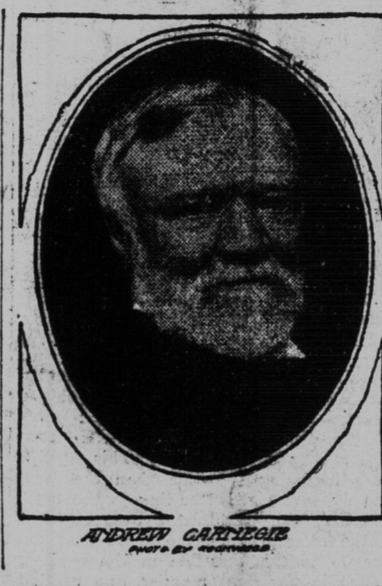

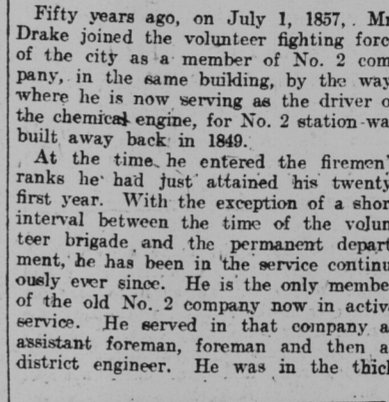

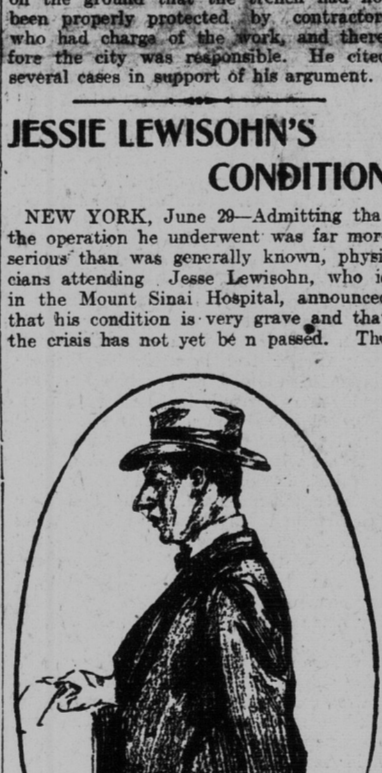

IN AMERICAN CITIES
Yesterday the Times quoted a leading Chicago journal on the subject of playgrounds. Not less interesting is an article in the Boston Globe, showing as it does how generally, after years of agitation, the idea of having supervised play as a more important factor in the educational system is winning popular favor.

Says the Montreal Gazette:—"Bishop Worrell, of Nova Scotia, has likened the ravages of the grifters in public life to those of the brown tail moth in the orchards. The simile is hard on the brown tail moth. It only does material harm. The grifter demoralizes as well as steals."

There are none who envy Mark Twain his good time in England. The veteran humorist has made the world brighter by the play of his daring fancy, and has thrust home many a truth in the guise of a funny story.

The high court of the I. O. F. which meets in St. John next week, represents some thousands of heads of families in this province. The order has over a thousand members in this city and suburbs.

Judging from reports concerning the conduct of some of the men under canvas at Camp Sussex, the country needs someone to protect it from its defenders.

Boston has apportioned \$13,000 for a proper celebration of the Fourth of July. St. John generally forgets that Canada has a national holiday, and goes fishing.

Chicago, through its park department, and Washington, through the Playground Association of America, have issued definite plans for the cities.

The Boston Globe says every citizen is ready to acknowledge that these recreation grounds are a good investment for the municipality. St. John has this year for the first time made a small grant toward the maintenance of two supervised grounds.

Mr. Henry M. Whitney is still conducting a vigorous campaign to arouse in the state of Massachusetts a sentiment in favor of reciprocity with Canada.

After the great Liberal victory of 1880 Mr. Gladstone again became prime minister and Mr. Chamberlain entered the cabinet. At the general election of 1885 the party was defeated, but was returned to power the following year.

Mr. Chamberlain again a minister holding an important cabinet portfolio. In the session of that year Mr. Gladstone introduced his first home rule bill, and thus created a split in his parliamentary following which has never been bridged over.

From 1895 to 1903 Mr. Chamberlain held the portfolio of secretary of state for the colonies. His regime was darkened by the South African war, as to which also he will have to answer at the bar of history.

The Canadian Pacific Railway Company has started a vegetable garden on its right of way near Calgary, to show the new settlers what can be done, and will do the like at other points.

Speaking at the Harvard commencement this week, the Rt. Hon. James Bryce, British ambassador, contrasted the wealth of American and the poverty of English universities, and then paid this very striking tribute to the power of the traditions of those institutions in both countries.

