The Supreme Council was opened in General Session at 11.15 o'clock, a. m.'

On motion of Ill.'. Bro.'. SPRY, the Proceedings of the last annual session, having been printed and distributed, were adopted

Supreme Council was called off and a Lodge of Perfection 14° opened, and members of the Rite admitted.

The Sovereign Grand Commander then delivered his Annual Address, as follows:

It has long been the custom in Masonic Grand Bodies in America. for the presiding officer to begin the business of the session by delivering what is termed his annual address, giving a review of the doings of the craft within the circle of his own jurisdiction, as well as items of interest which may come to his knowledge of Masonic life within the range of the greater circle of the craft universal: by this means also he submits a report of his own acts to his Grand Body and offers such suggestions as he may think will best promote the good of the brotherhood.

This system of addressing the Grand Body seems not to obtain in Europe, but is emphatically an American custom and is of that practical character for which our American brethren are so well and justly noted.

In accordance therefore with this, our usual custom, I now lay

before you a report of my acts as your Grand Commander, and submit for your consideration my views on various questions which I think are of importance to our Rite, with a general synopsis of its condition in this, as well as in some foreign jurisdictions, all of which I trust will prove of interest and worthy of your careful attention.

Peers and Brethren of the Supreme Council and members of the Rite, I extend to you all my most hearty and loving greeting at this our twenty-first session.

I congratulate you and myself as well, on the privilege of assembling in this Capital City of this large and prosperous Province of our great Dominion, where, I feel sure, the thoughtful and generous solicitude of the brethren will make this session one long to be remembered.

I rejoice in calling your attention to the fact that we meet to-day an unbroken chain, no member of our small band of brothers has stepped out of our ranks and crossed the dark river. We praise and bless the Good Father above for this token of his loving kindness, and sincerely pray that this respite may long continue.

But if our own little family has been exempted from the scythe of the Reaper, other brethren, not members of this supreme degree, but none the less beloved and lamented, have passed to the great silent majority, and without attempting to particularize, but looking upon each one as our brother beleved, we lament their death and we will record their virtues in our hearts, and now extend to their friends and to the bodies of the Rite who have sustained their loss our most sincere and heartfelt sympathy and consolation.

While rejoicing that our own Council has been spared, we have cause for much sadness when we look abroad, to see how the Dark Angel has visited other jurisdictions, pitilessly smiting down some of their bravest and best.

The Southern Supreme Council of the United States, whose loss of its Grand Commanders Pike and Batchellor was spoken of at our last session. has again been deprived of another Grand Commander, Bro.: Philip C. Tucker. The circular received by us announcing his death shows how dreadfully sudden the call was, one moment in life and apparent health, the next in the agony of death. Grand Com.: Tucker died on the 9th day of July last, from appoplexy. He was another of those grand old men such as that old Council has always had to preside over it, one who was eminent in every branch of this order, and who had ruled over all the Grand Bodies of Freemasonry in his State. This brother has now been promoted to a higher and holier sphere.

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From the same jurisdiction we hear of other losses; Ill.: Bros.: Archile Regulas Morel, 33°, an old active member, James Smith Lawson, 33°, and John Commingers Ainsworth. 33°, Emeritus members, and the following Honorary Inspectors-General have died during the year, beloved and regretted by their brethren, viz:

The loss by this Supreme Council of its third Grand Commander within 3 years, besides the numerous other deaths in its active and honorary ranks, calls, I think, for more than a simple record expressing our sympathy. The sweep of the Destroyer has been so relentless: the members removed were so eminent that the loss to our sister body must be almost irreparable. I suggest therefore that a letter be sent to the acting Grand Commander Caswell, conveying to him and the other members of his Council a message of kindly sympathy and extending to them our most sincere consolation.

From the Northern Supreme Council of the United States come reports of the departure of Ill.. Bro. . Agustus R. Hall, 33°, of Penn. sylvania, an active member, who died Oct. 7th, 1893, and Ill.. Bro. . Heman Ely, 33°, of Ohio, one of their oldest active members and who was for many years Grand Treasurer-General, died August 8, 1894, and of the following honorary members, viz:

FOREIGN MATTERS.

Our nearest neighbors and these with whose members we come mostly in contact, the Northern and Southern Supreme Councils of the United States of America, continue to hold with us the most intimate and fraternal relations.

The Bodies of our obedience being constantly visited by members from these jurisdictions and our members as frequently visiting them. These great bodies are everywhere extending the Rite and propagating its principles and seem to spare no pains or expenditure so long as they can reach as nearly as possible the high ideals which the originators of this system had in view. A letter which the Secretary-General will read, has been received from the Northern Supreme Council expressing in graceful language the gratification felt by that body at the visit of our delegates at Chicago last year, and I know you will heartily reciprociate the hope therein expressed that the friendly feeling which has always existed between the two Councils may be still further promoted by similar visits in the future. In response to the usual invitation of the Northern Council I had again the privilege of attending its session recently held in Boston. The Hon. H. L. Palmer, Sovereign Grand Commander, presided. I had hoped to be accompanied by some of our members, but found when I presented myself that I was your sole representative. I was received as I have always been in the past, with the honors due to the position which I hold; the kindliest and most fraternal sentiments were expressed by the Grand Commander towards this Council, and I feel sure great good has resulted and will ever result from this interchange of visitations between the

The Sovereign Grand Commander and all of his officers, our representative, the veteran brother, E. T. Carson and our honorary members

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The resolution the 16th ing; over that city Tucker Grand C

Bros.: Drummond, Tacey, Tyler and Babcock, seemed as if they could not do enough to make my visit pleasant and profitable. There were present 43 active, 2 emeritus and 113 honorary members besides the candidates. Every officer with one exception was in his place, and the work from the opening ceremonies to the closing ones was in character with the high tone of this illustrous body. The roll of active members who participated in the celebrated union of 1867 was called as usual, and out of 57 who were in that year to the fore, only 21 are left, and these with one exception were present. This Grand Body is now composed of 47 active, 3 past active, 2 emeritus and 568 honorary members, making it the largest Council in the world, and among these are very many of the oldest and most experienced Masons on this continent whose names are household words in the craft. This being their triennial or election year, the new officers were chosen, the result of the ballot being almost a unanimous re-election. this Council do not seem to be governed by the "routine of office" principle, unlike other grand bodies they are conservative as to their officers and retain them from time to time unchanged considering that the best interests of the Rite are thereby conserved.

I wish this principle prevailed everywhere in Masonry. We should then have abler masters in the various chairs of the order reflecting more honor on the office and the work of Masonry would be infinitely better done. Of course there are exceptions to this rule as in all other

This Supreme Council is conducted in a thoroughly business like manner, with great dignity, but with good nature and perfect harmony. The 33rd (active degree) was conferred upon three Ill.: Brethren, and the honorary degree upon 29 S. P. R. S. It would be well if the work of all Supreme Councils were conducted in the manner this great body is. The next session will be held in Buffalo, and as this city is so near to our frontier I bespeak now a large attendance of our members on

The members of the Rite in Boston entertained the Supreme Council and its visitors in a most superb style, sparing nothing to make this session a memorable one. I certainly shall not soon forget the pleasure of the three days I spent in the old historic city of Boston.

The Supreme Council of the Southern Jurisdiction by virtue of a resolution passed by it in 1892 held a special session in St. Louis on the 16th Oct., 1893. The late acting Grand Commander Tucker presiding; over a quarter of a century had elapsed since they had met in that city. The attendance was larger than usual. The late Ill.: Bro.: TUCKER, then Leiut. Grand Commander, was elected to fill the office of Grand Commander vacant by the death of Dr. BATCHELLOR.

