EXPORT AND IMPORT IN BIG GAINS

Ottawa Reports Show Increase in Trading in Dominion Markets.

FIGURES ARE GIVEN

Big Rise in Canadian Exports is Shown in Official Reports.

(By Canadian Press.) Ottawa, Nov. 17.—There was an increase of nearly \$137,000,000 in the total trade of the Dominion during the first seven months of the present fiscal year, according to returns made public today by the Department of Customs. There were increases in both exports and imports, but the rise in imports was much greater than in exports.

D'ANNUNZIO HAS BURNED HIS MEDALS

Brescia, Italy, Nov. 17.—Gabriele D'Annunzio has refused a silver medal for military valor conferred on him by the Ministry of War to replace one of his decorations, of which he received sixteen for bravery, including the highest gold medal award of the Italian army.

DECISION IS HELD

DRAMATIC SHIFT IN ELECTIONS

Tariff Issue is Disappointing to Members of the Cabinet.

BAN PROTECTION

Work of the Liberals is Manifested in Campaign Issue. BY HARRY N. MOORE (United Press Cable). London, Nov. 17.—There has been a somewhat dramatic shift of opinion in the government ranks during the last forty-eight hours that is destined to play an important part in the general election campaign.

While the question of protection which the Premier claimed a week ago was the very reason for the calling of this election somewhat suddenly and after so short a period of Conservative rule, was relegated to an obscure place in the speech from the throne. This was taken to mean that Premier Baldwin realized the utter impossibility of winning an election on a tariff issue owing to the absolute indifference of the country as a whole towards it, while there had already begun to dawn that definite opposition to protection which was evinced in the attitude of the Earl of Derby.

Republicanism Plan In Dublin Fails

Dublin, Nov. 17.—Appeals for the release of Republicans held prisoner by the Free State were made in the Daily last night, but President Cosgrave refused to be moved. He described the hunger strike as the greatest failure in history, saying that out of the original 7,000 only 500 are still on the strike.



MANY N. Y. WOMEN TOIL AT \$10 A WEEK

Thousands Receive Less Than \$12 or \$16—Cure of Ills Urged.

New York, Nov. 16.—Less than \$10 a week is being paid to 80,000 women employed in the confectionery, collar and shirt, paper box and tobacco industries, and in mercantile establishments in New York State.

The foregoing statements were made by Bernard L. Shientag, State Industrial Commissioner, after a survey of 278 firms in New York city and 199 firms in other parts of the State employing 80,000 women over 14 years of age.

In New York city in the industries studied approximately one-half of the women received less than \$12 weekly and up to state about one-half get less than \$14.25, according to Commissioner Shientag's summary.

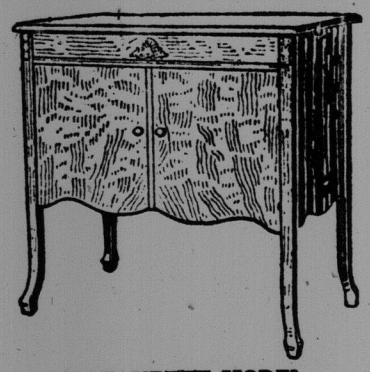

Sister Mary's KITCHEN  
SUBSTANTIAL LUNCHEON DISHES.  
Now that canned vegetables must take the place of fresh ones "made" dishes of vegetables come into their own. These dishes are specially nice for luncheons as they are usually almost a meal in themselves.

Spanish Rice  
Spanish rice is a hearty dish that might well form the principal food for a substantial noon-day meal. This with brown or whole wheat bread and butter, celery and a simple fruit dessert forms a well balanced meal that requires little time to prepare.

Two tablespoons bacon fat, 1 large onion, 2 cups canned tomatoes, 1-2 cup peas, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper.

Wash rice thoroughly through several waters, rubbing it between the hands. Drain. Melt bacon fat in frying pan. Add onion, peeled and cut in thin slices. Cook until onion is a pale straw color. Add tomatoes and sprinkle over rice. Season with salt and pepper. Cover and cook slowly for an hour. If the rice becomes too dry before tender add a little boiling water. Stir to prevent sticking. Serve very hot. A Spanish onion is preferred, but two small, plain, ordinary onions can be used.

Mock Sausages  
One-half cup dried lima beans, 1-2 cup fine dried bread crumbs, 1-4 cup chopped peanuts, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 egg, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper.

Canned lima beans can be used in this recipe.

If dried ones are used, soak beans in cold water for three hours. Par-boil in soda water for 10 minutes. Drain and rinse in clear cold water. Boil in salted water until tender. Drain and use as canned lima beans. Rub beans through a strainer. Add bread crumbs, nuts, egg slightly beaten, butter, salt and pepper to bean pulp. Mix well and shape in the form of small sausages. Roll in bread crumbs and fry in a frying pan.

When canned vegetables such as beans, peas or asparagus are used they should be opened and rinsed in clear cold water.

Pea Souffle  
Three tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 cup milk, 1 cup peas rubbed through strainer, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, 1-2 tablespoon minced parsley.

