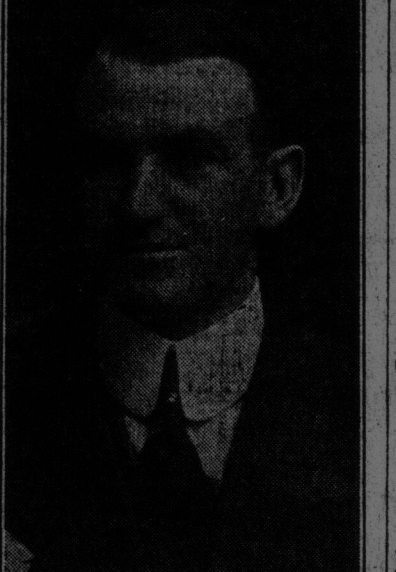
THREE BODIES RECOVERED

SCOTCH AND IRISH MAILS DELIVERED A DAY EARLIER

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JUVENILE COURT WORK IN HALIFAX

Judge Wallace Reviews It In Interesting Report

THREE YEARS IN EXISTENCE

Points to the Responsibility of Parents For Moral and Spiritual Welfare of Children—Has Had 480 Cases Before Him

(Halifax Echo.) There is contained in the report, presented to the legislature last week, an interesting report on the city juvenile court by His Honor Judge Wallace, whose interest in the matter is well evidenced by the fact that he has without compensation, given his services as judge of the court ever since its inception three years ago, and continues to do so.

without salutary parental control, the superintendent of neglected and delinquent children, who is an officer of the court, investigates the report, confers with the parents of the boy or girl and often by such action, renders unnecessary the summoning of the boy or girl or parents.

court to exclude anything like the appearance of criminal procedure and terminology. The boy or girl is not formally asked whether he or she is "guilty or not guilty," but is encouraged to tell the truth, and, as a rule, when the delinquent is thus treated, the particular facts admitted. Sometimes the delinquent appears on behalf of the children or their parents, and it is gratifying to report that counsel in such cases invariably have co-operated with the court in conducting the inquiry absolutely free from any technicalities, and in accordance with the policy of the court not to hold "trials," but earnest conferences concerning the child's condition and future welfare. The press of Halifax was also aided the policy of the court by refraining from publishing any report of individual cases.

During its existence the court has investigated 480 cases. In at least seventy per cent of these cases the delinquency of the boy or girl was traceable to defective home conditions involving, as a rule, criminal carelessness or moral obtuseness of parent. Juvenile delinquents are not born but made. In some instances they are the product of social conditions for the maintenance of which municipalities are responsible, but in the vast majority of cases the parents are to blame. Many parents who have appeared before the court seemed to assume that the responsibility for the moral and religious development of their children rested with the school teacher and the clergyman, and that the sole duty of parents was to feed their children and supply them with clothing and shelter. Other over-confident parents believe that their Magpie or Mary was able to take care of herself. Some of these parents had a tragic awakening.

The judge finds the absence of home discipline has been painfully evident in many cases of juvenile delinquency. A considerable number of the boys sent by the court to institutions have subsequently been placed out in good homes in the country and are now an expense to the municipality. One of the difficulties experienced by the court has been to secure fathers who from their habit or selfishness, remain idle a considerable portion of their time with the result that their children become neglected and their families are frequently in de-

circumstances. In some instances the juvenile court has sentenced such men to a term in the county jail and has released them on probation upon condition they took the pledge and paid a fixed sum weekly to the wife or someone else as trustee for the benefit of the families. It should be stated, continued the judge, that there are instances where the drink habit has not caused the poverty of certain persons, but has been the effect of a social misery caused by their poverty. In several cases the intemperance of a husband was traceable to the tactlessness of a wife, whose persistent nagging explained, if it did not excuse his greed. Many juvenile delinquents, who normally adhere to one of the many Christian denominations, are actually lacking in any religious faith or practice, so essential in moral development and character formation.

