



Section 1.—The General Assembly
shall provide for the operation and maintenance of an educational system for the
commonwealth. This shall include free elementary, secondary and vocational education for all the children of the education for all the children of the commonwealth and for persons mentally and physically handicapped, free education for adults in American citizenship, schools for the training of teachers, a system of public libraries, one or more state universities and such other educational institutions and agencies as it may determine to be wise and necessary for the improvement of the citizenship of the commonwealth. Section 2.—There is hereby created a state council of education to be composed of such citizens of the commonwealth as may be appointed by the governor pursuant to an act of the general as-

sembly.

Section 3.—The state council of education shall elect as their chief executive officer a stat commissioner of education and shall have such other powers and duties in relation to the educational system of the sementary duties in relation to the educational system of the commonwealth as the general assembly may prescribe.

Section 4—It shall be the dut- of the general assembly by appropriation and through general or special forms of taxation to make adequate provision for the effective and equitable support of the educational system of the commonwealth

support of the educational system of the commonwealth, or any part of said system, shall be appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school or institution.

Section 6.—All funds derived from reservations from ceipts of state forest reservations, from escheated estates in the commonwealth. and from all other property or money which shall in any way accrue, whether by act of Assembly, devise, gift, or otherwise, and any other funds as may be provided by act of assembly shall be maintained in perpetuity and designated as the State School Fund of Pennsylvania

vania.
Section 7.—The instruction in all public and private elementary schools shall be given in the English language and from English texts.







Statistics for July are not yet available, but the present indications are that this month will exceed June in the matter of publicity accorded the dominion by the press of the United States.

A significant fact in connection with this newspaper matter is that the United States editors appear suddenly to have awakened to the fact that their readers are interested in the people and the problems of their big British neighbor. This is shown in the remarkable increase in the number of editorials dealing with Canadian affairs. During June fifty-four editorials of this nature were collected by the Bureau of Information om the papers in the twenty-two om the papers in the twenty-two ares covered. Six months ago—or even nree months ago—an editorial on a Canadian topic was but very rarely seen in any publication south of the international boundary. It is probable that during the whole of 1919 there were fewer Canadian editorials in the United States papers than during June of this year.

States papers than during June of this year.

This record is considered particularly gratifying by the officials of the Bureau of Information because the publicity has not been solicited but is the result of the natural growth of interest in Canada.

"It is due in a large measure to the very excellent reports of events in Canada which are furnished the United States papers through the Canadian Press and the Associated Press," said Col. J. A. Cooper, chief of the bureau, in discussing the question of publicity for Canada the other day. "Some people perhaps imagine that we are running around to the various newspapers asking the editors to prim items about Canada as a favor. We are not doing anything of the kind. It is not necessary. The United States editors realize that their readers are interested in Canadian affairs and they are only too anxious to give them the news of the dominion. The new service sent to New York by the Canadian Press and distributed to the United States papers by the Associated Press appears to be meeting the demand, and I believe it is largely due to the good work of these two news distributing organizations that Canada is now receiving the attention which its rapidly growing importance as a nation warrants."

"Valuable assistance in making Can-ada better known in this country has been given by all the New York papers," added Colonel Cooper, "but I would like particularly to mention the New York Sun. The Sun's special Canadian pages are full of interesting and reliable in-formation concerning the dominion, and

FALLS FIVE STORIES FROM BLAZING LOFT

Thousands See Trapped Clerk Crash Through Glass Canopy, Missing Firemen's Net - Spark Ignites Celluloid.

(N. Y. Times)

A crowd of several thousand which gathered when smoke poured from the upper floors of an eight-story loft building at the north-east corner of Lafayette and Walker streets, saw a man hang for nearly five minutes from the ledge of a fifth-floor window and then drop through a steel-framed glass canopy over the building's entrance, missing by a few feet a net which firemen had hastily got into place. He suffered a fractured skull and internal injuries.

internal injuries.

As the flames burned through the fifth and sixth floors, licking up a store of celluloid in the loft occupied by the Universal Merchandise Company on the fifth floor, the noon hour throng of factory and office workers looked for a repetition of the terrors of the Triangle fire. They saw the man fall to the street and looked for others to follow, but police and firemen soon learned that all of the 100 or more workers on the upper flors had escaped, leaving Benjamin Finkel, 21 years old, an assistant shipping clerk, trapped in the rear of the fifth floor.

Unable to reach the fire escape on the Walker street side of the building Finkel apparently followed the north wall around to the front. The intense heat and thick smoke drove him back out the window, from which he hung while those below were powerless to help him Finally the flames reached the window and he was forced to drop.

Those who witnessed his plunge turn-

Those who witnessed his plunge turned their heads away when they saw that its course led directly into the canopy, fastened on both outer ends with two sharp spiked iron standards. But Finkel missed these and the resistance of the shattered glass broke his fall.

He was taken to Volunteer Hospital in an automobile, where it was said last night that his condition was faworable.

As Finkel was falling, firemen of Engine 31 had reached the sidewalk with a net. They were responding to the excited cries of onlookers after a member of the engine company from the firehouse at Lafayette and White streets, dispatched the appartus. A first alarm of fire was turned in, bringing other apparatus, and then a second alarm which called deputy chief "Smokey Joe" Martin,

The flames spread rapidly to the sixth floor, occupied by the Lufkin Rule Company, manufacturers of tape measures. According to chief Martin, the rapidly sweeping flames had their source in a large stock of celluloid and inflammable material.

The timber on the Tongass National Forest in Alaska is said in a report issued by the United States Forest Service to be of particular importance in connection with the paper situation. It is estimated that there are about seventy billion board feet in Sitka, spruce and western hemlock well suited for paper making. The timber is located in a comparatively narrow belt along some 1,200 miles of coast line. Water power is available, as is also deep water transportation from numerous mill sites.

It is estimated that the cut from this region alone would insure a perpetual It is estimated that the cut from this region alone would insure a perpetual supply large enough to meet one-half of the present newsprint requirements of the United States. Alaska is one of the centres to which the newsprint industry of the United States should look for a large future development, says the report. The same is true of centres in the west where immense resources of pulp wood supply are now almost wholly undeveloped. Much of this timber is in the national forests.