Make a white sauce of butter, flour, milk and salt. Measure pulp of peas after rubbing through strainer. Add to white sauce. Beat yolks and peaks of eggs separately. Add yolks beaten until thick and lemon colored to mixture. Add pepper and fold in whites beaten stiff and dry. Turn into a well buttered baking dish and bake in a moderate oven until firm to the touch. It will take from 30 to 40 minutes.

Asparagus in Ramikins is used for dinner when the meat is light or as the main dish for luncheon.

Asparagus in Ramikins  
One cup canned asparagus, 2 hard boiled eggs, 1-2 cups white sauce, 4 teaspoons grated cheese, 4 tablespoons grated bread crumbs, salt and pepper. Cut asparagus into half lengths. Put a layer of asparagus in each ramikin, add slices of hard-boiled egg and pour over white sauce to cover. Season with salt and pepper. Sprinkle with bread crumbs and cheese and bake 20 minutes in a hot oven. (Copyright, 1923, NEA Service, Inc.)

**Haddock Delight**

Ingredients: 1/2 lb. cold haddock, 1/2 cupful milk, 4 tablespoons lard and butter mixed equal parts, 1/2 cupful water, 2 tablespoons cream, 4 tablespoons flour, 1 egg, 1 spoonful vinegar, salt, pepper to taste.

Directions: Rub potatoes through sieve, adding salt, pepper to taste, one egg well beaten, two tablespoons lard, mix well. Roll out on flour board to 1/4 inch in thickness. Cut into small rounds, brush over with remaining egg well beaten. Toss in fine bread crumbs. Mark cutter slightly with small round cutter, fry to golden color in hot lard. Remove lids carefully, removing bulk of potatoes from inside. Fill with mixture, replace lids and serve hot.

For mixture, blend two tablespoons lard or butter with flour in a saucepan over the fire. Add milk, water, seasoning and cook for a few minutes. Put in sliced fish and make hot, adding cream last.

### GREAT CROSSLEY MEETINGS OF '94 HERE RECALLED

Noted Evangelist Who Roused St. John, Coming Again.

Announcement of the coming of Dr. H. T. Crossley to the city will revive in many minds memories of one of the most remarkable religious movements in the history of St. John. In the early part of 1894 the Methodist churches of the city entered into negotiations with Evangelist Crossley and Hunter, two ministers of Canadian Methodism, who had entered into partnership in evangelistic effort, to come to the city, and after a period of preparation by the local churches these men began a campaign on Tuesday evening, February 18, 1894.

Of the first meeting in St. John the Globe of Feb. 18, 1894, said: "Evangelists Crossley and Hunter held their first of many meetings in Centenary Church, Tuesday evening. The attendance was very large. The most of the Methodist clergymen were on the platform. The meeting was opened with prayer by Mr. Hunter. A large number of hymns were sung by a united choir. Mr. Crossley, who is a very fine singer, sang several solos." From the first meeting the interest steadily increased until the large auditorium of Centenary Church was filled at seven o'clock, and overflowed meetings were sometimes necessary. The tabular number of those who professed conversion was very large, and in all the churches there are to be found today men and women who began a new and better life under the preaching of these men. Mr. Hunter was the magnetic partner in the team, whose power of decisive appeal for decision was used of God in a wonderful way. Mr. Crossley was the philosopher and practical man, whose tenderness of spirit and force of reasoning gave to his preaching a marvellous charm. Some time ago Mr. Hunter, through ill health, was forced to seek retirement, but even then his zeal never wavered and more than once he was heard to put forth the claim that, in the long days when he sat in obscurity as an invalid and did nothing but pray, he was then accomplishing as much as in the days of his active evangelism. A. H. T. Crossley and J. E. Hunter in evangelistic work. It was impressed upon each of their hearts at a certain time that they were called to work of this kind and the letters which each wrote to the other suggesting that they join forces crossed in the mail. In this providential way there was begun a partnership which lasted for long years and resulted in great blessings to many lives.

The Whitechapel Horrors.

William Le Queux has come forward with another theory about the infamous Whitechapel murders that filled England with sensation and horror in the later eighties of last century. The victims were all East London daughters, of joy, whose bodies were found mutilated, but the author has never brought to justice. Many rumors have got abroad about these mysterious London crimes. It was said at one time that the murderer was a mad doctor, who has since died in an asylum. Again it was whispered that the murderer was the degenerate offspring of a great family who came to a violent end in the toughest hinterland of the Empire. According to Mr. Le Queux he was a mad Russian doctor, formerly in a maternity hospital in the city of Moscow. He was a Russian secret service agent, member of an East End anarchist club, and a disreputable follower of Jew Rasputin. Mr. Le Queux claims to have seen official documents, written by the notorious Rasputin, the monk who poisoned the Russian royal family and helped to submerge Russia, giving intimate details of the Jack-the-Ripper crimes. 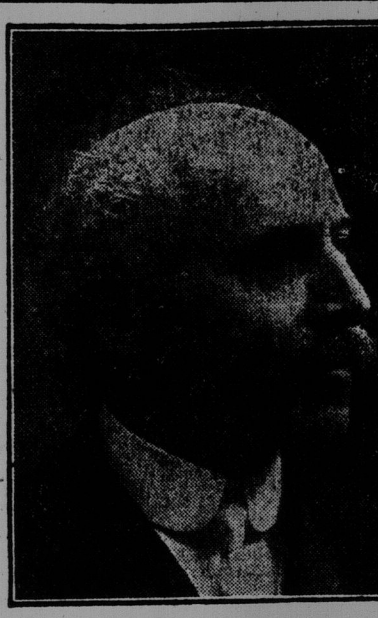

