





### THIRD YEAR OF THE WAR BEGUN

Brief History of the Progress and Chief Incidents of the South African Struggle.

Peace Overtures Fail.

London, Oct. 21.—A little over two years ago, or on Oct. 11. the Boers invaded British territory and began the war.

The British troops upon the spot, weak in number, were hard put to it to hold their own. In the west, the towns of Mafeking and Kimberley were at once in vested by the enemy in overwhelming strength. In Natal, Sir P. Symons was attacked by a large Boer force at Taland on Oct. 20. The enemy were defeated, and heavy loss was inflicted upon them, but the British general was killed. The victory was quite fruitless, as the troops had forthwith to retreat, abandoning their baggage and wounded.

A day later, at Elandslangte, the Boers were again defeated and severely bandled while on Oct. 24, at Rietfontein, yet a third action was fought. Next day the British army in Natal effected its concell, tration, but was compelled to offer battle at Ladysmith on Oct. 30 against over whelming strength. The issue of this fight was disastrous. 

In a paper published in the latest report of the Ontario Bureau of Mines, Mr. F.

N. Speller gives the following re the plant which the Lake Superior Power Company is erecting at Sault Ste. Marie:

The coke to be used at the Sault must be brought from either the Connelisville or Punxutawney District. This is the most important item in the cost sheet of the locality under consideration. It means an approximate haul of 210 miles by rail from Connelisville to Lorain or Cleveland, and a water haul to the Sault equivalent to 80 miles of rail haul. As it will require 1.70 tons of coke to smelt an equal quantity of ore and produce one ton of pigiron, applying Mr. Moxham's freight rate, we find that it will cost about \$1.97 to bring this fuel within easy reach of good ore and limestone on the north shore of Lake Superior or at the Sault; so that it appears quite evident that the cost of assembling the necessary raw material—coke, limestone and iron ore—in the neighborhood of Sault Ste. Marie should be much less than at Pittsburg.






