov. 1.—A society has been formed to render assistance to the Transvaal Government. Col. Montell is president and M. Francis is secretary. Henri Rochefort and Drumont, proprietors of the Libre Parole, are the honorary presidents. The organization is enrolling volunteers to fight for the Boers, and the promoters claim that more than 300 have volunteered. They have difficulty, however, in finding the necessary funds, and it is doubtful whether Dr. Leyds, the special representative of the Transvaal Government in Europe will be able to supply these. Under these conditions the whole movement, which is in the hands of the most violent section of the Nationalists and anti-Semites, will probably collapse.

### IS IT ALL UNDERSTOOD?

That Britain, With the Consent of Portugal, Will Seize Delagoa Bay? London, Nov. 2.—The Portuguese Government, according to a despatch from Oporto to The Daily Mail, has decided to send no troops to Delagoa Bay before the end of December, unless the frontier of Portuguese East Africa should be threatened.

### Britain May Seize Delagoa Bay.

Berlin, Nov. 2.—The Vossische Zeitung declares that official information that Great Britain, with the consent of Portugal, is about to seize Delagoa Bay.

### SEE THIS THING THROUGH.

Says Rosebery, Even if It Costs More Battalions and Still More Money. Edinburgh, Nov. 1.—Lord Rosebery, toasting "The Army and Navy" at a banquet given this evening by the Lord Provost of Edinburgh to the officers of the Gordon Highlanders and the Scots Greys, referred to the reverse in Natal, saying: "It is much to be regretted that a considerable campaign we must look out for such incidents. It is not in the nature of Britons to take much notice of them. We have had a good many of the same kind, and have generally got out right in the end. But, whatever happens, we must see this thing through, even if it should cost still more battalions and still more millions."

### "NOT GUILTY" HIS ANSWER.

Young Anderson on Trial at Winnipeg. Assizes for Molsons Bank Robbery. Winnipeg, Nov. 1.—(Special).—Interest in the case against John W. Anderson for the theft of \$22,000 from the vaults of the Molsons Bank, Winnipeg, in October, 1898, was evidenced by quite a large crowd at the Court House this morning. The bench was occupied by Judge Bain. The members of the bar were Mr. H. M. Howell, Q.C., and W. E. Perrine for the Crown, and N. F. Hazel, Q.C., T. F. McCallie and Harold Turnbull for the accused. Attorney-General Cameron was also present but did not take the stand in consultation with Mr. Howell.

### TRUE BILL BY THE GRAND JURY.

Case for the Crown Opened—Prisoner's Aged Mother Was in the Court Room. Winnipeg, Nov. 1.—(Special).—Interest in the case against John W. Anderson for the theft of \$22,000 from the vaults of the Molsons Bank, Winnipeg, in October, 1898, was evidenced by quite a large crowd at the Court House this morning. ### AGED MOTHER IN COURT.

At this point Anderson's aged mother and two brothers, accompanied by Mrs. Capt. Crowe, came into the court room, and the accused surveyed them with a rapid glance of recognition from the dock. The work of securing a panel of jurors was then proceeded with, and finished in about half an hour.

### CROWN'S CASE OPENED.

These preliminaries over, and the jury having been made acquainted with the details of the indictment by the clerk, H. M. Howell, Q.C., opened the case for the Crown. He spoke of the rare nature of this case, because of the large amount involved, and the fact that it was such a safe depositary as a bank that was robbed. He pointed out that the jury would have to put up with considerable inconvenience, inasmuch as the case was being tried in the institutions of their country, and that he did not ask them to act in a revengeful spirit, or to convict the prisoner in any case. What the Government asked was simply justice for the evidence.

### AGED MOTHER IN COURT.

In the afternoon Mr. Thepoe, ex-Manager of Molsons Bank here, gave evidence as to the safe combination, the date of the robbery in the vaults, etc., a few days before the trial. Nothing new was revealed in Mr. Thepoe's evidence.

## CANADA'S ACTION STIMULATED BY BRITAIN

The Whole Nation Finds Its Consolation in This Token of Loyalty

### AT QUEBEC LAST MONDAY

London Times Printed a Verbatim Report of the Send-off to the Contingent.

### BLAKE APPLAUDED FOR COURAGE

In Disassociating Himself from the Irish Nationalists, Who Are To-Day So Disloyal.

London, Nov. 1.—The London Times prints a stirring leading article to-day on the military spectacle which was witnessed at Quebec on Monday, on the occasion of the embarking and sailing of the Canadian contingent for the Transvaal. The Times declares that the whole British nation will find in this a measure of consolation for the reverse at Ladysmith.

Applause for Mr. Blake. The Radical Tory press to-day warmly applauds Hon. Edward Blake. The change for the action he has taken in disassociating himself from the Irish Nationalists and Radicals who openly express their sympathy in favor of the Queen's enemies.