The session was a busy one. The committee to whom had been referred, among other things, a number of important changes proposed to be made in the constitutions reported, asking further time for consideration of many of the questions, but reported in full on the series of resolutions which had been made by Ill. Bro. Parvin in 1892, viz: Favoring a union with the Northern Jurisdiction. The creation of a National Supreme Body of the Rits for the United States. The abolition of the "Life Tenure" of office in the Supreme Council, and proposing to make a representive system of government for this Rite similar to the so called "York Rite" bodies.

In commenting upon these resolutions the committee in the clearest and most convincing language answered each and every complaint made against the present order of things which the resolutions attacked and it would be well for every Scottish Rite Mason to read the admirable arguments and to my mind conclusive ones, against the organic and radical changes sought to be brought about by the movers in this matter, and I suggest that the Secretary-General do print in the appendix to this year's proceedings a copy of the above mentioned scholarly report.

The amendment of Bro.: HAYDEN contemplating an increase of the active members of this Council from 33 to 66 was also reported against, and the report of the committee was almost also unanimously adopted.

The three Councils of the Old Land, viz: those for England. Ireland and Scotland, appear to have a clear understanding between them as to the method of conducting and managing the affairs of this Rite. The "entente-cordiale" seeming to be thoroughly established. If it were possible, a more conservative spirit than ever before prevails with them.

The Supreme Council of England requires now that the name and profession of every candidate applying to the subordinate bodies of the Rite be reported by them to the Secretary-General of the Supreme Council one week before their meeting so that the rulers of the Rite can have an opportunity to pass judgment upon every applicant.

This Council is now composed of nine dignitaries, three retired members, three honorary members, one official of the Council, eight Inspectors of Districts at home and five abroad, with eleven unattached, making in all forty members of the 33°.

The three Councils at their joint meeting in London on the 3rd April last unanimously agreed to recognize the Supreme Council of Saint Domingo presided over by Jacinro de Castro, and a letter received by our Secretary-General from the Supreme Council of England referring to our action in this matter at our last session informs us of their

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recognition of the St. Domingo Council in the following words:—"It was unanimously resolved" that Bro.". De Castro's Council should be recognized as the only legitimate Supreme Council for the Dominican Republic, and the writer adds: "so that our views are identically the same as those taken by your (our) Supreme Council on the subject." I think therefore that our action in according recognition to this Council is now fully justified.

From the Supreme Council of Scotland through its Reporter, we have many items of interest. An appeal from the Grande Oriente Nacional de Espania or National Grand Orient of Spain, was made to this Council for recognition, giving a complete historical sketch of this body, showing apparently a continuous existence from the establishment of the first Council in 1808 by Count Grasse de Tilly.

The difficulty in Spanish matters in the way of recognition has heretofore been, that several bodies claim legitimacy and there was no proof forthcoming to show that either was a continuation of the original council. The Supreme Council of Scotland decided to refer to and discuss the question at the joint merting of the three British Councils in April. This was done and upon the recommendation of the delegates of these Councils it decided to recognize as legitimate the Supreme Council of Spain presided over by M. . P. . Bro. . Jose Maria Pantoga as Sovereign Grand Commander, and further recommended to it the appointment of the Earl of Haddington as its representative. This Orient has, moreover, through its influential members in the Government secured a law passed and placed on the statute books of Spain, which makes this the only legal Masonic Body in Spain. Knowing therefore that the British Councils had data at hand, sufficiently conclusive as to convince them of the legitimacy of this body, and that this Grand Orient has been acknowledged by twenty or more friendly relations with it and exchange representatives.

The Supreme Council of Scotland at its meeting on the 30th Nov. last resolved that no one in Scotland shall hereafter receive the 18th or "Prince Rose Croix degree" unless he had previously received the degrees of H.: R.: M.: and R.: S.: Y.: C.: S.: of the Royal Order of Scotland.

Thus, as it were, adding (in this jurisdiction) two more degrees to this system.

From France we are favored with the annual bulletin of the Supreme Council. In it we have simply a tableau of its officers and members and the bodies of its obedience. This Council, though an old one, has been very slow in multiplying its subordinates, having only 8 Areopagi of the 30th degree. 22 chapters of the 18th degree (covering

subordinate bodies) and 74 symbolic lodges. It shows a continuous existence since 1821, the time of its reorganization; having now a representative here in the person of our Past Grand Commander Ellis we hope hereafter to be kept in constant communication with this illustrious Council.

From Switzerland we have the official notice of the election of Ill... Bro... Jules Besancon as Sovereign Grand Commander in place of Bro... Ruchonnet deceased. The bulletin of this Council contains many items of interest principally of their home matters. This Council being the authorized head of what is known as the Lausame Convention, to which several Councils still remain connected, it is continually appealed to in matters of dispute or complaint between those Councils that form this bund and the bulletin mentioned contained accounts of several such matters of appeal.

From Mexico we have had a number of official documents executed in a highly creditable manner, all of which were lists of members and notifications of changes in their officials.

REPRESENTATIVES.

Since our last session the following representatives near our Council have been appointed, viz.

These leave three vacancies still in our representatives near foreign bodies and six vacancies near us. What has been done has been through the indefatigable efforts of the Ill.: Chancellor Sprv, and I doubt not we shall be able to accomplish the remainder before our next session and complete the list.

I again urge upon our brethren who are representatives to open and keep up regular correspondence with the Councils they represent so that we may become thoroughly informed as to what is going on in every part of the world.

HOME MATTERS.

I think it will be pardonable on my part, my brethren, if, instead of giving you a resume of the past year's doings, I should take a retro-

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spect of the past twenty, as our Council to-day completes its second decade.

It is now about twenty-six years since the Rite was introduced into the Dominion, beginning with a membership of twelve or fourteen brothren, of these only four remain, the rest have "fallen asleep."

The first bodies of the Rite were established in Hamilton and London in the Province of Ontario, followed by those in St. John, Province of New Brunswick, Halifax, Province of Nova Scotia, Montreal, Province of Quebec, and then again 1n Maitland, Orillia and Toronto in the Province of Ontario.

After a few years it was found that the laws and regulations governing the Rite in, and emanating from the mother country, although no doubt admirably adapted to the circumstances and requirements of the Rite there, were not such as suited the condition of things in this new and more "democratic land."

The few bodies we had were fairly prosperous, but it was evident that if we were to assume that high position in the craft to which the eminent merits of this system entitled us, we must take our place among the other great bodies under a Supreme Council of our own. Our members were but few in number, but we were unanimous in our desire for independence, which unanimity secured for us an absolution of our "vows of fealty" and a Supreme Council for the Dominion of Canada.

The hopes we entertained then have not been disappointed, our Council has been accorded the recognition of every legitimate Council of the world.

We have pursued a conservative course in the administration of the Rite; we might have made greater progress than we have in the way of establishing new bodies in the many small cities and towns of our Dominion, but we found out at an early day that mistakes had been made under the old regime, and under our own government as well, by planting bodies in small unimportant places totally unable to support them. In these cases the warrants were withdrawn.

Experience has taught us that this branch of Masonry is such as to require many circumstances to make it a succes. The ideals of the Rite are high. It aims at establishing a more profound system of Freemasonry. Its ritual is more ornate and more dramatic and consequently requires much more in the way of paraphernalia and appointments and very many more workers than any other system. All these things demand means and members such as small places cannot be expected to supply.

What has been our experience with regard to this Rite appears to

have been that of our brethren in almost all countries. The nature of the Rite with its numerous degrees and elaborate ritual requiring large expenditure and genuinely hard work on the part of its promoters makes such a heavy demand upon them in the way of time and money that they are apt to become disheartened and almost give up in despair, then the work languishes; but generally it occurs that after a time some one or more of the brethren, imbued with a love for the Rite and endowed with zeal, energy and a continuity of purpose take hold of it and the result is then a revival and success.

