Therefore resolved, that this Board will petition the Legislature to allow such monument to be erected in Queen Square, in this city, provided such reasonable subscriptions are previously obtained as to justify the Common Council in their belief that the same will be carried into effect; and

Further resolved, that a copy of the foregoing resolution be published in the Observer newspaper.







Thousands Receive Less Than \$12 or \$16—Cure of Ills Urged.

New York, Nov. 16.—Less than \$16 a week is being paid to 30,000 women employed in the confectionery, collar and shirt, paper box and tobacco industries, and in mercantile establishments in New York State. Less than \$12 a week is being received by one-fourth of the women employed in these factories, and one-fifth of the women employed in mercantile establishments. Less than \$10 a week is the regular wages of thous and of these women workers.

The foregoing statements were made by Bernard L. Shientag, State Industrial Commissioner, after a survey of 278 firms in New York city and 199 firms in other parts of the State employing 80,000 women over 16 years of age. The investigation was made by the Bureau of Women in Industry of the State Department of Labor. The wage figures obtained were submitted by employers.

In New York city in the industries studied approximately one-half of the women received less than \$16.25 weekly and up state about one-half got less than \$14.25, according to Commissioner Shientag's summary. Ten per cent. of the women in the four factory industries in this city received less than \$10 a week, while less went to 4 per cent. of those employed in mercantile establishments. Up state fully 21 per cent. of the women in the factory industries received less than \$10, as did 29 per cent. of the women in the shops.

"The conditions revealed again emphasize the need for some form of minimum wage legislation that will help the thousands of women wage erners who are bravely battling to keep their leads above water," said Coommissioner Shientag. "This makes the third time that similar official surveys show that thousands of women workers in this State are receiving utifully low wages. It seems incredible that with a knowledge of the situation this State has done nothing to remedy this great injustice in our

Commissioner Shientag suggested the setting up of a women's wage board similar to that in Massachusetts to investigate wages paid to women and minors, with power to recommend the payment of a living wage by employers who are not meeting this requirement. The power of the board would rest solely upon public opinion.

The relationship of the Health Centre and the organizations which are housed in the Health Centre building so far as financing of their undertakings is concerned was the matter of a lengthy and lively discussion at the meeting of the Board of Governors held last night. She said at some future date it might be possible for all the organizations to pool their assets and present a united appear. The Health Centre itself had been under considerable expense in fitting up the building, installing new furnaces and supplying fuel and it had received no grant.

J. S. Gregory said he understood that the Health Centre Board had been opposed to interfering with the grants received by the organizations housed in the building and had been apposed to the Health Centre asking for a grant, He did not feel that the Health Centre could raise funds and not have the right Mrs. E. 

MOST FARMER VETS

1,428 Settled in Maritimes Under Settler Scheme-\$5,059,544 Spent.

settlers in the three Maritime Provinces divided in something like the following proportions: New Brunswick, 660; Nova Scotia, 450, and Prince Edward Island, 350. Of these 1,428 there are 88 soldier settlers who have paid their loans in full although the agreement requires only that payment shall be completed at the end of 25 years. R. I. Donaldson, superintendent of the Maritime division of the Soldier Settlement Board, pointed out yesterday that it was the aim of the department to make good farmers and that special cases were dealt with leniently. Where a settler found it hard to make payments because he was making improvements to his farm or because of sickness or some other good cause, special consideration was given. The limit of the loan to each settler was \$7,500 which covered land, stock, equipment and permanent improvement loans. While the majority of settlers had taken farms that had been worked, a small number were settlers on Crown lands and these were not loaned any funds until they had fulfilled the requirements of the Labor Act.

New York, Nov. 17 .- Attendance at moving picture shows on Sunday is many times larger than church attendance, according to statements at a re-

A survey of 573 churches in the State showed a total attendance of 27,727, or an average of 48 persons at each church. Figures were not obtained at the twenty-eight other theatres in the same city. A survey of Washington, D. C., showed an attendance of 7,000 persons in 40 churches there, and 50,000 persons in attendance at 40 theatres at the same time. The attendance at Bible classes in Pennsylvania is one out of every four persons, while in New York it is one out of every twenty-one.