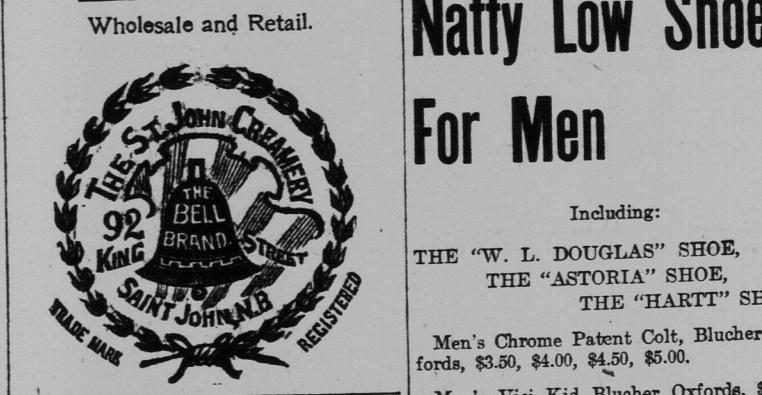

Reward of Little Nan's Bravery

Little Nan was the child of poor parents who had emigrated to the far West to make a home on the plains where rain fell so seldom that one crop in three years was about the average amount raised in that desolate country. As there had been two successive crop-failures when this story opens Nan's father found himself in a troubled quandary as to how he could manage to pull through till another year when rains might fall to moisten the soil and produce plenty for man and beast.

"Well," said Nan's mother meditated, "not knowing just how to decide, 'I've always opposed a mortgage, for so few people ever get rid of one after they've put it on. But I hate to say sell, for as things are now we'd get scarcely anything for the land and nothing for the improvements that's cost us five years of hard work and privation. If we could only hang out till next year it'd be a big crop then and we'll put something by for the next drought."

"But there's no way of hanging out," explained Nan's father. "We've got just about enough grub to last the week out. Then what? And how're we to feed the cows and horses without money to buy corn and hay? Nop!" and the puzzled farmer again shook his head, "the 'grub' is either sell or starve."

She ran right to the edge of the railroad tracks and began to wave her apron frantically in the air. And what pleasure Nan had taken to help to fix the little frame two-room house attractive! She had covered the walls of the "big" room with colored picture cards and newspaper cuts till the place looked quite cheerful. She had spent all her spare time sewing carpet rags, and as a result there were three great bags full of pound-weight balls ready to take to the weaver as soon as there could be got together enough money to pay him for making the rags into a carpet. And in the windows of the "big" room were pretty vines growing in tin cans that were neatly papered. Nan's own hands had planted these and Nan's own hands trained them and kept them watered and washed, though the task of watering the vines was not an easy one since Nan was obliged to go to the bottom of a steep hill to the well and to draw the water up in heavy buckets that were attached to ropes which swung over a wheel. But Nan was an industrious girl and did not mind work when there were good results.

And so Nan sat at a sad listener to what her troubled parents said about selling or "plastering" the farm which was home to Nan, a home full of tender ties and associations, regardless of the stult she had known there. She knew that mortgaging meant the same thing as selling, only there would be more delay in the transaction. 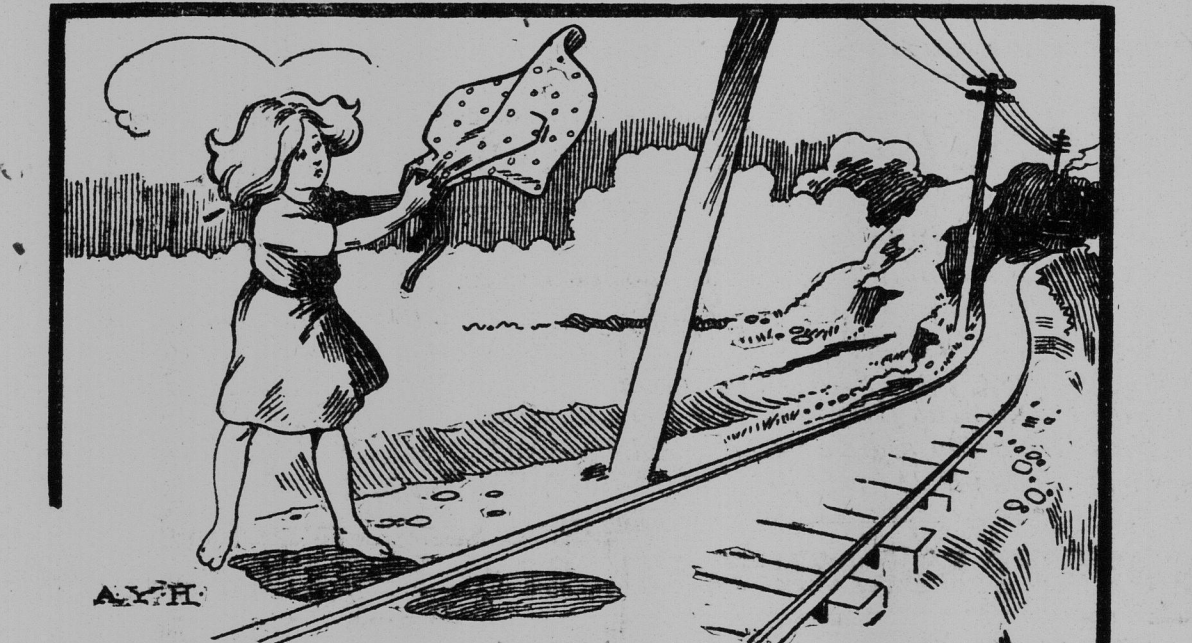