This seems to be the history of nearly all of the bodies of the Rite. Our brethren at first had all these difficulties to contend with, having also had to overcome great prejudice against the Rite, which through ignorance of its character and claims, prevailed at the first in this jurisdiction.

Now everywhere, with one or two exceptions, there is life and activity. Our bodies are nearly all well equipped, have large and select membership and their offices filled with the best and most talented of the craft. At one time they found it difficult to confer even two or three degrees "in extenso," now the aim is to present the whole series of the degrees in a finished and complete form, and I may say here, as a justly deserved compliment to the Lodge of Perfection in the city of Toronto, that each one of the eleven degrees of Perfection is worked by it in full. A thorough investigation as to the historic claims of this Rite, the careful study of its sublime ritual and its profound, practical and scholarly lectures have educated our members and inspired them with that zeal for its service which is shown now throughout the length and breadth of our jurisdiction, and we are therefore justified in being proud at having bodies of the Rite such as we now have in all the Provinces of our great Dominion.

It is a long and laborious task to ascend the heights to a successful working of this Rite, nevertheless, we think we have, to a great extent accomplished it; the A. and A. S. R. is firmly established in Canada and its success assured. It is to-day here as everywhere else considered the ne plus ultra of Freemasonry.

REUNIONS.

I visited during the year officially but two bodies, viz: the Lodge of Perfection and Chapter of Rose Croix in the capital city of Ottawa.

In response to a very fraternal invitation, Ill. Bro. Murray and myself accompanied by other brethren attended the reunion of the above bodies in May last—I was exceedingly pleased with everything I heard and saw on that occasion. The apartments were entirely suitable and beautifully and completly furnished and the degrees were conferred in both the Lodge of Perfection and the Chapter of Rose Croix in a man-

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ner that could not be excelled anywhere. We were right royally entertained and the reunion was in every respect a success. I look for great things in the valley of Ottawa.

I was present as an ordinary member at the reunion in my own city of Hamilton in January last. There was an unusually large attendance of our brethren from the Northern Jurisdiction. among whom Ill. Bro. E. T. Carson was present during the three days of the session, and his keen attention to the work was most noticeable and gratifying.

This acknowledged expert and critique of this Rite expressed himself in eulogistic terms as to the character of the work done, which was exceedingly pleasing to the brethren there, Bro.: Carson being, as all the world knows, a judge unexcelled in matters of this Rite.

OFFICIAL ACTS.

I was applied to by a brother whose residence is in this jurisdiction but whose business is altogether in the United States and where he is compelled to be during the most of each year, for permission to receive the degrees of this Rite in San Francisco. I referred the matter, through the deputy, to the Lodge of Perfection in the city where the brother's family resided, and finding the brethren there averse I refused the waiver.

Another Ill.. Bro. who had received all of his degrees up to and including the 31st here, but who has removed permanently to Ohio, requested permission to complete the series there and to this application I gave consent and the brother was created a S. P. R. S. in Lake Erie Consistory in Cleveland.

I gave my approval to a new set of By-Laws for Toronto Chapter Rose Croix.

The petitions from the brethren of Vancouver for a Lodge of Perfection and Chapter Rose Croix which were presented at the last session and referred to Bro.. Ellis and myself, were returned by the Secretay-General suggesting a change in some of the officers proposed. A good deal of correspondence has been held with the brethren there and the result is the matter remains in abeyance for the present. Already some of the brethren whose names were on the petition have removed from Vancouver, and from the changing nature of the population there the brethren seem to be always coming and going, nevertheless I am convinced that if we were to send an Ill.. Bro.. of the 33rd degree there with the power to establish the bodies, good first-class men can now be secured who are desirous to propagate the Rite and who will readily embark in the enterprise.

I would therefore suggest that power be given to appoint some one

of our members who may be competent to do the work and who can go on this mission, and that his expenses be paid.

From the returns received by the Secretary-General it will be seen that considering the financial depression which has extended throughout our jurisdiction and is still existing the bodies have done well. There has been a slight falling off with nearly all of them in the number of initiates received, but I am assured that great care is being taken in regard to the quality of the material introduced, and I would urge our brethren everywhere, in the most fraternal spirit, to still maintain this diligence by seeing that no one is selected who will not reflect honor and add strength to our Rite. There is always danger to any branch of Freemasonry when it becomes popular. This Rite has become so; it has earned its way to the hearts of the great body of the craft and numbers are now seeking admission, let therefore the greatest care be taken that only those are received whose social standing as well as moral worth and fitness is beyond question.

CONSISTORY DEGREES.

It has been for a long time mooted and earnestly discussed among our older and most active members throughout the Dominion, that the too free admission to the Degrees of the Consistory is in direct opposition to the genius of the Rite and in violation of the spirit of the old constitutions and contrary to the original intention, when the degrees were aggregated into the system. Fears are expressed that the custom which has somewhat obtained in this country of advancing brethren to the Consistory degrees, as a natural sequence to the 18th has lessened the value of the former and will tend to destroy the celat and honor which are attached, or intended to be attached, to the possession of this high rank, and in consonance with this idea the practice has begun of discouraging the ambitious views and aspirations of many of the younger members, restraining them from applying, but holding out to them in the future the hope of their attaining by labor on behalf of the Rite, and experience in it the position they covet.

This conservative spirit has already been adopted by the Consistory in Ontario and the effects are already seen in the increased desire for the degrees and the evident higher appreciation of them by those already possessing them. The very nature of the instruction of the 32nd degree clearly shows, that no one should obtain it but one thoroughly versed in all the preceding grades, and the general drift of the whole, partaking of the chivalric or knightly character, is a plain indication that the greatest care should be taken in selecting those who are to occupy this high position, and perform the important duties which devolve upon and are the privileges of its members.

Some time ago, when revising the Constitutions of this Council a

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spirit diametrically opposite to these views obtained the time limit which we had before in our old Constitution was done away with, and the barriers which might have been strengthened were almost entirely removed, so that only two months are now required between the 18th degrees and 30th, and the result has been that though our numbers in the Consistory may have increased, I fear it will be by those who although worthy men are not experienced enough in the Rite to entitle them to the position and priviliges this high rank confers.

Brethren, I desire, and it is earnestly desired by many, that this should cease, and I strongly recommend, as a first move in this direction, that the Constitution be amended and the time be greatly increased between the 18th and 30th degrees and also between the degrees above the Kadosh.

Many and strong arguments might be adduced in support of my remarks and as a proof of what I am contending for, but time and space here will not permit, nor is it necessary, I assume, as I feel sure these views are those of most, if not all of the members of this Council, and I trust that this session will will not close without at least the first step being taken to secure this much to be desired end.

CANDIDATES FOR 33°.

There are several Ill.: Brethren who have been honored by this Council by being elected to receive this high degree who have allowed two or three years to pass without presenting themselves. I recommend that the election of these be cancelled unless they come forward this session.

RITUAL.

The Ritual Committee to whom was entrusted the question of considering the ceremony of the Easter Services as practiced in the Halifax Chapter Rose Croix, as also to complete the ceremonials generally for the use of this Supreme Council are expected to present their report at this session.

CLOSING WORDS.

The active, thoughtful worker in Freemasonry who makes of it a life work, is sometimes puzzled by the thought whether after all his labor and expenditure of time, talents and money he is really doing the Master's work. Brethren, I have put this question often to myself during a long Masonic career, and I am bound to believe after careful consideration that Masonry, especially this branch of it, has a mission to fulfill, and I am convinced that just as sure as the constant dropping of the water wears even the flinty rock, so the oft repeated sublime lessons of these beautiful degrees cannot and do not fail to leave their impress deep in the hearts and lives of our brethren. In this belief then, in which I 3

hope my hearers all join, let us work on while the day lasts, "for the night cometh in which no man can work".

