## RESISTANCE AT PORT ARTHUR GROWS WEAKER

The Japanese are Pressing the Fighting for Possession of Port Arthur, Assaults Being Made Almost Continuously Upon the Eastern Lines of Defences.—Reports From Japanese Sources Intimate That the Ammunition and Supplies are Running Short—Stoessel Is Disabled by Wounds.

## STOESSEL IN HOSPITAL ADVANCES TO COMMANDERS ARMY

Spirit of Russians in Port Arthur so dampened That Many of Them Kept on Duty Only at Point of Revolver.

Headquarters of the Third Japanese Army before Port Arthur, Nov. 15, via Fusan.—It is reported that a wound received by Gen. Stoessel has necessitated his confinement in a hospital, that he refused to relinquish the command of the garrison, and that he has issued orders to the troops to die at their posts rather than surrender. It is said that the spirit of the Russian troops has been dampened by continuous work, the lack of supplies and the hopelessness of their position. The Japanese command of a desire to desert have been shot as a warning to others. The Japanese now believe that the garrison has almost reached the limit of human endurance.

EXPECTS JAP ADVANCE.—Chansianoum, Manchuria, Gen. Kuroki's Headquarters, Nov. 15.—A large mass of Japanese troops are moving eastward and the Russians are expected to strike at their left flank.

AN ATTACK UPON THE FORTIFIED Village of Endonyublu, north of the city of Mukden, was carried out brilliantly during the night of Nov. 10 by the second brigade of the 35th Infantry division. The village had been captured the same morning by the Japanese.

ONE SHELL A MINUTE.—Mukden, Nov. 15.—An broken cannonade of siege guns, fired by the Japanese position in the region of Shahe station, began early this morning, ending only at midnight, when more than half a thousand big contact shells had been fired at the Japanese army's strongest position in the plain for the purpose of demoralizing the work of fortification concentrated at that point for the last four weeks.

TO-DAY'S BOMBARDMENT WAS THE MOST serious attempt yet made by the Russians' large guns, and it was made on account of the apparent determination of the Japanese to make Shahe station an impregnable defence of the railway behind. Both sides have dug themselves in the ground, night and day, that artillery fire is practically ineffective and the ammunition is nearly wholly wasted.

BOTH SIDES RECOGNIZING THAT THE struggle has become one of attrition, and regular field artillery is only occasionally engaged. A sense of inevitable meanness exists. The distress of the natives has increased. Twenty thousand refugees are being fed daily at Mukden. Even the wealthiest farmers and gentry are cutting inadequate charity grain from the public kitchen.

JAPS CARE FOR RELICS.—Mukden, Nov. 14, via Tientsin, Nov. 15.—The Manchurian army Vespik gives details of the scrupulous care shown by the Japanese for relics and other objects of the Russian dead found on the battlefield, and tells how the Japanese have forwarded such effects to St. Petersburg. The paper highly commends this action and says that Gen. Kuroki's recommendation that all his commanders shall observe a similar practice regarding the Japanese dead, owing to the fact that the Japanese have been left in possession of the dead, and the Japanese have entirely devoted upon them. This may give the impression that the Russians in their treatment of the dead warriors, but such an impression would be obviously unfair. This recognition, by both sides, of the benevolent care of the dead, still further marks the abandonment of primitive practices in warfare. The Vespik announces new plans for the organization of the army, indicating elaborate and more reconstruction and reinforcements.

RUSSIA IN DISTRESS.—Chefoo, Nov. 16.—(8:30 a.m.)—The Russian torpedo boat destroyer Rastropov was fired upon this harbor this morning. Firing was heard half an hour before she entered the harbor. A snow storm and a high wind was prevailing at the time, and it is believed the Russian vessel, under cover of the storm, attempted to escape from Port Arthur. The correspondent of the Associated Press was not allowed aboard her. The captain of the Chinese cruiser Haiyung was the first person to go on board the Rastropov. He held a brief conference with her commander, after which the Rastropov came further in the stream and anchored in the same spot that the destroyer Ryshitski had last August, before she was captured by the Japanese.