"After a judicial experience of thirteen years in a county court, judge's criminal court," says His Honor, "I am certain that there would much less need for such courts if more attention was paid to the religious training of the children. Nothing else can effectively curb the rising tide of delinquency and vice."

A certain percentage of juvenile delinquency is closely related to physical and mental defects in the child, and there is much need in the province of permanent custodial care of feeble-minded boys and girls. There are special reasons why girls of this class should be guarded. The juvenile court is not and never can be a cure-all for such cases. It is a palliative. The judge thinks a curfew law would not prove an effective cure for existing conditions in cities where delinquency and crime must be more ungenerally attacked and the defects and injustices of such courts remedied. Human rights of all should not be sacrificed to material interests of a few.

There is much social work to be done concerning which many of the people of the province seem complacently indifferent. The offences of the juvenile delinquents are very light in comparison with other crime which Nova Scotia will perpetrate if it disregards the rights of these children of whom it is the ultimate parent.

The juvenile court deals only with boys and girls under sixteen years of age. There is another class of boys sometimes called juvenile adults, between sixteen and twenty-one years of age, who cannot be sent to a reformatory and must go to jail or penitentiary. The attention of the department of justice, Ottawa, has been called to such cases and the present minister of justice has since promised to look into the question.

Daily Hints For the Cook

Queen Muffins. One-fourth cup of butter, one egg well beat 1-3 cup of sugar, 1/4 cups of flour, half cup of milk, 1/2 teaspoon of baking powder. Bake in buttered gem pan in a hot oven twenty minutes. Ladies' Cabbage. Boil a firm white cabbage in boiling water fifteen minutes; then drain, partly split in four parts to allow it to cook quickly and place in freshly boiled water and cook until tender. Allow it to become cold, chop finely, and add two beaten eggs, a level tablespoon of butter, a little salt and paprika and three tablespoons of milk. Place in a baking dish, cover with bread crumbs rolled in melted butter and bake in a hot oven until a rich brown on top.

BURNED TO THE GROUND

New House at Fair Vale Owned by Charles Dunlavy Destroyed—Children in Peril—Other Week-end Fires

A house at Fair Vale, owned and occupied by Charles Dunlavy, was burned to the ground yesterday morning. Mr. Dunlavy, his wife and two children had a narrow escape from being burned to death. They were awakened about two o'clock and realising their danger, gathered together, what clothes they could and escaped to a nearby summer house. It was with difficulty that the two children were saved by their parents. The house was a new one having just been completed and the loss is estimated at \$1,200 with \$200 insurance. It is not known how the fire started.

About 2.30 o'clock yesterday morning two alarms were rung in town by the fire department. The fire was in a house in Somerset street owned by John Kelly and John O'Brien. Mr. Kelly had his wrist severely cut, by glass. Fortunately a bystander saw the fire and rendered first aid and did so. The injured man was taken to Doctor Kelly's office. The property damage is said to be about \$500.

The firemen were called out on Saturday afternoon when an alarm was rung in from box 81. The fire was in the basement of a house at the corner of King street East and Westwater, owned by R. G. Murray. It is believed the fire was caused by the crossing of electric wires. Harry McCullough lives up stairs and Jarvis Wilson in the lower flat. Considerable damage was done by fire, water and smoke. The alarm was given by W. C. Broadbent.

HALIFAX WOMAN MURDERED—SON-IN-LAW ARRESTED

A funeral service will be held at Mrs. Curry's residence this afternoon at 8.30 o'clock, and the remains will be taken for interment to Jackson by this evening's Boston train.

The death of Aaron B. Douthright, farmer, of Little River, Albert County, took place at his home on Wednesday, the 4th inst. He was forty-six years old, and is survived by his wife.

Mrs. David Ritchie, widow of David Ritchie, formerly merchant of Dalhousie, died there on Wednesday. She was born in Hexton, N. B., in 1842, and was the eldest daughter of the late Alexander Givnan. She is survived by one sister Mrs. W. W. Doherty, and two brothers, Mrs. Ritchie had one child, Dr. A. A. Ritchie, who died in 1904.