And now my brethren, I commit these remarks to your wise and careful judgment and direct you to the work of the session, with the assurance and firm belief that this 21st meeting of our Council will redound to the progress, success and glory of the A. and A. S. Rite.

JOHN W. MURTON, 33°, GRAND COMMANDER.

The Lodge of Perfection was then closed, and all brethren below the Thirty-third degree having retired, the Supreme Council resumed labor in general session.

On motion of Illustrious Brother Ellis, the address of the Grand Commander was referred to a special committee to report during the session.

The Grand Commander appointed Ill.: Bros.: ELLIS, STEARNS and MACKAY on the committee.

FIRST EXECUTIVE SESSION.

The Supreme Council went into Executive Session at 1.10 o'clock p. m.

The Secretary-General then read the names of brethren from the Province of Ontario proposed for the degree of Hon.: Ins.: General, 33°, at the Annual Session of 1893, viz: Ill.: Bros. BENJAMIN ALLEN, 32°, and ELIAS TALBOT MALONE, 32°, both of the City of Toronto, and DANIEL FRASER MACWATT, 32°, of the Town of Barrie, Sublime Princes of the Royal Secret.

The roll having been called, in each case the Illustrious Brethren were elected by viva-voci vote.

The Supreme Council was called off at 1.15 o'clock p. m.

The Supreme Council resumed labor in General Session at 3.15 o'clock p.m. Officers and members as before.

Illustrious Brothers B. D. BABCOCK, of Cleveland, Ohio, and CHAS. W. CUSHMAN, 33°, of Buffalo, New York, were presented and welcomed by the Grand Commander.

The Grand Master of Ceremonies introduced the following Illustrious Princes of the Royal Secret, 32°, to receive the degree of Honorary Inspector-General, 33°, viz: Ill.: Bros.: JOHN MCKECHNIE, BENJAMIN ALLEN, ELIAS TALBOT MALONE, and DANIEL FRASER MACWATT.

The Thirty-third degree was conferred on them in full form. They were received, welcomed and proclaimed Honorary Inspectors-General of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, and enrolled as Honorary Members of the Supreme Council for the Dominion of Canada.

The following reports of Provincial Deputies were then read:

ONTARIO.

To the Supreme Council, 33°, A .: . & A .: . S .: Rite for the Dominion of Canada.

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN:

I have much pleasure in reporting that all the bodies of your obedience working in this Province are making substantial progress, as will be seen by the tabulated statement prepared by the Ill.: Grand Secretary.

During the year I have issued dispensations to confer the degrees within the prescribed time, to Ottawa Lodge of Perfection, Ottawa, Murray Chapter of Rose Croix, Ottawa, Hamilton Chapter Rose Croix, Hamilton.

I had the pleasure of visiting all the bodies located in Hamilton as well as in Toronto, in which latter place I duly installed the officers of both Lodge and Chapter.

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The rooms in which the Toronto Bodies meet was very much damaged by fire during one of the meetings of the Lodge of Perfection: fortunately all were able to escape unhurt. The furniture, regalia, etc., being insured, the Toronto brethren have taken the opportunity of remodelling their rooms and making them better adapted to the working of the Scottish Rite. I would take this opportunity of calling the attention of all our Lodges to the desirability of their maintaining a full insurance. It takes years to accumulate all that is needed, and should a complete loss occur without insurance, the resources of the Rite in that particular locality might be too severely taxed.

During the coming year I hope to be able to meet with my brethren more frequently than in the past year. I refer to the visitation of Lodges and Chapters, in which I fear I have been sadly remiss.

In conclusion, I have the greatest pleasure in reporting that the same harmony still prevails in this Province and that the outlook for the coming year is bright.

This Lodge has been dormant since last March, and seeing no immediate prospect of success in the near future, and by the request of the members I withdrew the warrant, books, etc., and returned them to the Secretary-General, H. PROSPECTS OF THE RITE IN NOVA SCOTIA.

Although the number added to the Rite during the past year is not large, it makes up in quality what it lacks numerically. Young and active members are coming forward and taking office, and the degrees are fairly well worked. I have not yet had the pleasure of witnessing Bro.'. W. C. Smith confer the 30°, but his candidates informed me that they had no idea they had anything so grand in Masonry; what Bro.'. Smith does, he does well. The prospects for the coming year look bright. We have lost two of our esteemed brethren by death: Ill.'. Bro.'. T. R. Harris, 30°, and E.'.& P.'.P.'. J. D. McDonald, 18°; two of our best attendants and enthusiastic members have left us: Ill.'. Bro.'. Capt. Boileau, 32°, and Rev. F. B. N. Norman-Lee, 32°. The books of the three bodies are well kept and credit is due the Secretaries, Bros.'. Bonner and Murray, for the trouble they have taken to have every detail of every meeting properly and correctly noted.

MANITOBA.

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN:

I beg to present to you my annual report. The returns of all the bodies in Manitoba were forwarded promptly, and show that the membership in this Province has been materially increased since your last meeting.

Taking advantage of the fact that the meeting of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba, A. F. & A. M., was held at Banff, Alberta, in June last, Winnipeg Lodge of Perfection called an especial meeting of the Lodge for the following day at the same place. The meeting was most successful and enjoyable, the degrees 4-14 being conferred on eight candidates. A well selected collection of paraphernalia and fittings

were taken to Banff from the Winnipeg rooms, and the degrees were conferred in a most satisfactory and impressive manner. As your Deputy, I was present and inspected the proceedings and work. Twenty-four members of the Winnipeg Lodge were in attendance, and when it is considered that the meeting was held at a place one thousand miles distant from Winnipeg, your Council can have a fair idea of the vitality in the Rite in my jurisdiction. I venture to say that the successful holding of a Masonic meeting in Canada one thousand miles from headquarters was never before attempted, and is quite unique in Canadian Masonic history. I mention this merely to indicate to the Council the earnestness of aim and work shown by members of the Rite in the Canadian Northwest.

The last annual re-union of the Lodge of Perfection was held in February, and was, like those held in the past, most successful. The proceedings terminated in a banquet, at which seventy-five members of the craft were present.

In the Lodge, Chapter and Consistory the ritual work is well done, the staff of expert workers increasing, and the fittings and paraphernalia all that can be desired. The property of the three bodies now in the rooms stands insured for \$1750.00, and the three have now, clear of all liabilities, about \$700 in hand. The Lodge, during the current year has already donated \$125.00 to charities such as the homes for women and children.

The Committee on Ritual presented the following report:

To the Supreme Council, A:. & A:. S: Rite for the Dominion of Canada.

Illustrious Brethren:

The Committee on Ritual appointed at the last annual meeting of the Supreme Council beg to report that they have had under consideration and have prepared a form of ceremony for the installation of officers of the Chapters in this jurisdiction, and they submit herewith a form which they recommend for adoption. The Committee have carefully examined the ceremonies in use by the Supreme Councils of England and the Northern and Southern Jurisdictions of the United States of America, and in the form of ceremony submitted they have followed very closely that used in the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States, omitting, for the sake of reasonably convenient brevity, those portions thereof which in the opinion of the committee could be most easily dispensed with, and making such changes as seemed to be requisite.

