As the sound of the explosion died out, residents of the little community started an exodus from their homes through a blinding rain storm to the mouth of the mine, there to claim their dead. Practically all of the men entombed within the mine and believed by company officials to be dead, have been residents of the mining community of Sublet for years. Geneva, Sept. 16—Representatives of 12 Governments gave preliminary approval today to the several articles concerning sanction in the draft protocol, which Dr. Edouard Benes, of Czecho Slovakia submitted as a pact which advances the cause of arbitration, produces a sense of security among nations and prepares the way for disarmament.

MUCH INTEREST IN NATIONAL RACES

If Epinard Wins, Outlook Bright for Future International Races.

New York, Sept. 16—(United Press)
—International horse races, which will bring together the champion of Europe and the best thoroughbred in the United States probably will ensue as permanent annual fixtures as an outcome of the three big international races arranged this season.

Considering that international comso satisfactorily established in athletics, so satisfactorily established in athletics, tennis, golf, polo, yachting and other minor sports it is rather unusual that so much difficulty should have been encountered in fostering and promoting international relations in horse racing, one of the oldest and perhaps the most popular of world sports.

As a rule, most of the best thoroughbreds in Europe are bred, owned and raced in England, and, in the majority of cases, the best horses belong to the stables of titled horsemen who respect tradition more than they care for establishing new customs.

In horse racing alone, England retains the old prestige of the empire, and it is being carefully guarded. The watchdogs of the national honor do not want their thoroughbred class to descend to the rating of their pugllists, their athletes and their tennis players and there is only one way to do it—leep them away from anything that can beat them.

After great difficulty, the first international face was arranged last year, and Papyrus, the winner of the Epsom Derby, made the trip across the Atlantic to get a terrific beating from Zev, the champion money winner of America, in the mud, at Belmont Park.

The race never could have been arranged if Papyrus had not been owned by Ben Irish, a commoner, with more sporting instinct than the owners of the big ranking stables. Irish took a chance with his thoroughbred, and for taking it he was considered as almost a national traitor. When Papyrus lost and was shown up so badly, he was looked upon as something even worse. It long has been the contention of those on the other side opposed to international racing that a foreign horse has no chance to sail across the ocean, to change climate, food and water and to race on hard tracks after having been accustomed to "cross-country" turf. They point out, with some justification, that weight and conditions should be even to make any horse race and that the American horse would have all the aivening.

Although he was beaten by less than a length, Epinard refuted arguments that it was impossible to bring a horse over here from Europe and keep him in condition. Epinard was in good shape, but, according to his owner, he was short of racing and would have been much better if he had been allowed to run in a preliminary event under actual racing conditions. Papyrus perhaps was handicapped by an English trainer and an English jockey, whereas, Epinard had the advantage of being handled by an American trainer and being ridden by an international races. If he does, his two victories will furnish a strong impetus to the promotion of future international races, because it will convince the British peerage that it is possible to keep a horse on form in this country, and it certainly will show that the sport is being promoted by international classics.

American owners could do much to foster the international spirit if they would send a few of their best thoroughbreds to England. Many American horses have been shipped to England and raced in the past, and it would be well to do it again.

BOYS EAGER TO BECOME JOCKEYS

Hundreds Flock to Tracks, Seeking Goal Few Ever Reach.

New York, Sept. 17.—With coming of the first fall days boys who aspire to be jockeys and who wish to be in trip to ride in the 1925 racing season are flocking to the Long Island tracks and signing up.

More apprentice papers are taken out at this season of the year than any other and a large part of the making of a jockey is done in the off season, after Belmont, Aqueduct and Jamaica have closed until next spring.

Belmont closed up on Sept. 15, Aqueduct will finish its season Sept. 30, and then Jamaica will see the last racing on the Island from Oct. 1 to 15.

Hundreds of boys throughout the country whatever race horses are kept either in active training or revelling in winter quarters at this time of the year sign away their services for terms of from three to five years, with the consent of their parents or guardians in the hopes of becoming an Earl Sande of Ivan Parke, and earning the fame and big reward of a star rider.

Of the hundred who will begin at the bottom this fall, only scores will ever sport racing silks. Of these comparatively few—less than a dozen—will ever see ever see their names in print, outside the racing charts.

Of the dozen, possibly one, or at the most two, will gain anything like a reputation. Once in a generation there comes an Archer, or a Sloan, or a Sande—a rider whose methods, because of their sensational results, throw him into the limelight.

The public sees nothing of the failures, and little of the trials. The majority of lads have their ambitions flashed on the training track or even before they are given mounts.