## Port Arthur due to Fall Within Two Weeks

Headquarters of the Third Japanese Army before Port Arthur, Nov. 14, via Fusan, Nov. 15.—(Delayed.)—Spies and Russians who have surrendered report that rations in Port Arthur have been reduced. ## JAPS BEFORE PORT ARTHUR STORY OF PIERCE CONFLICT

Assaults Failed But Absolutely Unmasked Eastern Russian Positions and Strength.

## NOT ON COMMON GROUND

London, Nov. 15.—The Daily Telegraph's correspondent with the Japanese army before Port Arthur, describing the attack of the Japanese on the eastern fortified ridges on Oct. 20, says: "The terrific and continuous bombardment, night and day, from Oct. 27 to Oct. 30, culminated in wonderful practice, quite beyond criticism. With appalling rapidity, countless bursting shells mingled their smoke in a dense, oscillating mass of vapor laden with earth and gleaming with flashes of fire, the climax being reached at 1 o'clock with a tremendous fire of shrapnel across the broken breastworks of the fortresses. "Suddenly every gun ceased fire, and the Japanese infantry rushed out from their parallels over the hills had ceased reverberating with the thunder of the cannonade, from seven separate quarters against the Ribbing, Keekwan and Pauling fortified ridges. The attack was simultaneously developed. Without a single preliminary fire, fully 4000 troops dashed out pell-mell with fixed bayonets, waving standards and shouting the air with shouts of 'Banzai!' "Checked by Big Shots. The correspondent details how the various Japanese attacks were checked by the big moats and the terrible Russian fire which rapidly depleted their ranks, notwithstanding a clever covering fire of Japanese artillery, and says: "It was most remarkable, even incredible, but fully substantiated, surmises of their ability to withstand the fire of the heaviest Japanese ordnance, how the Russians, despite the heavy bombardment, replied from their fortress guns, after 1300-2000 shells had been fired that day, not counting thousands of smaller projectiles. It is estimated that the day's bombardment cost the Japanese 320,000, representing nearly 20 per cent. of the total stock of ammunition days of the siege in August.

"Before half an hour had elapsed, and after losing 600 men, the Japanese abandoned the attack against the south Keekwan fort. By 4 o'clock the Japanese fire had diminished in intensity and the assault was discontinued. At 10 o'clock the Japanese opened a shrapnel fire on the eastern ridge to cover the retirement of their isolated assaulters, whose situation was critical. From the east and the south Keekwan forts. The total Japanese casualties exceeded 2000.

Unmasked Russian Positions. "Altogether the assaults failed in the capture of the main objective, they also unmasked the eastern Russian positions and their strength. The casualties are relatively small, for all the seven regiments were engaged, not half the troops issued from the parallels, owing to the attacks being so skillfully manipulated and finally ceasing without support being utilized. For strength the Russian position was unassailable, and it would have been useless to double the force and incur danger the casualty list in the same assault.

"After dusk the Russians sortied and recovered the ground lost between the east and the south Keekwan forts. They recovered the fort at 10 o'clock in the evening, but Gen. Ichimov gallantly returned the east and secured 250 casualties expelled the Russians by sheer dash and courage. Indeed, his personality won the hill for the Japanese.

In the Underworld Passages. "After having captured the eastern Russian covered galleries of the Keekwan fort, the Japanese engaged in a bloody fight in the underground passages, slowly winning the vitals of the fort inch by inch, despite the bombs and machine guns of the Russians defending the casemates. On Nov. 6, the central and front sections of the casemates were gained. The work, however, is progressing slowly, owing to the nature of the ground.

## CRIMINAL LIBEL IS CHARGED GUSS PORTER MAKES MOVE

Complains of Damaging Article in Belleville Paper and Little Yellow Dodger.

The Alleged Libel. The information against T. S. Carman, proprietor of The Ontario, complains of the publication of the following article in the issue of The Ontario on the 4th inst:

"If, as Mr. Porter and his friends claim, the plot has been known for some time, why did they not wait until the boxes had been in actual use, when they might have had a case; no, they knew all about those ballot boxes and they are the only ones who did know anything about them, as will be proven soon enough.