The Committee have also had submitted to them the Special Ritual which for some years past has been used by Keith Chapter, Halifax, in

connection with the Easter Ceremonies. The unauthorized use of this special ritual or innovation on the work prescribed by Supreme Council was referred to in the address of the Sovereign Grand Commander at the last annual meeting, and the Committee have considered the question in view of all the circumstances and the correspondence which has taken place. The Committee are of opinion that on general principles departure from the ritual laid down for use by the subordinate bodies should not only not be encouraged, but should not be allowed. Without claiming perfection for all portions of the ritual used by the Rite throughout the various degrees and even admitting that many improvements thereon might be suggested, it seems almost incapable of argument that Lodges or Chapters should be allowed to wander off with work of their own, and there does not appear to your committee any good grounds for distinction in this respect between the work of conferring the degrees and the Easter Ceremonies. Moreover, the ceremonies used by the Halifax brethren provide for the admission by invitation, of Masons who are not members of this Rite, to certain portions of the ceremonies used on Easter Sunday, and to the Committee this seems especially objectionable. It is urged that nothing in the nature of secret work is displayed in the presence of the outsiders, and that the order is much benefitted by the favorable impressions, which, as privileged spectators they derive from what they hear and witness on such occasions. But the same argument should apply to much that is beautiful and impressive throughout the ritual of the degrees, and no line can be safely drawn. The Committee think the door should not be opened in favor of any innovation or novelty whatever. While unanimously arriving at this conclusion, the Committee desire to acquit the Halifax brethren of any other motive than that of endeavoring to render the ceremony more attractive and pleasing. The work they wish to use displays evidence of ability and taste in its preparation, but it is a departure—an unauthorized departure from that uniformity which the committee believe to be desirable, and apart from any other consideration, on that ground alone should not be sanctioned or a!lowed. The committee recommend that the ceremony of installation of officers now submitted for the approval of Supreme Council and the work heretofore provided and at present in use in connection with the Easter ceremonies be printed together in convenient form, and that the Secretary-General be instructed to take the necessary steps for this purpose.

The Committee on the Grand Commander's Address presented the following report:

To the Supreme Council, A:. & A:. S:. Rite for the Dominion of Canada.

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN:

The Committee to whom was referred the Address of the Sovereign Grand Commander concur in his expressions of congratulation at the meeting in the city of Toronto, where there are many evidences of the prosperity of the Rite and where the members of the Supreme Council have had the pleasure of meeting so many kind, generous and thoughtful brethren.

With the Grand Commander we rejoice that our chain of union this year is unbroken, and like him. too, we mourn the losses sustained by sister Supreme Councils, particularly that of the Southern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States in the death of Sovereign Grand Commander Tucker, following as it did so closely that of Ill.'. Bro.'. Bachelor and that of Ill.'. Bro.'. Pike, they recommend that the suggestion of the Sovereign Grand Commander that a message of kindly sympathy be sent to the Southern Supreme Council be carried into effect. The Committee also noted with much regret announcement of the death of Ill.'. Bro.'. James Smith Lawson, who took an active interest in the early development of the Rite in Canada in establishing a knowledge of the system in the Province of British Columbia.

It must be a matter of pleasure to all of our members that the Sovereign Grand Commander was, this year, able to revisit the Northern Supreme Council in annual session in Boston, thus keeping strong by personal contact the bonds of fraternal association. The information which the Sovereign Grand Commander submits respecting other Supreme Councils with which we are in friendly relations must prove of much interest to all members of the Rite in Canada.

In regard to the condition in Spain, the Committee feel that in view of the internal dissention still existing among the Freemasons of that country and of the past attitude of this Supreme Council in regard to the bodies claiming Masonic authority there, and to give the members of the Supreme Council further opportunity for investigation, the wisest course would be to let the matter of recognizing any of the bodies in Spain remain in abeyance for the present.

The Committee congratulate the Supreme Council on the work accomplished so far by the Ill.. Grand Chancellor in aid of the efforts of the Sovereign Grand Commander to fulfil the representative system, and hope that through the efforts of the representatives themselves the

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ties of frendship will be strengthened with other bodies and a more intimate knowledge be extended of what this fine organization—the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite-is accomplishing.

The report of the Sovereign Grand Commander as to his official acts, visits, etc. call for no special action by the Supreme Council, but it is pleasurable to observe the deep interest taken by our Illustrious Brother in all the affairs of the Rite. His resume of our history during the past quarter of a century is a record of progress with which members of the Supreme Council may well be satisfied.

In regard to British Columbia, the Committee recommend that the matter be left in the hands of the Sovereign Grand Commander and the Illustrious members conversant with the conditions there: they concur in the view that there ought to be a Lodge of Perfection in Vancouver, and that if it is found necessary to get a member of the Supreme Council to go thither, his expenses should be paid. The Committee also think that in view of the long period of time which has elapsed since the Lodge and Chapter at Victoria have met their warrants should be called in.

Referring to what the Sovereign Grand Commander has said in regard to the time which should elapse between the conferring of certain of the degrees, the Committee are of opinion that the remedy for the evil pointed out is to provide a constitutional time limit between the conferring of the degrees which shall be absolute, and that the power given to shorten this period by dispensation should be vested solely in the Sovereign Grand Commander.

The Committee concur with the Sovereign Grand Commander in the feeling that some action should be taken in regard to members elected to receive the thirty-third degree in this Council, and who have not presented themselves for admission, although at least two years have elapsed since their election. The Committee recommend that the Supreme Council at this session take such action in each case as to it may seem advisable on its merits.

In the thoughtful words with which the Sovereign Grand Commander closes his address brethren of every degree will find food for reflection. That the Masonic institution has lived so long, that it is so widespread, that its principles and teachings have been cultivated and applied by so many eminent men, afford ample ground for the belief that its practical work and its theoretical teaching benefit humanity, and that it is a part of the divine plan laid out for the good of mankind by that Architect who built the skies.

To the Supreme Council, A.:. & A.:. S.:. Rite for the Dominion of Canada.

Illustrious Brethren:

The Committee on the Doings of Inspectors-General or Deputies for the Provinces have carefully examined the reports from the several Provinces, and respectfully submit the following:

ONTARIO.

The Deputy from this Province reports that the Rite is in a prosperous condition and the prospects are highly favorable, there being every indication of a considerable increase in membership in the several bodies of the Rite. The Consistory at Hamilton continues to show a marked increase, although members are not admitted to the 31st and 32nd degree as readily as in former years. The Rose Croix Chapters are all progressing, especially those at Hamilton. Toronto and Ottawa, while the Lodges of Perfection are doing good work.

The brethren at Toronto having had their premises destroyed by fire, have refurnished them in the most appropriate manner and worthy of the highest commendation.

Your Committee are fully in accord with the views expressed by the Illustrious Deputy for Ontario, and would urge upon all the bodies of their obedience the wisdom of insuring their property for a reasonable amount.

QUEBEC.

The Illustrious Deputy for Quebec reports that the Rite is steadily progressing in that Province.

The Consistories at Montreal has not had any increase in membership during the past year, but it is expected that some addition will be made to their number during the ensuing winter. The Rose Croix Chapter and Lodge of Perfection have conferred degrees upon several candidates. In the city of Quebec there has not been any marked progress, nor are there any indications of much being done. All the

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bodies of the Rite in the Province of Quebec are well conducted and controlled by able and zealous Masons.

NOVA SCOTIA.

The brethren in this Province show commendable caution in the admission of members, and none are admitted who have not shown by their life and conduct that they are likely to appreciate the teachings and dogmas of the Rite. The Consistory at Halifax has added to its membership, and the Rose Croix Chapter and Lodge of Perfection at Halifax have done some good work. The Deputy for the Province acted wisely when he withdrew the warrant and books of Cumberland Lodge of Perfection, as it was found that a Lodge could not be successfully conducted at that place. The prospects for the future are very bright and, it is expected there will be quite an increase in the membership of the Rite in Halifax.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Your Committee are gratified to learn that in this part of our obedience the Rite maintains its high standing. There has been satisfactory progress made and the prospects are most encouraging.