TOMB OF OSIRIS FOUND BY PROFESSOR NAVILLE

Ruined Sanctuary Built at Time of Pyramids—Digging at Abydos, Egypt, Disclosed Two Large Halls

London, March 9.—Prof. E. Naville, in a letter published in the Times today on excavations of the Egypt exploration fund at Abydos, expresses the belief that they have found "what Greek authors called the tomb of Osiris, where the head of the god is supposed to be preserved."

The excavations began at the door which Prof. Petrie discovered two years ago. The doorway, Prof. Naville thinks, was the entrance to a passage leading to a subterranean chapel under the temple of Set I.

"We should have never expected what we found," he continued. "Between the doorway and the temple is a complete sanctuary, evidently of the time of the Pyramids, very much ruined but built with huge materials.

"It is rectangular, the inclosure wall is 12 feet thick and consists of two different castings, the outer one of rough limestone and the inner one of large blocks of hard red sandstone. The length of the inside is about 99 feet.





Confession of a Lady Mayoress

Officiating as First Lady of London Is No Light Task

(London T. B. B.) It was Sir William Trevelyan, who became lord mayor in 1906, who said, "The power behind the Mansion House walls is the lady mayoress." This is very true, although the general public apt to regard her position as a sinecure, simply because it is over-shadowed by the publicity which the lord mayor must of necessity endure.

Some idea of the labors, however, which the lady mayoress is called upon to fulfill may be gathered from the confession which Lady Trevelyan, whose husband occupied the Mansion House in 1908-9, made to the writer at the end of Sir George Trevelyan's year of mayoralty.

One Thousand Guests

"As chaperone of the Mansion House," said her ladyship, "I have acted as hostess to 25,000 guests. This is the number of people we have had to lunch, dinner or tea, but if audiences were included, the number of visitors to the Mansion House would be multiplied many times." It is not unusual for 1,000 to attend a reception at the Mansion House—people of all classes—and it is one of the penalties of her position that the lady mayoress must make herself agreeable to everyone with whom she comes into contact.

Here is a brief outline of a typical day in the life of the lady mayoress. She usually breakfasts at nine, and is then deeply immersed with her two secretaries in the morning's correspondence. Perhaps there is a dinner or reception to be held, in which case details have to be discussed, invitations sent out, and the whole thing generally organized.

In the meantime callers are arriving, their cards and messages sent up, and they are dealt with according to their business. Every moment until luncheon time is taken up, and in the afternoon there are always several other duties to fulfill, such as visit to a charitable institution, the opening of a sale of work, and possibly a meeting on behalf of some charity.

Perhaps the lady mayoress is holding a reception, too, or has agreed to visit someone "at home." The evening is probably taken up with a big dinner or reception in the Egyptian Hall, an apartment capable of holding 1,000 guests. Perhaps a ball follows, and it is seldom before twelve or one o'clock that the lady mayoress is able to retire.

SEPARATE BUILDING FOR WOMEN PRISONERS

Dr. Katherine Davis Hopes To Secure It Within Two Years—Fifteen Story Edifice

New York, March 7.—Dr. Katherine B. Davis, commissioner of correction, told an audience of judges and artists at the Pen and Brush Club yesterday afternoon that she hopes in two years to see all the women prisoners in New York housed in one building. She said that, largely through the efforts of Annie Matson, a Boston woman, and other public spirited women, a city in West Third Street for the exclusive use of female prisoners.

"A fifteen-story building is planned on a plot of land owned by the city," she said. "It will be built up to date in every particular. There will be baths, open-air loggia, etc."

"There is a great need of an exclusive women's prison at present. New York City is the only one in the United States which is medieval in comparison to the methods of other cities. When I see the condition of women prisoners here, Bedford Reformatory seems like the Waldorf to me."