"If the actions like those on the part of the Tories do not redound to their everlasting discredit and shame, it will show a marked decrease in the country's moral attitude. The citizens may be time and again warned to be prepared for last minute sensations, but this latest one has reached the climax of political treachery and deceit. 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PROVINCIAL POLITICIANS PREPARE

In the announcement sent out calling a conference of the Conservative party of Ontario in Toronto there was omitted this important fact, that the editor of every Conservative paper in the province is invited to attend.

Orangeville, Nov. 11.—(Special.)—Dufferin County, which is similarly constituted for federal and provincial representation, is overwhelmingly Conservative, having a party majority of over 2000. A Reformer has a show in Dufferin only if two Conservatives enter the field through discord and dissension in the ranks, although even under such favorable conditions one has hitherto failed to score. A local election is due in Dufferin within the next few weeks in any event. Dr. Barr, the veteran local representative, having been promoted to the commons. In June last Dr. Lewis of Orangeville received the local Conservative nomination, and he is actively in the field. George Macfarlane, a Shelburne auctioneer, has announced himself as an independent Liberal. He is in competition with both parties in the north, but has no visible chance of election. There are disunited and dissatisfied Conservatives who, some openly, some secretly, are anxious to stir up opposition. Dr. Lewis, the later program appears to be to put a Conservative prohibitionist in the field, and prohibition on Nov. 23, the intention of the men manipulating the wires being to elect a Conservative and popular Conservative. But nearly all the leading Conservatives of the county were at the convention that nominated Dr. Lewis and pledged his support. The Dominion Alliance has laid down the rule that a prohibition candidate is to be nominated only when both candidates of the political parties refuse to pledge themselves to support drastic temperance legislation, and if Dr. Lewis gives the necessary prohibition pledge he will render it unnecessary for the temperance enthusiasts to select a standstill candidate. Dr. Lewis has been the most active and aggressive Conservative in these parts for a quarter of a century.

In Peel riding in the late federal election, Richard Blain (Conservative) was successful by 125 votes, and since then the Reformers have been dependent and disorganized. The local Peel is not, however, the General Peel. The Dominion constituency consists of the judicial county, but the provincial riding has the Township of Allandale, near the Village of Bolton, with a Conservative majority of over 100, lopped off, as these municipalities belong to provincial Cardwell. In the recent election the municipalities constituting local Peel gave a Conservative majority of less than 20. Provincial Peel is, in fact, one of the closest ridings in Ontario, and hitherto success has gone to the candidate who has been personally most popular. It has been supposed that this popularity lay with the Reformer. John Smith has been the local representative since 1897, and has admittedly won thru his personal hold on the electorate. The besting difficulty was to keep Conservatives from voting for him. Mr. Smith is now an old man, having passed his eightieth year, and in the campaign in 1902 he announced at every meeting that he was seeking the suffrage of the electorate for the last time. This final appeal was made in pathetic fashion and won Mr. Smith a majority of 125 Conservative votes. The Reformers of Peel to-day admit that they have not a man, with the exception of John Smith, who can be elected to the legislature. E. G. Graham, a Brampton lawyer, is the only person mentioned, but he would make a poor run in his own town, and still a worse showing in the rural districts. An effort is being made to induce Mr. Smith to offer again, but he has so far stubbornly refused, and even the urgent representations of men like Hon. Mr. Stratton have failed to move him. Another name mentioned is round hollow, and there is no doubt but few, if any, Conservatives will mark their ballots for him again. The Conservatives held a convention at Brampton on Saturday next. The candidate will be Samuel Charters, editor of the Brampton Conservator. He has long strengthed himself in the county since 1902, and his success seems certain.