MANITOBA.

The Deputy for this distant Province presents a report that is satisfactory in every respect. The Consistory, Rose Croix Chapter and Lodge of Perfection are well conducted and the work in the several Lodges is well and correctly done. The meeting of the Winnipeg Lodge of Perfection held at Banff, Alberta, during the Session of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba, in June last, afforded an opportunity to some worthy brethren to receive the degrees of the Rite without making the long journey to Winnipeg.

It is gratifying to your Committee to be enabled to state that the reports show that there is a state of general prosperity in the Rite, and bright prospects for the future progress and influence in the Dominion of Canada. Your Committee would respectfully suggest to the Illustrious Deputies for the several Provinces that it would be highly advantageous to the Supreme Council and afford better opportunities for judging of the past, present. and probable prospects for the future if more details were given in the reports which they submit for our information.

Ill.. Bro.. J. V. Ellis moved that the thanks of the Supreme Council be given to Toronto Lodge of Perfection and Toronto Chapter Rose Croix, for the arrangements made for our meetings and the entertainment furnished our members.

The labor of the Supreme Council benig ended, the Chain of Union was formed, and the Council was closed at

5.10 o'clock P. M., to assemble again iu annual session in the City of Montreal in the Province of Quebec, on the fourth Wednesday in October, 1895, at 12 o'clock noon.

To the Bodies and Brethren of the Obedience of our Supreme Council:

SORROW! SORROW!

We are constantly reminded that "life is a count of losses." November's chili and churlish blasts have not only laid fields and forests bare, but have brought to us tidings of great sadness. Three Inspectors-General, known and loved among us, have been called from their abode on earth to report in the spirit Land.

"Rest to their ashes; peace to their souls."

The first, although our near neighbor and beloved by all of us who knew him personally, was not of our own Jurisdiction, but one honored and respected as a Past Sovereign Gr.: Commander of the Supreme Council of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite for the Dominion of Canada—Brother WILLIAM H. HUTTON, 33°, of Montreal. Province of Quebec. He had been ill for several months with Bright's disease. A Mason of the English Rite, he received its Degrees in St. Paul's Lodge, English register, at Montreal; was Arched in the Royal Arch Chapter attached to that Lodge; for several years was District Grand Master over the three Lodges of the obedience of the Grand Lodge of England in that city; and was also Deputy Provincial Grand Master for Ontario and Quebec of the Royal Order of Scotland. In the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite he was the leading spirit in that Province; was created a Sovereign Grand Inspector-General, 33°, at the formation of that Supreme Council in 1874, and rose by eminent ability to the highest office-that of Sovereign Grand Commander.

"Long may his grave with fragrant flowers be dressed, And the green turf lie gently on his breast."

Brother James Smith Lawson, 33°, an Emeritus member of this Supreme Council, died at San Francisco, on the 7th instant, of typhoid pneumonia. We have not the statistics showing his reception and advancement in Bodies of the American Rite. He was for years a

Special Deputy of the Supreme Council (being a 32d) for Washington Territory and the satisfactory manner in which he discharged the duties of that office was evidenced by our Supreme Council investing him with the Grand Cross for extraordinary and meritorious services rendered therein. He was born February 13, 1828, at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; was a civil engineer by profession, and for many years was connected with the United States Geodetic Survey on the Pacific Coast. He was crowned an active member of our Supreme Council, May 30, 1876, and was assigned to duty in the then Washington Territory, and afterwards he was stationed at San Francisco, California. On the 11th of October, 1890, he resigned as active member of the Supreme Council, and on the 23rd was placed upon the Emeritus list of that Body. He has ever been respected by us as skilful in his profession, an elegant gentleman, an accomplished and zealous Mason.

Truly.

"The loved leave vacant places, Every year."

He was buried with the honors of the Rite.

Brother Achille Regulus Morel, 33°, was born at Duclair, France, April 9, 1810; received a liberal education, and in his early manhood was engaged in commercial pursuits; later he removed with his family to New York, where he lived for about two years, and then changed his residence to New Orleans, La., where he lived for many years. There he became active as a Freemason; was Master of Polar Star Lodge, No. 1, and Wise Master of the Chapter of Rose Croix of this Rite. From his associations he soon became identified with the so-called "Supreme Council of New Orleans, La.," being a member of the Consistory under that Jurisdiction, then known as the Consistory of 1813, by the authority of which Supreme Council he received the 33rd degree of Inspector-General. With Claud Samory, 33°, and Chas. Laffon de Ladebat, 33°, he composed the committee who, on January 30, 1855, entered into a convention with a similar committee from the Consistory of 1852, and thereby transferred all the rights, powers, and privileges of the Consistory of 1813 to that of the Consistory of 1852, and became a united Consistory, which was a predicate to the Concordat between the Supreme Council sitting at New Orleans and our Supreme Council of the Southern Jurisdiction, by which was evidenced the dissolution of the irregular Body which had existed at New Orleans from the year 1839, called the "Supreme Council of New Orleans in the State of Louisiana," and all Bodies existing by pretended authority of that organization, and their members gave in their allegiance to our Supreme Council, which has since governed the Rite in that State. Nine of its active members were elected and declared honorary members of our Supreme Council, and were appointed Deputies in Louisiana

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and invested with the supervision of the Rite therein, subject to the superior authority and control of the Supreme Council at Charleston, S. C. Bro. . Morel was one of the nine Deputies so appointed, and it is believed that he was the last survivor thereof and of said old irregular Supreme Council. He continued on active duty in the Rose Croix Chapter until the time he moved from New Orleans to Galveston -about the year 1872-where employment was furnished him for several years by members of our Rite. Up to May, 1876, he did not attempt to do anything for the Rite, except once. when, at the request of Inspector Tucker, he accepted an appointment as his Special Deputy to visit Corpus Christi and set a new Lodge of Perfection at work at that place. At the meeting of the Supreme Council the same year, Inspector Tucker being ill, could not attend, and Inspector Morel visited Washington and attended the meetings of the Body. While there. Inspector MACKEY, of his own volition, had him recognized as an Active Inspector-General, and assigned to Texas. In Texas he was never active. He would not work in English, being accustomed to do it in the French language, and, practically, his official position was that of Consulting Inspector. At one time he was recognized as the Representative and Guarantor of Amity at this Supreme Council from the "Unico Supremo Consiglio Dei 33rd per l'Italia," whose see is at Rome. Subsequently he was appointed to the same position for the "Supreme Conseil pour la France et les Dependances," in which he served for nearly a score of years. Late in 1876 he moved from Texas to California. The feebleness incident to extreme old age prevented him from entering into active business there. His wife died about three years ago. That event crushed him, and ever thereafter he but lingered here below, and lingering died at the ripe age of eighty-three years and six months.

Good-bye, old friend, good-bye!

The Bodies in this Jurisdiction and all the members of the Obedience of this Supreme Council will display the mourning colors for the dead, according to their respective rank, as customary; and, in compliance with Section 10, Article XVI. of our Statutes, the Inspectors-General and Special Deputies of the Supreme Council in each Jurisdiction, and the Chief Dignitary or Officer of each Body, are charged with causing this order to be duly complied with.

SORROW! SORROW! SORROW!

DEAR BRETHREN:

In the painful performance of sad duty and heavily oppressed by the sense of a great loss, I officially announce to you the death of our greatly beloved Brother, Philip Crosby Tucker, 33°, Grand Commander of our Supreme Council. The startling news came like a thunder-clap from a clear sky. He died of apoplexy, in the city of Washington, D. C., July 9th, at one o'clock, p. m.