The Westminster Gazette to-night quotes a speech in which Hon. Mr. Blake eulogized the desperate valor and martial vigor of the Irish soldiers at the Cape. He said he had no feeling but disgust for the suggestion that one man amongst them could have been base enough to take any other course in the latter part of the campaign. The Gazette adds that what the speaker has said has been well said, and that they firmly believe that the mass of the gallant Irishmen do not lag behind the Englishmen in their pride for the gallantry of their countrymen in South Africa.

People's Feelings Stirred. The Times' verbatim report of Monday's send-off at Quebec has deepened the feelings of the people here.

The Montreal Gazette devotes its chief editorial to the subject, and says: "Quebec has given a crushing answer to those who would accuse themselves of being disloyal to the good by asking, 'What have the colonies to do with South Africa?'"

### WILL HOLD THE PHILIPPINES

Satisfaction in London Because of the Decision of the U. S. to That Effect. London, Nov. 2.—The Morning Post, in an editorial commenting upon a despatch from its Washington correspondent, who says that the United States Advisory Committee has reported to President McKinley unanimously in favor of retaining the Philippines, observes: "We rejoice that the committee has taken such a practical view of the matter and trust that the country will endorse it both at the State and Presidential elections."

Why Ladysmith Was Named So. Ladysmith is called after the wife of Sir Harry Smith, formerly commanding general in South Africa. She was a Spanish girl, to whom the general gave protection when he was a subaltern in the Peninsula War, and who subsequently married him. Harri Smith is named after her husband.

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UNCLE SAM'S WAR FORCES

Adjutant-General Corbin Shows a Total Army of Close on 100,000 Men.

REGULARS NUMBER 64,586 MEN, VOLUNTEERS MORE THAN HALF AS MANY—REFERENCE TO ANGLO-AMERICAN GOOD FEELING.

Washington, Nov. 1.—The annual report of the Adjutant-General of the army, Brigadier-General Corbin, to the Secretary of War was made public to-day. Gen. Corbin sums up the military forces now in the service as:

Regular army, 64,586; volunteers, 34,574; total, 99,160. The regular establishment consists of ten regiments of cavalry, seven of artillery and 25 of infantry.

The distribution of these troops up to October last was as follows: In the United States, 34,222; Porto Rico, 2693; Cuba, 11,387; Philippines, 32,315; en route to the Philippines, 17,638; Alaska, 409; Hawaiian Islands, 409.

Gen. Corbin adds the following to this summary: "It is expected that by December 1 next all the infantry regiments, United States volunteers shown above as in the United States, will have sailed for the Philippine Islands. These, with the troops now there, will give a total strength of 217 officers and 63,968 enlisted men."

The report dwells on the courtesies shown our troops by the British Government officials while stopping at Gibraltar and elsewhere, en route to the Philippines, and says this international courtesy will long live in the memories of both parties to the spontaneous exchange.

CANADIAN PACIFIC STAYS OUT.

Declined to Send a Representative to the Western Passenger Association Meeting.

Chicago, Nov. 1.—The committee of the Western Passenger Association which manages the immigrant traffic pool, met yesterday, with the idea of ending the competition of the Canadian Pacific. That road did not send a representative to the meeting, and consequently no action was taken.

"We have been invited repeatedly to walk into the parlor, but I guess we'll stay where we are," said a representative of the Canadian Pacific this evening. "To be sure, we are not satisfied that the purpose of the Western Immigrant Bureau is in accord with the purpose of the inalienable commerce and anti-trust laws of the United States. In the second place, we are not willing to accept so small a share of profits of the pool as the western lines propose to give us."

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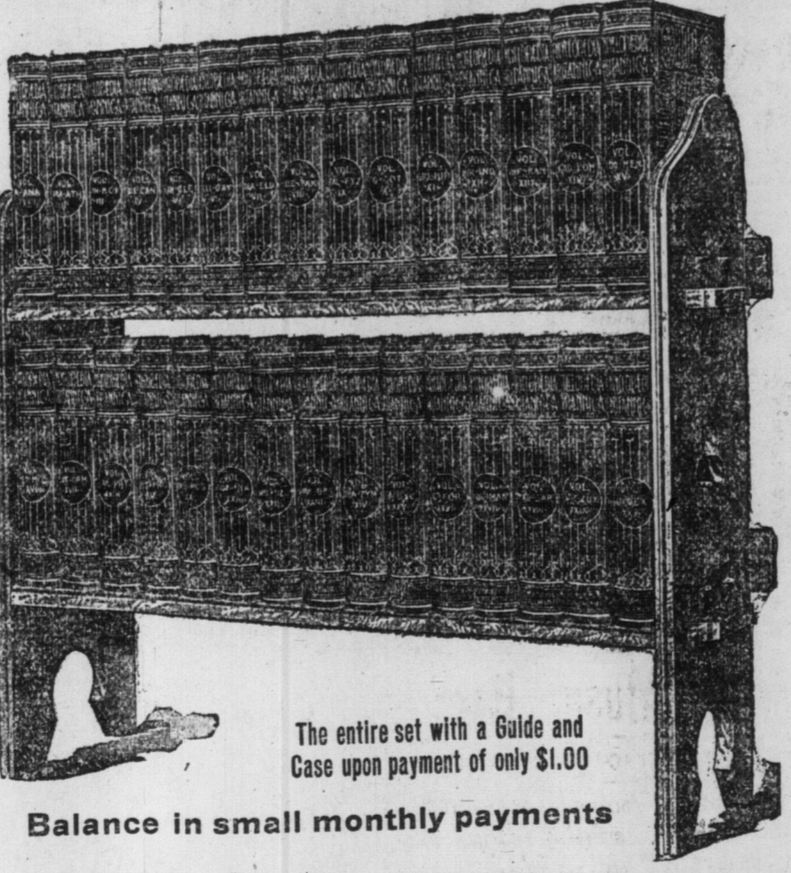