Dr. Davis declares against short sentences. She said prisoners either should be given comparatively long sentences or discharged. Two or three days sentences provide an opportunity to see that a prisoner gets a bath, but not to do any useful work.

MAY MEAN TIE-UP OF ALL LONDON BUILDING WORK

London, March 9.—The men engaged in the building trades of the metropolis have sent an ultimatum to the employers in retaliation for a circular letter issued by the Building Trades Federation, requesting provincial builders not to employ London workmen during the continuance of the existing dispute.

At a meeting of the men's unions on Saturday a resolution was passed which declares that the time had arrived when all members of the Master Builders' Association must be regarded as at war with the trades union, and that only where employers withdrew from that association should union men be allowed to work for them.

The resolution, if carried into effect will paralyze the building trades, which have suffered from a partial strike for several weeks.



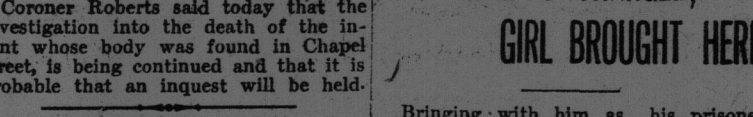

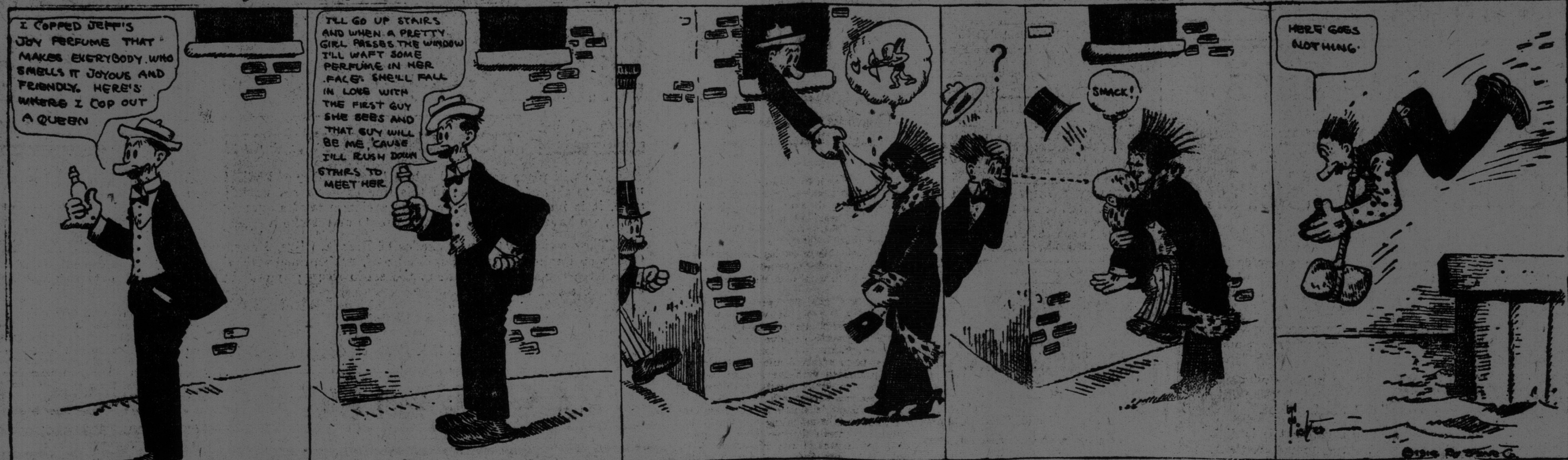

The funeral will take place at Kaleden on Tuesday.

PROBABLY LONGER THAN HE EXPECTED

Irvine Sent to Jail For Fourteen Months With Hard Labor

Andrew Irvine was arrested on Saturday evening and appeared in the police court this morning to answer a charge of using profane language in Charlotte street. The prisoners were fined \$5 each, which was paid by the captain.