Bro. Tucker was born in Vergennes, Vermont, February 14th, 1826. He was a lawyer of careful reading, both as a counselor and pleader. His career was unsullied by blot or stain that might mar the harmonies of a rure, noble and exemplary life.

He was made a Mason in Dorchester Lodge of Vergennes during the exciting times of Morgan days. He afterwards became P. M. of this Lodge. He was T. I. M. of Vergennes Council R. & S. M., Past District Deputy Grand Master, Past Grand Secretary of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter, and was made a Knight Templar in Burlington Commandery. He came to Galveston November, 1852, and affiliated with Harmony Lodge No. 6, and was Worshipful Master of it for six years. He was also a member of Tucker Lodge No. 297; Past High Priest of San Felipe de Austin Chapter No. 1, R. A. M.; was Eminent Commander of San Felipe de Austin Commandery Knights Templar for fourteen years; Grand Master of Grand Lodge of Masons in Texas in 1869; Grand High Priest of Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Texas in 1835, and Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar in 1864, and was the Representative of other Grand bodies to those near Texas. He received the degrees of A. . & A. . S. . Rite from 4° to 32° at New Orleans, La., February 5th, 1867, at the hands of Bros. James C. Batchelor, 33°, I.: G.:., Samuel M. Todd. 33°, I.: G.:., assisted by Bro. H. R. Swasey, 32°, by virtue of a dispensation issued by the Ven.: Gr.: Com.: of the S.: C.:, dated July 22nd, 1836. He was commissioned as Deputy Inspector General of the Supreme Council with ample powers for the State of Texas by the Ven.: Gr.: Com.: February 13, 1867. Elected a 33° at Charleston, South Carolina, May, 1868; crowned an active member September, 1868, at St. Louis, Mo.; appointed Second Grand Equerry of Supreme Council May 6th, 1874; appointed Grand Prior ad interim February 5th, 1883; elected Grand Prior October 22nd, 1881; elected Lieut.

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Grand Commander October 17th. 1862, and elected Grand Commander October 18th, 1893. He was also commissioned as representative and guarantor of amity from the Supreme Council of Mexico to this Supreme Council on the 27th of January, 1882, which position he held until 1891, when he resigned.

In the war, he was in the Confederate service doing duty as a volunteer aid on Gen. Magruder's staff, with the rank of Major, and not only rendered valuable aid to the cause by his intimate knowledge of the surrounding country, but was able to give Masonic relief and assistance to those taken prisoners.

He was an active member of the Howard Association during the yellow fever epidemics that visited Galveston. Night and day for long months in each epidemic he never weakened or failed; what man could do for the sick and suffering was done by him and his associates. Everywhere, at all times, under all circumstances, he performed faithfully, punctually and thoroughly every duty, civic and Masonic, imposed upon him by the nature of his office. Pure of heart, of perfect integrity and most worthy of the grand old name of "gentleman"; immeasurably generous, kind, affectionate and tender hearted, a fast, firm friend, genially hearty and good humored, he was one to win esteem and honor, firm friendship and warm affection.

He was my close and intimate friend for many years, and I think I never knew a man more thoroughly the devotee and soldier of Justice, Right and Truth than he. What these commanded was for him Divine Law. and therefore he loved Freemasonry with all his soul, and would not have exchanged its offices and honors for patents of nobility.

"What shall be sung or said When honored age lies dead;

What fitting words shall crown his life's proud story!

Death reaps the ripest years,

Time dries the saddest tears;
The good, the great, He crowns with crown of glory."

A widow and seven children survive him to lament the loss of the kindest and most loving of husbands and the most indulgent of fathers. We offer to the desolate widow and afflicted children the sympathy of our brotherly love. May our Father, who is in Heaven, comfort her and them and give unto them eternal rest.

In the performance of the sacred duty of remembering with gratitude and honor the well deserving dead, every body of our obedience in the State will, upon the reading of this letter therein, drape its altar and working tools in the appropriate mourning for the space of sixty days, and that each of the Brethren will, for the same time, wear the

proper badge of mourning for a Gr.'. Com.'. of our Supreme Council, deceased.

The funeral services (Kadosh) will be held in the city of Galveston at 12 o'clock midnight, on Saturday, July 14.

SORROW.

MY DEAR BRETHREN:

On the ninth day of this present month, the painful intelligence was flashed across the continent to me announcing the death of our beloved Brother and Venerable Grand Commander, Philip Crossy Tucker.

The relentless messenger, whom none can defy, and whose imperious summons all must sooner or later obey, has again touched our still biceding hearts, and for the third time in too brief a period, taken from us our Grand Commander, chief counselor, and dear friend. With a heart full of sadness do I discharge the painful duty of officially announcing to you this sorrowful intelligence, and briefly endeavor to pay slight tribute to his worth—well knowing that no words of mine can add to his glory, or allay the bitter sorrow his death occasions.

Brother Tucker was a man and Mason beloved by all. He will long be remembered for his zeal and fidelity in the cause of Masonry in general, and the Scottish Rite in particular; and truthfully can I unite with one who was his intimate friend for years in saying, that "I never knew a man more thouroughly the devotee and soldier of Justice. Right and Truth, than he. What these commanded was for him divine law." He was one whose motive was in the deed, and not in the event—whose motive for action was in no sense the hope of reward. All the jewels of excellence that clustered about his brow, his humility gave to them their brightest lustre. To that talisman paradise opens its gates; and to it opened the hearts of his brethren and fellows. "It is the graceful droop of the branch laden with fruit."

This communication, my Brethren, has been necessarily delayed,

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that I might give and something of the personal Masonic history of our lamented brother-of which I knew but little—and which for reasons fully understood by all it was impossible sooner to secure. Two days since, however, I received the tribute of the friend above quoted—Inspector A. B. Chamberlain, 33°, of Texas.

Our Venerable Grand Commander died in Washington, D. C. on the 9th day of July, 1894, at one o'clock, p. m. His remains were conveyed to his home in Galveston, Texas, accompanied by Bro. Fred Webber, 33°, Secretary General, and other Brethren of the Rite, where the solemn services of the Kadosh were performed at twelve o'clock, midnight, on Saturday, the fourteenth instant.

In token of our appreciation of his worth, and in commemoration of the sad event, the bodies of the jurisdiction and all members of the obedience of this Supreme Council will display the mourning colors for the dead, and wear the usual badge of mourning for the period of ninety days.

Memo. 2.

During the last century and a-half, the institution of Freemasonry has been bitterly persecuted by the public authorities of Spain, and which was endured until 1868, and it was not until 1889 that we were entirely free.

We thoug! It the time had come, and it was our solemn duty to embrace the opportunity. The Grand Council took the matter in hand and carried it to the Senate and Assembly. The result was that a law was passed on February 7, 1889, whereby we were recognized as a legal institution, and since that time have enjoyed freedom under protection of the law.

This important matter settled, we thought, our Grand Council as the mother of Spanish Freemasonry (founded 1870) should remodel our Constitution, Laws. etc.

With this object before us, we received from your Executive on May 29, 1890, the basis of said reform, also the authority to publish and distribute same, and about 15th last March our work in this matter was completed.

For this important work we had before us the Laws of all the principal regular Councils of the world, and we have endeavored to harmonize our Laws with the spirit of progress for which our beloved institution is noted.

I remit you with great pleasure a copy of Laws then enacted and beg to repeat most cordial and fraternal greetings.

On the 5th we celebrate the grand event by giving him a grand banquet which will be universal in character because it celebrates our victory for Masonic liberty in Spain.

