lew House at Fair Vale Owned by Charles Dunlavey Destroyed
—Children in Peril — Other Week-end Fires

A house at Fair Vale, owned and occupied by Charles Dunlavey, was burned to the ground yesterday morning. Mr. Dunlavy, his wife and two children had a narrow escape from being burned ed to death. They were awakened about two o'cock and, realizing their danger, gathered together what clothes they could and escaped to a nearby summer house. It was with difficulty that the two children were saved by their parents, The house was a new one having just been completed and the loss is estimated at \$1,500 with \$500 insurance. It is not known how the fire started.

About 2.80 o'clock yesterday morning two alarms were rung in from box \$3.

The fire was, in a house in Somerset street owned by John Kelly and occupied by him and John O'Brien, Mr. Kelly had his wrist severely cut, by glass. Fortunately a bystander knew how to render first aid and did so. The injured man was taken to Doctor Kelly's office. The property damage is said to be about \$600.

The firemen were called out on Saturday afternoon when an alarm was rung in from box \$1. The fire was in the basement of a house at the corner of King street East and Wentworth, owned by R. G. Murray. It is believed the fire was caused by the crossing of electric wires. Harry McCullough lives up stairs and Jarvis Wilson in the lower flat. Considerable damage was done by fire, water and smoke. The alarm was given by W. C. Broadbent.

Halifax, March 8—The body of Mrs. Margaret Brown, a widow aged fifty years, was found in her room early today by her son George, with her skull frightfully crushed and her face mutilated. 