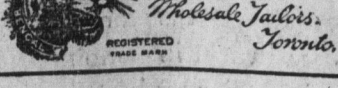

OUR PRESENT DUTY.

We have a Militia Department in Canada and a considerable sum is appropriated yearly for the training of our citizen-soldiers. It is evident that a change in the policy of the department is called for. While the volunteer system is all right as far as it goes it does not meet the exigencies of the times. Canada needs a Department of War rather than a Department of Militia. We must fall in line with other nations and place our soldiers, whatever it is, on a fighting basis. It is time that Canada maintained a standing army commensurate with its population and resources. We have recently decided to send a Canadian contingent to South Africa. It was necessary to organize the regiment and then equip it. It took ten days to get the men to Quebec. This is the best record we could make under the existing system. What is required is the equipment of so many battalions of regular soldiers, on a war footing. We ought to have a small standing army that would be available for active service on the shortest notice. All other countries, no matter how small, have regular standing armies. Canada has been relying too much on the good-will of the Mother Country. We must assume a greater degree of responsibility ourselves. It is not necessary to send a second contingent to South Africa, but that is no reason why steps should not be immediately taken to equip a regiment and have it ready for any emergency. While we think the situation is serious enough to warrant our raising another regiment and offering its services to the Mother Country, yet we do not think a crisis has arisen for the summoning of the Canadian Parliament. Such an act would be superfluous, and it might make us somewhat ridiculous in the eyes of other nations. Canada is not declaring war nor is she asking for a large credit. The funds required for raising the second contingent will be comparatively trifling, and even if we have to send another regiment to South Africa, it will not be necessary to raise a loan or levy war taxes. There is no justification for calling Parliament, from a financial point of view. Nor does any good reason exist for the summoning of Parliament to debate the principle and the advisability of our sending troops to South Africa. This subject can be fully discussed at the next regular session of Parliament. To call an extra session would be giving the matter undue importance. The prosecution of the war in South Africa does not demand the summoning of the Canadian Parliament. There is no mistaking the unanimity of public opinion in Canada on the question of assisting Great Britain in its war with the Boers. It is not necessary to summon Parliament to ascertain the sentiment of the people. That sentiment is practically the same throughout the whole Dominion. Why, then, should Parliament be summoned? The broader question of the part that Canada shall play in future in the wars of the Empire is not urgent. It can safely be left over till the usual session. All that is required at the present moment is the equipment of another regiment to be held in readiness on an order from the War Office. The services of such a corps may or may not be required by the British authorities, but it should be organized, equipped and prepared to sail on the shortest notice.

THE METROPOLITAN'S APPLICATION.

An important point to bear in mind in considering the application of the Metropolitan Railway for the privilege of making a connection with the C.P.R. is that the company's franchise to its right of way on Yonge-street, within the city limits, expires in less than six years. If the city consents to a connection being made by the C.P.R. and the Metropolitan, it may, by this act, relinquish its ownership of the franchise granted to the company in 1884. It is evidently a case where the city should proceed cautiously, and grant no rights except after the most careful consideration. Probably the most serious aspect of the case for the residents of Yonge-street is the possible conversion of Yonge-street into an ordinary railway. The Metropolitan claims to have all the rights

FOR \$153,000 IN HARD CASH

The Whole Assets of the Londonderry Iron Company Was Sold Yesterday.

SOMEBODY IS GETTING A SNAP. The Company Was Capitalized at a Million Dollars-Extensive Property Transferred.

Montreal, Nov. 1.-[Special.]—A property representing a great deal of money was sold this morning by Walter M. Kearns, the entire assets of the Londonderry Iron Company, situated at Londonderry, N.S., were sold for the sum of \$153,000 cash to interests represented by Mr. H. S. Holt of this city. The Londonderry Iron Company was incorporated in 1887 under a special charter from the Dominion Government. The capital of the company was placed at a million dollars, divided into \$100,000 preferred and \$600,000 ordinary stock. The directors were: Lord Mount Stephen, Sir Charles Ross (Glasgow), A. S. McNeil (Glasgow), J. J. Greenhalgh (London, Eng.), A. F. Patterson (Montreal), John Turnbull (London, Eng.), and John McNeil (Montreal). The assets of the company, which have been purchased, consist of the plant and machinery now contained in the building and on the property of the company.