We expect to receive a great many telegrams from foreign Grand Lodges who unite with us in spirit on this occasion of Masonic triumph.

Letter 6.

Your favor July 8th inst. to hand, and in compliance with your request have ordered the "Keeper of Archives" to give me the data necessary, and should the Supreme Council of Spain desire any more information it will be given with pleasure.

The first Spanish Lodge of Freemasons was formed in Madrid, Feb. 15, 1728, by the Duke of Wharton and was known as "Lodge Matritense," by authority of a warrant issued by the Grand Lodge of England.

The "Matritense" was separated from Grand Lodge of England in 1767, constituting the mother lodge of Spanish Freemasons, presided over by the Count de Aranda, in 1780 was changed into Grand Orient National of Spain. Count de Aranda died Jan. 7, 1798, and was succeeded by Count de Montijo.

Up to this date the Scottish Rite was unknown in Spain, but in Sept. 1838 a cousin of the Count de Grasse Tilley instituted the first Supreme Council of the Scottish Rite in Aranjuez, Spain; he also instituted the first Council in France in the year 1804.

The Grand Orient National of Spain, its possessions and dependencies is the indisputable fountain, origin and patriarchial mother of the institution of Freemasonry in Spain.

TRANSLATION OF MEMORANDUM FROM SUPREME COUNCIL OF SPAIN.

On 15th Feb., 1728 the Duke of Wharton, who in 1723 had been Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of England, founded in Madrid the Lodge "Matritense," which, confirmable to the constitution of Anderson, received from the Grand Lodge of England the necessary charter on 17th April of the same year. These dates in regard to that Lodge ought to be noted as the Archives of our Grand Orient contain them.

In 1767 the Lodge "Matritense" with others separated itself from the Jurisdiction of England, and was erected on that basis the Grand Mother Lodge of Spanish Freemasonry, by the Count of Aranda, who was our first Grand Master.

Our Grand Lodge took in 1780 the name of "Grand Orient," the Count of Aranda continuing as Grand Master until his death in 1799, although he was not in possession of all the grades of the Scottish Rite.

The Scottish Rite was introduced into Spain on the 2nd September 1808 by the Conte Tilly, who presided on the occasion of the installation of the Supreme Council of Spain—The Count of Montijo being our second Grand Master and Successor to the Count of Aranda. Since that time it has never ceased to act with perfect regularity as this Memorandum shows.

The French invasion brought with it the French Rite, and there was founded in Madrid, on 3rd November, 1809, a body entituled the "Grand Orient of Spain," which was not recognized by us. We took the name of "The Grand Orient National of Spain," in order not to be confounded with the other.

The French were expelled from our country, their "Orient" going with them, but there remained many Spanish Masons initiated into the Lodges fold of the French Rite. An alliance of both Rites was effected in Granada in 1817 placing all under the Jurisdiction of the "Grande

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thei Nat Oriente Nacional de Espana" and its Supreme Council, and erecting with this object the Grand Camara of all the Rites.

General Don Raphael del Riego succeeded the Count of Montijo as Grand Commander, and he exercised his office till his death on 7th November 1823.

Succeeding to him was his Royal Highness the Infanta Don Francisco de Bourbon, who, in union with his wife in 1832 saved the cause of liberty, and with it the Freemasonic Institution.

The Infanta being set aside for his liberal proclivities, Don Ramon Maria Calatrava was, on the 24th December, 1847, proclaimed Grand Master and Grand Commander of the Supreme Council of Spain. He gave a great impulse to the institution, and promulgated in 1866 the constitution by which we have been governed until 1st March, 1893.

The revolution of 1868 excited passions, and caused several to separate themselves from the "Grande Oriente Nacional de Espana" and its Supreme Council, and to form in 1869 one called "Central Orient of Spain," a body eminently political, and at whose head were found men influential in the politics of the time.

Don Ramon Maria Calatrava having died on the 28th February. 1876, there was substituted in the Grand Orient National of Spain and in the Supreme Council, the Illustrious Marquis of Sevana, who had been Grand Secretary from the 29th December. 1869. The first centenary of the foundation of the Grand Orient National of Spain being celebrated under his direction.

During the reign of the Marquis of Sevana the number of our Lodges was considerably augmented, the official relations with foreign Masonic powers were more closely drawn together, and a number of services organized, following a path entirely regular and free from political or religious squabbling.

The same results did not follow in the body styling itself the "Orient of Spain," and which divided itself into four diffrent factions according to the political aspirations of those who presided.

The Marquis of Sevana dying on the 31st January 1887, an Intrim Grand Master and Intrim Grand Commander was elected, Brother Jose Maria Pantoga, who in union with the chief dignitaries of the Order believed that the time had arrived for taking decisive steps for the good of the Order, and taking advantage of the death of the Marquis of Sevana, the Grand Lodge (Symbolic) of Seville united with the Grand National Orient of Spain by means of a treaty, and the only two branches which remained of the Orient of Spain having expressed their grief on such an irreparable loss, recognizing in our Grand National Orient the historic purity and regularity which distinguishes

it as the oldest of the Freemasonic Family in Spain, accepted with pleasure those tenders of approximation with the result that in the same year the first of the two fractions of the Orient of Spain (for that which had for its Grand Commander Brother Catmona, and for Grand Master Brother Morayta) proposed to the Grand National Orient of Spain a treaty of alliance and friendship; while that which was presided over by Brother Roger Arias asked that it might be received into our Grand Orient to make a fusion of the two into one Sovereign Orient of Spain, which proposed a fusion of the two into one Orient, which in its turn could enter into a treaty of alliance and friendship with us.

The proposal was approved of by all except Brother Morayta, who showed himself opposed to the movement, and who was expelled. Notwithstanding this, and to gratify his selfish views and aspirations, he founded an order which he styled "The Spanish Orient."

The proposal having passed the two branches of the Orient of Spain they united themselves into one, and this proposed on 8th February, 1888 a treaty of alliance and friendship with the Grand National Orient of Spain, in which it recognized the legitimate fountain of the Spanish Freemasonic institution. A treaty by which on the dissolution of the Grand Orient of Spain in 1889, there entered into the National Grand Orient of Spain all the healthy elements of that centre—remaining outside only the body presided over by Don Miguel Morayta, which works under the name of the "Spanish Orient," and follows the unfortunate lines of its original constitution.

The Freemasonic Institution having been generally persecuted by all the governments previous to 1889, in order in future to avoid the recurrence of this as far as possible, the Grand National Orient of Spain by means of those Senators and Deputies who were members of it, procured the consession of a law of association which was voted by the Chamber, and in virtue of which it succeeded in being recognized as a legal association on 7th February, 1889, as may be seen in the certificate published at the head of our actual laws.

This important step being taken which allows us to live under shadow of the laws of the nation, and that which was "Orient of Spain" having disappeared by dissolution, our Intrim Grand Master and Grand Commander believing that the time had arrived for revising and improving the laws, by which since 1866 we had been governed, convoked with this object our legislative Assembly, and to which was accorded the revision of the constitution and laws. In this work they were engaged until the 15th March of the present year, when with general approval there was promulgated the code under which we are now acting, and in virtue of being at a meeting of the Grand Legislative Chamber on 23rd, 29th and 30th July, and 30th

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Lod sion of re cour both August, the election of the Grand Commander of the Supreme Council was proceeded with, as also the election of the other officers, conform to circular of 9th September, 1893, a copy of which I now send you.

To-day the "Grande Oriente Nacional de Espana" is in general sympathy with all the world, having been named arbiter in different questions, and being intimately united by treaties and relations of amity and friendship with most of the powers, who from time immemorial have recognized it.