The Dominion Cardwell is gone, but the Ontario Cardwell remains. The riding extends from Allandale, near Barrie, to Tullahoma, in the southern part of Albion Township, in Peel County, and must be fully half a hundred miles long. It is like Dufferin, a Conservative hive. Neither party has a candidate in the field yet. Mr. Little has represented the constituency in the legislature for several years, and is again seeking the nomination. James Fraser, a pondus lawyer of Tottenham, and president of the Cardwell Conservative Association, also after H. Linc. Hutton of Bolton was the Reform candidate at the last election, but the one experience to have satisfied him. It would be hard to surmise who the Reform nominee will be, but the fact is that anyone who wants the nomination can have it.

RESIDENTIAL AND FREEDOM BATTLE HUMBER VALLEY OF DON IMPROVEMENT TAX

Court of Revision Hands Out Judgment Which Assessment Department May Appeal. Where the Fighting Will Be Fiercest in the Blank Cartridge Combat To-Morrow.

The court of revision handed out its judgment in the appeal on the Don improvement assessment yesterday. The decision was in favor of the assessment department. The court held that the residential property on either side of the Don cannot be properly assessed as any portion of the cost of this work, because it has not improved the value of the property in question.

The following parcels are relieved from the assessment, Nos. 20 to 101, 104 to 120, inclusive. Nos. 130 to 134 are confirmed, as there is no objection to them. The assessment on these parcels also stands. Nos. 21 to 24, 41 to 43, 59 to 62, 65 to 70 to 72, 75, inclusive. Lot 84, in parcel 2, should be given to Block K as assessed for the frontage on the Don roadway. Parcel 43 should be assessed on the roadway at 45 per foot, and also parcels 92 and 102 at 48 per foot. Reductions are made as follows: Nos. 25, to 28, to 96 and 75, to 82 per foot. Parcels 40 to 51 are changed and the frontage of lots 1, 2, 3, and 5 on plan 227, and lot 6, assessed at 430 per foot.

The judgment concludes: "As to the argument pressed upon us by Mr. Hiddell, that the land, block to be exempt, as it was land reserved from the city in exchange for other lands, the lands given in exchange would have been exempt from the assessment if they had been retained by their owners and there is nothing in the conveyance that would warrant us in holding that they are or were intended to be exempt from the assessment."

The straightening of the river following the pollution of its waters, by opening up the banks, has not improved the residential character of the neighborhood in such a manner as to entitle the corporation to assess such property for any part of the cost of this work. The property that may be used for factory or other sites in connection with the railway and along the roadway stands on a different basis, and is properly assessable to the extent of the advantage derived from the improvement work.

It is difficult to advise where best the fight may be seen from, as so much depends upon which force falls on the points of advantage first. Anywhere along the Humber banks near Bloor-street or Swains should be a place to witness the infantry attack and artillery duel.

AMERICAN FEDERATION OF LABOR. New Orleans Labor Body Censured for Hecateing Paper.

San Francisco, Nov. 15.—The convention of the American Federation of Labor to-day voted against a proposition to make the two Saturdays falling during the fortnight session half holidays. The report of the executive council cited a long list of disputes resulting from the jurisdiction and the merits of the convention were gone into.

Some of the principal contentions referred to were those between the Longshoremen and Seamen's unions, which the executive council, at its meeting, recommended be dissolved. A special conference in this city during the present session, and the dispute between the brewery workers and the International Association of Firemen and Engineers, which the council recommended be submitted to a special committee of the members from each union involved, and a like number of representatives from the American Federation of Labor.

The central labor body which came in for censure of the executive council was that of New Orleans. The latter organization boycotted the latter organization because of an expression of opinion, which was stated by the committee as a violation of a free press and a fundamental principle of unionism. The New Orleans body was given thirty days in which to remove the boycott or the alternative of having its charter revoked. Unions everywhere were called upon to be more conservative in their unfriendly list. It was recommended that such cases be referred to the federation, which would then thoroughly investigate the boycott.

The situation in Colorado was referred to as "shocking" and denunciations were expressed to aid the Western Federation of Miners, both morally and financially in efforts to have the matter brought for the highest court in the land for final adjudication. The report concluded by urging all union men to work persistently to the end that an anti-injunction bill, eight-hour law, and measures to regulate convict labor and enforce Chinese exclusion might be passed by congress.