News Notes Gathered From the World of Stage and Screen

SYRACUSE MINISTER CALLS SEEKER OF SUNDAY AMUSEMENTS A HOG

Survey Shows the Churches Near Empty and Theatres Crowded.

New York, Nov. 17.—Attendance at moving picture shows on Sunday is many times larger than church attendance, according to statements at a recent conference of officials of the Lord's Day Alliance.

A survey of 573 churches in the State showed a total attendance of 27,727, or an average of 48 persons at each church. At the same time in one up-State city two moving picture theatres on a single Sunday evening had a total paid attendance of 14,100. Figures were not obtained at the twenty-eight other theatres in the same city. A survey of Washington, D. C., showed an attendance of 10,000 persons in 40 churches here, and 80,000 persons in attendance at 40 theatres at the same time. The attendance at Bible classes in Pennsylvania is one out of every four persons, while in New York it is one out of every twenty-one.

The Rev. John Ferguson, who spoke on the situation in New York State, said the alliance has a programme for the coming session of the Legislature. The fight for the passage of these laws, he said, must be waged against business interests worth \$750,000,000, of which a third are in New York city. Sunday Baseball Condemned.

Dr. Frank J. Niles of Syracuse, said the alliance will seek the repeal of laws permitting Sunday baseball and Sunday moving pictures. He argued that the alliance has no objection to the way a man spends his Sunday, but opposes commercializing Sunday, because they require other people to work a seven day week. The man who asks to be amused on Sunday he characterizes as "a hog." The idea of turning out a Christian in one day a week, he said, is had enough. "I cut this short is the present tendency."

"America is the land of opportunity because its civilization is based on Christianity, and when you commercialize Sunday, you stifle Christianity," he concluded.

The local organization for observing the Sabbath called attention to petitions received recently urging that competitive shops be forced to close. Some of the objections stated were that shopping on Sunday is a "bad habit handed down from one generation to another, depending upon police action for the entire obliteration of this habit."

Actress Sticks To Little Theatre In Spite of Broadway's Rebuffs

(By Hortense Saunders, NEA Service Writer.)

New York, Nov. 17.—The latest Lady Lochinvar to go east, instead of west, and make herself successful in New York is Evelyn Vaughan. She left San Francisco to become a Broadway star. She has turned out to be a successful dealer in real estate and has built up one of the most unique residential districts in Gotham.

"Of course," she confides to me, "I really knew less about real estate than a teaching baby when I arrived. And I had only money enough for current living expenses. But now I have acquired an interest in ten houses and a theatre!"

It began this way: Miss Vaughan had theatrical success enough in California to warrant her coming to New York and experiment with the drama. She wanted her own theatre, where she could have a hand in producing the type of plays she believes the average theatregoer wants to see. And she wanted to act in her own plays.

"But Broadway couldn't see it my way," she goes on. "They weren't at all interested in renting a theatre to an aspiring actress who had only theories to offer."

Costly "Reason"

"I could have made them listen to reason—reason that spoke in terms of two thousand dollars a week for rent and a gross gate receipt of \$8,000, or that would have built me a theatre for \$100,000. But just to let space to some unknown woman who wanted to do slightly different things—that was not to be thought of."

But Miss Vaughan kept thinking. If she couldn't have a theatre on Broadway, why not have one somewhere else? One day, a friend, showing her through the picturesque slums of Greenwich Village, pointed out a group of rookeries on Commerce street that formed an elbow around a miscellaneous assortment of buildings. She spotted a real old-fashioned barn in the midst of them. Then she knew she had found her theatre. So in a short time she had formed a real estate corporation, had leased the 10 houses and the barn, and was engaged in transferring them into the most modern of studios and living apartments.

The backyards were thrown together into a community garden. The fronts were made over and the theatre was made out of "Just best of all," Miss Vaughan explains, "the Cherry Lane Theatre came

Mr. Benjamin went to South America on business and she joined her parents in Seattle.

Mr. Benjamin returned from the South two months ago, and then went to Riverside to engage in the real estate business. Miss Lamphere, who is well known on the concert stage in the West, recently has been filling engagements in Los Angeles and Riverside, where her mother, Mrs. Lankin Lamphere, joined her. Her father, who died a month ago at Seattle raised apples on a large scale.

The first Mrs. Benjamin is a daughter of Prof. and Mrs. Charles Avery Doremus of New York, and was married to Mr. Benjamin in 1909. Two children, a son and daughter, were born to them.