At the afternoon session Michael Davitt made a short speech, expressing his sympathy with organized labor, and was loudly applauded.

Railway.  
A Good Time to Try.  
The mayor said that the motion fully expressed his views in relation to the matter. The company had for 13 years been violating its contract. He had found that it had done so, but could give the city no remedy. The only thing to do under such circumstances was to go to the legislature, which ratified the contract and ask that it be annulled.  
"According to the papers," said he, "we are going to have a municipal ownership legislature in any event, and I think it will be a good time to go to it."  
Corporation Counsel Fullerton did not care to express any opinion, but said there would be no question of law involved. The matter would simply be decided according to the will of the legislature.  
"That's a great question," said Controller Spence, "and I'll have to have more time to think over it." Controller Hubbard thought it was advisable to go to the legislature and ask for expropriation, but he was very doubtful of success.  
"Omnibus" Case Reopened.  
Meanwhile the omnibus case will come before Justice Anglin again on an application for a rehearing in regard to the question of specific performance. The issuance of the judgment has been withheld for the present, and the text will be varied so to give the city an almost complete victory. The decision of the court referred to specific performance very briefly, as the judgment of the supreme court in a similar case in 1898 was considered innumerable.  
It appears, however, that an act was passed by the Ontario legislature in 1898, entitled "An act to amend and to amend certain contracts entered into with municipal corporations." This statute, it is said, was passed partly on account of the decision of the supreme court and partly on account of the decision in Johnson v. Consumers' Gas Co. The act is short, containing but one section as follows:  
**"This may be the fact."**  
"Whereas duties, obligations or liabilities are or have been heretofore imposed by statute upon any person, company or corporation in favor of a municipal corporation, or where contracts or agreements are or have heretofore been entered into with municipal corporations, which impose such duties, obligations or liabilities, every such municipal"

**"THE SHOP FOR KEEN PRICES"**  
The net examines have yielded about 11 per cent on the average paid-up capital. Taking the road-bed, equipment, water tower, power, plant, and real estate and buildings at their book value of about \$1,000,000, the company is placing the goodwill of the franchise for the unexpired period of 10 years at about \$1,000,000, making a total of \$2,000,000 of which it is to be sold in Ottawa City bonds bearing 4 per cent interest, the remaining \$500,000 being the bonded debt, securities for which would be assumed by the city. The city should accept the terms of the company, with the proviso that for \$100,000 a year, being the interest on the \$2,000,000, the interest on the \$500,000 bonds should be paid by the company. The city would then be a creditor of the company, and the company would own the street railway. The net assets of the company are about \$1,000,000. The market on the street work results would, therefore, be very small.  
As far as the city is concerned, this price is considered high but not prohibitory. When Mayor Ellis proposed to sell the road, he tried to make the matter as a joke. The offer by the company to sell to the city at a higher price, has made municipal ownership of the street railway a real live issue. It is conceded

## "THE HOUSE OF EQUALITY"

There are 42 miles of single track, traversing about 25 miles of street. The capital stock is \$1,000,000 and the bonded debt \$500,000. As the stock is not watered, \$1,500,000 may be taken as the actual cost of the road. The bonded debt bears interest at 4 per cent. The assets include, in addition to the track, a valuable water-power and power house, a summer park and pavilion at Britannia, Victoria Park, over 100 passenger cars, and other rolling stock and storage sheds.

The financial statement of the company for last year shows a net income of over \$123,000, after paying working expenses. Of this amount about \$900 went to the city for the interest on the bonds, and \$200,000 on interest on the bonds for the year of over \$34,000, from which the company declared a dividend of \$12,000, and transferred the balance to the rest fund.  
For the current year so far the showing is very ahead of last.

**EQUIP AN EXPEDITION TO SEE THE NEXT ECLIPSE**  
Prof. DeLury Says Canada Should Do Something When it Occurs  
August 30.  
Prof. DeLury addressed the Royal Astronomical Society last night on the subject of eclipses, explaining the methods of determining or predicting the time and the places where they would be visible.

The next eclipse of the sun will take place on Aug. 30, 1906, and it will be visible as a total eclipse over a belt extending from a point south of James Bay, Canada, through the Arctic Sea, the Atlantic Ocean, thru Spain, and continuing on to the Pacific Ocean, for the longest period, four minutes. From that place westward it will be less, until it vanishes altogether in Arabia.  
Prof. DeLury pointed out the advisability of a man starting to make an expedition to observe the eclipse and make a collection of scientific specimens. He recommended that the coast of Labrador be chosen as the best place to start. Professors Bergstrom and Dickson of the School of Mines, Kingston, reported that they had just returned from the streets of London two weeks ago, and the account they gave was that the streets of London were a piece of furnace slag.

**POLE COLLAPSED WITH LINEMAN.**  
Was Rotten at the Base and Was Shattered in Hospital.  
A telephone pole, which it is said was so rotten at the base that it could not bear a man's weight, collapsed yesterday morning at the corner of Wellington and Ontario streets, and a lineman, who was working on it, fell and was seriously injured. The pole was about 100 feet high and was carrying several cross-arms with wires. The lineman, who was about 50 years old, was thrown about 20 feet in the air and landed on his head. He is now in the hospital, and his condition is described as serious.

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## CORRUPTION RESOLUTIONS REFERRED TO DELEGATES

North and East Toronto Liberals Got Ready for Convention—Conservative Ward Meetings.

The Liberals of North Toronto held a convention in St. Paul's Hall last night and elected delegates to the provincial convention, to be held on the 17th inst. There were 262 representatives present, all of whom were admitted by credentials which they exhibited at the door for ballots. The opposition press was excluded from the meeting. J. Herbert Denton occupied the chair. It was decided that the election of officers should be deferred until the 17th inst., and that four delegates at large should be elected from the meeting and two from each of the eight districts of the riding, thus making up the number allowed to attend the provincial convention. Thirty-five names were put in nomination, out of which there were elected on the first ballot F. S. Spence, Jos. Oliver, Thomas Reid and N. W. Rowell, K.C. From the various districts were elected: Atwell Fleming, W. B. Hamilton, Dr. John Ferguson, J. B. Holden, W. A. Rundie, R. C. Steele, T. W. Britton, A. D. Ramsden, D. J. Bauman, A. W. Ballestrone, R. W. McPherson, D. Carlyle and C. A. McArthur. Those who were elected on the second ballot were: F. S. Spence, J. S. Dewar, Richard Knowles, A. W. Burke, C. W. Kerr, A. H. Jones, H. C. Taylor, C. S. Gavne, William Banks, Thomas Urquhart, H. H. Dewar, K.C.

While the ballots were being counted Mayor Urquhart spoke briefly. He said the difficulty in Toronto was getting out the vote. This had caused his failure, but he was proud of the position he occupied. Bartley Dewar expressed the necessity of organization, which they should start at once. The Conservatives were always ready and won on that account.  
A number of resolutions were then submitted, in regard to corruption in the Ontario Association, but they were referred to the delegates with instructions to prepare something that would be desirable to the convention.

**WANTS PROHIBITION DELEGATES.**  
Open Letter From Dr. Ross of Embray to Oxford Liberal Executive.  
"Dr. Ross of Embray, president of the Oxford Prohibition Association, has addressed an open letter to the North Oxford Liberal executive in reference to the provincial convention, in which he asks for prohibition delegates." The letter is published in full in another column.

For a number of years Liberal promoters, including the late Sir Oliver Mowat, Hon. Mr. Hardy, also the present premier, Hon. G. W. Ross, have repeatedly given pledges in favor of abolishing the liquor traffic, but the time for carrying out these pledges has so often been postponed that many Liberals are losing faith in those pledges given by the Liberal cabinet.  
In view of the facts here presented in this convention, it is suggested that the delegates to be selected to attend this convention be in sympathy with the premier in his efforts to radically curtail the liquor traffic in the province. The electors will expect this.
